Here's city ordinance 110 in action: The city of East Jordan, using ordinance 110 as a legal weapon, hired William Porter to demolish an old, empty house at 102 Echo street after legally notifying the owner that the house must be removed. With no comment from the owner, listed as Mrs. Lucy Compo, of Fenton, Michigan, the city waited 30 days and demolished the house and ordered the fire department to burn the debris. The legal right to remove old, unsafe and unsightly buildings was a long time coming, but the city finally has the legal tools to do so under its ordinance, 110. The city now has started proceedings to cause removal of the old former store building at 205 Water street, listed at the city clerk's office as being owned by Steve Paterka, of Charlevoix. Old, empty, unsightly and unsafe structures are fire hazards and are attractive nuisances to children, it was said.

A public hearing for residents of the East Jordan school district has been scheduled for 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, September 27th in the high school.

The session is being called to discuss publically the coming three-school district election on the proposed merger of East Jordan, Central Lake and Ellsworth school districts.

The special school election will be held in each of the three districts, Monday October 3rd.

At a meeting of the boards of education of the three schools, the following resolution was approved: The principle of a merger between the three schools would be beneficial to the educational opportunities of the children of the three districts.

Following are benefits of such a merger as released by the three school boards: improvement of curriculum or subjects offered. More vocational subjects. Better grouping of students. Accreditation for all students. Improved labs and shops (in new buildings). Teachers working in their major fields. Inducement to teaching candidates to come to this area. Inducement to industry and people to come to this area.

Costs of the merger could be and likely would be as much or more, than at present. The students would be offered more for this cost, it was said.

A building to house the planned merger and the necessary program has been estimated to cost \$5.50 per \$1,000 valuation for a period of 26 years.

Operational costs of the new building have been estimated at about \$35,000. How much of this could be saved by better utilization of teachers and by a reduction in use of present building use can not be determined at this time, Max Damoth local superintendent said.

Citizenship Day

Saturday, September 17, is Citizenship Day. For many citizens, the reaction is, "So what." Which means that you never miss the water till the well runs dry.

Even if you were born an American citizen, you are descended from people who weren't. They became citizens through the difficult processes of immigration and naturalization, except for some who became citizens of the United States by establishing the United States by means of a war.

For those people, citizenship was not a "so-what" proposition. It was one of the most important things in their lives.

Citizenship means full membership in a country. A country and its citizens are not really separate.

Citizenship involves both civic and political rights, as well as civic and political duties. Bills of rights in the United States Constitution and in state constitutions guarantee civic rights to all Americans. A child possesses civic rights, such as the right to worship as he pleases, from the moment he is born.

In turn, each citizen owes allegiance to his country. It is his civic duty to support his government, obey its laws, and defend his country.

We need to think more and more about these things now and in the years ahead.

Heavens! Without color, Walt Disney would be just another

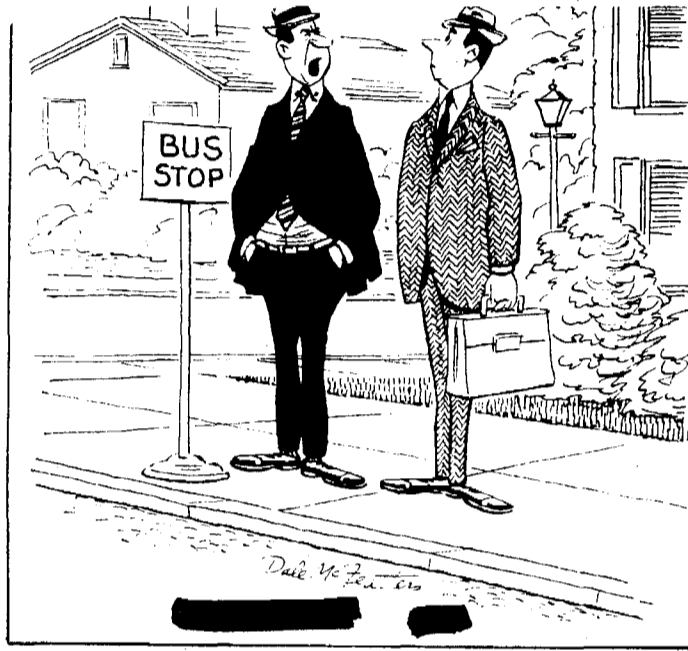
millionaire, terribly unsung.

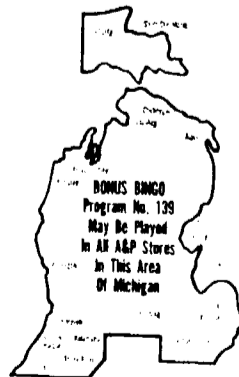

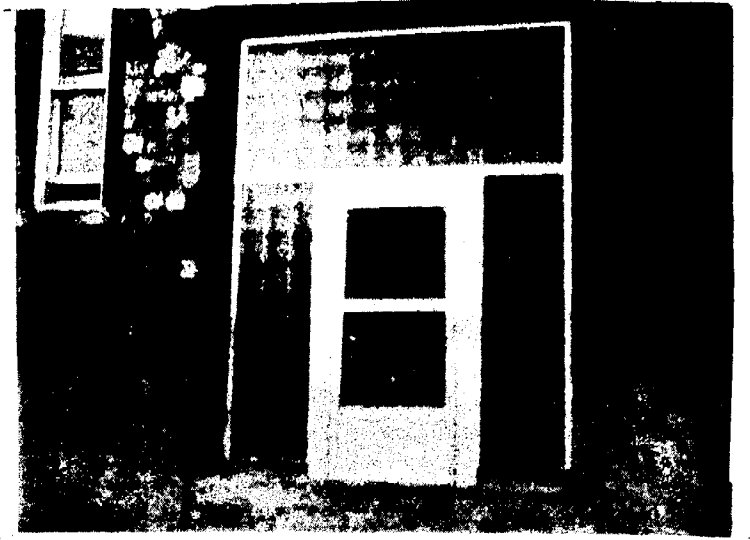

Dancing was enjoyed; the music was furnished by the Crazy Notes orchestra of Boyne Falls.



Susan is in the 12th grade at East Jordan High School and is planning to further her education in journalism at Ferris State College.



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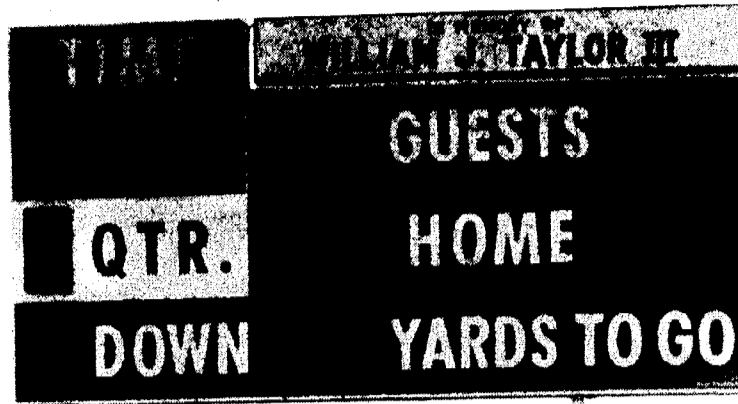

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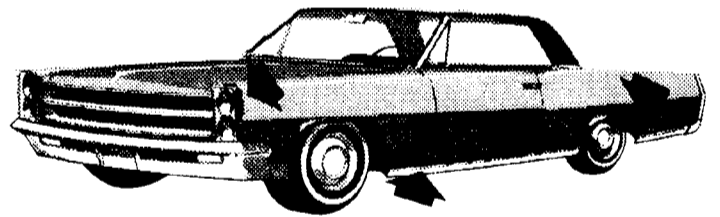
