## Church Census Will Cover All E. Jordan Homes Next Sunday

### Ask Public To Cooperate

Four East Jordan Churches are cooperating with a local church census with the hope of aiding the churches in their service to the community.

The census will be taken in East Jordan on Sunday, October 16th through a cooperative effort of the Methodist, Lutheran, Presbyterian and United Missionary churches.

Members of these churches will compose a group of visitors who will make a call at every home in the city.

Purpose of the census is to find out the church membership or preference of the residents in East Jordan. The findings will be tabulated, and each church will be given a copy of these findings.

Sponsors of the census are hoping that the people of East Jordan will welcome the census takers, and will cooperate in supplying the information asked.

### To Rate School

Members of the North Central Association for Secondary Schools and Colleges will evaluate the East Jordan school program Thursday for college accreditation.

Members of the evaluating team will arrive from Alpena, Big Rapids, Boyne City, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Clare, Newberry, Petoskey, Reed City, Rogers City and Traverse City.

The members will visit classrooms and teachers during the day Thursday and later compare notes on the standard of the East Jordan school.

The sessions will be led by George E. Mills, of the bureau of school services of the University of Michigan.

Members of the evaluating team were to arrive here Wednesday night and hold a dinner meeting at the Jordan Inn with school board members and superintendent Max Damoth and Principal Keith Annear. Seven of the members will remain over night.

The East Jordan school program has long been accredited with the University of Michigan and the North Central Association and Thursday's evaluation is a periodic check on the system here for continued accreditation.

## High School May Offer Classes To Interested Adults

During recent months local school officials have been questioned by a number of individuals regarding possible course offerings on the post high school or adult education level.

Superintendent Max Damoth said this week that "if there is enough interest the local school will provide facilities, and locate teaching staff."

Initial plans call for adult courses in Spanish and typing in addition to the specialized courses in mathematics and drafting already being offered under the Tool and Die Apprenticeship program.

Any other type of course could be offered if there is sufficient enrollment to cover the cost of operation.

It is planned that high school credit could be obtained for those wishing to apply such credit toward a diploma.

Classes will begin in early November and run through the winter months. It is planned that each class will meet for one, 2-hour session each week.

Any citizen who is interested should contact Jim Shepard, Vocational Coordinator, stating the course or courses in which he or she would like to enroll.

## Servicemen's Basket Program Under Way By Legion Auxiliary

Some fifty Christmas baskets for East Jordan servicemen and women are under preparation by the American Legion Auxiliary. With the aid of the Legion men, the baskets will be shipped to local men in service before Christmas.

The newly organized program replaces the Legion Auxiliary's annual work of preparing and distributing Christmas baskets to the local needy. The growing number of local men in service prompted Auxiliary members to reinstate the program which had ended some 20 years ago after World War II.

Auxiliary President Mrs. Tom Breakey said baskets to servicemen overseas will be sent airmail the last of November and baskets to those in the states will be sent early in December.

"We are still checking the names and addresses of East Jordan men and women in service," Mrs. Breakey said. "And we hope to have a complete list soon."

Those parents with boys or girls in service who for some reason are not getting the News-Herald through the Community Chest, are being urged to leave their addresses at the Post office. Names and addresses of those in service who receive the News-Herald have been turned over to the Auxiliary.

"We have received wonderful help from residents," Mrs. Breakey said. "Our two bake sales and our supper helped sponsor funds for the basket program."

Not all of those in service from East Jordan are men. The ladies have found two or three women who are serving in the armed forces.

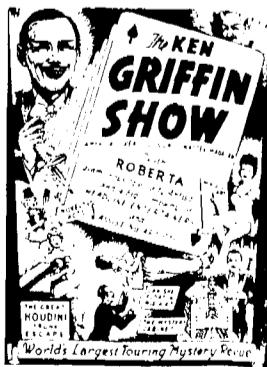
The show is being planned to swell the treasury of the chamber and at the same time give young and old residents an opportunity to see an evening of unusual entertainment.

CONSERVATION

The first eleven days of special grouse hunting on Garden and High islands in Lake Michigan resulted in 197 hunters taking 66 birds. On Garden Island 18 grouse were flushed for every one shot, and on High Island where cover is less dense, the figures were 12 flushed for every one shot.

Although this shooting record is not noteworthy, Conservation Department game biologists point out that hunting conditions are more severe than on the mainland. Island cover is heavy and the going is rough through dense shrub-tangle.

"But the birds are there," say biologists, who estimate the grouse populations to be above the average for most mainland areas. One island hunter with a good dog put up 35 grouse and 43 woodcock on opening day.

The special season on the islands will continue through November 10. There are no bag limits, nor will birds taken there be counted against the season limit for the regular grouse season. The island seasons are experimental with careful counts taken of birds flushed, shot, etc.

Michigan's Department of Conservation has just the thing for the man who has everything.

In this air age of forest fire detection, fire towers are giving way to the broader, more mobile coverage of plans and 10 of these surplus steel structures are for sale through the state Department of Administration in Lansing.

The towers, which have served as sentinels of the Conservation Department's forest fire program since the 1920's, range from 82 to 105 feet tall and feature metal cabs.

Nine of the structures which are still standing are being offered for \$100 each. The other four which have been dismantled carry a minimum price of \$200 apiece.

# Around Charlevoix County

John D. Voelker of Ishpeming, a former member of the Michigan Supreme Court and author of "Anatomy of a Murder" and others, has expressed the fear that the area's beauty is on the verge of giving way to man's lust to build and attract tourist dollars.

The Voelkers have a cottage at Sequanota near Ironton. They frequently come to the cottage but finds it less and less attractive due to intense development along Lake Charlevoix. He was quoted in a recent news story as saying that "In their lust to erect monuments to themselves, people too often overlook the fact that the "unspoiledness" of wilderness is a greater achievement than anything man can build."

He defines "unspoiledness" as nature before man starts musing it up so he can build roads, cottages, sewage systems and other creations.

Debby Williams, 16, who returned to her Ironton home following a recent football game, may have saved the lives of her sister, Becky, 14, and her young brothers, Randy, 8 and Rusty, 4. She returned to find the living room filled with smoke and her sister, who was baby-sitting with their brothers, asleep on the davenport. She aroused the sleeping youngsters and got them out of the house before calling the Charlevoix fire department. Later the fire fighters were joined by the East Jordan department. The house was completely gutted by the blaze which apparently started in the furnace room behind the living room. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ray "Sonny" Williams were away from home at the time.

An extensive remodeling job had just been completed on the house and the furnace placed in operation by workman the day before.

The U. S. Coast Guard cutter Sundew, stationed at Charlevoix, left its home port last weekend for its annual trip to the shipyards. This year it will be at Sturgeon Bay, Wis., for a general overhaul and repairs. It is expected to be there until early next month.

Members of the East Jordan police department will be among the law enforcement officers from throughout the area who will be attending a training program being offered by the F. B. I. The sessions will be held at the county building in Charlevoix every Tuesday afternoon and evening through November 1. Subject matter, taught by special agents, will cover various phases of law enforcement. The course is sponsored by Sheriff Philo Sumner, Charlevoix County Sheriff.

Boyer City is exploring the possibility of public housing in an effort to relieve the tight housing situation, according to Forbes Tompkins, city manager.

A study of the possibility was initiated after it was found that Grayling in Crawford county had processed its request for 60 new housing units. Cost of setting up a program for Boyer City that would be a part of the county's overall planning system would be \$3,500, members of the planning commission have been told.

Work at the new Medusa Portland Cement Co. plant near Charlevoix reached a high point recently when the 12 storage silos for finished cement were completed after 272 hours of work. More than 250 men, working around the clock, poured 12,500 cubic yards of cement in all kinds of weather including gale winds that threatened to close down the operation less than 12 hours before it was completed. The silos, constructed in two rows of six each, are located on the north side of the slip where the company's carrier will dock to take on its cargo.

The silos will be the highest structure on the property with the exception of the stack. The silos are 190 feet high. The stack is 220 feet high.

The facility is located at South Point in Charlevoix township on the north side of approximately 1,000 acres owned by Medusa whose home office is located in Cleveland. The plant is scheduled to be in operation by July 4, 1967.

Not too many couples observe a golden wedding anniversary and fewer yet celebrate a sixtieth anniversary. The P. R. Rosses of Charlevoix are one of those few. They will celebrate their sixtieth anniversary at a family dinner at their home in Charlevoix, Saturday evening.

Time was when a motorist had only to keep an eye on patrolmen on the highway but now he will have to keep an eye on the sky as well if Michigan State Police put into general practice its proposed new idea to stop speeders. At a recent meeting Michigan Justices at Boyne Mountain, the State Police gave a demonstration of how the idea would work. Cruising overhead at a given altitude, the police would clock a motorist driving over a 660 foot check area and calibrate his speed. Should he exceed the speed limit, the pilot would radio a patrol car on the ground and the arrest would be made.

If the car covered the distance in six seconds it would be traveling 75 miles an hour; at five seconds 90 miles an hour; 4.5 seconds a hundred miles an hour.

## Concert Season Is Sellout

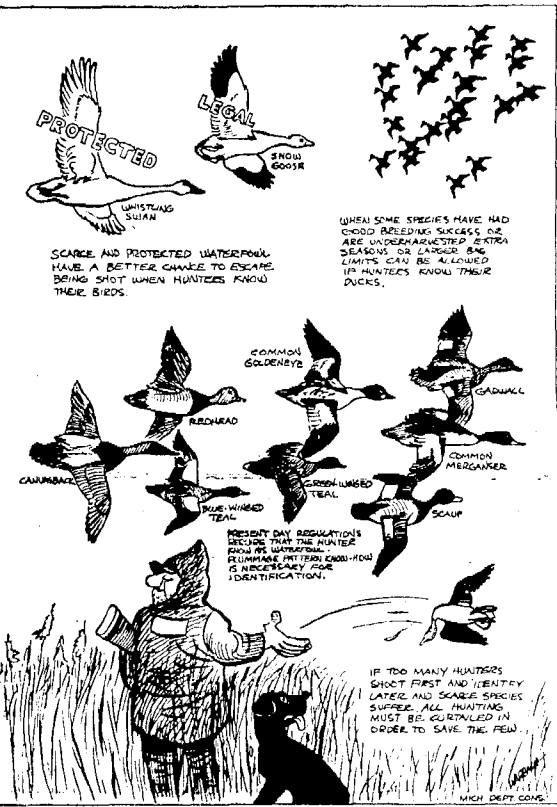

South Ann Farm Bureau met at the home of Delbert Ingalls for its annual election of officers.

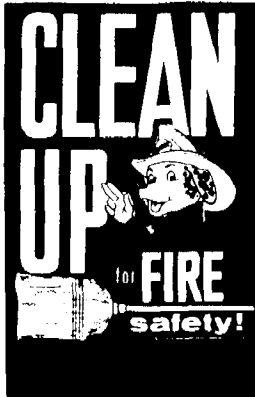
## Clean House Doesn't Burn

Above all, make sure that any kerosene or oil room heaters are clean and in sound working condition before you put them away for the season or get them ready for summer camp use. A dirty defective one is about as dangerous an object as you can have in your home.

It could be time to check the chimney too—it's particularly important if you burn wood or coal. And a clean, tight chimney means fuel savings as well as fire safety. If you have an exhaust fan and duct over your kitchen stove, how long since it has had the greasy residue removed?



Those pesky bugs are gone. The air has a special crispness. Rich splashes of autumn colors add a magic touch to clear, rippling streams and placid lakes. Hard-hitting steelheads and cagey brown trout are on the move. There you have it, fishermen—your perfect combination for fall fishing. And it's all yours in more than 400 Michigan lakes and streams where rainbows, including stream-running steelheads, and browns remain open to action during the extended fall trout season. Adding an extra come-on this fall are coho salmon—the state's newest glamour fish—which are expected to make upstream runs in some rivers of lakes Michigan and Superior. Cohos are legal catches in inland waters through November 30 under size and creel limits covering trout. Virtually all of the cohos caught this fall will be bragging-sized keepers with inches to spare. What more could any red-blooded fisherman ask for? —Mich. Department of Conservation.

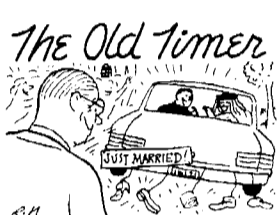

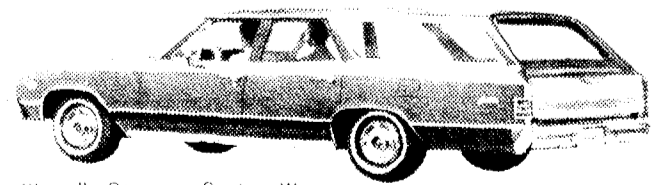

# CITY OF EAST JORDAN..Ordinance 111

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A FRANCHISE AND REGULATING THE BUSINESS OF A COMMUNITY ANTENNA TELEVISION SYSTEM

THE CITY OF EAST JORDAN ORDAINS:

Section 1. There is hereby granted to the Lake Charlevoix Cable TV, Inc., of the City of Charlevoix and State of Michigan, and its successors, hereinafter called the grantee, the right and privilege for a period of 10 years from the effective date of this Ordinance, to construct, maintain and operate in the present and future streets, alleys and public places of the City of East Jordan, towers, poles, lines, cables, necessary wiring and other apparatus for the purpose of receiving, amplifying, and distributing television and radio signals to said City and the inhabitants thereof.

Section 2. That poles or towers shall be so erected as not to interfere with the traffic over the streets and alleys, and the location of all poles, towers or other obstructions shall be fixed with the prior written approval and under the supervision of the City of East Jordan, as to such location giving consideration to the reasonable operation of the same; providing further that such location shall not be a vested interest, and the same shall be removed or relocated by grantee at grantee's expense whenever the same restrict or obstruct the operation or location or any future operation or location of said streets and alleys and public places.

Section 3. That permission is hereby granted the said grantee and its successors to attach or otherwise fix cables or wires to the pole facilities of any public utility company even though the same may cross over the streets, sidewalks, public lands and high-ways of the City of East Jordan, provided the said grantee or its successors secures the permission and consent of said aforementioned public utility companies concerned to affix the said cables and/or wires or other apparatus to their pole facilities.

Section 4. That all streets and sidewalks disturbed or damaged in the construction or maintenance of said cable lines and other appurtenances shall be promptly repaired by the grantee at its expense and to the satisfaction of the City of East Jordan.

Section 5. That the grantee shall be subject to all ordinances now in force or that may be hereafter enacted relative to the use of the streets and alleys of the City of East Jordan.

Section 6. That the grantee shall hold the City of East Jordan harmless from all claims for damages arising out of the construction, maintenance, or operation of said cable lines or other appurtenances.

Section 7. That this franchise shall be subject to revocation at the will of the City Council of the City of East Jordan, Michigan.

Section 8. That this franchise shall be subject to repeal for misuse, non-use or failure to comply with the provisions hereof.

Section 9. That the Lake Charlevoix Cable TV, Inc., shall establish reasonable standards of service and quality of transmission and prevent unjust discrimination in service or rates.

Section 10. That the Lake Charlevoix Cable TV, Inc., shall be required to furnish continuous and uninterrupted service to the public, Acts of God excepted in accordance with the terms of the franchise throughout the entire period hereof.

Section 11. That the said Lake Charlevoix Cable TV, Inc., shall not fix rates for its services without first reviewing them with the City Council and coming to an agreement thereon, and any increases must be made in like manner. Nor shall the value of the property of the utility used as a basis for fixing such rates include a value predicated upon the franchise, good will or prospective profits.

Section 12. That the Lake Charlevoix Cable TV, Inc., shall make its services available to any resident of the City of East Jordan, provided that it is economically feasible to provide such service.

This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its adoption by the City Council of the City of East Jordan.
