Residents' Tax Opinion Is Sought By City Council

A "yes" vote at the polls on an income-payroll based tax proposed by the city council will not automatically establish the tax for East Jordan.

At Tuesday night's city council meeting it was explained by councilman Harry Watson and city attorney Robert Klevorn that by putting the income tax issue on the spring election ballot, the council is asking for an expression of the people concerning such a tax. But it is not necessary to hold a vote on the issue, it was said. The city could create an ordinance and enact the tax without a vote. But it is giving the people an opportunity to say whether or not they want the city to enact the tax in the future.

The tax would create a one percent deduction of payrolls for those people working within the city; and a one percent deduction of the annual net income of business and professional men. Non-residents working within the city would pay one half of one percent of their payroll earnings.

Housing Members Named

Mayor Betty Robertson appointed five residents to an East Jordan housing commission in the city's present work of seeking federal funds for possible construction of low rent housing for the elderly and others.

Those named to the commission and their terms of office were: Lysle Johnston, one year; Vern Whiteford, two; Roman Dubas, three; Jack Zoulek, four; and James Lilak, five.

The council earlier had passed an ordinance creating a housing commission which now will recommend a site for constructing the proposed housing unit.

When all of the federal requirements are met, the city will make application to the federal government for a grant from the federal housing assistance administration.

To Sign Sewer Contract

The city council has authorized the Mayor and the City Clerk to enter into an agreement with the County of Charlevoix pertaining to the extending of city sewer facilities to Grandvue Hospital.

Kit Carson, of Charlevoix, acting for the county board of supervisors, presented a contract to the city council Tuesday night which agrees that the county will construct the sewer at an approximate cost of \$30,000. The county will receive free use of the sewer for a ten year period, after which the county will begin making regular sewer tax payments to the city.

Soloists and ensembles appearing on the program received a 1st division rating at the Solo and Ensemble festival in early February. They will be participating in the State Solo and Ensemble Festival at Hastings on the 18th of March.

"We cordially invite the public to attend this program which give you an opportunity to hear the soloists and ensembles and the high school choir which is in its first year after a lapse of a few years," the director said.

She married Glenn Bearss in September, 1960 at Charlevoix and they lived there until they moved to East Jordan four years ago.

Besides her husband, she leaves a daughter, Peggy Sue, her mother, Mrs. Godfrey McDonald and one sister, Mrs. William Kerr of Charlevoix.

Study Group Votes "Yes"

It now is evident that some form of consolidation of Charlevoix county schools will be the top area school news for some time to come.

Clayton Healey, a member of a Michigan school consolidation steering committee, and a strong supporter of school mergers, told members of the local school citizens' committee Monday night that most schools in the area need more room; and he feels that through consolidation an area vocational educational program could be established.

Healey is among those who see the Michigan Legislature eventually wielding a dictatorial stick, forcing certain schools to consolidate, regardless of the wishes of the taxpayers or the voters.

The ominous threat of an all-powerful legislature has for some time been hung over the heads of those voters who feel that school consolidation may bring a burdensome tax boost.

"I feel that school consolidation is a coming thing," Healey told the committee members, "and you know the power of the Legislature."

For the past year or so northern Michigan residents have been hearing that the state could eventually withhold state aid to certain schools that do not consolidate; and that the legislature has been "thinking in that direction."

The state presently has no power to withhold state aid from schools for not consolidating.

In a vote regarding some form of school consolidation, the East Jordan school's citizen committee members Monday night voted overwhelmingly in favor of exploring a merger of some kind. The vote result was about the same as that taken when the committee was first formed some months ago.

Since that time the committee has been making an exhaustive study of the school, its building, its curriculum, its administration activities, all phases of the operation here. The feeling that the school should be consolidated in some way has not changed among committee members as the study progressed.

The fact that each school at East Jordan, Boyne City and Charlevoix has been discussing some form of consolidation with each other or with outside county schools is well known. All the possibilities are being explored by school officials. No individual school board wants its preliminary discussion aired until they are prepared to make a definite proposal to the voters.

As the result of a consolidation opinion survey in East Jordan, conducted by Ted Malpass, it was reported that the various groups and individuals contacted were in favor of a merger. Malpass said that local teachers and the school administration were in favor of a merger, but that he felt the general public was not much interested in expressing an opinion one way or another.

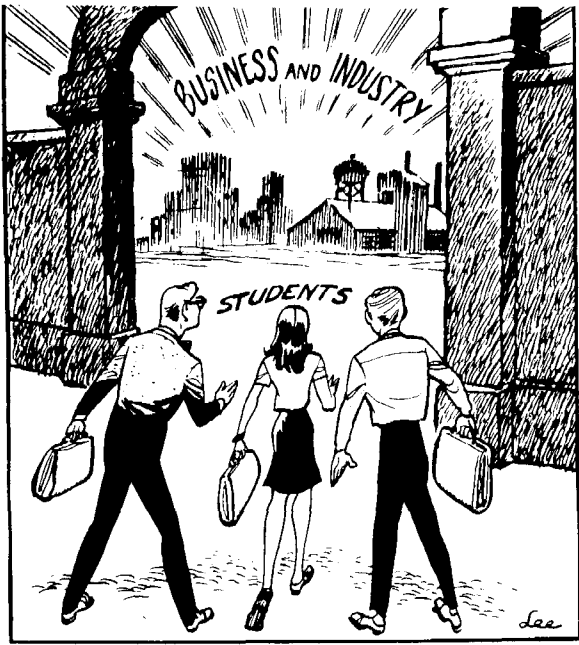
An East Jordan school enrollment projection study has revealed that in five years the number of students through the sixth grade will increase from the present 591 to 668; and it was said that students from the seventh grade through the twelfth will increase from 398 to 445.

The study was made for the school by Claus Bekema, of Davenport Associates, of Grand Rapids. He made the projection of student enrollment to find the adequacy of the present school building for future use. It was said the school is now overcrowded in many areas.

Sub-committees of the citizens committee gave reports on the study now under way at the school, but they were not yet complete.

When the study committee has finished its work, it plans to present the school board with a complete list of its findings and recommendations.

STUDENT-INDUSTRY DIALOGUE

In today's changing world the student who wants to make his dreams become a reality should be made aware of how industry is doing just that for millions of Americans.

We are in an era of technological development. Industry requires young people with broad vision, great human energy and with the wisdom necessary to deal with an ever-changing world. The student who is liable to contribute new ideas, new efforts, new concepts is the one industry is seeking. Dr. R. Franklin Thompson, president, University of Puget Sound, Tacoma, Washington, said recently "that industry has become more alert to the practical use of ideas... Dr. Thompson continued: "American business is far from being the soulless, heartless, money-grabbing institution it is sometimes pictured to be... this year over seven hundred million dollars in corporate profits will be spent for the public good, over one-half of which will aid schools and colleges."

Today creation of new industries, expansion of present old industries, and the continuing parade of technological changes provide challenges the student faces as he seeks to find his place in this new age.

Industry is helping in this challenge.

Romney Offers 4-Part Solution To U.S. Problems

Michigan Gov. George Romney told the Congress of Industry at the National Association of Manufacturers annual New York meeting that "the growing centralization of Federal power is not only dwarfing America's men, but it is dwarfing state and local governments."

Gov. Romney said there are two things wrong with us. "The first is the stifling consequence of overcentralization," he said.

"The second is that Federal action alone is too superficial to succeed and will only raise expectations that it cannot fulfill."

"Unless basic trends are reversed, there is a grave danger that the flood of Federal dollars, Federal decisions and Federal domination will smother the people's capacity for independent, voluntary action and self-government," he said.

Gov. Romney, a former president of American Motors, said the NAM must support a "four-dimensional approach" to solving the nation's problems.

He said the founding fathers set out four ways to problem solving:

"First their voluntary associations provided independent cooperative centers.

"Second, their private enterprises provided independent competitive centers.

"Third, state and local governments provided locally oriented action centers.

"Fourth, the Federal government provided an action center to cope with tasks requiring unified national effort."

He said the Federal government has eclipsed its proper role.

"We are trading in our Aladdin's lamp of four-dimensional power in problem solving for the old lamp of a government directed and controlled society that has failed throughout the ages," he said.

"It's popular to say these days that you can't buy much with five dollars. But I put it to you that you can. With five dollar contributions to an honest candidate you can help buy something that will be one of your most precious possessions: honest government."

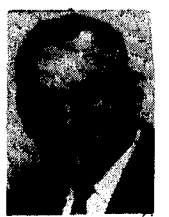

Big Lift for Wildlife Studies



The snowmobile has put thousands of recreationists happily on the trail of new winter fun in the last few years. It also has taken a lot of the slow, leg-aching drudgery out of winter field studies conducted by conservation officers, game and fish biologists, foresters, and other Conservation Department workers. With the Department's fleet of 60-70 snow-going machines, conservation field men are able to scout into remote areas to check winter deeryard conditions, timber stands, wildlife projects, and other developments on their outdoor "beat". Besides allowing these workers to get into back country they might not be able to otherwise reach at this time of the year, snowmobiles also enable them to cover much more ground than is possible on snowshoes. --Mich. Dept. of Conservation

About Snowmobiles

Recent snow storms have raised the vehicles commonly known as "snowmobiles" high in the public interest -- for emergency service, fun, and in some cases, bad temper.

We have had complaints of operators running or trying to run on traveled parts of main streets highways -- also chewing up shrubs and small trees, lawns, etc., as they romp over private property. At least one has plunged through ice on a lake.

Be advised that unless they have the equipment required of a motor vehicle in Michigan -- they are not allowed to be licensed to run on the public highway. This includes such things as lights fore and aft, windshield with wipers, direction signals, brakes and brake light, etc. Few of these machines comply.

If an accident occurs involving such a machine and a vehicle licensed to travel on the public highway, the burden of legal liability would naturally be on the owner of the exotic vehicle. He would probably have a few more busted ribs also. We are told that the Conservation Department is considering laying out snowmobile trails on public lands. Also, that the Department of State Highways and State Police are working on legislation to clarify the status of the winter-type scooters.

Meanwhile, do what you can to persuade local enthusiasts to keep off the regular traveled streets and highways and out of the widow Jones' azalea patch.

OUTDOOR SHOTS



Public deeryard tours have been set by the Conservation Department for various parts of the northern Lower Peninsula in March and April.

The specially guided field trips, aimed at giving people a first-hand look at pinch-period conditions facing deer during the winter, are scheduled for these dates, originating from the following Department installations:

March 12, Harrison and West Branch field offices; and April 2, Baldwin field office and Gaylord district headquarters.

April 16 is the date and the stoplight corner in the village of Vanderbilt is the starting place for an elk tour into the Pigeon River Area.

Each of the organized Sunday outings will begin at 10 a. m. and last until approximately 3 p. m., which means that followers should pack field lunches.

Spectators should wear waterproof footwear and warm, but light clothing to make their travels afield as comfortable as possible. These trips will be routed by field men so that snowshoes will not be necessary.

No reservations are needed to take part in the "show me" excursions, but each individual or touring party must make its own transportation arrangements.

As in the past, none of the tours will be laid out to see deer, dead or alive. Instead, they will be charted to show people where and how deer weather the winter.

Department field men will draw attention to signs of over-browsing by deer and point out different types of natural foods, including choice and so-called "stuffing" species, upon which deer either pull through the winter or die.

Touring groups will also be guided through areas in and around deeryards where timber cuttings by the Department and commercial loggers are easing winter food shortages for hungry deer.

"This is the most critical moment in the history of gun legislation." Those were the words of Lansing attorney Harold Glasen, vice-president of the National Rifle Association.

Glasen's cause for alarm is a vicious, anti-gun bill just introduced by President Lyndon Johnson through Senator Thomas Dodd of Connecticut. It replaces Dodd's infamous bill, S. 1.

In a bit of fancy maneuvering, the contents of S. 1, were pulled out of the bill. In place of Dodd's bill, the new LBJ Gun Bill has been substituted--and it is a lulu! In the House of Representatives an identical bill has been introduced as H. R. 5384.

The bill, termed "far worse than anything Dodd ever dreamed of," contains a preamble which claims that guns (not people) are the cause of crime, juvenile delinquency, etc. Among other things, the LBJ Gun Bill would:

- Forbid the purchase of any type of firearms by mail.
- Forbid the purchase of any pistol except in the state of residence.
- Allow "over the counter" purchase of rifles and shotguns. However, the Secretary of the Treasury would be given dictatorial powers to regulate gun sales or ownership as he sees fit. Since the Treasury Secretary serves at the pleasure of the President of the United States, it would give President Johnson full control of every type of firearm. In so doing, it would over-ride

the Constitution of the United States!

The new bill would also repeal the entire Federal Firearms Act (Title 18) which now offers reasonable protection. This move is designed to keep S. 1 away from the House Ways and Means Committee so it can be assigned, instead, to the House Judicial Committee, now packed with anti-gun members.

Plaus call for pushing S. 1 and H. R. 5384 through Congress before an alarmed American citizenry can stather forces and fight back.

In pushing rapidly for his bill, President Johnson said: "It (the bill) will gain added strength as the states pass firearms legislation and licensing laws similar to the Sullivan Law in New York." (New York's crime rate is the highest in the United States.)

"To pass strict firearms control laws at every level of government is an act of simple prudence and a measure of a civilized society. Further delay is unconscionable."

Pursued to its obvious conclusion, the LBJ Gun Bill can leave the American public disarmed and at the mercy of criminals. This, ironically, is what it claims to be trying to prevent.

Unless this is what you want, you have a citizen duty--right now--to phone, write or telegraph your Congressman and Senators Philip A. Hart and Robert P. Griffin in Washington to let them know how you feel about S. 1 and H. R. 5384. Next week may be too late!

Nylon Turf Gives All-Weather Base

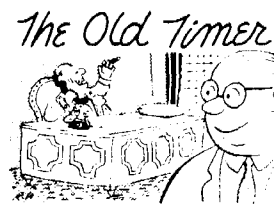

One Out of Five Employed Works for the Government

One out of five of the United States working force is now in government service at local, state and federal levels. As of November 1966 there were 2,608,000 people on federal payrolls and 8,457,000 on state and local payrolls, with another 3.2 million members of the armed forces. In the 12 months ending November 1966, federal employees increased from 2.4 million to 2,608,000. This is a much faster pace than has been recorded for some time. State and local government employment increased in the same period from 7,920,000 to 8,470,000. While the population growth rate was only 1.1 per cent, and private industry's employment growth rate was 4 per cent, the growth rate for government employment was 7.2 per cent.

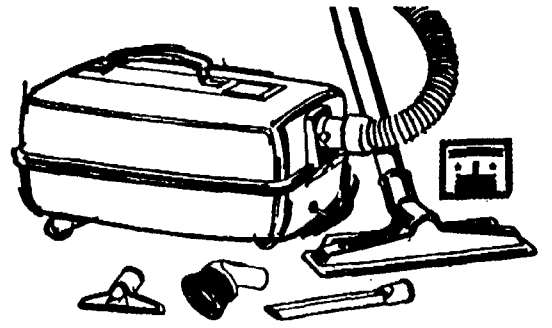

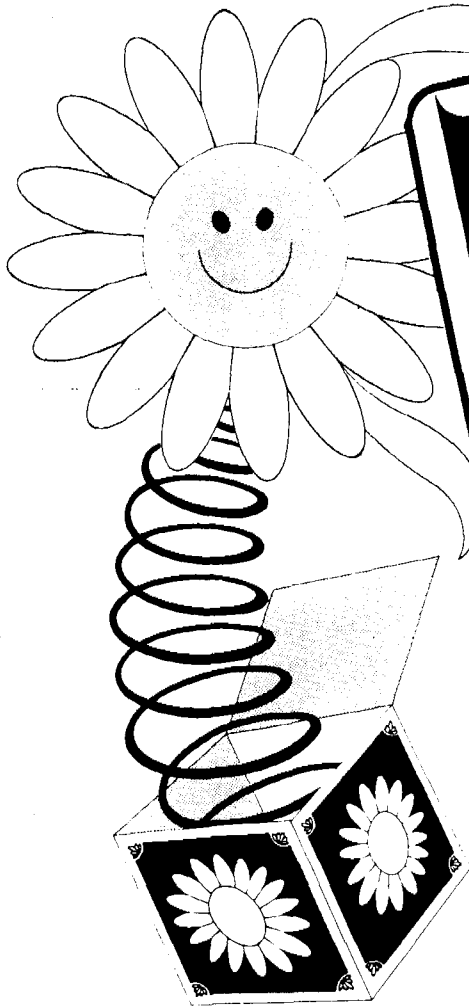

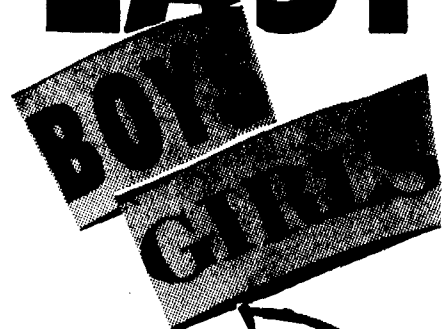
