



Thousands Of Dollars Lost Yearly

Dairy farmers who want pointers on the control of mastitis—a disease which costs Charlevoix county thousands of dollars in milk and cow losses each year—can get them at a Better Milking Clinic on Tuesday, January 25, at East Jordan High School Auditorium.

The allday program with speakers and demonstrators from Michigan State College and several milking machine companies, is under sponsorship of the Charlevoix County extension service. Doors will open at 9:30 a.m. and close at 4 p.m.

Farmers who have no troubles yet with mastitis can learn how to keep it out of their herds and those who have infected herds can find out how to rid their cows of this costly disease.

Sharpies Selling Silly Sugar Syrup

You'll be eating pancakes and maple syrup before long. The season is approaching.

And the State Department of Agriculture warns customers not to get gypped when they buy the syrup.

Three men are under arrest in Indiana for selling 174 gallons of substitute maple syrup for \$3.65 per gallon. Their syrup was made from sugar and water with only maple flavor added. This syrup normally sells for about \$1.27 per gallon.

Michigan law requires maple syrup be made by evaporation of maple sap or concentrate and must contain not more than 35 per cent water. It must weigh at least 11 pounds to the gallon.

The label must identify the product as maple syrup. Read your label is the advice given by the department of agriculture.

Maybe you are paying maple syrup prices for sugar, water and artificial flavoring.



The supervisors promised the school that eleven remaining buildings used for cattle display and other show purposes would be removed from the grounds within the next two years.

Development Coming For Grandvue

Additional development at Grandvue hospital was seen when the Charlevoix county board of supervisors authorized sale of the farm part of the hospital.

It is expected that money from the sale, which will be done thru bids, will go into a fund for future development of the hospital.

The supervisors authorized the county welfare commission to sell the portions of the 120 acres it no longer needs. This includes farm buildings, stock and equipment.

Sale of the above will remove what is left of the old Charlevoix County Poor Farm, operated for many years by Ira Lee.

ENOUGH property will be kept for present and future needs of Grandvue hospital.

Selling of the farm part of the hospital came about after the Michigan Sanitation Commission ordered removal of the farm buildings from the hospital vicinity.

First new development at the hospital will be a sewage disposal plant. Bids for installation will be let next month. Bids for sale of the farm buildings and certain portion of land will be opened at the April meeting of the board of supervisors.

Charlevoix county welfare commission, which has control of Grandvue, is made up of three members: Percy Penfold, of East Jordan; Roy Scott, of Boyne City and Frank Bird of Charlevoix.

Frank Bird was named to the commission recently by state appointment following the resignation of Ralph Hamilton of Charlevoix.

The county board will request bids for sale and removal of the buildings.

Pearsall said the fair board would end its 65-year reign Saturday. Fair Board money on hand, except \$50, was turned over to the county supervisors. After all outstanding bills are paid the society will dissolve.

A decision to end the Charlevoix county fair came last fall when the fair board decided that continued entertainment in the face of poor attendance was no longer profitable.

A deed to the fairground property was signed by Talmon Brady, chairman of the board of supervisors and Fenton Bulow, county clerk, and mailed to the local school board.
