

Motion made by Alderman Sturgell and supported by Alderman Rebec THAT WHEREAS because of unforeseen developments the proceeds of sale of bonds dated September 1, 1953, are inadequate to complete the Sewage Disposal System in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor and in a manner necessary to comply with the Degree of Circuit Court;

AND WHEREAS, the balance due for completion of the Sewage Disposal System is Ninety Nine Hundred and Ninety Nine Dollars (\$9999.00). AND WHEREAS, all conditions precedent to the issuance of additional bonds or bond have been complied with; NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: 1. That the additional cost of completion of the said system is hereby approved; 2. That bonds or bond of the City of East Jordan be issued in accordance with the provisions of Act 320, Public Acts of Michigan, 1927, in the aggregate principal sum of \$9999.00, for the purpose of paying the cost of completion of the said system; 3. That said bonds or bond be designated General Obligation Sewage Disposal Bonds, Series II, said bonds or bond to bear interest at the rate of 4% per annum, and said bonds or bond to mature one year after date of issuance.

Said bonds or bond shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Clerk, and shall have the corporate seal of the City affixed thereto.

4. That the City Attorney be instructed to make application to the Municipal Finance Commission for approval and sale of such bond or bonds.

This is the trimming season—many are out trimming. Newer spray materials, newer spraying equipment and higher labor costs revise the older style of trimming and leaves the old bulletin on the thin wood method out of date.

The high tops are removed today and the thin wood toward the bottom is left; only cut back about one half. This thin wood produces large apples in a shorter time. The new method has a fourteen year trial. For full details note the American Fruit Grower.

Growers who do not have the Fruit Grower should write to the American Fruit Grower Publishing Co., Willoughby, Ohio for the December issue. The two long articles thoroughly explain the newer and better methods as backed up by the Wisconsin experiment station and growers in southern Michigan.

This newer and better way of trimming apples would not apply to the McIntosh apples as it bears its fruit on three year old wood. However I feel that it would be better to not have the tops get too high on the McIntosh.

On Cortland the low willowy limbs should either be propped up or else thinned in order to obtain better color.

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

Meet In Ellsworth


A nitrogen fertilization meeting will be held next Monday evening, January 17 at 8 p.m. in the Ellsworth Community Hall Ed Reiman, county agricultural agent announced today. This will be a combined meeting of Antrim and Charlevoix county farmers who are raising fruit and other field crops.

There will be three speakers on the program. Lin Robertson from the soil department will discuss nitrogen resources, nitrogen fertilizer manufacture, characteristics and adaptations of the different forms of fertilizer nitrogen, prices and recommendations as to the use of nitrogen fertilizer on farm crops with particular emphasis on fluid nitro-

A specialist from the department of Horticulture will discuss the adaptations of the different forms of nitrogen to the fertilization of fruits and give specific recommendations regarding the general fertilization of fruits.

Clarence Hansen of the Agricultural Engineering Department, will discuss the mechanics involved in the handling of liquid fertilizers including anhydrous ammonia and nitrogen solutions. This will include types of storage tanks required and cost of installation; equipment needed for the application of anhydrous ammonia, nitrogen solutions and other liquid fertilizers; cost of equipment and precautions necessary in the handling and application of liquid nitrogen.

Everyone who is interested in the use of fluid fertilizer are urged to attend this meeting.
