Merchants' Meeting At Jordan Inn Tuesday

Heavy Business Agenda Opens To Members Only

The East Jordan Businessmen's first monthly meeting for the new year will be held 7 p.m. Tuesday night at Jordan Inn, chairman Donald Clark has announced.

Chairman Clark said the board of directors decided last week to open Tuesday night's meeting to members only. Dinner will not be served.

Due to the heavy amount of business and the importance of the current year's schedule of projects, it was decided to dismiss other activities at Tuesday night's session.

Additional industry, the planning of a 2-day celebration for early summer, the appointment of committees, the obtaining of summer long boat races, and several other matters of business will be discussed.

The association has been asked by the Michigan Public Service Commission, of Lansing, to give a definite expression concerning the East Jordan office of the Railway Express Agency.

A commission spokesman said they would take the association's report into consideration when a hearing comes up on the question of allowing the agency to close the local office.

At the last board of directors meeting held at the City Hall members discussed a proposal from the Boyne City chamber of commerce that both cities consider making it possible for lake boats to lay up in Lake Charlevoix over winter months.

Each member of the new board of directors has expressed strong desire to develop civic projects which will mean more employment and will bring additional financial aid to residents and businessmen.

The board members expressed opinion that some non-competitive industrial plant might be attracted to the city if the membership decides to give full support toward such efforts.

Red Devils Start Second Half With Perfect Conference Slate

A fired up Boyne City outfit jumped into a quick lead over the East Jordan Red Devils on the Rambler's court Friday night and then after trailing throughout the game tied things up when the final gun sounded, 41-41.

The boys from Boyne City leaped into a 11-8 lead during the first period, but the league leading Red Devils took charge 22-15 at halftime.

Playing the first overtime both sides dumped in two baskets before the extra time ended. East Jordan's Danforth was fouled and sunk the first two shots after that, ending "the most exciting game of the year," 47-45.

DARBEE'S calm ball handling during the "sudden death" overtime is one of the reasons he is outstanding in Red Devil play. He paced Red Devil scoring with 10 field goals for 20 points. Boyne City's Gordon Yahr had 14.

The Ramblers suffered a great loss during the first overtime play. Carl Charon tossed one in, lost his balance and sprained an ankle. It was the Rambler's fighting

chance to climb high in the northern C loop.

East Jordan's 52-47 win over Pellston Tuesday night was their seventh straight and kept them atop the loop standings. Boyne City's 59-52 loss to Grayling dropped them from near top position. Charlevoix kept its second place standing with a 71-36 trouncing over Mancelona.

The Gaylord Blue Devils pounded Harbor Springs farther down the ladder in a 59-56 battle that was anybody's game until near the final gun. Beginning the second half of the season's play when they replay each conference team, East Jordan meets Grayling on the home court Friday night. High spots in the second half for the Red Devils will be Grayling, Charlevoix, Boyne City and Pellston.

Stafford Seeks State Board Nomination

Dale Stafford, an East Jordan summer resident and publisher of the Greenville Daily News, will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for the State Board of Agriculture. Nomination will be made at the Republican convention in Detroit, February 19.

Stafford, a native of St. Louis, Michigan, is a MSC alumnus. As a student in 1926 he was the school's first athletic publicity director. He served three terms as the alumni member of the MSC Athletic Board of Control, completing his last term in 1954. Since then he has been a member of the MSC Alumni Advisory Council, representing Northwest Michigan.

Prior to purchasing the Daily News in 1951, he was managing editor of the Detroit Free Press. His earlier years in journalism were spent in Pontiac, Lansing and Jackson and with the Detroit Associated Press.

"From my long association with Michigan State College I have become increasingly aware of the great demands that are going to be made on all higher institutions of learning in the next decade," Stafford said. "I feel that my background might enable me to aid Michigan State in solving the many problems it is certain to face in its great expansion."

Stafford has been active in soil conservation in Montcalm County where he is interested in a Christmas tree farming project. He has held numerous newspaper posts, including chairmanship of the Michigan Associated Press and 1954 chairmanship of the Inland Daily Press Association News-Editorial Committee. He represented the Michigan Press Association in negotiating with the State Board of Agriculture for opening its meetings to the press.

And that which is good for East Jordan is good for Charlevoix county; and what's good for Charlevoix is good for every last man in the county.

The time is upon us when an industrial plant or large scale civic development in any one of our communities fires the imagination and hopes of everyone in the county.

Small minded, pinch-penny men of the old self-seeking days have no place in the new future of Charlevoix county. One by one they have been left behind in the rush to our wonderful new civic developments that aid all of us.

Upon the basis of this fresh and highly productive feeling of co-operation rests the future of Charlevoix county.






TRIMMING THE MONTMORENCY CHERRY TREE

During the twenties we were trimming fairly well, sometimes heavy. During the thirties and during Professor Gardener's time no trimming at all was advocated. This would produce the largest tonnage.

Today with the new grading laws, more insects to combat and larger and better colored cherries demanded, a moderate amount of trimming each year is to be preferred to a very heavy trimming on any one year for the purpose of getting the best yields. Some growers like a tree with a long trunk and a high pointed top. My preference is a very short trunk and with a wide spreading top. We call them flat backs.

The wide trees produce more lugs and harvest easier. There is no set rule for shaping young trees. No two trees are exactly alike and they come in different ages and sizes. So we try to have them low and spreading and no sharp crotches to split down in later years.

Producing higher quality milk and the controlling of mastitis in dairy cattle will be the theme of an all day milking clinic at the high school next Tuesday.

The farmers who own Charlevoix county's 4,000 milk cows will hear three Michigan State College dairy experts during the day.

The meeting will be held in the high school gym. County Farm Agent Ed Rebman has announced.


Several milking machine companies will have exhibits set up in booths with the equipment in operation for farmers to study.

The better milking clinic, which is open to all farmers in the county, will start at 10 a.m. and continue to 4 p.m.

Rebman said: "Good udder health is perhaps the biggest problem for Charlevoix county farmers. Mastitis is present in many of the herds. The losses from less milk, treatment costs and slaughter runs into many dollars each year. Mastitis provides low quality milk."

Michigan State College speakers will be: Jim Hays, Glen Reed, and Donald Murray.

Spilled Milk To Really Cry Over



The high cost of disease in farm animals is dramatically pointed up by the widespread incidence of mastitis in dairy cows. Mastitis sharply reduces milk production, and in many instances is fatal to the animal. The disease can be controlled, say dairy husbandry authorities by preventive measures which means accurate diagnosis, adequate sanitary and herd management practices and close cooperation between the dairyman and his veterinarian. Also vital to a control program, they add, is proper treatment with the weapons provided by medical science, such as Targot, a mastitis ointment made from a combination of several antibiotics.

Local Farmers May Enter Big Contest

Charlevoix county farmers and lumber dealers joined this week in a nationwide contest which offers \$10,000 in cash prizes for farm building improvements.

Designed to encourage farmers to make their operation easier and more profitable, the 1955 Farm Building Improvement Contest offers two grand prizes of \$1,500 each and also two prizes each of \$750, \$500 and \$250. There are 40 \$100 prizes.

Lumber dealers are cooperating with the sponsors of the contest, the National Lumber Manufacturers Association and Better Farming magazine, in advising farmers on their building projects.

Eligible to compete are such projects as a new farm building, the remodeling of an old one, an addition to a building or the construction of such things as pens, chutes, feeders and other specially-designed devices.

Any project begun after January 1, 1955, and completed before November 1, 1955, is eligible for a prize. Entry blanks are free; there is no charge or fee of any kind to enter the contest.

Canning Crops Mean Plenty To State Farmers

Production of vegetables for canning and freezing last year returned almost \$10 million to Michigan farmers.

The income resulted from the harvesting in the state of almost 337 million pounds of vegetables for sale to processors.

The 1954 farm income from processing vegetables did not break any records, but it was ab-

out \$2.5 million greater than the average for the 10-year period ending in 1952.

Michigan led all the states in production of cucumbers for processing. It also is an important producer of such processing crops as asparagus, lima beans, snap beans, beets, cabbage and tomatoes. Last year the state planted almost 68 thousand acres to these and other vegetables




UNWRITTEN LAWS
