Indoor Ice Rink Open To Public

East Jordan's Rotary Club sponsored indoor skating rink is attracting attention around northern Michigan.

Opened in the community building behind the post office Saturday night, it was reported that Traverse City, Charlevoix and Boyne City skaters have come to investigate.

Rotary Club President Keith Annear said the rink opened officially Saturday night with more than 100 townspeople skating.

The movement for an indoor rink got underway when Rotary Club members decided something should be done about providing an ice rink for local skating.

The Rotary Club committee assigned to see if the indoor rink was possible included: Ted Malpass, Bill Porter, Ken Diller, Earl Clark and Keith Annear.

With the authority and assistance of the city of East Jordan the floor of the community building was cleaned up and flooded. The big double doors in the back were left open and ice formed immediately making a perfect indoor skating rink.

Teddy Kotowich and Elmer Green donated their services in sweeping the floor before flooding. The Jordan Valley Cooperative Creamery moved their stored goods from the building and Fire Chief Sherman Thomas with Tom Breakey used the fire truck for flooding operations.

Reports say it is the only indoor skating rink in this section of Michigan.

Adequate lighting has been provided along with music for the skaters.

THE CITY COUNCIL Tuesday night assigned Dan Bennett to the supervision job Monday thru Friday of each week. Saturday and Sunday skating will be supervised by Rotary Club members.

Skating is allowed each day from 2 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. with time out for cleaning and flooding the rink. It was decided to close the rink at 9:15 each night to allow children to go home before the 9:30 curfew.

Certain hours have been set aside for adult skating only as well as for Boy's hockey games and for fancy and figure skating.

Skaters are warned that racing will not be allowed unless it is scheduled. Cracking the whip and playing tag will also not be allowed. Skaters are asked to skate with the crowd at all times.

A CALL has gone out for 78 rpm waltz records which can be played on the record player for skaters. Those having records to donate are asked to see Keith Annear.

This is the first time the residents of East Jordan have made use of the huge community building. It was constructed several years ago by the WPA and stood idle except for storage use.

Mich. Bell Tax Money \$4,000 Here

C. L. Johnson, local Michigan Bell Telephone Company manager, reported Tuesday that \$4,098, of the firm's total tax payment for 1954 will go to the East Jordan public school system.

Johnson said Charlevoix county schools, including East Jordan, will receive \$18,965 from Michigan Bell's Tax payment.

Johnson said the payments were based on a school census of 942 in East Jordan and 3,900 in Charlevoix county.

Total amount of the firm's state property taxes was \$7,235,000.

The payment to the state Primary School Fund was the largest in the company's history and Michigan Bell remained the largest single contributor, in 1954.

ZIEGLER REPORTS NO ROAD CHANGE

Mayor Chris Taylor as well as the News-Herald were informed Monday morning that recent stories concerning the future of state highway M-32 had no basis.

Mayor Taylor visited the state highway department Monday and the department also telephoned the News-Herald.

"At no time has the highway department ever considered turning M-32 back to Charlevoix and Antrim Counties," Commissioner Ziegler said.

"And at no time has there ever been any consideration given to the relocation of the highway," he added.

The News-Herald was asked by the highway department to make the above statements public.

It was also stated that the department is checking to learn the sources of constant false statements concerning highway M-32 leading into East Jordan.

IT WAS SAID the department is checking its plans for the future of the bridge over the Jordan river and will make them known to East Jordan residents. Ziegler's remarks about the highway followed news reports that the East Jordan Businessmen's Association was checking into strong rumors about the

Red Devils Drop Game, Meet Rams

The East Jordan Red Devils, now in second place in the northern Michigan Class C basketball standings, will meet the Harbor Springs Rams on the local hardwood Friday night.

The locals slid to second place in the loop list when they dropped their first game of the season to Charlevoix and then did not play Tuesday night while Charlevoix was beating Boyne City 77-60.

The Rayders made first scoring in the Charlevoix contest leading 10 to 8 at the end of the first period. Battling point for point the two top teams in the northern loop scored six points each in the second stanza.

In the third quarter the locals jumped in 12 points to Charlevoix's 16 and went into the fourth period six points behind.

THE RED DEVILS picked up 13 points to their opponents' 15 in the last quarter ending the much talked about contest, 47 to 39.

East Jordan registered 10 personal and Charlevoix 17. The Rayders connected with 17 field goals to East Jordan's 12. In foul shooting East Jordan connected for 15 out of 28; Charlevoix 13 out of 18.

Bob Darbee was top man for the Red Devils with 12 points. Dwain Walker led Charlevoix with 14.

Charlevoix's first place rating came only because they have played one more game than East Jordan. Official standings will not be reported accurately until next week when East Jordan plays Mancelona and Charlevoix has a breather.

FFA Work Cited At Annual Soils Meeting Here Monday

Members of the Charlevoix Soil Conservation District heard a progress talk and saw colored slides of construction of the Mackinac Bridge.

The members met at the East Jordan high school Monday night for their sixth annual session.

Attention was given to the work going on at the Hi Brock farm north of East Jordan.

The East Jordan FFA and the soil district assisted in their advisory council along with soil run-off demonstrations underway there.

About an acre of land is leased from Hi Brock with the run-off plots starting in the fall of 1953. There are four plots in the demonstration.

The four year soil project was established to show interested farmers how much soil is lost from their land by erosion.

HUGH GRAHAM and William Zitka, both of East Jordan, and Burr Blanchard, of Charlevoix, received certificates of achievement as outstanding farmers for 1954.

They were picked by the board of directors as doing the most toward completing their soil and water conservation plans.

It was said that soil cooperators planted 44,000 trees last year and brings to total to date to 279,000 trees.

The group has 166 members

with 87 having basic plans for soil conservation.

Clayton Healey, of East Jordan, is chairman of the soils district.

Results?

The recent flurry of excitement in Charlevoix and Antrim counties over state highway M-32 from US-131 to East Jordan has been partially cleared up.

The East Jordan Businessmen's Association went into action when it was told that this portion of M-32 was termed a "borderline state highway" and that the state might consider turning it back to the two counties.

After that the News-Herald was told by the state highway commissioner that the story was false. That there were no plans for abandoning the highway or for relocating it from its present location.

The department said information upon the future of the bridge over the Jordan River would be forwarded by letter. It is refreshing to learn that the 60 members of the East Jordan Businessmen's Association have dedicated themselves to work toward the development of this area.

WHO WILL be the first to deny that the taxpayers have a right to work for the betterment of the area whether it be roads or anything else? Or that they have a right to become concerned about anything which might retard the future welfare of this section of northern Michigan?

The businessmen's association is to be congratulated for its deep concern and readiness to work for the good of the taxpayers of this area.

A news report from Lansing this week says Michigan highway will be improved this year by \$71,000,000 and well over \$78,000,000 in 1956.

It was said this highway program will not do much more than repair many miles of worn-out highways.

Highway officials say they are ready to double up the work and do the whole job this year, using the \$149,000,000, if necessary.

Farm Week Underway

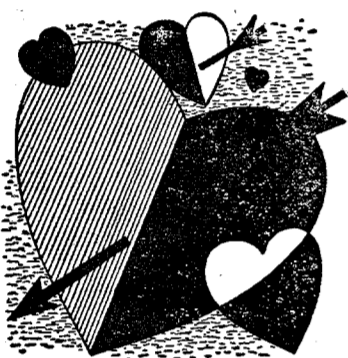

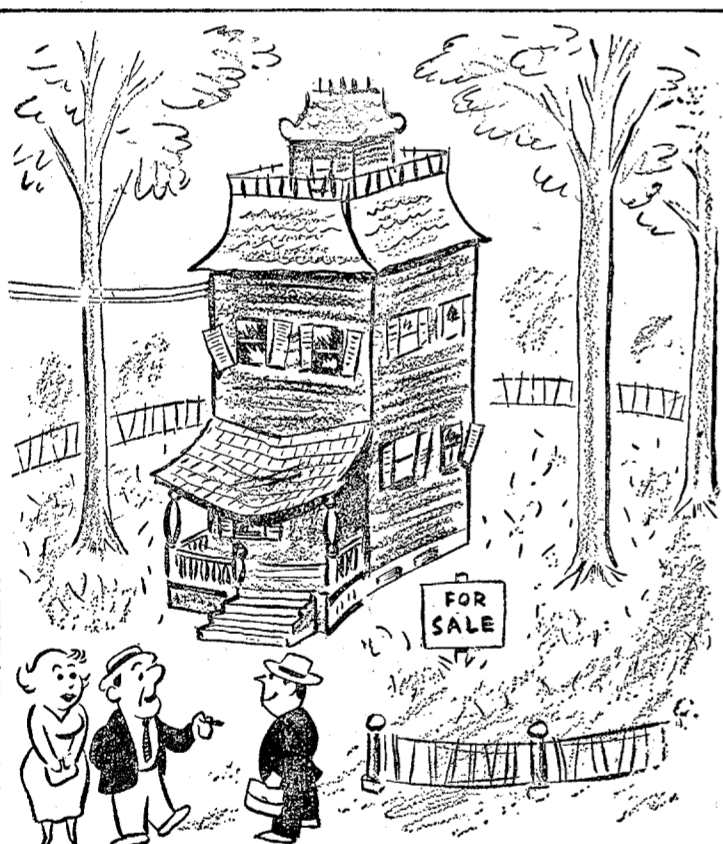

Rep. Meggison Says . . .

Approaching the close of our third week of the session of the 68th Legislature it would seem that a brief review of our activities to date, is now indicated.

Pursuant to constitutional requirements, we convened at noon on Wednesday, the 12th, and proceeded to organize and set in motion the machinery for getting underway a session which from all appearances will be anything but dull, due to the many serious problems facing us, and the conflicting opinions as to their solution.

Three hours and fifty-five minutes were consumed in the swearing in of the members, election of our House officials (Speaker Wade Van Valkenburg, Speaker pro tem Andrew Bolt, Clerk Norman E. Philleo, Sergeant-at-Arms Dan McCuaig and Postmasters Arthur H. Wickman and Harold Hill), selection of seats, adoption of routine resolutions pertinent to organization, hearing and granting a petition for a recount in the Menominee district, appointment of a recount committee and the introduction and adoption of a concurrent resolution to set up a joint convention to invite and hear the Governor's message the next day.

His first message on January 13 was a short one—more of an outline with promise of details to follow in later messages, although he did urge (1) placing on the April ballot a \$500,000,000 bond proposal for road construction; (2) increased grants for the greater development of the tourist and recreation industry; (3) expansion of our present statewide farm marketing program.

In his Education Message, the Governor recommended among other things, a huge building program for schools and colleges. There is no denying the paramount need of the schools for additional facilities and this is one of the serious problems with which we are confronted. It is conservatively estimated that the program he recommends would require an additional \$40 million yearly in new taxes.

His budget message called for an appropriation of \$292.2 million which is exactly \$46 million higher than estimated revenues.

Today we received his tax message, and as expected, he called for a 5 percent Corporations Profit Tax to yield \$110 million; repeal of the present Corporate Franchise Tax; retention of the present Business Receipts Tax

Though too early to know how much cutting will be done this winter, state records show about 10,000 acres are cut each winter.

In addition to making immediate food for deer, the cutting operations also inspire new growth. Sunlit openings in the forest give young sprouts chance to push up and provide more food for deer.
