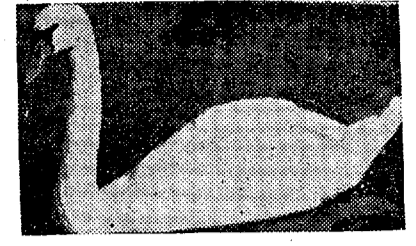

What did East Jordan do for old Uncle Sam during World War II? A check of Ed Reuling's records as of June 25, 1943 shows there were 374 East Jordan residents in uniform at that time.

Of that number 300 were in the Army. An even 40 were in the navy, 19 marines, 6 coast guards, 5 WACS, 3 nurses, and 1 merchant marine.

Here were their ratings: Army 204 privs and Pfc's., 31 Cpls., 48 Sgts., 13 Lt., 2 Capt's., 1 Maj. and 1 Lt. Col. Navy: 1 Lt., 2 Lt. (jg) 1 Chief P. O., 10 with P. O. ratings up to Chief, 15 with rating similar to Army Cpl., 4 aviation cadets and the balance similar to our Pfc. in the army. Marines: 1 Sgt., 1 Lt., and the balance Pvt's. WACS: 1 2nd officer, 1 3rd officer, 1 Cpl. and 2 privs. Nurses: 2 Navy Ensigns and 1 Army Lt. and 1 Merchant Marine.

That is what East Jordan was doing for Uncle Sam during World War II.

A number of years ago the former Charlevoix County Herald ran an ad stating that the Herald was: Mixers of Type, Ink and Brains."

Everyone is pulling for Bill Downs' quick recovery. He found a very welcome home in East Jordan as a lawyer and citizen, and has made many friends who are anxious about his progress.

Several weeks ago we put on a question and answer program at Rotary. It was all about East Jordan. One of the questions wanted to know the exact spot where the E. J. & S. "Tuesday of last week there was launched at Camden, Me., the largest schooner in the world, and what is said to be the first six master ever built. Not only is it the largest schooner afloat, but it was built entirely of wood. The George W. Wells, for that is its name, is 302 feet 11 inches long on the keel, 345 feet long on top, 48 feet 6 inches beam

and 23 feet deep. Its frame is of white oak throughout and all its planking and ceiling hard pine, most of the planking 6 inches thick. The six lower masts are remarkable examples of Pacific coast products, being of Oregon pine, 119 feet long and 30 inches in diameter. Such a vessel requires and enormous amount of material. In its construction there were used 550 tons of white oak timber, 1,000,000 feet of longleaf yellow pine and about 100,000 feet of white pine deck planking. This vessel is calculated to carry more than 5,000 tons of coal with only fourteen men all told for crew, whereas a full rigged ship of the same carrying capacity would require at least thirty-one men. Lumbermen will be inclined to encourage the building of this class of vessels."

And it was all wood! Here's a story from the August 25, 1900 issue of the American Lumberman:

Red Devils Meet Boyne City On Local Court Friday Night

Saxton's Red Devils, on top of the north C loop with the Charlevoix Rayders, will host Boyne City on the local court Friday night when the visitors will attempt to off set the 47-45 win by the locals the last time they invaded Rambler territory.

Boyne City's big win over Petoskey Tuesday night and Charlevoix's 62-47 romp over Pellston were the only highlights in area play since last Friday.

The Red Devils looked at Boyne City anew today when they checked over results of the Rambler-Petoskey contest at Boyne City Tuesday night.

The Ramblers ran away with the Petoskey Northmen 57-35 in a game that was Boyne City all the way.

The much improved Boyne City team, which will travel to East Jordan Friday night, is expected to put the locals to the real test of the current basketball season.

In the Red Devil's Friday game at Gaylord, the Blue Devils led Saxton's men 11 to 9 at the end of the first quarter, but the locals moved into the lead with a 26-24 count at the half and stretched it to 46 - 41 at the end of the third. The final score, 64-52, kept the Red Devils on the road to a conference tie with the Rayders.

BOB DARBEE earned 23 for the locals with Gaylord's high man being Mike McKillop who had 18 points.

Also last Friday, Boyne City took Harbor Springs 68-55; and it was Grayling over Mancelona 65 to 45.

East Jordan's last game of the season will be played next week Friday at Pellston.

MEGGISON SAYS:

House Has Short Week; White Pine, State Tree

Although this has been a short week, in that we did not reconvene until Tuesday evening because of the County Conventions held on Monday night, it has been a busy week with stepped up committee action and several caucuses.

The road construction bill mentioned in last week's letter, has been out on the calendar all week. This is a very important matter, and as you are probably aware from the stories appearing in the daily papers, one on which opinion has been pretty much divided. Discussion of the many suggested ways for arriving at a fair and equitable road program have brought out many interesting points, some of which might be well worth mentioning at this time.

It is estimated that the interest on a bond proposal such as that advocated by the Governor, would run in the neighborhood of around 200 million dollars, and that interest money would build a good many miles of badly needed roads. Another undesirable feature of a bond program is that it would set up a third department for the supervision of highways, and in the long run cost the taxpayers more money than a pay-as-you-go program. Still another disadvantage is that in order to provide a means of paying the bonds, gas and weight taxes are included in the bond proposal and therefore they become a part of the constitution, which would be mighty difficult to change in future years.

The House passed H. B. 15, making the White Pine the official State tree. The bill has now gone to the Senate, and if favorable action is taken by that body Michigan will boast an official State tree.

The House also passed H. B. 3 making it a misdemeanor for any person to wilfully attempt to influence a juror in any case by means of intimidation of argument other than as part of the proceedings in open court in the trial of the case.

Charlevoix County bears the distinction of being the first in the state to have had 100% coverage by Dr. Weiss.

NORTHERN LIGHTS

(Compiled by the News-Herald Staff)

If you started out to make a visit to all the lakes in Charlevoix county you'd be a busy person, indeed.

And if you inspected one lake a day you would be on the road more than a month.

For there are some 33 lakes in the county, big and small. Tell that to the guy who asks you about fishing or boating in Charlevoix county.

Naturally Lake Charlevoix with its long South Arm is the largest. Walloon Lake is second with Thumb Lake (Lake Louise) in third place for size. Deer Lake is fourth and Norwood and Susan Lakes vie for fifth position.

NOW, WHAT do you know about the other 27 lakes in the county. They are scattered all over and you may be surprised where some of them are.

People out in Chandler township are the only folks in the county who cannot boast a lake in their area.

Many people who haven't bothered to look it up believe Thumb Lake is in Chandler Township. But it is located in the north section of Hudson Township.

Boyer Valley Township has lots of water via the Boyne River, but its only lake is a part of Deer Lake. Charlevoix Township has Round Lake, Lake Charlevoix and Lake Michigan on the west.

Bay Township folks have no lakes, but the area borders on beautiful Walloon.

The South Arm of Lake Charlevoix cuts through the center of Eveline Township. Eveline also has part of Norwood Lake and all of Steel Lake as well as Mud Lake, sometimes called Healey's Lake, near Advance.

IT MAY BE a surprise to some that Evangeline Township in the Boyne City area borders on both Lake Charlevoix and Walloon Lake. The extreme north east part (section 12) touches Walloon Lake. There's a Mud Lake in the township, also. And it is of no small size. It is just south of Walloon in the Wildwood Harbor area.

Hudson Township in the south east corner of the county contains all of Thumb Lake. Other lakes there are: Clear Lake (Bows Lake); Branch Lake (Hoffman Lake), Heart Lake, Mud Lake and Kidney Lake. Booth Lake lies just north and east of Thumb Lake.

Melrose Township surrounds plenty of Walloon Lake, but there are no other lakes in that area.

Bound on the West by Lake Michigan, Norwood Township has Harwood Lake, no small area of water.

South Arm Township in the East Jordan area has of course the long south arm of Lake Charlevoix. A surprise to some living outside this area is the fact that Intermediate Lake runs through sections 18, 19, 30, and 31, of south arm township, Charlevoix county. And it is no small portion of Intermediate Lake.

Most people identify Wilson Township with Deer Lake. But most of Deer Lake belongs to Boyne Valley Township. Wilson has a small mud lake in the center of the township on section 16.

Hays Township in the north end of the county has the famous Susan Lake. It also contains Oyster Bay which goes quite a way inland. On the north, of course, is Lake Michigan. There's a mud lake in Hays, also. It is located on sections 16 and 21.

Over in St. James Township, Beaver Island, Front Lake is the big attraction; and in Poaine Township, Beaver Island, there are the following lakes: Barney's Lake, Egg Lake, Fox Lake, Green's Lake, Geneserath Lake and Round Lake.

AND, OF COURSE, Beaver Island is surrounded with something besides land, mainly Lake Michigan.

Marion Township, south of Charlevoix, has seven lakes and they are not too small, either. They are: Matchett Lake, Skinner Lake, Adams Lake, Twin Lakes, Cunningham Lake, Lake Marion and Norwood or Nowland Lake of which the largest part is in Marion township.

So the next time a school teacher asks you to name the lakes in Charlevoix county you can rip them off like this:

Walloon Lake, Deer Lake, Lake Charlevoix, Norwood Lake (Nowland), Steel Lake, Mud Lake (Healey's Lake), Mud Lake, Thumb Lake (Lake Louise), Clear Lake (Bows Lake), Branch Lake (Hoffman Lake), Heart Lake, Mud Lake, Kidney Lake, Booth Lake, Harwood Lake, Intermediate Lake, Mud Lake, Susan Lake, Oyster Bay, Front Lake, Barney's Lake, Egg Lake, Fox Lake, Green's Lake, Geneserath Lake, Round Lake, Round Lake, Matchett Lake, Skinner Lake, Adams Lake, Twin Lakes, Cunningham Lake and Lake Marion.

This report holds true only if some of the lakes mentioned haven't dried up since our informant whispered into our ear.

The names of some of these lakes have been changed through the years. That's why we mentioned the second names of some of them. But how many people would believe there are 33 fair size lakes in Charlevoix county?

Arizona Paper Describes Devine's New Assignment

Daniel J. Devine, top assistant to Duffy Daugherty at Michigan State, this afternoon was appointed head football coach at Arizona State College at Tempe.

Dr. D. R. Van Petten, retiring director of athletics at ASC and chairman of the football selection by telephone with President Grady Gammage — attending a convention in the East — and with Devine. All parties reached complete agreement on the selection.

DEVINE, 30, succeeds Clyde Smith, new athletic director, who was outspoken as a selection committee member in the new coach's behalf. The position pays \$8,700 a year.

It was announced recently that Devine asked the former Charlevoix Rayder and All-American football player Bob Carey, of the Los Angeles Rams, to be his end coach at Arizona State.

Devine made many northern Michigan friends during his time as head coach at East Jordan. Assistant coach to Gayle Saxton here is Donald Carey, brother of Bob.

Highly recommended to the ASC committee by Clarence (Biggie) Munn, Michigan State athletic director, and Daugherty

for the ASC job, the new coach will arrive here Thursday.

A disciple of Munn's famed multiple offense, Devine was taken from the high school ranks by the Spartans after two undefeated years at East Jordan Michigan.

He was promoted successively from assistant freshman coach to freshman coach, to junior varsity coach and finally made Daugherty's chief assistant.

AS FRESHMAN coach, Devine had supervision of several other coaches and 150 football candidates. As junior varsity coach Devine had more than 80 athletes, a number of other coaches, and played a schedule.

He is touted by Michigan State officials and friends of the school as an able organizer, public speaker, and recruiter.

"We believe Dan Devine fulfills our needs more than any other man in our big list of applicants," Dr. Van Petten declared. "He has youth, experience in the toughest of football schools, and the recommendations of people all over the Big Ten. It goes without saying that he created a highly favorable impression with our committee

What is new in the fruit line? What shall we plant and for what market and purpose? Location—type of soil for same? Shall we raise strawberries and raspberries?

Off hand I believe the red raspberry business could be revived here on account of mechanical harvesters now used, especially for canning purposes.

Those were the good old days—when we hauled Cuthbert red raspberries to the East Jordan Canning Company. Now today the old Cuthbert is run out. We have grown ten acres of this variety here. Today there are other good varieties for canning.

The red raspberry can be grown on a rougher scale than the strawberry and on lighter soil. Sometimes they can be grown by using a straw mulch. Everyone likes the red raspberry fresh or canned. Red raspberries and strawberries have been the means for a great many fruit growers to get started in tree fruits. They are also a good side line for regular fruit growers.

An up-to-the-minute civil government of Michigan has been added to our list of books. This is written especially for the teen agers but will be equally interesting for adults.

Mrs. Walden brought us twenty-three books, all fiction. Six are for sale since we have them already on our shelves. Among those ready for our readers are:

Windom's Way, (Ullman), the story of an American doctor in Southeastern Asia, his contacts with the Communists and with the natives.

The Village, Laski is a story of an imaginary village, which might be any village, anywhere.

The Big Eye, by Eherlich, was a planet which, it was reported would clash with the Earth on Christmas Day in 1962. The effects on the Russians and the U. S. regarding the atomic war which had been in the making and the final surprise ending make this an edge-o-the-chair book.

The Stone in the Rain, by MacDuffie, relates the story of the marriage of a young Southern girl to the man of her choice, and its near ruin because of the narrow, in-grown society to which they belonged through this marriage. Characters come alive for you in this book.

An Affair of State, by Pat Frank, is a story of Washington, D. C. and Budapest. It is full of suspense and intrigue, and is completely entertaining.

Fiddler's Green, by Ernest Gann, tells of Hamil Linder, a great, hulking fisherman of Norwegian-American birth, working along the Pacific Coast, his son, Carl, who has not made his father proud nor yet happy, and a wise guy running from the police who has never before come in close contact with such a man as Hamil Linder.

Turkey in the 15th century is the scene of Schoonover's book, The Gentle Infidel, which is called Historical Fiction at its best. Senator Marlowe's daughter, by Keyes, has half the world for a background as it unfolds the love story of Faith Marlowe in lands across the sea and in our own capital and our new England.

More Practice Needed For License Tests

Chief Harry Simmons today announced that the East Jordan Police Department is cooperating with the Michigan State Safety Commission, under the leadership of the Department of State, in a state-wide public education program on driver licensing.

According to Simmons the driver license examination for beginning drivers recently put into effect is much more comprehensive than the previous one and is a far better measure of a person's ability to drive safely. He urged all new applicants for a driver's license to study harder on the Michigan Traffic Law and safe driving practices, and to practice more on their driving before taking the road test.

"Traffic authorities are determined to be doubly sure that persons awarded the privilege of driving are able to demonstrate this ability by passing a more thorough examination. Many motorists who do not prepare for it carefully will fail this test on the first try, but those who pass the test will have the feeling they have earned the privilege of driving," the Chief continued.

Chief Simmons pointed out that passing the driver's license examination and obtaining a license merely launches the beginning motorist on his driving career. He emphasized the fact that the motorist must continually prove his right to retain this privilege by obeying traffic laws. If he causes a traffic accident or commits serious hazardous moving violations he will have his license suspended. Only in that way can the state protect other drivers on the highway.

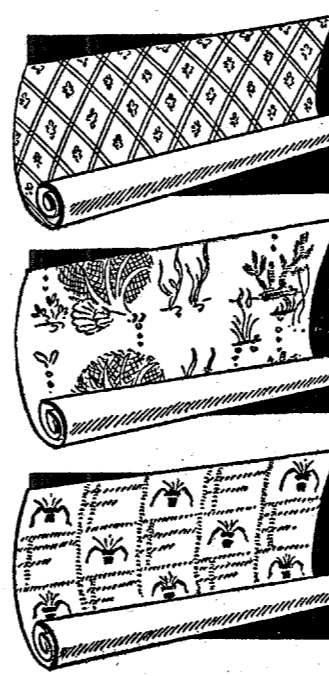

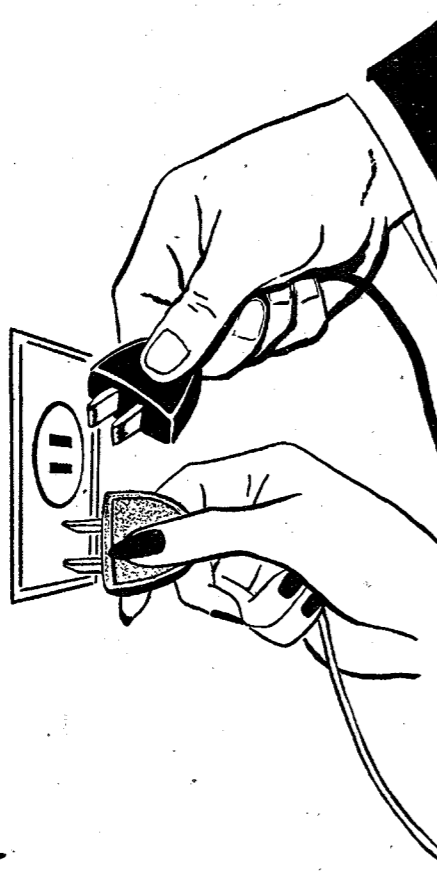
