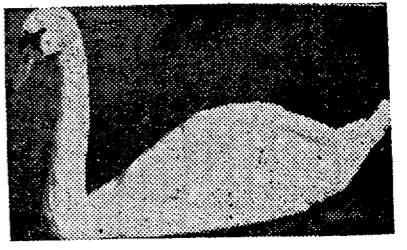

OVER THE BACK FENCE

We've just seen some figures on the St. Lawrence Seaway which makes one scratch his head. Apparently northern Michigan lake cities should do some checking before they get too excited over the revenue to be brought here as a result of the Seaway.

At least it looks that way.

The report we have on hand says: A 27-foot waterway has been "sold" to the American people on the false basis that:

1. Our Great Lakes cities will become ports for ocean-going ships in world trade.

2. The water way is necessary to move Labrador iron ore to inland steel mills.

3. The water way is essential to national defense.

Eighty five percent of the faster cargo vessels now entering American ports and 81 percent of the cargo vessels and all the tankers engaged in the inter-coastal trade would not be able to use the seaway.

A channel depth of 33 feet is a minimum requirement if the St. Lawrence waterway is to serve the purpose for which it is advocated.

Yet only a 27 foot channel has been authorized by the United States government with \$105,000,000 worth of funds provided.

Army Engineers estimate the cost of a 27-foot channel from Montreal to Lake Erie will be \$174,950,000 to Canada and \$88,074,000 to United States. Interest and carrying charges on this 27-foot ditch will run well over \$14,000,000 per year—for 50 years.

It is claimed that to dig this ditch to 35 feet (which would allow it to be used as we have been led to believe it will be used) would cost an additional \$100,000,000 to United States and another \$500,000,000 to Canada.

Total cost of a 35-foot channel over a 27-foot channel would be one billion, five hundred million pieces of green paper.

Improvement of Great Lakes channels and harbors to 27 feet deep would cost about \$100,000,000 for channels and \$100,000,000 for harbors.

Remember! The U. S. government has only authorized spending of \$105,000,000 on the seaway.

Dear Northern Michigan Reader: The seaway was "sold" to us as a foreign trade route, opening up all ports on the Great Lakes to foreign commerce.

But it will not be much more than an extension of the present Great Lakes waterways, of use mainly to Great Lakes vessels which were not designed for sea duty. It is claimed that these backing the Seaway now admit this today.

But the thing we Great Lake lovers didn't think about is the fact that the Seaway will be of no use to anyone during four and one-half months of each year when ice closes it to all commerce.

It looks as though those behind the Seaway knew all along that a 27 foot ditch would not answer the purpose, but got their political foot in the door by asking congress for \$105,000,000 for the "Seaway."

Once we've spent our money on it, we'll need another billion to finish the job and a few more hundred million to make our lake ports fit to receive the big boats.

If the government does furnish all the big money and northern Michigan does finally prosper from ocean trade, we'll be getting more wealthy through a sort of a backhanded WPA project.

And thus we are disappointed. We thought that one day we could walk down to the lake and see a foreign looking sailor with rings in his ears and a big knife in his belt.

But take heart. You can see him at the movies for 50c a throw.

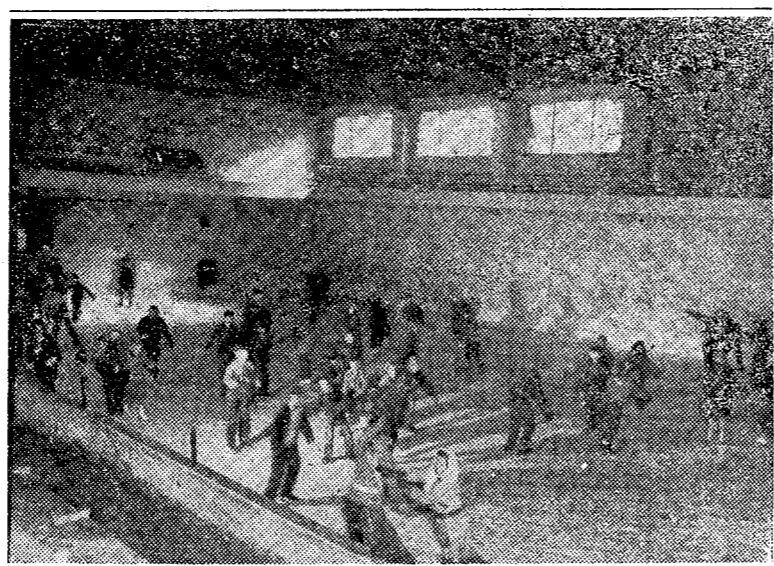
One sister, Lydia Youngedyk of Sumas, Washington, survives besides nieces and nephews.

The other day we had a long talk with a high official in a neighboring Chamber of Commerce and discovered that such civic organizations have many problems in common.
A Board of Commerce, Chamber of Commerce or Businessmen's Association (call the group what you may) has as its goal the promotion, development and continued all around betterment of its home town. And it cannot prosper with out all the residents also prospering in one way or another, great or small.

But it is still common among many of these successful civic organizations to be told that: "Your organization never helped me any."

Time and again the membership roll of the civic group in question has been checked; and the individual who bemoans the fact he received no benefit is not or never was a member—gave no aid either morally or financially to the group's efforts.
In further discussing our common problems with this neighboring civic official we struck common ground on one important fact:

MORE THAN ONCE a Chamber of Commerce has at long last induced a new employer to locate in their city. Because of this there is some upswing of business in all fields, retail, insurance, real estate etc. New workers search for housing, new businessmen want to move in.

Property values go up; and more than once a property owner has sold for a much higher figure than he would have realized if the civic group had been non-existent.

Yet it is not uncommon for such a person to tell his home town Chamber of Commerce that: "It never did me any good."

There are few businessmen or property owners in Charlevoix, Boyne City or East Jordan who would be willing to sell their holdings for the going price of a few years ago—back before the Chambers of Commerce of these cities encouraged industry to locate in Charlevoix county.

The "you never did me any good" people have often realized more financially than those hard working people who spent time and money to raise the financial structure through efforts of the civic organization.

ALTHOUGH THAT is a true statement it is difficult for some to believe.

But these people make up only four or five percent of the vast numbers of good citizens who are ready and willing to put their shoulders to the wheel for the common good of their neighbors.

These are some of the things visiting Chamber of Commerce people discuss when they let their hair down.

NORTHERN LIGHTS

But lo! Many schools now frown upon use of the highly talked up ball point. They let them smear themselves up with fountain pen ink—and break as many lead pencils as they like—but they discourage use of a modern instrument. But this instrument now is accepted by government for all kinds of document signatures, by banks for checks and anything else you sign. Some believe this resistance to change will be overcome in our schools.

The Detroit News recently published a series of articles under the head: "1999." These articles gave the reader a good look at the many things to come in the fields of science, electronics, agriculture etc. We'd like to see a story entitled, "Northern Michigan — 1999". Within the next 44 years there will be a good many changes in this section of the state as well as in Charlevoix county.

This newspaper, here and now, dares to predict some of changes to be made in Charlevoix county by 1999. If you fail to hang on that long you cannot prove us wrong. Ha!

There will be a bridge over the narrows at Ironton maintained by the state of Michigan.

Barring the striking of oil in the Deer Lake area, East Jordan, Boyne City and Charlevoix will each have gained about 1,000 additional taxpaying residents. That's about an additional 23 and one half resident per city per year until then. What a one half resident will look like remains also to be seen.

BOYNE FALLS will be one of the more active and highly important winter resort areas of the county.

The state highway department will have improved roads running through the county.

All county residents will have natural gas available for home and commercial use.

There will be a spanking new county court house located on the land now occupying . . . This is top drawer and out of reach secret info . . .

The trend toward consolidation of many things will have continued to the point where much of the official county work will be done at Lansing. Police work will be more consolidated with the state having more and more to do with it.

Newspapers will be referring to "our great industrialized north area."

Many of our so called "dumb kids" in school today will be heading large and successful concerns.

CRAZY JACK will still be writing a newspaper column having decided that that was a better deal after all. Incidentally, he pointed his finger at us last week and said things.

The trend to shop out of town will not subside, but it will change with the shoppers having switched their ideas on where to go. They will no longer think it smart to shop in the larger northern towns nearby, but will be visiting Detroit and Grand Rapids more often — this will be due to more rapid means of transportation.

Television will be a child's item purchased in toy shops — the older people having moved on to newer forms of entertainment.

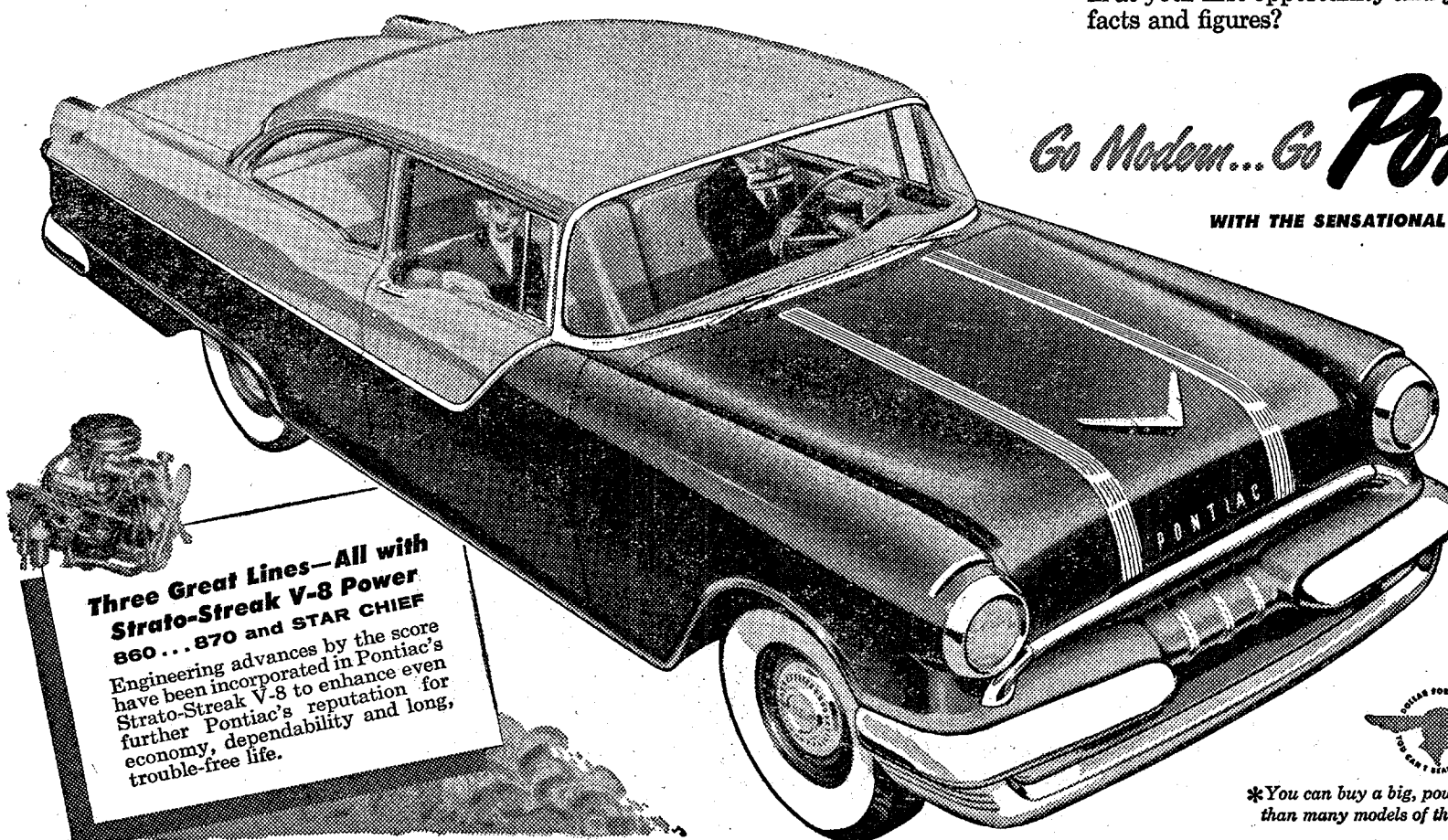

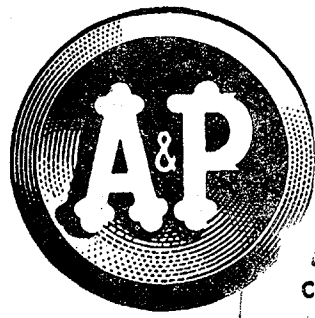

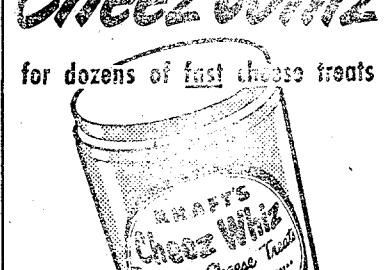

Every orchardist is thinking of spraying materials. Fruit magazines, fruit schools and meetings all run to this subject. This is because of shot hole on cherries and scab on apples last season.

For this spring it is advisable to cultivate before bloom. And where trees are in much to spray the ground with a D. N. compound such as Eigelol Krenite, etc. We now have a great many newer materials to choose from. All of them are advertised to be the best.

Some of the materials are very dangerous to use on account of their killing power to man. None of the materials are specific for all fruit diseases. Some materials will allow a nice finish on certain varieties and on other varieties the same material would cause russeting or other ill effects. One material will work nicely one year and on another year of cold nights will be in reverse.

However most of the new materials are very good. By next week I will make a check of most of the spray materials and tell of the success and failures other growers over a wide range of territory.

much fertilizer the land requires. You may use the fertilizer—which contains aldrin—on corn, potatoes, mint, and strawberries.

Agent Rebman has information on where to get the fertilizer and how to use it. He suggests that farmers read the label for instructions and dosage.

A good dosage range is from two to five pounds of actual aldrin per acre for wireworm control. The lower limit, 2-3 pounds will handle sandy soils, but five pounds will be needed on heavy muck.

Rebman emphasizes that for a good wireworm kill when broadcasting the fertilizer, it should be worked 4-6 inches into the soil. He says the mixture is just as effective in controlling wireworms as spray or dust and requires no special equipment or operations.

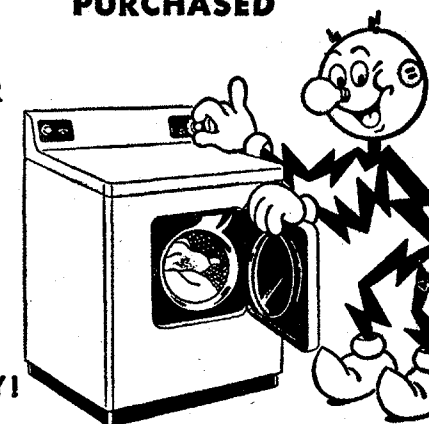

If you happen to see Jean Nachazel tell him congratulations on his engagement. Doesn't seem very long ago we were in school together.

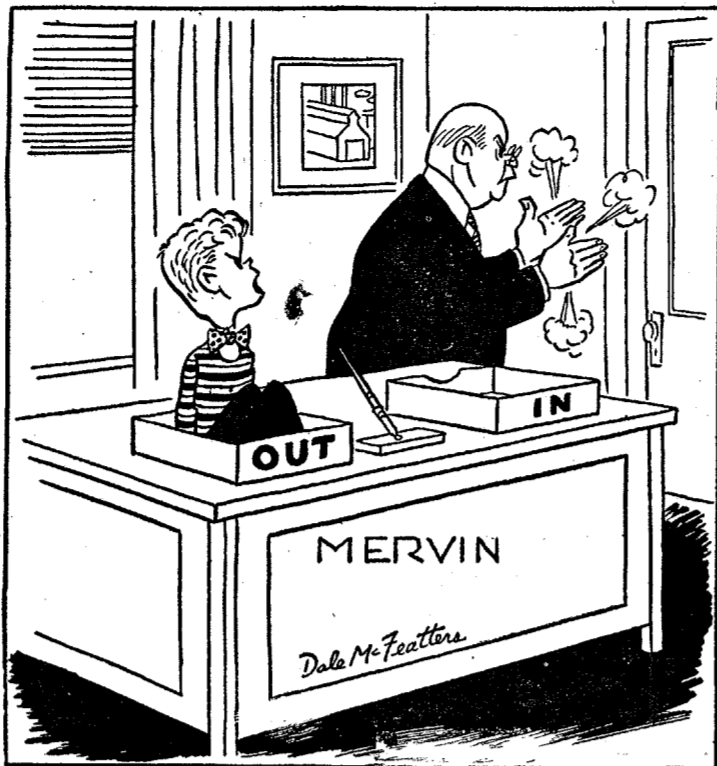
