# Report Contest In April 4th Election

## Red Cross Drive Starts In County

The annual Red Cross fund drive got underway throughout the nation Tuesday with the goal for Charlevoix county set at \$3,200. The campaign will continue through the month of March.

A corps of more than 50 workers have been recruited to canvass every home, farm, factory and business establishment in the chapter area.

Fund-raising chairman, the Rev. Forrest Mohr of Boyne City in a last minute message to volunteer solicitors, reminded them that the Red Cross "fund appeal time is important not only to the thousands of people throughout the country who depend upon the contributions to Red Cross to help them in time of disaster, but to the local people as well."

MOST OF THE annual budget goes to caring for the needs of the Charlevoix county servicemen, veterans and their families.

Funds are also budgeted for water safety and other programs which benefit the community.

Of the total budget of \$3,200, 55 per cent will be allocated to national headquarters for its national and world-wide activities, including aid and assistance to servicemen and their families.

## Seek Return Of Historic "Mackinaw Trail" For US-131

Forty years ago travelers north from the Indiana State line to Petoskey saw markers along the highway bearing the picture of a Mackinaw trout and the caption, "Mackinaw Trail," thus identifying it as the route of the historic old Indian trail bearing that name.

Eventually the state highway department changed the name to US-31 and later when that number was given to the Dixie Highway it became US 131.

Wednesday evening at the meeting of the "US-131 Highway association" in the Rowe hotel, Grand Rapids, about 60 men from a dozen communities along the highway were present. East Jordan being unofficially represented by George Secord.

After electing as chairman, John English, chairman of the transportation committee of the Cadillac Chamber of Commerce; vice chairman, Robert Brown, executive secretary of the Kalamazoo Chamber of Commerce;

and secretary treasurer, Fred Bock, secretary manager of the Cadillac Chamber of Commerce, the subject of getting publicity for the highway was being discussed.

George Secord writes: "I brought up the idea of restoring the old name, 'Mackinaw Trail.' They went for it like a trout for a fly, so we have the idea definitely underway. Only two others present could remember the old name, a man from Leroy and one from Howard City."

The Association was organized last fall to promote further development of US-131 from the Indiana border to Petoskey. (contributed)

It was believed that artificial equipment could be used to keep perfect skating ice throughout the winter months — avoiding thin and melting ice during warmer winter days.

## Whiteford, Penfold Out For Top City Office

Two men will be seeking the Mayor's office when residents go to the polls in the annual city election, April 4th. It was announced this week that Alston Penfold will run for office on slips against Vern Whiteford who's petition was filed before the deadline in February.

Whiteford's petition was filed when it was learned that present Mayor Chris Taylor would not seek a third term.

Penfold is assistant manager at Jordan Valley Cooperative Creamery, a graduate of East Jordan high school, Michigan State college and was for nine years assistant superintendent of the Detroit Creamery, largest milk handling firm in the state.

He returned to East Jordan in February of 1954 to fill an executive position at the local creamery.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Penfold, Alston lived in East Jordan from 1931 to 1938 before obtaining his college education. He is a veteran of World War II. His father has been manager of the local creamery for nearly a quarter century.

## WHITEFORD'S experience in city government was gained as Mayor from 1944 to 1947—4 years. Owner of Whiteford's 6c to \$1.00 store, he opened his business in 1932 and now operates the oldest uninterrupted retail business on Main Street.

A member of the East Jordan Businessmen's Association, the Rotary Club, sportsmen's club and a veteran of World War I, Whiteford has been a member of the board of canvassers.

Another contest looming in the coming election in that for position of second ward councilman. Both Merrit Shaw and James Lialak have filed petitions.

All other offices are unopposed. No one, however, filed for county supervisor in the first ward.

Keith Annear will run for first ward councilman. Incumbent Frank Strehl did not file. Milton Meredith, the other councilman in the first ward has one more year to serve.

PRESENT Councilmen for the second ward are Greg Boswell and George Rebec. Boswell does not seek another term and Rebec has another year to serve.

In the third ward, Richard Malpass Sr., is seeking re-election and Gilbert Sturgill has one more term.

Second ward supervisor Robert F. Barnett filed for re-election as well as Barney Milstein in the third ward.

William Bashaw, one of Michigan's oldest supervisors, did not file for re-election in the first ward.

Joseph Wilkins was the only person filing for the office of constable. He is running in the third ward.

EAST JORDAN held no primary election February 21st. A no-contest election, where less than three run for one office, eliminates necessity for a primary election. Residents will elect a mayor and councilmen at the annual spring election, April 8.

Services will be held today (Thursday) at Watson Funeral Home at 2 p.m. for Tim Jensen, 61, who passed away Monday morning at Detroit after a five year illness.

Mr. Jensen was a brother of Mrs. Julia Rude of East Jordan. A complete obituary will be published next week.

Ira Lee was for many years superintendent of the Charlevoix county poor farm, where Grandvue hospital is located today; and he was well known thru out Charlevoix county.

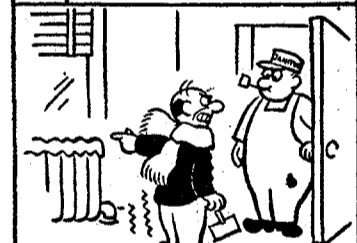
Both Mr. and Mrs. Harold Lee graduated from East Jordan high school.

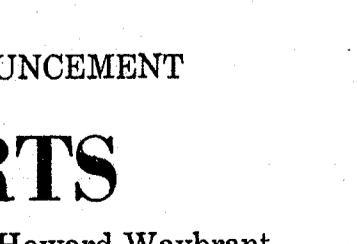
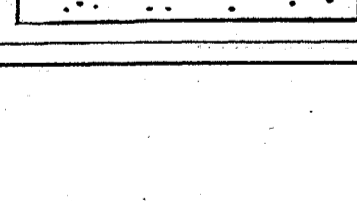

## List Mid-West Resolutions At Annual Dairy Meeting

Manager Percy Penfold and assistant manager Alston Penfold, of Jordan Valley Cooperative Creamery, headed a group of local plant officials in attending the 22nd annual meeting of Mid-West producers' Creameries, Inc. at South Bend recently.

Alston Penfold was elected to membership of the Mid West board of directors. Others from here who attended included President Frank Bur, Elmer Murray and Francis Nemecek.

Main speaker was Norman D. Myrick, editor, "The American Milk Review," New York City. Here are some of the resolutions submitted at the annual meeting in South Bend.

**WE FEEL** prices for dairy products should be supported at a percentage of parity, high enough to protect the purchasing power of the dairy farmer and low enough to discourage overproduction.

City school lunch programs be continued and expanded thru increased appropriations giving consideration to the number of children of school age and the accepted standards of adequate nutrition and recommend greater emphasis be on use of high quality milk and dairy products.

**We recommend** passage of the O'Hara bill which proposes to amend provisions of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetics Act relating to misbranded food.

**We believe** in the principle of a self-help program for agriculture. A self-help plan for dairying has been developed by the National Milk Producers Federation and now before the 84th Congress.

**WE OPPOSE** an increase in minimum wages because such action will further increase costs of farm production, resulting in still lower net spendable income to our farm population and higher costs to the consumer of food and fibre.

**We continue** to advocate complete ownership of the banks for cooperatives by farmers thru their cooperative associations and to urge early enactment of legislation designed to accomplish this.

**We urge** that dairy farmers be permitted to purchase feed grains from government stocks at a price equal to the percentage of parity at which dairy products are being supported.

## Orchard Notes . . .

Attending the fruit school at Twin Lakes last Thursday was personally very valuable to me. I've estimated the worth at \$2,000. I never knew of so many different virus diseases pertaining to different varieties of cherries and so many insects that would attack cherries.

Mr. Hootman's secret was to have a large orchard and make money on other people's labor. And to possibly grow berries and many kinds of fruits. He told of the present increase in population in Michigan and United States. In Michigan we rank first in Montmorency cherries and last in apples. At our present rate of increasing population, in ten years we will have a fruit shortage and it takes ten years to grow the average orchard.

Much of Mr. Hootman's speech will be in this column from time to time. I was able to get an OK on my proposed spray schedule, only they said it would cost more. I've planned a program to use materials that are not injurious to man or fruit and foliage of any species of fruit.

I contacted Ray Hutson, Professor of Entomology and Edward Klos, Professor of Botany for the insecticides. While it is not their part to advise the use of any certain material, Mr. Klos said I could use Termate or Terbam as long as I had had previous good luck with it. Ray Hutson said I could use Mariate, Methoxychlor where arsenate of lead, DDT, etc. formerly used. Malathion can be used for mites aphids, lycanium scale, etc.

More will be said about these materials, and my orchard will be open for inspection this coming season.

**Red Cross Report . . .**

Prior to the drive to raise funds to keep the Charlevoix county chapter of the Red Cross in operation during the forthcoming year as well as the county's quota to the national fund drive, Peter H. Timmer of Charlevoix, chapter chairman, has compiled a report of the work accomplished by the chapter during 1954.

The report reveals that assistance of some type was given to 171 servicemen, 54 veterans and 86 civilians during that period. In addition, loans totaling \$480 were made to service personnel and grants of \$307.87 which were outright contributions to victims of household fires in the county were made. The chapter, in several cases, also solicited clothing, household goods and furniture for the victims.

Last June the chapter sent five Charlevoix county young people to aquatic school so they might become qualified lifeguards. This was done at the cost of \$45.00 per student or \$225.00. A home nursing course was conducted at the cost of \$35 and a first aid and water safety course was offered at the cost of
