School Problems To Be Aired Here

Set Fire Inspection Day In East Jordan

East Jordan will be one of eight Michigan cities receiving the inspection services of the Michigan Fire Prevention Association this Spring.

Through aid of the East Jordan fire department, business places will be checked by 25 fieldmen who will work in groups of six searching for items or situations which might be fire hazards.

The inspection tour will be carried out in East Jordan, Thursday, April 14 with aid of the following organizations: The East Jordan Rotary Club, the City Council, the East Jordan Businessmen's Association, the East Jordan Fire Department and Boy Scouts of East Jordan.

The fieldmen will check buildings placing a red tag on places which might be fire hazards. They will be accompanied by local firemen and Boy Scouts. The tags will be attached by the scouts.

It is expected that the business section will undergo inspection starting at 9 a.m.

The inspection will in no way affect fire insurance rate adjustments. It was said the inspection tour is a service and will cost nothing to businessmen.

The red tags will bring possible fire hazards to light, but no one will be compelled to follow through with a fix-up program. Because only eight Michigan cities can be inspected each year by the fire association, East Jordan planned the coming inspection tour nearly two years ago.

IT WAS SAID Tuesday that a fire association representative will be in East Jordan next week to further prepare for the coming program.

At a meeting of interested residents Tuesday, it was suggested that East Jordan set its annual Spring Clean-Up to coincide with the fire day inspection.

Following the final Red Devil contest Coach Saxton reported this year's team was the highest scoring outfit in the school's history.

Pointing out the team's successful shooting ability Saxton said the team had a season's record of 33 and one third percent of all tosses attempted.

30 Percent Fail Driver License Test

Results of the first 30 days operation of the new driver license examination for beginners has been announced by Charlevoix County Sheriff Glenn E. Rose.

According to the record, 10 persons took the exam, with three or 30 per cent failing.

Rose said most of those taking the exam were young drivers who had never had a license.

THE HIGH percentage of failures on the first try, Rose said, is because the state demands that applicants know more about safe driving than was previously required.

Most of those failing on the first try will probably pass on the second, if they study more and practice more driving Sheriff Rose said.

COURT DOPE

The East Jordan basketball squad dumped 1,101 points into the hopper during the current hardwood season to become the highest scoring team in local school history.

The Red Devils ended the season with 15 wins and four losses and a berth second to Charlevoix for conference honors. They took the class C district meet at Gaylord in an overtime fight with Grayling and dropped their first regional contest to Traverse City St. Francis at Petoskey.

Red Devil Coach Saxton notes that former squads won three district contests in the last five years and two regionals goes since 1940.

Nearest the locals got to a state crown was in the 1940 event when they whipped Remus in the quarter finals and dropped a game to Williamson in the semi-finals at Lansing.

Charlevoix's Rayders have taken five conference titles in as many years.

Saxton reports the school will lose about as heavily as any in the C loop. Graduation will take away Darbee, Danforth, Somerville, Cutler, Brennan and McGeorge. And thereby goes the team.

But it is expected that next year's play will see five or six men six feet tall and over.

The northern loop's 1954-55 all conference team, which is made up players pieked from throughout the circuit, will not be released until next week.

That's because all teams in the loop must have finished their season before the selections are final. Wednesday Charlevoix was still engaged in tournament play.

School Officials To Face Public In East Jordan

The program for the meeting has been outlined by the superintendents of all schools in Charlevoix county with the aid of county superintendent Robinson.

Major problems confronting Charlevoix county education in the schools will be presented by several laymen so residents attending may become acquainted with the overall school needs.

THE ALL-COUNTY mass meeting in East Jordan is a part of the "White House Conference on Education."

It has the support of President Eisenhower, Governor Williams and educational leaders through out the county.

Superintendent Robinson recently attended two Michigan district meetings pertaining to the Michigan White House Conference, one in Cadillac and in Traverse City.

The White House Conference on Education will be explained by Robinson and the objectives outlined.

This is believed to be the first all-county meeting of school interests where residents may discuss current educational problems with school officials.

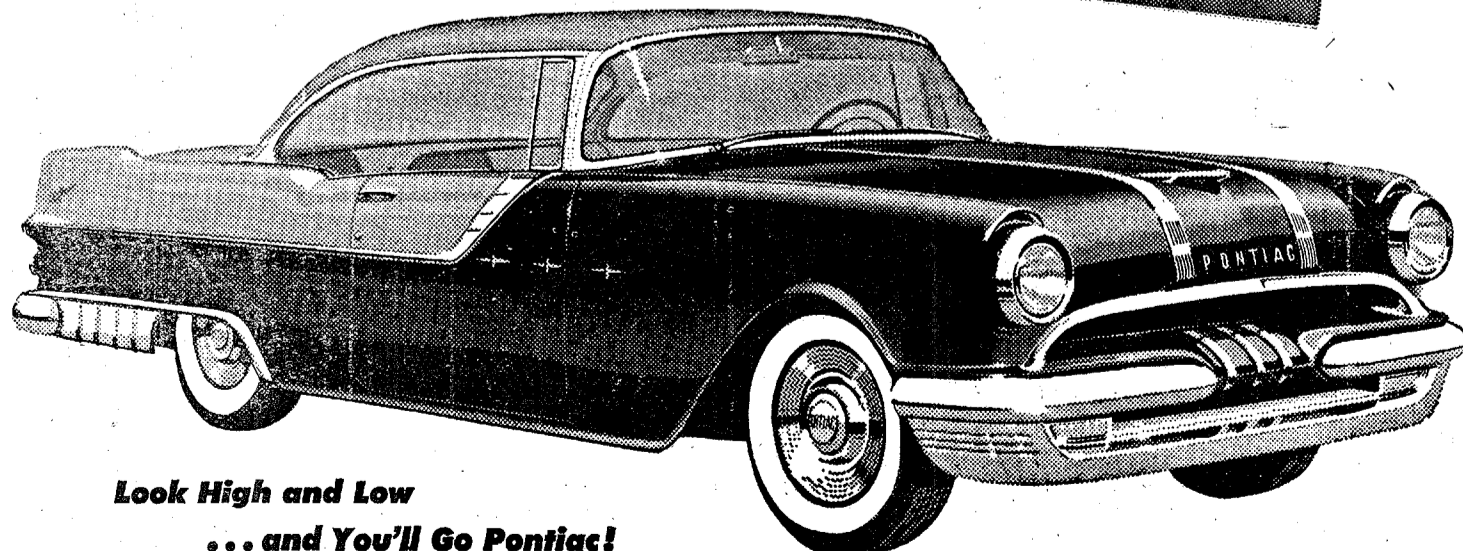

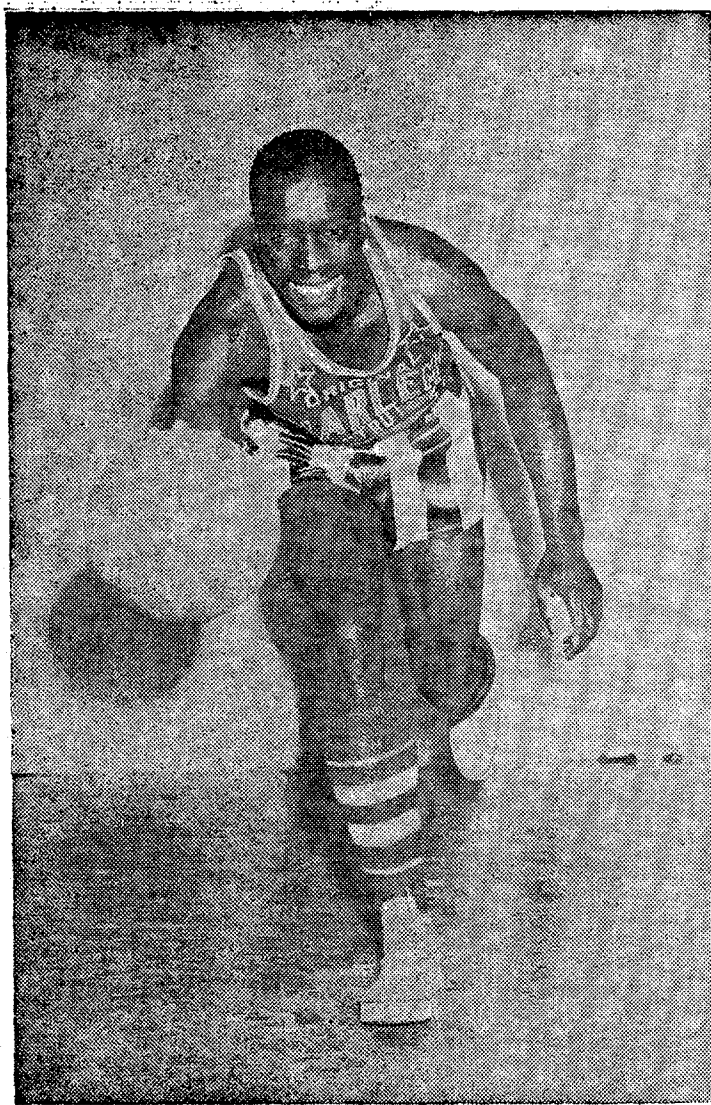

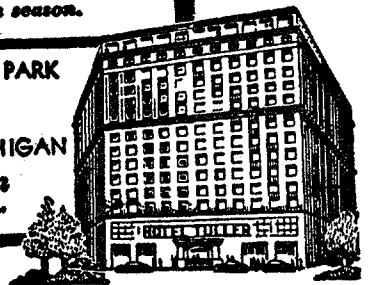

Orchard Notes . . .

. . . Claude Fairman

The Bordeaux mixture was no doubt the first fungicide invented. It originated at Bordeaux, France. Many of us remember using it for various fungus diseases such as apple scab, brown rot, blossom blight, cherry leaf spot and mildew. It is still the best material for mildew which is noticeable on young cherry trees about July 1st.

After copper sulphate and lime liquid lime sulphur came along. Cherry growers got larger cherries with this material but in the long run also got more shot hole.

Then—or about twelve years ago—Fermate appeared on the market. This material was especially good for sweet cherries. And at our orchard here it has been our only fungicide for all fruits. Peach scab, peach blossom blight, apple scab, shot hole fungus on cherries, etc.

Of the three leading and new fungicides, fermate is the only one that has not caused injury at some time or place. On Yellow Delicious and Jonathan if the temperature is very low around blossom time fermate may cause them to russet. For all other fruits it is superior to all other materials for disease prevention and keeping the trees and foliage healthy. For shot hole on cherries apply before or when one third of petals are on and the second application in six days.
