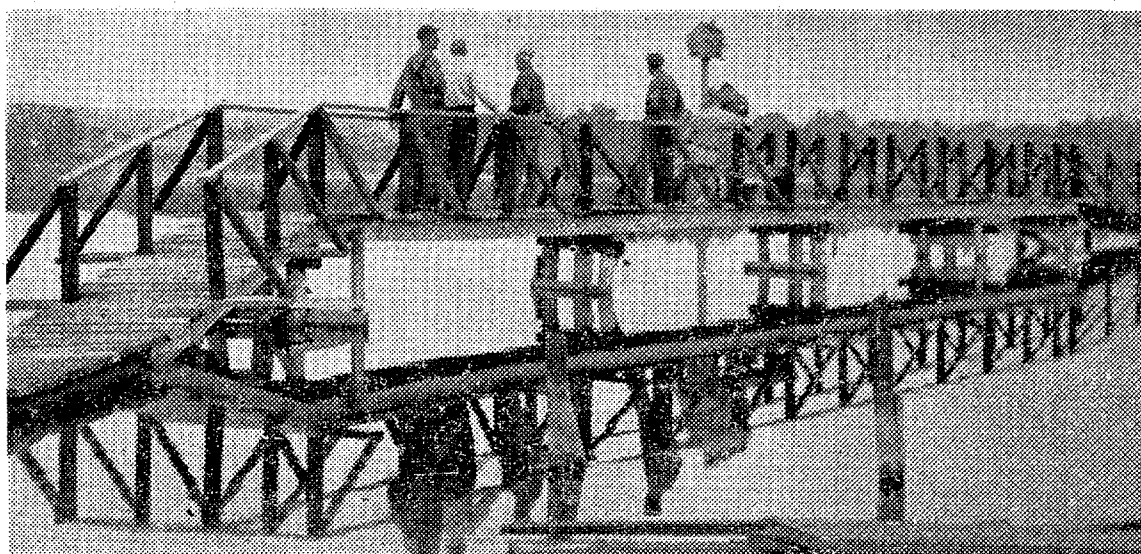

Spring has sprung and there's action on the Jordan—king of Michigan's mighty trout streams! Pre-season activities by the Jordan River Sportsmen's club are readying the famous waters for the summer-long trek of visitors — people who seek fishing at its best.

The newly revived club is spending long hours to improve sportsmen's park and the pond area behind the Mill street bridge.

Reorganized this winter, the club is laying plans for the preservation of wild life along the Jordan. They include erecting of bird houses in the park, establishing of nesting racks for swan and general improvement of conditions to encourage wildlife production.

THE CLUB now has 140 members. They meet on the last Thursday of each month. Earl Leatherman is president; Vern Whiteford, vice-president; Keith Dressel, second vice-president and Jerry Rogers, secretary-treasurer.

CLUB GROWS Meetings have been held in the information room at the post office building, but an increasing membership may require more space. Dressel is chairman of the membership committee.

Early Rainbow trout season on the Jordan starts Saturday, April 9th when fishing is allowed from Webster bridge down to the mouth. Regular trout season will not open until April 30.

The club has joined the Michigan United Conservation Clubs, a highly important wildlife body; and members receive the magazine, Michigan Outdoors.

## Jim Shepard At FFA Meet

Jim Shepard, vice president of the Northwest Region, number six, of the Michigan Association of the Future Farmers of America, left Tuesday to attend the annual convention of the State organization at East Lansing, where he will spend four extremely busy days.

The Northwest Region covers the area bounded on the south by a line from Ludington to Clare, and on the east by US27 from Clare to the Straits.

Four degrees comprise the FFA, the first being "Greenhands;" the second, "Chapter Farmer;" the third, "State Farmer;" and the fourth, "American (National) Farmer."

Only two percent of the total State membership are eligible each year to be named "State Farmers."

Jim is chairman of the State Farmers committee and also of the Selection committee, assisted as adult advisers by Donald Stormer, agricultural instructor in the East Jordan Rural Agricultural school, and Charles Langdon, member of the MSC agricultural department staff of instructors.

DURING the individual sessions of the eight Regional groups Jim will preside at that of his own, the Sixth. At a general session, officers of all eight divisions will give a resume of the year's work and activities.

Jim is also head of the committee on tryouts for Michigan representative to the National contests in Band and in Chorus.

Six boys will be selected to compete for the coveted honor of representing Michigan in each contest.

Friday morning Jim will appear on the WKAR 10:30 broadcast when he presents the State Farmer awards to the successful candidates.

Mr. and Mrs. William Shepard who go to East Lansing Thursday, will be awarded a citation Friday morning for having a son who has done such outstanding work in Michigan's FFA activities.

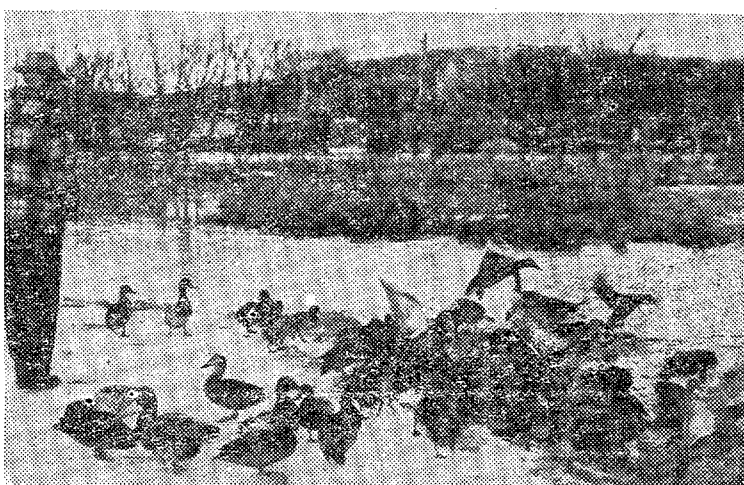

It is said that due to water conditions and poor nesting situations a very low percentage of swan eggs survive hatching stage.

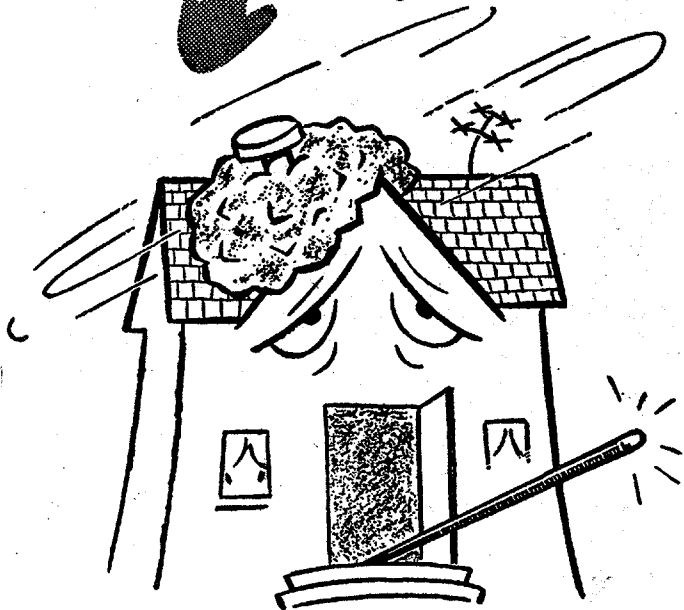
Floating racks for nesting have been the suggested solution by some members.

The young man in the Cadillac and the one who greeted him are established major league players, poised and self-assured, men who have worked long and hard to achieve the status of baseball stars.

The three youths are rookies, getting their first tryout with a big league team. Nervous and uncertain, they are nonetheless determined to show that they have the stuff to make the grade.

They're after the jobs of the man in the Cadillac and his teammate. Perhaps some of them will succeed. Maybe they'll drive a big car themselves some day and, in turn, have their jobs the target of a new crop of rookies.
