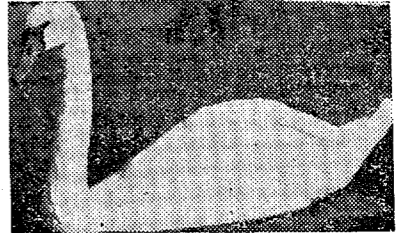

Canvassers To Report On First Ward Balloting

Vern Whiteford, former mayor, and owner of Whiteford's 5c to \$1.00 Store, was named mayor of East Jordan at the annual spring election Monday, according to unofficial tabulations made by the News-Herald.

Whiteford received a total of 379 votes compared to 88 for Alston Penfold. Penfold ran on slips.

Proclamation

Whereas, The City of East Jordan with the cooperation of the Rotary Club, Businessmen's Association, the Boy Scouts, the public schools, and the city officials, have invited the Fire Prevention Association of Michigan to conduct a fire hazard survey and educational campaign in East Jordan; and

Whereas, the destruction of life and property by fire occurs daily in this nation, and is a serious drain on our national life, and the largest part of this fire waste could be averted through carefulness; and

EDITORIAL NEWS

April is Rural Cleanup Month in Michigan. It's been so named in a proclamation by Gov. G. Mennen Williams, according to Ed Rebmam, Charlevoix county agricultural agent.

Gov. Williams notes that trash and other fire hazards in rural areas are a threat to property and life. And he urges a special effort during the month to make all property free of these dangers.

Rebmam suggests that spring is one of the best times of the year to start a year-around fire safety program on the farm.

David G. Steinicke, farm safety specialist at Michigan State, lists these cleanup recommendations:

1. Remove old magazines, newspapers, clothing, rags, mattresses and broken and discarded furniture and the like from the attics, closets, basements and the barn and other outbuildings.
2. Clean up rubbish in the farmyard and cut down dead vegetation around buildings, along fences and in fields.
3. Clean up the machine shop. Dispose of shavings, oily rags and old paints and oils safely.
4. Clean up all electrical equipment and power machinery.
5. Clean up the heating plant, chimney, stoves, brooders and heaters of all types.

NORTHERN LIGHTS

Have you ever wondered what to tell your son or daughter who is about to drive the family car? Thirty-five members of the Flint Association of Fire and Casualty Agents combined to carry a message to parents, and to their teen-age children. It appeared in a full-page advertisement in the Flint Journal recently. It is a good piece of writing and full of good sense.

"Son, in return for the keys to the car, you're in for three minutes of hard listening. First, you might as well know how now that any infraction of the rules that you had to learn to pass your driving test, will mean the end of your permission to drive. The hazards of the road are serious enough when you obey all regulations. No-body has a right to multiply the risk.

"The rules of the road and some mechanical ability are important, but no more important than your attitude and sense of responsibility. The distorted attitude of some drivers toward the law, toward themselves, or toward other living things is what makes the automobile our No. 1 killer. It's up to you to maintain the right attitude as a driver, but be constantly on guard for those who don't or won't. The 'other fellow' has to be on your mind all the time.

"Regard and treat the car for what it is: A complicated mechanism designed to get you where you're going with a minimum of effort on your part. It is not a fast-moving toy, or a means to express feelings of power or superiority, or a stage on which to show off—except your maturity, alertness and conscientiousness. While you're at the wheel, you must never give way to anger, or impatience or undue hurry, or absent-mindedness, or fatigue, or a stupid impulse to show some idiot that you aren't 'chicken.'

"Courtesy is one ingredient which makes everyday life pleasurable. For a driver, courtesy is the factor which makes life possible.

"This car you will drive cost a lot of money. To buy it required financial sacrifice. It takes more sacrifice to keep it running. Your mother and I had to assume financial and moral responsibility for your actions in it before you got your license. We carry some expensive insurance to protect us and you. Just the same, a thoughtless or rash move on your part could mean ruin for us. Juries always convict reckless drivers.

"Even more important are the human factors involved. Our good name and personal honor rest on your shoulders as well as ours . . . never more so than when you're driving a car. I'll spare you any faltering attempts to express the love your mother and I have for you, or our constant concern for your safety. Just keep in mind that everybody is loved by someone . . . I mean the person riding with you, or driving behind you, or in front, or on foot in the path of your car.

"A lot of responsibility to hand out, isn't it? A measure of the way we feel about you is that we're glad and proud to say, 'Son, take the car keys, and have a good time!'"

Mary Isabelle Anderson, the seven week's old child of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Anderson, died suddenly Sunday afternoon.


Miss Norma Johnson is beginning another term of school near Boyne Falls Monday.

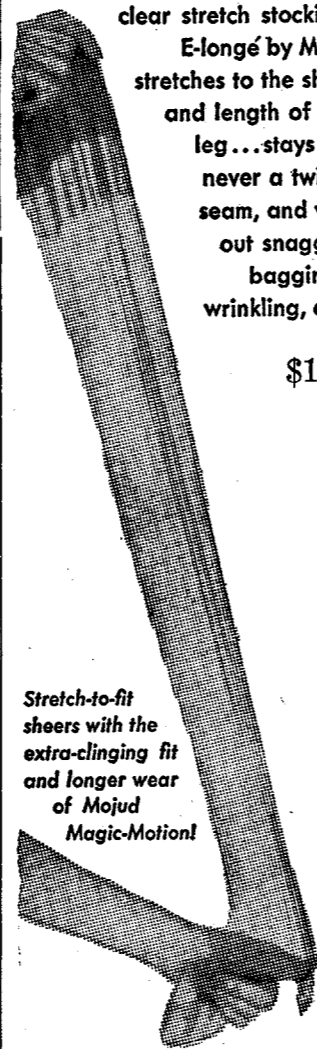
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James H. Nice Services Held Here Tuesday

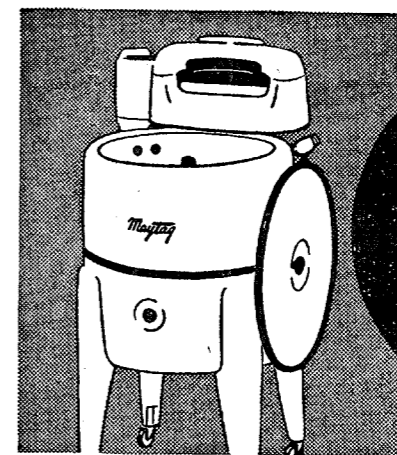
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
