Demomstration Council Plans Lansing Fete

The Charlevoix county Home Demonstration Council met Wednesday at the home of Mrs. Ted Malpass for its regular quarterly meeting.

Miss Edna Sommerfield, district supervisor in home economics for northern Michigan, assisted the council in planning its program.

She revealed there are 40,878 members in the state, 22 per cent of which are new members of less than two years standing. Seven per cent are members of 20 years or more.

Miss Sommerfield urged all groups to send delegates to the annual Homemakers Conference in East Lansing in July. She advised that county chairman attending are to dress in suitable period costumes for the Centennial tea, a highlight of the conference.

Other delegates may also wear costumes if they choose.

To date, 14 Charlevoix county delegates are planning to attend including four from the Friendly circle of East Jordan and three from the South Arm club.

Mrs. Henry Erber of Boyne City, county chairman, announced the annual Achievement Day will be held at Whiting Park, May 17. She appointed the following chairman: Mrs. Harry Tompkins of Boyne City, arrangement committee; Mrs. Nina French of East Jordan, hospitality and refreshments; Mrs. Joseph R. Williams of Charlevoix, program.

Each group will be in charge of its own exhibits.

News-Herald Helps College Club Drive

Surviving are one son, Klon Smith of Albany, New York, and two sisters, Mrs. Lillian Ramsey of East Jordan and Mrs. Harry Latour of Detroit.

Rotary Club Plans Dinner, Program For Inspectors

Today is fire inspection day in East Jordan. Twenty five fire inspectors will travel throughout the downtown business section checking for dangerous fire hazards.

The inspection will neither cost individual merchants anything nor affect current fire insurance rates. It is a service offered by the Michigan State Fire Prevent association.

The inspectors will be in East Jordan upon request of the fire department and aided by the Businessmen's Association, Rotary Club, Boy Scouts, School officials and firemen.

The Rotary Club will hold a noon luncheon program at the Presbyterian Church in connection with the inspection.

It is planned that the inspectors will travel in several groups, each with a fireman and a Boy Scout. Places found to be fire hazards will be identified by a red tag.

ALL MERCHANTS have been requested to cooperate with the inspectors who will ask to check the buildings.

The inspection day is being held when East Jordan also holds its annual clean-up week. Mayor Elect Vern Whiteford is asking all residents to cooperate with clean-up week by placing rubbish near the curb where city trucks can pick it up.

It is felt by firemen that a thorough fire inspection day and clean-up week will help toward reducing the number of fires and accidents which needlessly occur throughout the year.

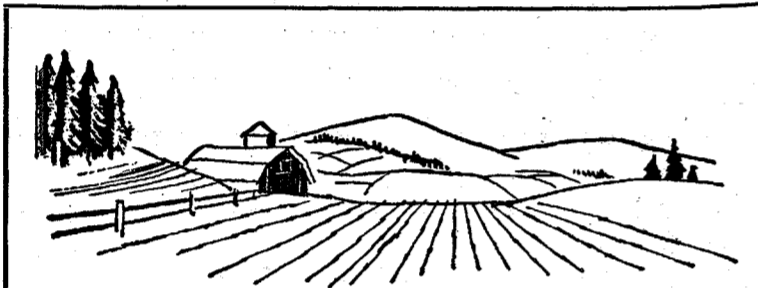
TOUGHER COMPETITION

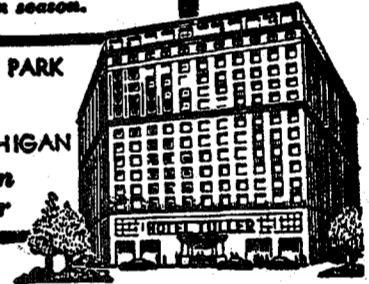

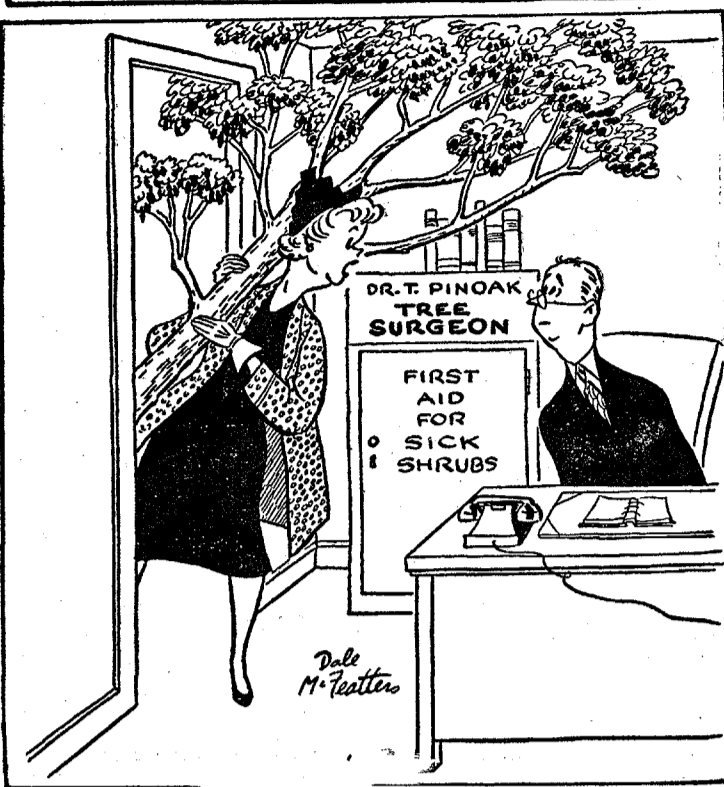

You Spend \$4.75 For Flowers

The average Michigan resident is a more frequent buyer of flowers than the citizens of some states and spends \$4.75 a year on the average for flowers against a national average of \$4.28.

These are based on the most recent figures available from a report to the Michigan Department of Agriculture by the Michigan Florist association.

Michigan ranks seventh among all states in retail floral sales. In 1949 this amounted to a \$30 million business; this has increased a third, so today \$40 million would be a more accurate figure.

Though Michigan ranks seventh in retail sales across the nation, it ranks No. 1 in the sale of gladiolus bulbs and second in production and sale of bulbs of all varieties. Roses, the perennial favorite over the retail counter, still is the state's No. 1 floral product with a gross wholesale value of \$1.5 million.
