For instance, how well educa-ted are we? Did you know that only 30 percent of the people over 25 years old have graduated from high school?

Did you know that the average age of our county residents is 30?

Retails sales in the county totaled \$13,422,000 in 1954. The buying income per family this year is about \$3,155. Average buying income per person is \$892.

Our average temperature for January is 21.7; our average temperature for July is 68.2. The maximum temperature is 99 and our minimum is 33 degrees below zero.

These temperature records were released by the United States weather bureau and are an average of recordings kept for the last 22 years. The report says our average annual snow fall in inches is 72.1. These records came from the U.S. Weather Bureau at Charlevoix.

GRADE SCHOOL OKAYED

Alex Sinclair, of the East Jordan Canning Company, said Wednesday that the area needs 300 more pickers immediately before the hot weather dries the cherries on the trees.

"If we can't get more pickers," Sinclair said, "then we'll need a quick rain to save the crop from burning up."

Six hundred pickers have been hired in East Jordan area orchards, according to Sinclair. But he added that 300 more are in immediate demand.

More than 500 residents of the East Jordan Rural Agricultural district number 2, voted in a special school election Monday with the greatest majority approving construction of a \$400,000 grade building.

On the proposition to increase the tax limitation by 81/2 mills over and above the 15 mill limitation, there were 373 Yes votes compared to 161 No.

On the proposition to borrow \$410,000 and issue bonds for that amount, there were 365 Yes votes and 152 No.

OBSERVERS said the large Yes vote reflected the general city wide desire to improve the community and the general area wide up turn in employment and better financial situation.

* * *

The substantial turn out of voters (537) revealed the wide interest in the proposition. Only four ballots were thrown out due to improper marking.

The school vote was somewhat outstanding in northern Michigan at this time since several communities have recently turned down propositions to construct gyms, additional classooms or entire schools.

North State Development Heat Through Month Of July Group Named

A northern Michigan committee of civic leaders representing 28 counties will go into action this fall seeking perity and better living for the northern half of the lower peninsula. The organization's name, "The Northern Lower Peninsula Development Committee" was selected by representativs meeting in East Jordan, Friday. The new north-state development group grew out of a series of area meetings and will attack problems found in the following fields: industry, education, agriculture, land use, finance, public relations, recreation and transportation.

Most of the nation is scheduled for hotter-than-usual weather from now until mid-August, long-range forecasters of the United States weather bureau said Monday.

The only exceptions they fore see are the southeast and the far west, where temperatures are expected to average below nor-

The central plains and Great lakes regions will be especially hotter than normal, the weathermen forecast.

Precipitation is expected to exceed normal in the southeast and northwest sectors of the nation. Below normal amounts are anticipated in a broad zone extending from New England southwestward through the middle Mississippi valley to the central plains. Elsewhere, near normal precipitation is forecast.

Civic leaders with special interests and capabilities in the various fields have been nominated to the organization. Their names and fields they represent will be announced soon.

The practical approach to greater and more speedy north state development has ben guided by the State Department of economic development.

A recent Cadillac meeting called by the department was attended by 150 community leaders from the 28-county area. eight of whom were named to a board charged with the responsibility of recommending ways to improve north state economy.

At a recent Grayling meeting the board selected action committees from throughout the north which will work under the newly selected title "northern Lower Peninsula Development Committee."

The board is headed by A. E. Steinbrecher, manager, Northern Michigan Electric Cooperative, Boyne City, who held a committee meeting in East Jordan, Friday.

Here the development group's proper name was selected and work done on an explanation of its expected action.

Don Weeks, director, state department of economic development, attended in an advisory capacity.

VARIOUS tell-tale signs show how business and other activities have increased in northern Michigan this summer.

Traffic across the straits is up over last year, volume of spending is up, and the number of summer vacationists are increasing. Commercial shipping activities on the Great Lakes is also over last year. To June 1st, commercial shipping was up 11,000,000 tons over the same period last year; Fourth of July traffic was 7.3 percent

higher across the straits than last year; for the first half of this year 17,840 more cars crossed the straits compared to the same period last year.

THE LARGEST, most comprehensive study of Michigan foreign trade has been launched by the Library of Congress in Washington. The federal study is to further the economic health of the state. With the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway, it is expected this study will be followed with keen interest by those in northern Michigan. About 15,000 business firms, trade organizations, and indivi duals will receive a questionnaire regarding the study.

THE MICHIGAN Good Roads Federation says: "We have in this state dozens and dozens of unsafe, ancient, single lane bridges to be replaced, and hundreds of miles of city streets and county roads to be constructed or reconstructed. Road and street administrators cannot meet public demand for changes on present revenues.

That's the "Massasauga." It is poisonous-a pit viper belonging to the rattlesnake family, but no deaths have been recorded as the re-sult of a bite by one of these small rattlesnakes.

Adequate precautions should be taken even though the bite is rarely fatal.







A gala open house celebration is being planned to mark the presentation of the shelter to the county. At that time the warden's schedule and pick up fees will be announced.


