* * The state speed law put into effect at that time was: 35 miles per hour on the open road; 20 miles per hour in a residential section; and 15 miles per hour in a business section.


* * * Along about this time President Wilson refused \$150,000 offered by a newspaper syndicate for the first newspaper article written by him after leaving the White House.

The American Society of Planning Officials quote the following figures on the cost of getting big:

One hundred new families mean 450 new people That, in turn, means 2.2 more grade school rooms, and 1.6 more high school rooms. Extra rooms, if it were possible to add to existing buildings, would cost about \$120,000. On an annual basis, 100 families would add about \$30,000 to the school operating budget, for new teachers' salaries, building additions, etc.

Other costs include more garbage collection, tax collecting, street cleaning; 10,000 extra gallons of water a day; land for parks, playgrounds, etc.

Extra services adds up to more municipal employees—an added policeman, possibly a paid fire department, and others — with a general payroll hike of \$12,000 to \$15,000 a year. The figures don't count a new hospital bed (cost \$10,000)—or a fraction of a jail cell.

Such is the cost of growing.

The Grand Rapids Press of August 11th injected a little flapdoodling nonsense into a news story from Horton Bay. The Press said: 'The county road that connects Boyne City with Charlevoix, the county's principal cities, is being widened as a road improvement project.

Wondering just how much more principal Charlevoix and Boyne is than East Jordan, we checked our Roget's International Thesaurus to find the meaning of the word principal. For the news story left no doubt that Charlevoix and Boyne City were the principal cities in the county.

Know what that book claims? It says principal could mean almost anything, including "of the first water." We have never heard of the "second water," but if Charlevoix and Boyne City are the county's principal cities and of the first water, then East Jordan of the second, third or fourth water-depending, of course, upon who is attempting to establish the accuracy of the particular bit of claptrap.

* * * The word "principal" also means chief or "first fiddler." Also "biggest frog in the pond." And so, if the Press story is correct, East Jordan is a tadpole playing second fiddle to something.

Now for this pollywiggle in the lagoon stuff. Boyne City and Charlevoix are not the only principal frogs in the county pond just because someone put it down on paper. Ear, eye and nose wise they have the edge on E. J. But do we hear anyone suggesting we start from there? * * *

The encyclopedias mention principal cities referring to amount of trade, employment, shopping center, financial standing, commerce, population and general importance to a given area.

Now, to what or to whom is East Jordan playing second fiddle in Charlevoix county? Not to the financial standing of the people; not to the number of steadily employed; not to commercial and retail trade; not to city-wide construction; not to general civic development; not to general importance of the area.

It must be meant then that we are playing second fiddle to the population of these aforementioned principal cities. But population alone does not make a principal city. Not any more than does age become an antidote for stupidity.

We checked several unquestionable sources and discovered that

It is without doubt true that the folks in East Jordan are most happy to be able to play a fiddle (second, third or fourth) which gives them no fear or sleepless nights—one that stands in no danger of being repossessed. For occasionally one runs across a first fiddler who whistles nervously while he works.

Humane Society To Collect Dog Licenses

The Charlevoix County Hu-mane Society officer, Ed Erber of Boyne City reports that two thirds of his dog complaints are those involving unlicensed dogs or strays.

Not all unlicensed dogs are strays. Every year after June 15th, the deadline for purchasing dog licenses at the regular fee, there are hundreds of delinquent owners of dogs who have never applied for the license.

This year the county treasurer's office turned the delinquent list over to the Charlevoix County Humane Society for collection. A report shows there are about 600 owners to be contacted. Mr. Erber spends one day each week in Charlevoix, Boyne City and East Jordan locating delinquent dog owners. He is prepared to issue them a license at that time. The law imposes a penalty of double the fee for being delinquent.

Mr. Erber investigates complaints of cruelty made to him in writing and signed by the complaining witness, trespassing dogs and vicious dogs. He finds that there are very few cases of real cruelty in the county, but there are habitual trespassers even though it is unlawful for an owner to allow his dog to stray beyond his premises.

The Shelter on Hull Street in Boyne City is being built for the purpose of caring for such dogs. The kennel section will have 12 inside heated compartments for dogs who roam at large and where there are complaints of nusiance and damage. Dogs, licensed or unlicensed, will be handled alike when involved in a violation of the Michigan State dog laws. First offenders

Lost unlicensed dogs will be held at the shelter for three days. If not called for, they will be adopted into an approved home or put to sleep. Reports from the Conserva-

tion department of dogs running deer and livestock damage are increasing in the northern counties. A program is needed to bring this under control. The Humane Society would like to sponsor an educational program, but since it is a new organization and not too well supported by the public, they find it necessary to devote all their funds and energy to the procuring of a shelter, truck and hiring a keeper and

officer to enforce the laws.






