Woods Become **Dangerous** Fire Traps

The conservation department has put on a ban against fires or fire permits for burning outdoors in 14 of northwestern Michigan's counties.

All fire permits have been eliminated until a general rain lessens danger.

Conservation officials said some of the forest growth in the north has already become dead because of lack of water, adding to the danger of flash fires.

The department appealed to the public to exercise the utmost caution in the woods and stressed the danger of discarding cig-

EACH DAY without rain from now on will make the situation more critical, it was said. Charlevoix county forests are especially dry and residents are warned that a small fire can spread so fast, it might be im-

possible to control it. The East Jordan fire department has recently stopped several grass and rubbish fires which would have caused extensive damage if they had not been extinguished within minutes.

Seek New City Limit Signs Here

East Jordan may have modern "welcome" signs installed at three city limit points if arrangements are worked out between the businessmen's association, the Rotary Club and the City Council.

Suggested by the businessmen's association, the Rotary club named a committee to investigate the necessary work and approximate cost of sign construction.

An effort is being made to install large rustic signs with log supports bearing the Rotary emblem, the city's population and other current information concerning East Jordan.

Local school district taxes would pay for a little more than maintenance and operation of the eleven school buses.

school district taxpayer, contribute toward school operation

Of the approximate \$6,000 per week school operating cost, (for nine months), total local school taxes could contribute \$686 each week — the total am-

ount raised here. In fact, school taxes raised locally amount to about 8 or 10 per cent of the actual annual cost of operation.

The total annual school payroll is six times as great as the amount of all local school taxes collected.

With operational costs at \$214,129.64 from July 1954 to July 1955, local taxes to help meet this is only \$24,713.

From seven state agencies comes \$163,882.09 which enables the school to operate.

Salaries for 30 teachers, not including the superintendent, are \$115,317.43 per year.

That's about \$3,200 in weekly pay, or nearly \$13,000 per month It costs about \$20,000 per year to keep the school buses

rolling. Operation of the school plant, janitors' salaries and supplies run more than \$18,000 per year.

Although local school income is but a small amount of school costs, residents further support the school through various state

However, without state aid, local school taxpayers would have to jump their direct support from \$686 per week to \$6,-000 per week, which would present a highly critical situation.

If entire cost of school operation fell to the responsibility of those living within the city limits of East Jordan, each person would be assessed about \$3.00 per day for the school term.

Cities Must Aid Local **Industries**

Michigan communities should make a special effort to retain and develop the industries they now have, George Petrie, chief of domestic commerce of the U.S. Department of Com merce's Detroit field office, said Wednesday, August 17) at the first industrial development workshop in Mt. Pleasant.

Seven other instructors spent most of the day discussing with local industrial committees plans for attracting new industry.

The eight industrial development experts spoke before representatives of Gratiot, Isabella, Clare, Mecosta, Midland, Montcalm and Osceola counties. The workshop was sponsored by the Michigan Economic Development Department and locally by the Mt. Pleasant Chamber of Commerce and Central Michigan College.

Petrie emphasized that it is usually the newer and smaller companies which need assistance the most. Many times, he said, community leaders and businessmen can spot signs of trouble in a company and help prevent its failing.

Some of the ways the community can help out are by: Insuring the adequacy of lo-

cal utilities. Promoting vocational training for the community's youth.

Helping to avert any labormanagement tensions. Promoting opportunities for subcontracting with little man-

ufacturers. Encouraging and offering advice to new manufacturers especially those with limited ex-

perience in business. "It's appalling to see the number of new industries which fail every year," Mr. Petrie said. "A survey conducted by Dun & Bradstreet shows that 89% of all business failures are due to incompetence on the part of the cperator. Undoubtedly many of those failures might have been averted if these businessmen had received good advice in ad-

vance." From the floor, State Senator Bert J. Storey of the 25th District suggested that a directory of Michigan towns should be compiled listing the qualifications of each town that might fit various types of industry coming inte Michigan.


They're dead as a dodo-deader!







Ol' Diz has been asked more than once how the Tigers get along together. Well, I'm happy to report that the team is one big happy family. All the players like and respect one another. They mix socially. Sometimes they go out in a group.

Contrary to the general impression, this is true of most major league baseball teams.

Today's baseball player is better educated and better mannered than his counterpart of years ago. Where the old-time player generally was cocky and difficult to manage, the current crop regards baseball as a serious business and tries to get along with everybody.

FEUDED AMONG SELVES

Of course, sometimes there are individual differences between players but rarely is there team dissension such as may be rumored or reported.

In fact, the last case of outright dissension Ol' Diz can recall occurred in 1940 when the so-called Cleveland "cry-babies" feuded with their manager and among themselves.

What usually causes such dissension, when it does infrequently occur, is a team faltering under the pressure of a tight pennant race. Harmony prevails on a winner but a loser, being under greater tension, is more susceptible to a blow-up.

In my experience, there has never been real dissension on the Detroit baseball club. A good manager can stop it before it gets fairly well started.

TRUE TO LIFE

Individual disputes, arguments that fade out almost as quickly as they flare up, are another matter. You'll find them in baseball just as you will in the ordinary course of life.

With the Tigers, Ol' Diz recalls a big niffnaw years ago between Birdie Tibbetts, then our catcher and now the Cincinnati manager, and Bobo Newsom, who was the ace of the pitching staff, over what pitch to throw. It started on the field and continued in the clubhouse, ending as abruptly as it began.

Then there was the time in 1949 when Dick Bartell, our coach, and Ol' Diz had a tiff in the clubhouse in Boston over my taking some extra cuts during batting practice.

But even these occasional blow ups are missing from the Tigers of 1955. The team likes Manager




