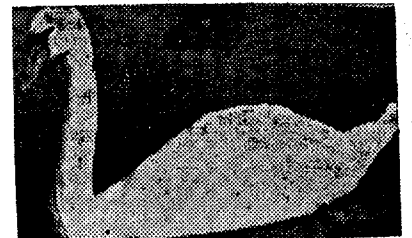

Seek Bidders For Work On Highway M-32

Announcement that the State Highway department will let contracting bids for improvement of M-32 through East Jordan was made at the monthly meeting of the East Jordan Businessmen's Association Tuesday night.

The road work bids will be let September 7th in Lansing, according to a state legal advertising appearing elsewhere in this issue of the News-Herald.

The association has been urging improvement of the highway for two years.

The association has announced plans to aid whenever possible the Jordan River Sportsmen's Club plan to improve sportsmen's park.

A committee studying the possibility of obtaining new family units in the city reported that negotiations are already underway by private interests.

It was voted by the association to obtain two additional photographic brochures of East Jordan patterned after the one just purchased. It is titled, "This Is East Jordan."

The books will be used in attempts to attract new industrial plants to the city.

A discussion on city wide development in the past two years revealed that use of electricity has jumped nearly 300 per cent and that new telephone installations are continuing at record pace.

Tokoly Heads Oceana Road Commission

Sam Tokoly, of Boyne City, who spent eleven years with the Charlevoix county road commission, now is engineer-superintendent of the Oceana county road commission.

Tokoly is a veteran of World War I, serving with the Royal Flying Corps and noted throughout United States for his past flying feats. He is often referred to as a World War I flying ace.

In 1919 he joined the Michigan State highway department and served until 1922 when he became engineer for the Alpena County Road Commission. He remained at Alpena until 1931 when he joined the Charlevoix county road commission, remaining until 1942. His home is in Boyne City.

During World War II, Tokoly was employed by the U. S. Air Force as a coordinator and chief engineer and he supervised construction of airports at Kinross and Grayling. Since 1947 he has been engaged in private contracting work.

Tokoly, a registered civil engineer and land surveyor, replaces William G. Wolf in Oceana County, who was killed in an auto accident.

Last minute placement of two high school teachers has completed the staff of East Jordan high school which opens for the 1955 year, September 6th.

Supt. E. E. Wade has announced the hiring of Howard Brighton, of Roscommon, as assistant coach to replace Donald Carey, of Charlevoix, who returned home to become head coach following the resignation of Del Terrill.

Brighton comes to East Jordan after one year at Ovid, near Owosso, where he was head basketball coach and assistant football coach. He is a Central Michigan graduate.

He received his B. S. from Central and his M. A. from the University of Michigan. He is married and has three children.

Replacing Harry Jankoviak as industrial arts instructor will be Harold Jouett, of the State Normal University Normal, Ill.

Supt. Wade reports a half day session, Sept. 6th. Buses will leave at 12 noon. In the afternoon adjustments will be made in classes and textbooks will be distributed.

Kindergarten children living within the city limits will not report until Wednesday afternoon. Children five years of age or who will be five on or before December 1st will be admitted to school this fall.

May Get Trees From Mich. State

How Much Is Your House Worth?

The most that should be hoped for in a real estate appraisal is that it be an estimate of value provable by the mathematics of common sense — bolstered by the integrity of good conscience.

When appraising an ordinary lot or modest home, the commonly accepted theory of reconciling replacement cost, income and market value, may be adequate.

However, appraising commercial, industrial and large-parcel values is a much more complex process which requires a knowledge of layout and construction, finance, taxes, law, business, industry, merchandising, etc. If the findings are to serve their purpose they should be conclusive enough to withstand the scrutiny of specialists in the fields involved.

Real estate appraisals are largely "guesstimates" because many pertinent value-determining factors are not always taken into account and properly coordinated in arriving at conclusions.

Regardless of classification, real estate is individualistic in nature. Each parcel should be reckoned on its own — as its desirability, utility and value, influence neighboring properties, and it, in turn, is affected by the others.

Regardless of an appraiser's ability, his evaluations should not be expected to go unchallenged.

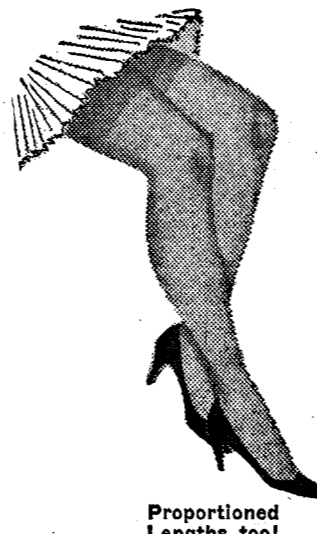

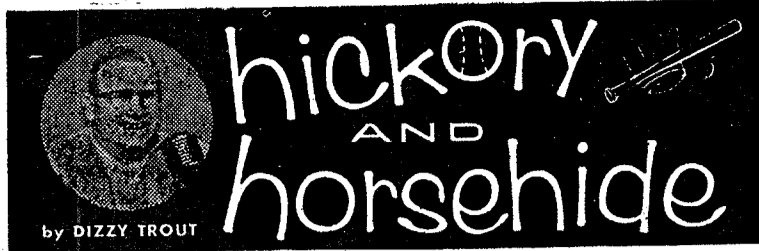

Well mannered, pleasantly dispositioned and well-liked by his teammates, handsome, conservative Raymond Otis Boone is as much the "bread-and-butter" man of the Tigers today as he was right after he was traded to Detroit during those bleak early days of 1955.

O! Diz will stick by my statement in an earlier column that no player alone is responsible for lifting the Tigers from our only basement finish in 1952, but more than any other player Ray kept the Tigers going during those dark days.

Sometimes, when he was driving in one winning run after another, it sure seemed like he was doing the job single-handedly.

But of course Harvey Kuenn contributed considerably to the upsurge and so did Steve Gromek and others, and now we have the added punch of fellows like Al Kaline, but 32-year-old Boone keeps on going like Old Man River.

CAUGHT UP WITH PACK

Despite early season injuries and a hitting slump, Ray has caught up with the pack and is well up there in hitting, runs batted in and other departments. And he is as popular as ever with Tiger fans.

Strangely, none of this was the case at Cleveland, where frequently Ray was roundly booed by patrons of Municipal Stadium and was the target of barbs from the press.

As a consequence, his hitting suffered and he dropped from a high of .301 and 58 runs batted in in 1950 to .241 and 21 RBIs at the time of his trade in 1953.

Showing just how much a change of climate can mean to a player, Boone wound up the 19-53 season with a .312 batting av-

erage and 93 RBIs with Detroit. Moreover, he belted 22 home runs, 10 more than he ever hit in any season with Cleveland.

"I always figured I was good for at least 20 homers a year," Ray said.

CHANGED DIRECTION

Last year he hit an even 20 and this season, with 16 as of this writing, he's hoping to repeat again. In addition, his 90 RBIs as I write this tops anything he's ever done in the majors and he stands a good chance of breaking 100.

Boone's explanation for his remarkable increase in batting ability is his change in hitting direction coupled with friendlier reception of Detroit fans. Where formerly his long ball was to center field for a simple out, the right handed hitter now pulls the ball into left field for doubles down the foul line and homers into closer-in stands.

Ray considers the trade that brought him to Detroit one of the best breaks of his baseball career. He classifies it in importance with his conversion from a catcher to a shortstop by the Cleveland management because of a shortage of infielders in the Indians' farm system.

Ray had been going nowhere as a catcher, but in his first year as an infielder with Oklahoma City, a Cleveland farm, he batted .355 and was called up by the Indians near the end of the '48 season.

When Ray came to us, Manager Fred Hutchinson moved him to third only because a fellow named Kuenn was doing pretty good with the Hickory and Horsehide at shortstop.

Farmers May Use Dist. Marsh Plow

Farmers are reminded that the Charlevoix Soil Conservation District has a marsh plow that belongs to them and which is available for use to anyone.

It was purchased by the Charlevoix Soil Conservation District a few years ago through the assistance of Charlevoix county banks.

Most farms in Charlevoix county have no pasture due to the dry weather. Farmers who have low wet areas do have some pasture. Many of these swampy areas are fairly dry now and possibly could be made into much better pasture. Possibly using this marsh plow to fit this low land could be done with a wheel tractor if it is dry enough otherwise a crawling type tractor is needed.

People who are interested in obtaining the use of this marsh plow are advised to contact one of the Soil District directors, the farm planner or the county agricultural agent.

Orchard Notes . . .

One thing noticeable this season is the earlier ripening dates of the various fruits.

Jonathan apples that usually ripen here October 25th may ripen this year in mid September.

The little rain that we had Sunday will help fall apples to take on color. It takes cloudy weather to put color on apples. Here as well as other places, apple growers are feeling a little better.

Trade inquiries are heavy as many large orchards in various parts of Michigan have no crop at all. This brings to bear that our north Michigan lakes region fruit belt is coming to the front.

Jonathan and Delicious and all late ripening apples should be better than usual. Some fall and early fall apples are still problematical but may come on in fine shape.

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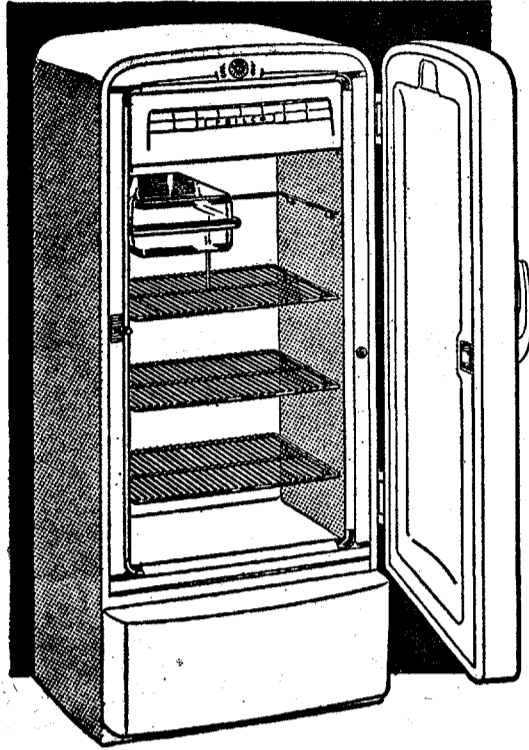
