A little boy was asked to write an essay on the human anatomy and this is what he turned in to the teacher:

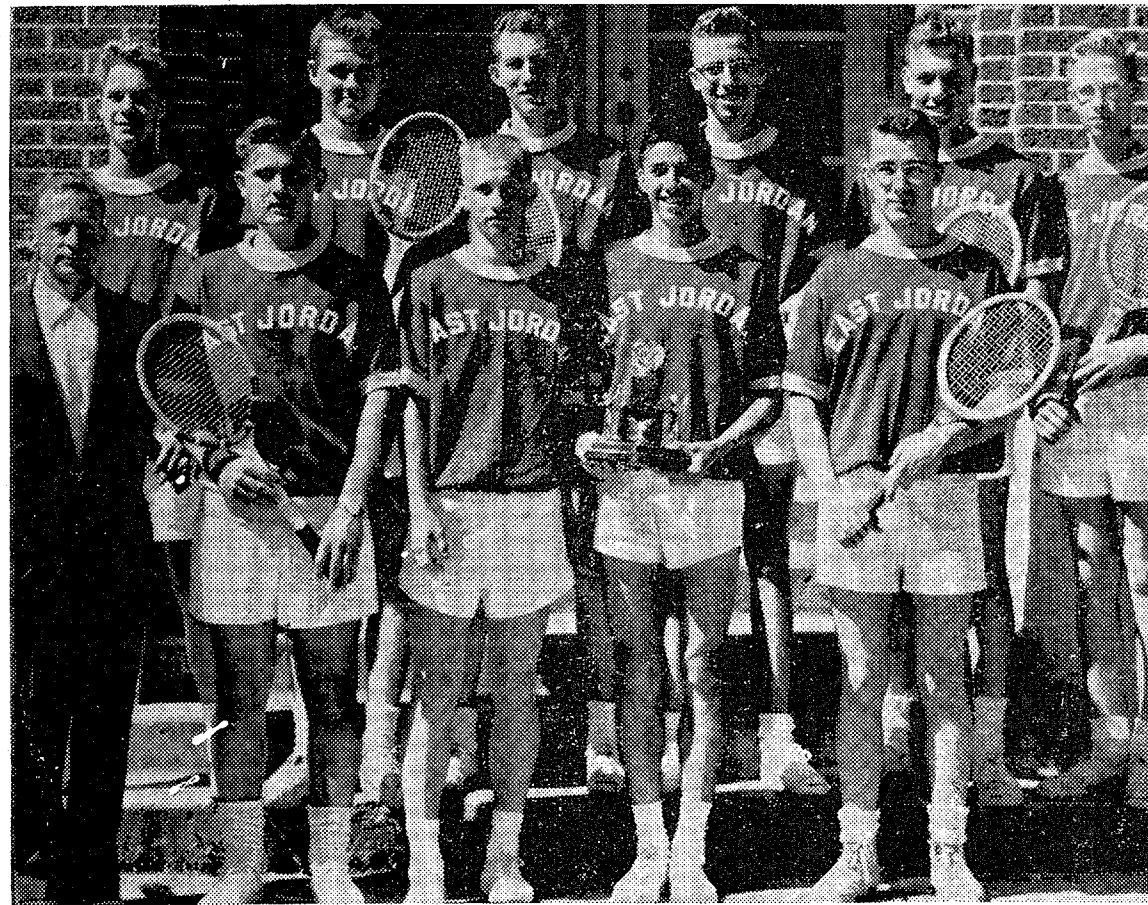

North State Legionnaires Meet Here Next Sun.

About 150 members of the American Legion and Auxiliary are expected to attend the annual Lower 11th District meeting in East Jordan, September 18th, next Sunday.

East Jordan's only state athletic title in high school competition, the State C-D Tennis championship taken at Kalamazoo this year, tops a full season of successful play around Michigan.

Unknown in tennis play a year or so ago, the East Jordan squad rose rapidly in 1954 and 55 and throughout the past summer received numerous invitations to join area and state play offs.

In 1954 the team capped the regional C-D tournament at Mt. Pleasant with Keith Evans runner-up in the singles; Lysle Johnston was the semi-finalist in the singles and Danforth and Somerville won the doubles.

Improved playing under the coaching of Max Damoth sent the team back to the Mt. Pleasant regional this year with the local squad again winning over Leelanau, Standish, Sterling and Benzonia.

In the team's second appearance at the regional Bob Darbee won the singles title and his brother Cal was runner-up. Lysle Johnston was semi-finalist in the singles.

Danforth and Somerville copped the doubles title for the second year with Woodcock and Pemberton runners-up in the finals. Richards and Graham were semi-finalists.

At the state tourney in Kalamazoo the singles championship trophy went to Bob Darbee with Cal Darbee a semi-finalist. Danforth and Somerville were semi-finalists in the doubles.

East Jordan high school was presented with the state team trophy.

The 1954 summer play for the team began with the boys entering one of the strongest play offs in Michigan — the Hamtramck matches. The entire squad was snowed under, but Lysle Johnston won his first round match before bowing out.

They entered other tournaments at Cadillac and Petoskey. At Petoskey, Jerry Dedoes, a local summer resident, and Bob Darbee took the men's doubles title. Dedoes was also men's singles champ. Bob Danforth won the boys' singles and teamed with Johnston to cop the boys' doubles crown.

The team came into its own a year later, when this summer, the boys entered the Grand Rapids Press tournament, and although doing well, none came out on top.

At Beulah Bob Danforth won the Junior Men's singles and teamed with Bob Darbee to take the doubles. In the Paul Bunyan tourney at Cadillac, Darbee and Danforth won another doubles crown.

At Petoskey Danforth won the Men's singles and Darbee and Danforth took the Men's doubles. Gene Richards picked up his first trophy as he won the Boy's singles.

Petoskey Firm To Improve Highway Thru East Jordan

Hodgkiss & Douma, Petoskey road builders, have received the Michigan State Highway job of improving M-32 through East Jordan, according to Charles M. Ziegler, state highway commissioner.

The Petoskey firm was low bidder for road projects on both M-66 and M-32 amounting to a total of \$151,725.37.

The M-32 project consists of bituminous aggregate surfacing from Maple Street (where the fairgrounds road ends in the city) through to the East Jordan and Southern Railroad crossing near the Mill street bridge.

Devils Start Season At St. Ignace

The Red Devils will open their 1955 football schedule at St. Ignace Saturday with opening kickoff slated for 2:30.

After two weeks of intensive drills, Coach Saxton will probably go with a backfield combination of a sophomore, two juniors and a senior.

Larry Woodcock, two years a letterman, will start at quarterback. Richard Streeter, 130 lb. senior, gets the call at the all-important fullback slot. Gareth Thompson, a junior and a reserve end last fall, gets the nod at the left halfback slot.

Sophomore Alan Ingalls rounds out the backfield at right half.

Other ball carriers, who may see considerable service are; Bucky Cihak, a freshman, at quarterback; Jack Ingalls, a junior and first year man at either left or right halfback, and Jerry Harrington, a 6' 2" senior, who may do the kicking.

Leading the line up front are three solid letterman, regulars back from last fall's aggregation; Jerry Sweet, right guard; Ralph Wykoff, right tackle, and Dick Johnson, center. Another letterman, Frank Russell, will more than likely get the starting left guard position.

At left tackle three boys Rod Steenbergh, Glen Kowalski, and Ralph Shepard are still battling it out for the starting berth and the starter will probably not be known until kickoff time.

At left end it's a toss up between Alva Noirott, a junior, and James Yettaw, a freshman. Ray Walker, 6' 2" junior, has the edge at right end.

Coach Saxton has named Dick Johnson, three-time letter winner, to act as the game captain in Saturday's opening tilt.

St. Ignace is expected to be tough with several letterman returning from last fall. They also will have the advantage of one game with Canadian Soo last weekend.

East Jordan School Gets New Name

Official name for East Jordan high school and all the rest of the schools in Charlevoix county were changed September 7th by the Charlevoix county board of education.

The old name of East Jordan Rural Agricultural School, district number two, fractional, has been changed to: "Fourth Class School District No. 3, Charlevoix-Antrim County, East Jordan, Michigan."

\$80,000 PROJECT
This project is estimated at \$80,000. The City of East Jordan's share is \$5,010.00, a check for which has been mailed to the state highway department. The city's payment was made following a special council meeting Monday night.

Mayor Vern Whiteford and Police Chief Harry Simmons attended the opening of the bids in Lansing last week.

It was said the M-32 project includes some relocation of sewers, removing and replacing and the adding of curb and gutters and conditioning the road for blacktopping.

IT WAS EXPECTED that the work will get underway soon with completion early next summer. Completion date set by the highway department is July 31, 1956.

The M-66 highway work which was also awarded the Petoskey firm is as follows: 3.7 miles of bituminous aggregate surfacing from the Charlevoix county line, southeasterly; and 2.68 miles on M-66 from the Antrim county line northerly through East Jordan to the corner of M-32.

Seek More Interest In Boy Scouts

If you feel your community is paying too much for scouting, then you should induce more boys to enter the program. The larger the number of boys joining in a community, the less scouting costs per boy.

That was the answer given East Jordan Rotary Club members by Arthur Huey president, Scenic Trails Council, Boy Scouts of America.

Hughey, a past district governor of Rotary International, addressed Rotary Club members at their regular Tuesday noon luncheon meeting.

The president said you can't serve scouting well without first studying the program and learning all about the youth movement.

Huey said scouting is 45 years old and Rotary is 50 years old and that he believes the Boy Scouts of America and Rotary International are among the top public service organizations of America today.

IT WAS POINTED out by Donald Berg, head of the executive office of the Scenic Trails Council, that East Jordan has 134 scouts enrolled to date. This is the largest scout enrollment per capita for any northern Michigan city outside of Traverse City.

Berg came to the meeting with Huey. The men were invited to address Rotary by Howard Porter, who was in charge of the program for the day.

Also attending were the following East Jordan scout masters: Harry Watson, Cliff Gihbard, Lou Gardner and Richard Malpass.

Of the four local scout troops, one has no sponsor and members of Rotary are considering the possibility of accepting that responsibility.

Travel Back Roads For Pleasure . . .

Some day, when we have finished a few more super-highways, someone is going to make a lot of friends by advocating the construction of a few thousand miles of narrow, winding dirt roads that lead nowhere in particular—roads that just wander off across the countryside, up and down hills, across valleys; typical, old, country roads, with all the natural hazards and charm left in.

Such roads will be built for dawdling, stopping on hilltops, for wild-flower admiring, for bird-watching—for all the things the prudent motorist shouldn't do on a four-lane highway. We still have many country-road drivers who want to see a tree, not a blur of woodland; who want a breath of country air, not highway fumes; who want to stop and look without creating a traffic jam two miles long behind them.

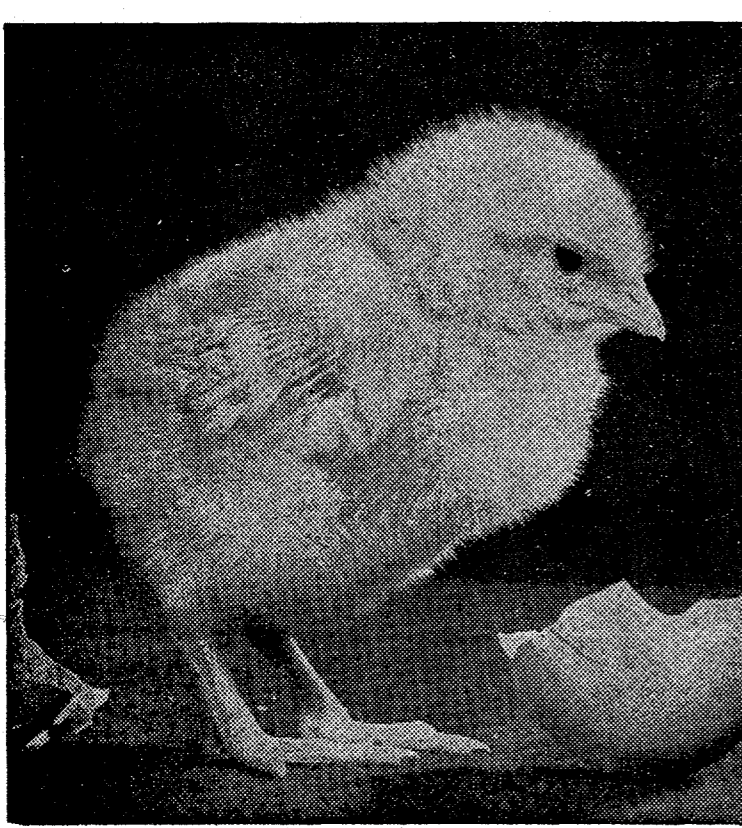
I recall one back road where we parked one day to watch a wood thrush, and after we had been there half an hour two foxes came into a clearing close by and played like puppies. It's a grassy trail that leads past an old cellar hole and two very old lilac bushes, fragrant remembrance of a farm wife who lived and raised a family there, and is buried there beneath a weathered sandstone marker.

These back roads lead to something many of us don't want to forget. Something placidly beautiful, something as natural as a stand of fine old hemlocks. Something that isn't too much changed by the years or by the things man does to the places where he lives and works.

We live in a world of change, often violent and sudden, and it is good for the soul to be aware of things which change only on their own terms and in their own time.

After several lean years, the famine is nearing an end. Next season for sure, the Tigers will return to the first division.

This is based on expected help in large measure from our fertile farm system. A lot of highly promising young ball players are coming up, according to those in the know in the Tiger organization.

"It really looks good," declares perceptive Jack Tighe, now a Tiger coach and formerly a scout for three years and a manager at Buffalo, Toledo, Williamsport and Muskegon.

If anyone should know about the future Tigers, it is the squire of Spring Lake (a Muskegon suburb), for he scouted, signed and managed many of the youngsters who will soon wear Tiger livery and he still keeps close track of them. Jack speaking:

"Our farm system is strong at every position except second base, and even there we've signed a young fellow named Shep Fraser off the University of Alabama campus whom we think will someday be a great player."

LOTS OF CATCHERS
"We're especially strong in catching. Take Jay Porter, who has been recalled from Buffalo. He started hitting the ball once the first base experiment was abandoned and he was allowed to return behind the plate, where his heart really was. His average rose from .225 to .264 just a few weeks after he started catching again."

"Our regular backstop someday will be Charlie Lau from Romulus, Mich., who hit .295 and got 16 home runs at Buffalo. This was his second year in organized ball, his first season being 1952 and the two years in between being military service."

"Bonus pitcher Bob Miller, who's also been recalled to the Tigers, did nicely at Augusta, winning 7 and losing 2, including taking a seven-inning no-hitter, and he may very well stay up with us."

TOP PROSPECT
"A youngster to keep an eye on is Gene Neff. Now in his second year at Durham after military service, this powerful right-hand hitter is going to run somebody right out of the Tiger outfield soon. He hit .300 with Jamestown his first year in baseball."

"Other names to remember are Emil Karlik, who hit .326 at Augusta; Tom Sarna, a big

strong third baseman who hit .317 with the same club, including 17 home runs and 91 runs batted in, and Steve Demeter, 19-year-old infielder, who hit .281 and got 17 homers and 78 RBI's at Buffalo.

Farmers May Order Seedlings From Mich. State

Charlevoix county farmers can get a special packet of forest seedlings adapted to windbreak use. The new packet along with the order list for other trees has been announced by the conservation nursery at Michigan State.

The seedlings are for delivery this fall and next spring.

The windbreak packet includes 100 red pine, 100 Norway spruce and 100 white spruce transplants. Transplants of red pine, Jack pine and white spruce along with seedlings of white pine, Jack pine, Austrian pine and Scotch pine are available for reforestation use. Hardwood seedlings on the list include black locust, American elm and red oak.

Douglas fir transplants appear on the list for the first time in several years, according to Bull. Black walnut stratified for spring planting will also be available for purchase during the winter and spring. Early purchasers can get small numbers of Norway spruce and tulip poplar.

Trees sold by Michigan State cannot be used for ornamental plantings. They cannot be planted within corporate limits of towns and cities, nor can they be planted on building lots in residential sub-divisions outside of cities.

They may also be obtained by writing to the Conservation Nursery, Michigan State University, East Lansing.

Police May Lose License Examinations

The executive committee of the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police, has approved a resolution recommending that driver license examinations be turned over to the department of secretary of state.

Action was taken following appearance before the committee of Lee C. Richardson, director of the driver and vehicle services division of the department, and George M. Newman, chief examiner, driver services section.

The proposal that the department take over the examinations would be conducted by a special staff of trained employees who would be under state civil service.

Examinations are now conducted by police and sheriff departments. Committee members felt that the transfer of the examining function would result in more centralized control of driver licenses, closer supervision and greater efficiency. They said it costs police departments more money to conduct the examinations than they receive from the state as their part of the fee.

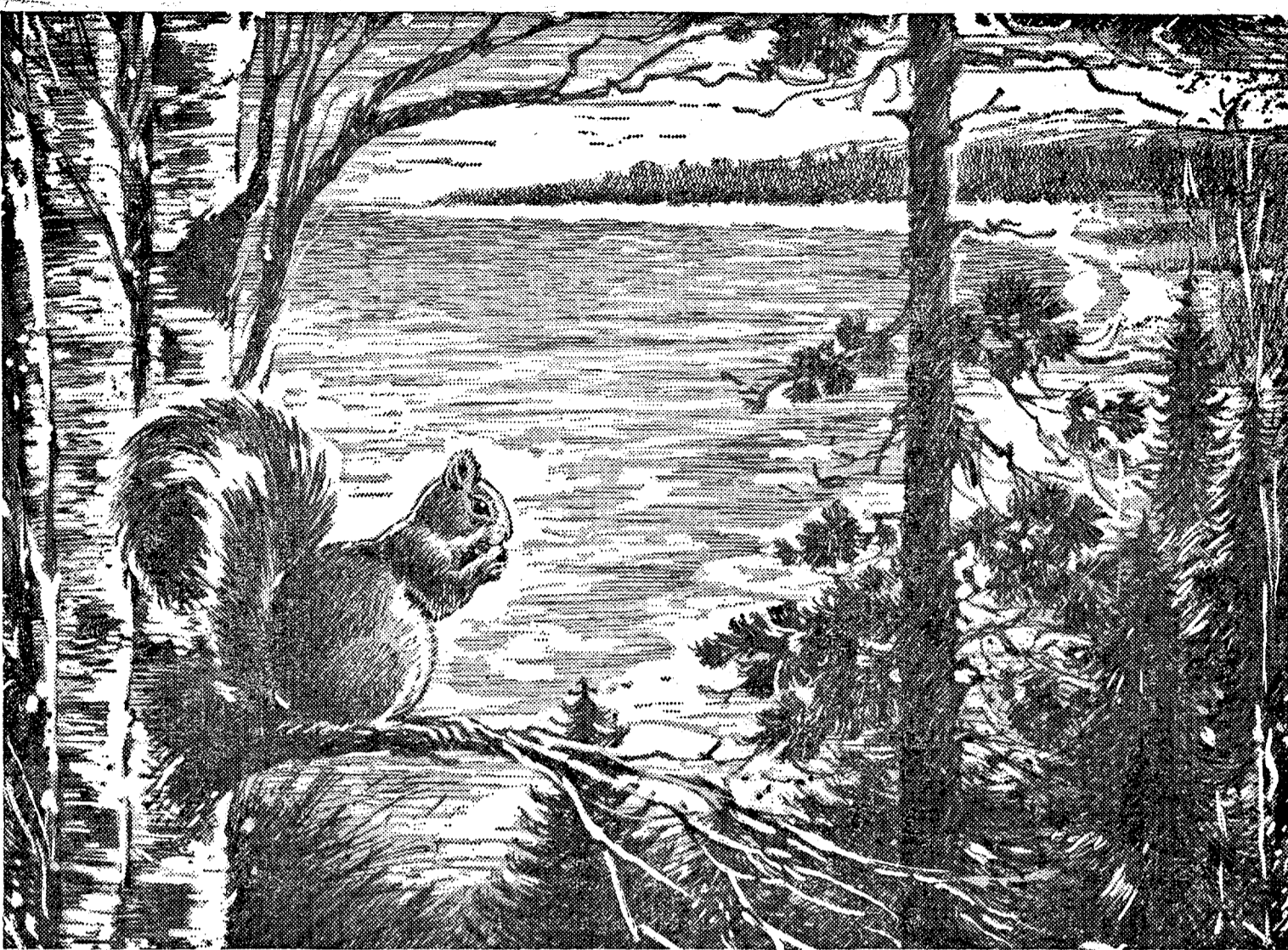

Rules For Hunting On Farms

1. Never hunt on any farm without permission. To be certain of a place to hunt get acquainted with farmers well before the season opens.
2. Limit hunting parties to three or four persons.
3. Keep dogs and guns in the car until you get permission to hunt. Invite the farmer and or his boy to hunt with you.
4. Determine the exact locations of farm boundaries, livestock, and perishable grain crops. Don't walk or hunt through those crops.
4. Always close gates and climb fences at posts or go under them.
6. Observe all game laws and safety rules. Never fire a gun in the direction of livestock or buildings even though they may be out of range.
7. Report any damage to livestock or property immediately to the farmer and assume full responsibility.
8. Thank the farmer after your hunt and, if possible, share the game with him. Common sense and a little courtesy will go a long way in creating a friendly relationship between farmers and hunters, Shick concludes.

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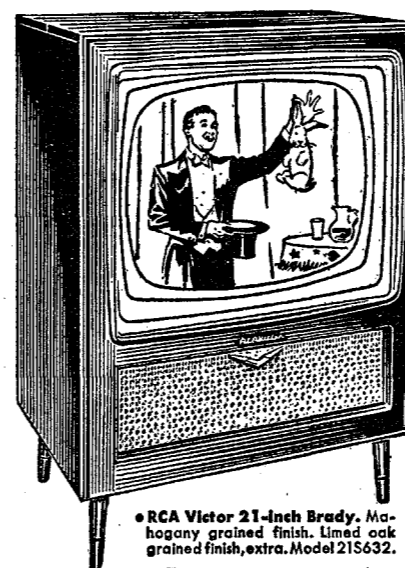
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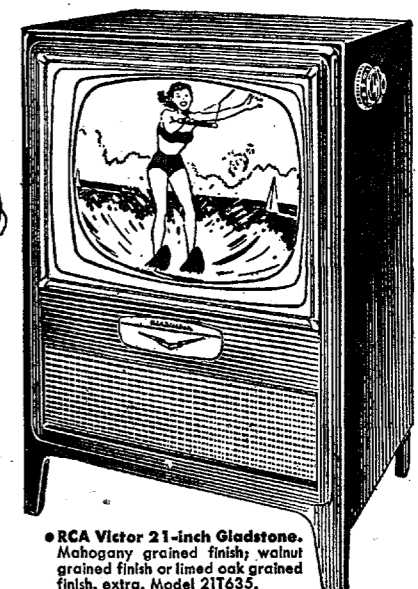

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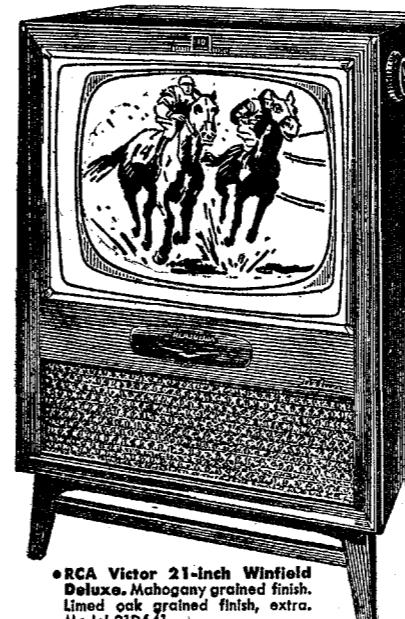
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
