SOCIAL SECURITY ISSUE

E. Jordan School Personnel To Vote In State Election

All East Jordan's high school employees will vote in a statewide school election next Wednesday and Thursday (Dec. 14-15) on whether their services shall be included or excluded from the state-federal old age survivors insurance agreement.

Charles Robinson, Charlevoix county superintendent of schools, said the federal social security act was amended in 1954 to permit including school employees if most of them wanted it.

He added further that Michigan laws were amended to permit school employees to receive benefits of social security with a plan and formula of payment set up if the employees agree.

Those eligible to vote are: Those who started September 15, 1955 and who are still working at the time of the election. Substitute teachers who are working on those days may vote, but teachers who have actually retired may not vote.

Local Teachers Continue College Study Courses

There was a time in Michigan when a teacher's life certificate meant just that, Sadie Liskum, of the East Jordan Teacher's Club, said Wednesday.

There have been many changes in the teacher certifying laws since those early days. No longer does a life certificate insure a conscientious teacher of a job, even in these days of teacher shortages. In fact, part of the high qualifications demanded of teachers, Mrs. Liskum said.

But many teachers continue their in-service training beyond the minimum requirements of the certification laws.

To meet this demand of teachers the state colleges and universities extend their services to many small cities through out the state.

Mrs. Alice Nesman and Mrs. Rhea Thomas drive to Gaylord every Tuesday to study theory of music. They are working toward their bachelor's degree.

Mrs. Lucille DeHaven, Rhea Thomas, Mrs. Kenneth McKay and Mrs. Leden Brintnall have classes in Charlevoix on Nature Study and Psychology every Wednesday evening.

Mrs. Marguerite Stokes, Sadie Liskum and Agnes Darbee have a class in Petoskey on Wednesday evenings. They are studying counseling and guidance under Dr. Byron from University of Michigan.

Miss Betty Brooks, Max Damoth and Kenneth McKay drive to Mt. Pleasant every Saturday to University of Michigan classes. Damoth and McKay plan to get their master's degrees in administration soon.

University of Michigan will set up a class in conservation in East Jordan for the second semester.

combination of retirement and social security. In all cases those who work long enough to be fully covered under social security will retire with greater benefits than under the present plan.

If one wishes to retire at age 60 his social security benefits can be figured from age 65, then the total amount he would ordinarily get can be spread over total time of retirement beginning at age 60.

In the event one retires before qualifying under the required quarter coverages he may choose to accept the present plan if his benefits would be greater under it.

Those who are thoroughly familiar with the two plans state that it is impossible to lose and in nearly every case there are significant gains under the new proposed plan.

Postmaster Asks For Cooperation

Help the mailmen. That's a plea being sent out by the East Jordan postoffice this week.

In order that post office employees may be able to give prompt and speedy service in handling Christmas mail, Postmaster Tom St. Charles asks that you cooperate with the following rules:

(1) All outgoing letters and Christmas cards should be tied in packs and dropped in the proper deposit slots.

(2) All mail which is to be distributed within the post office and local RFD should be tied in packs, also; and dropped into the proper slot.

(3) Due to the incoming mail 4 days before Christmas being very heavy, the Postmaster suggests that all Christmas cards be in the mail by December 20th.

Employment Up As Gov't. Work Falls

Government contracts for defense work have fallen in Michigan to where only 65,000 workers are employed in government contract-holding factories. These are full time defense workers.

This report was issued by Governor William's emergency industrial production commission, which added that:

"There are no indications that the amount of this defense work will increase in the near future."

In the face of the sharp drop in government defense workers, the Governor's commission also reports that Michigan's unemployment stands at less than 3 percent of the total labor force.

Observers now feel that with both Democrats and Republicans reporting continued prosperity throughout the state, the coming 1956 election campaigns will steer away from any "hard times" issue.

The superintendents will discuss the plan for various training opportunities in mental health for teachers in the area during the next three years.

Bad Taste Won't Sell

The level of taste of the American consumer has been raised to such a degree since the depression that "bad taste no longer will sell any place in the country."

That statement was made by an officer of a company which produces fabrics, in a speech before the graduate class at New York University's School of Retailing. He went on to say that in the last 20 years "there have been more radical changes . . . than there were in the preceding 300 years of retailing. People insist upon clothes that are colorful, lighter in weight, and packable for traveling; furniture that is informal; china that is bright and gay; and fabrics that are crease-resistant and machine-washable and need little or no ironing."

Such striking advances have not been confined to manufactured goods. The retail food store of today, to add another example, would have made our grandmothers blink their eyes in disbelieving amazement. New processing and packaging techniques have enormously reduced the amount of time the housewife needs to spend in preparing her meals—and, also, have made foods which once could be had only in season, available at all times of the year. It's a far cry from food in the raw state to freezers loaded with ready to serve meals.

This brings up another point. There has been complaint about the spread between the prices paid the producers of various commodities and the prices charged consumers. The answer can be found by just looking around any modern retail store. All the processing and packaging and other desired services cost money—and the cost must be added to the selling price. There is no big profit margin in the highly competitive retail industry. —Crawford County Avalanche, Grayling

Ordinance No. 78 provides:

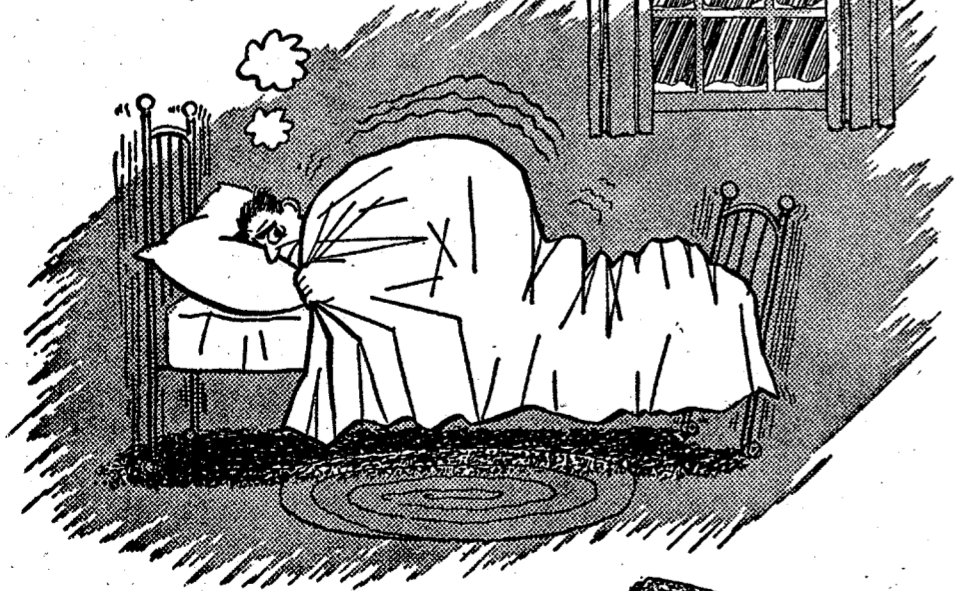

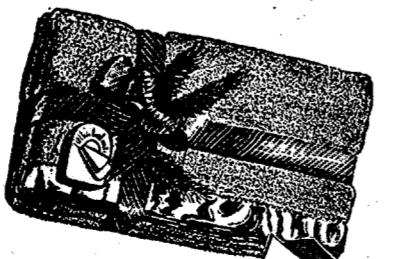

Shall We Shoot Elk?

Michigan's elk herd, estimated at more than 600 animals, threatens to create a problem in game management near Vanderbilt.

The herd, which started with the release of seven elk in the Pigeon River state forest in 1918, has grown rapidly in the last few years. Conservation workers sighted more than 200 in less than an hour last month.

Private landowners in the area have complained recently that elk are causing damage to pine, cherry and other trees with low branches.

Damage to trees with low-hanging branches also reduces the available supply of deer food.

Michigan never has had an elk hunting season and there are no measures at present to restrict the growth of the herd.

Game specialists say that some control of the herd must be exerted if tree damage continues. Possible solutions include: issuance of permits to landowners to kill damage-causing elk; a restricted hunting season with a limited number of elk taken, or trapping elk and transferring them to remote grassland areas to reduce concentrations in the Vanderbilt area.

Pigskin Trouble

Moderation must replace "accelerated madness" in college football or corrective action must be taken, U. of M. President Harlan Hatcher says.

The score of a game and its effect on conference championships or traditional rivalries is no longer the important thing, he says. Sports reports now seem to place primary importance on the effect of a game on a "bid" to a bowl game.

Carried to an extreme, the present "accelerated madness" could turn football into a year-around sport, he points out. If the "bids" to bowl games are all-important then it may not be too long before the demand arises for the winners of the major bowl games to meet in playoff games to determine a national champion. This could produce football games in February or March with spring practice beginning soon after and then, after a summer's interval, the whole thing would start over again in the fall.

The pressures built up by pre-season ratings and the sports writers' emphasis on "bowl bids" are the more regrettable, President Hatcher believes because the game of football itself has so many admirable qualities.

Good Times Ahead

America's big potential for a bright economic future has been outlined to more than 3,000 industrialists who are attending the 60th annual Congress of American Industry this week in the Waldorf-Astoria.

Sinclair Weeks, Secretary of Commerce, reported business figures for 1955 will show highest record of all time, with every indication prosperity will continue into 1956.

Christmas Seal dollars play a vital role in school health education in Charlevoix county, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association says. On the average, 3,100 pieces of health education material are requested each year from the MTA by teachers in the Charlevoix county school system.

Elementary teachers rely on the MTA for much of their basic health material. They requested 238 posters and 300 pamphlets last year.

One of the most popular of the MTA publications in the Children's Health Bulletin, published each month during the school year. The bulletin is written in three parts to adapt it to different reading levels. Each school in the county receives copies, and many request additional copies. A total of 324 are distributed in Charlevoix county each month.

More About Life in Germany Following World War II

Today was a typical, common, and unremarkable day in the Wullenweber home on the bank of the Rhine.

At 6:15 19-year old Angela climbed sleepily out of bed to prepare her father's breakfast of one boiled egg, two rolls delivered every morning at 6:30, and a pot of coffee; to heat water to just the right temperature for his shaving; and to shine his shoes and brush his suit.

With Father on his bicycle riding to the commuter's station where the 7:10 train whisks him near his "Office of Finance" in Bonn's City Hall, Angela, together with her mother, attacked the week's washing which was dumped into huge tubs in the back yard and washed by hand.

By 2:00 P.M. the whole family was poised around the white table-clothed dining room table waiting for Mama Wullenweber to shuffle from the kitchen carrying a huge bowl of a rich kind of bean soup. There were seconds and thirds of the delicious soup so no one needed leave the

table without enough but anyone who didn't like bean soup remained hungry because that's all there was. No bread, potatoes salad, beverage or dessert. Just bean soup!

After dinner while Mama and Angela canned the fruit gathered the day before from their garden, Karl, the 22-year old son, and I picked up potatoes from a nearby field. It seemed that we lugged enough potatoes to the cellar to feed 10 hungry football teams for 20 seasons but Karl assured me the cellar would be bare when spring came.

SUPPER WAS A little earlier than usual because we were going to a concert. Or rather a concert — Beethoven's Ninth Symphony — was coming to us via radio from Cologne. Supper consisted of a plentiful supply of Reibekuchen — a kind of potato pancake. The German Hausfrau is ingenious in the endless variety of ways she finds to prepare potatoes but variety ends with the manner in which potatoes are prepared for potatoes can be expected two times a day se-

ven days a week.

At 8:15 the concert began and from the first measure on all was still. Not even a whisper interrupted the thrilling strains of Beethoven's Ninth, written by a man so completely deaf that he himself heard only with his heart but never with his ears the music which has thrilled generations as an example of the unconquerableness of all that is best in the human spirit. Angela sat on the 20-year old sofa sewing a dress to be added to her entirely homemade wardrobe. Father was at his place at the head of the table aimlessly leafing through the one magazine to which the family subscribes.

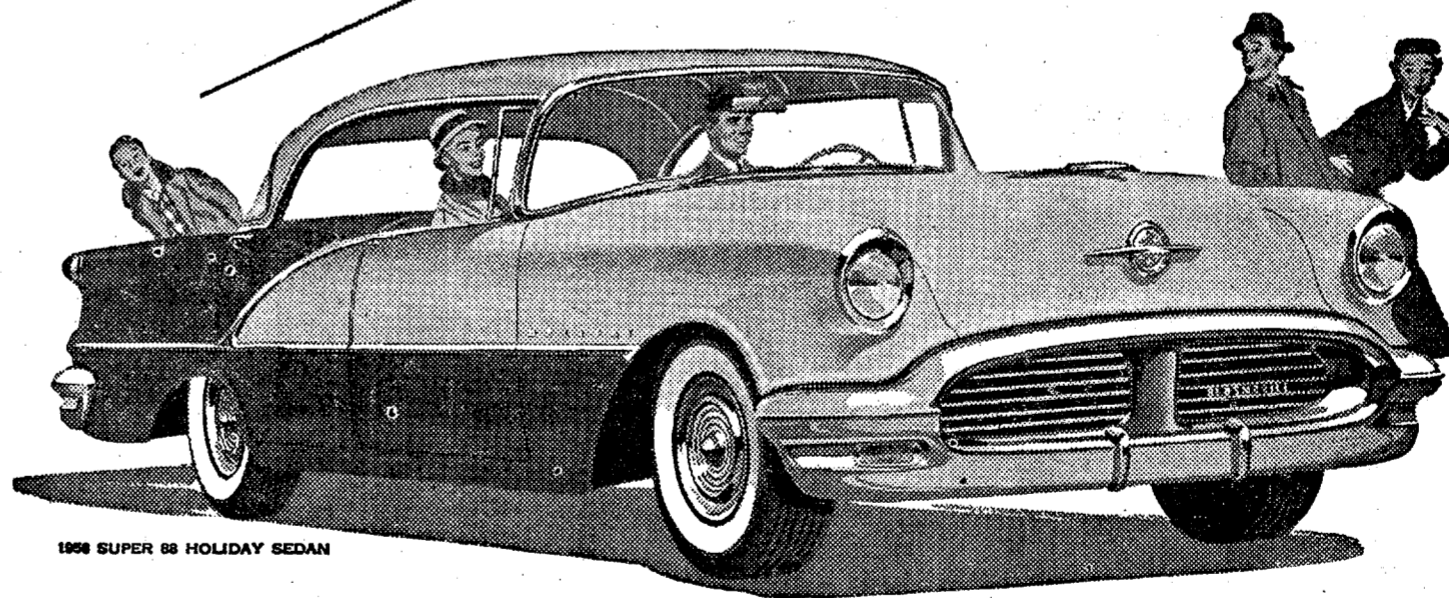

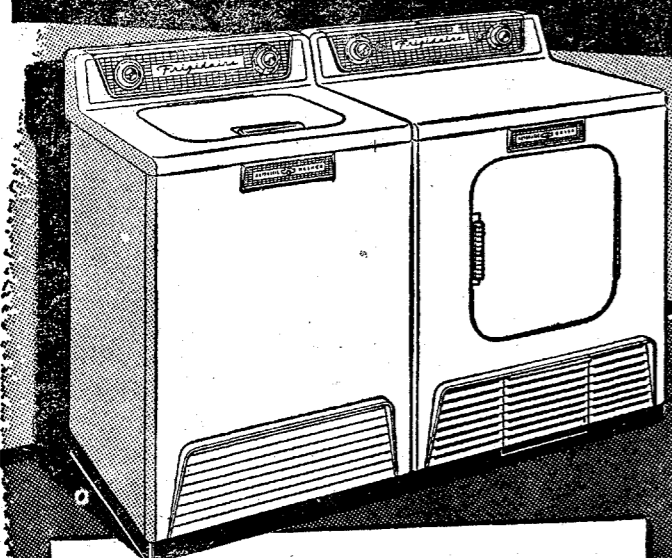

In the frenzied tempo of an atomic age one would err to describe a family sitting quietly together in a circle of love "typical." And in its own way the release of love from the human heart is even less commonplace, and perhaps in the long run more significant than the release of energy from the split atom. A world torn with war and the threat of war cries for the miracle of such commonplace and yet spectacular days.

THE MIDDLE GUARD by LES BINGAMAN

Line play is frequently overlooked in football, college as well as professional, but the backs will be the first to tell you that without the linemen clearing a path for them they could go nowhere.

A back is only as good as his line, and this is apparent on any given Sunday when a star runner or passer apparently is having a bad day. More than likely it is his line that is having a bad day.

As an old lineman, maybe I'm making too much of this, but I honestly believe many fans are missing much of the game of football by concentrating on the ball-carrier and overlooking the intense struggle between the two forward walls.

For example, in the past few years the defensive game has undergone a revolution that makes it considerably more complicated and yet, at the same time, more interesting. Now you see four, six and seven-man lines by the same team, umbrella defenses for pass protection and occasional delayed charges to confuse the offensive linemen.

KEY MAN
 The 'middle guard, which I once was, has come into his own. He is a key man on defense, between the guards and in front of the opposing center, perhaps a yard back of the line.

He must be strong enough to stop a play head-on or must react quickly to slide along the line and follow a play. If, for example, a tackle gets trapped,

the middle guard must be there to help him out.

Lou Creekmur is doing a fine job for the Lions at middle guard. Since he's taken over the spot, we've been winning some games.

Defensive teams shift constantly into four, six or seven man lines both to confuse the opposition and to better prepare for the coming play. For instance if a pass is expected, perhaps there will be a six man line, one linebacker and four men further back in an umbrella defense pattern to protect against the anticipated aerial.

GETTING SHOVED AROUND

The defensive linemen frequently will employ what is known as a forearm shiver to get his opposite out of the way. This is a sharp rap on the shoulder with the forearm, followed if necessary by a grabbing with both hands and yanking to one side.

Verily, the lineman's life is a rugged one.

IN MAY OF 1955 the Charlevoix County Farm Bureau after months of study and ground work initiated the program of Direct Distribution of Petroleum products in the County. This program is the distribution of petroleum products direct from the refinery to the farm. The quality of these products is the same high quality of the Farm Bureau Products. The program has been very successful and we are very confident of rapid growth of this field.

The County Farm Bureau has Blue Cross available in group form.

We have a letter from Jim Milstein:

Dear Editor, I think that it is high time I wrote. I wish to express my appreciation for receiving the home town paper. It is a tribute that is well received.

I am located in the Munsan-Ni area, about 1/4 mile south of the ImJin Gang river. The area is about 30 miles north of Seoul. At this minute I am sitting about four miles from the D. M. Z. (Demilitarized Zone).

Orchard Notes . . .

Tree trimming time is here. Some progressive apple growers have half of their trimming done as of to date. Years back we used to trim heavily then the college proposed little if any trimming, and now it is back to heavy trimming or according to our needs.

A young apple tree will grow better if not trimmed too heavily. When the tree is ten years old, more trimming can be done, and in most cases when the tree is fifteen years old much heavier trimming can be done.

Apple growers today like to trim heavy enough to keep their trees smaller in order to spray and harvest easier. That is, to keep them from getting too high, too wide, and slightly thin in the center.

Peach trees after being shaped and set out should not be trimmed until they have reached the age to produce a full crop. At that time heavy trimming is the general practice for the purpose of producing new wood. The peach produces fruit on the previous year's wood and should receive annual trimming.

The sweet cherry should not be trimmed at all except shaping the tree when it is set out. Except in some cases when extra sprouts grow.

The pear, very light, Stanley prune and plum, trim lightly.

Most growers are familiar with the Montmorency. After the Montmorency is up to bearing age, annual trimming is better than too much trimming in any one year. Heavy trimming will curtail production on sour.

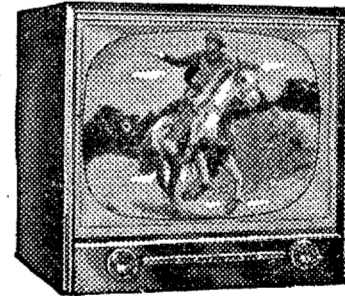

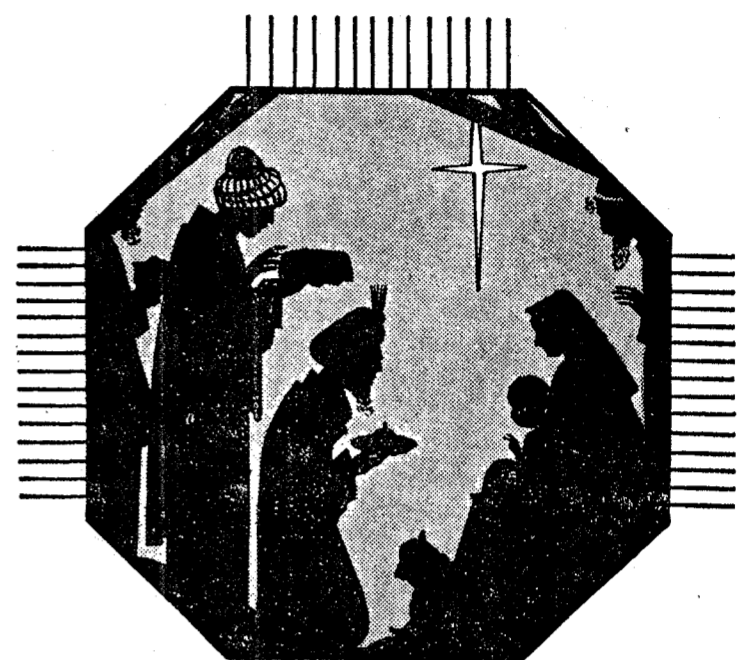
