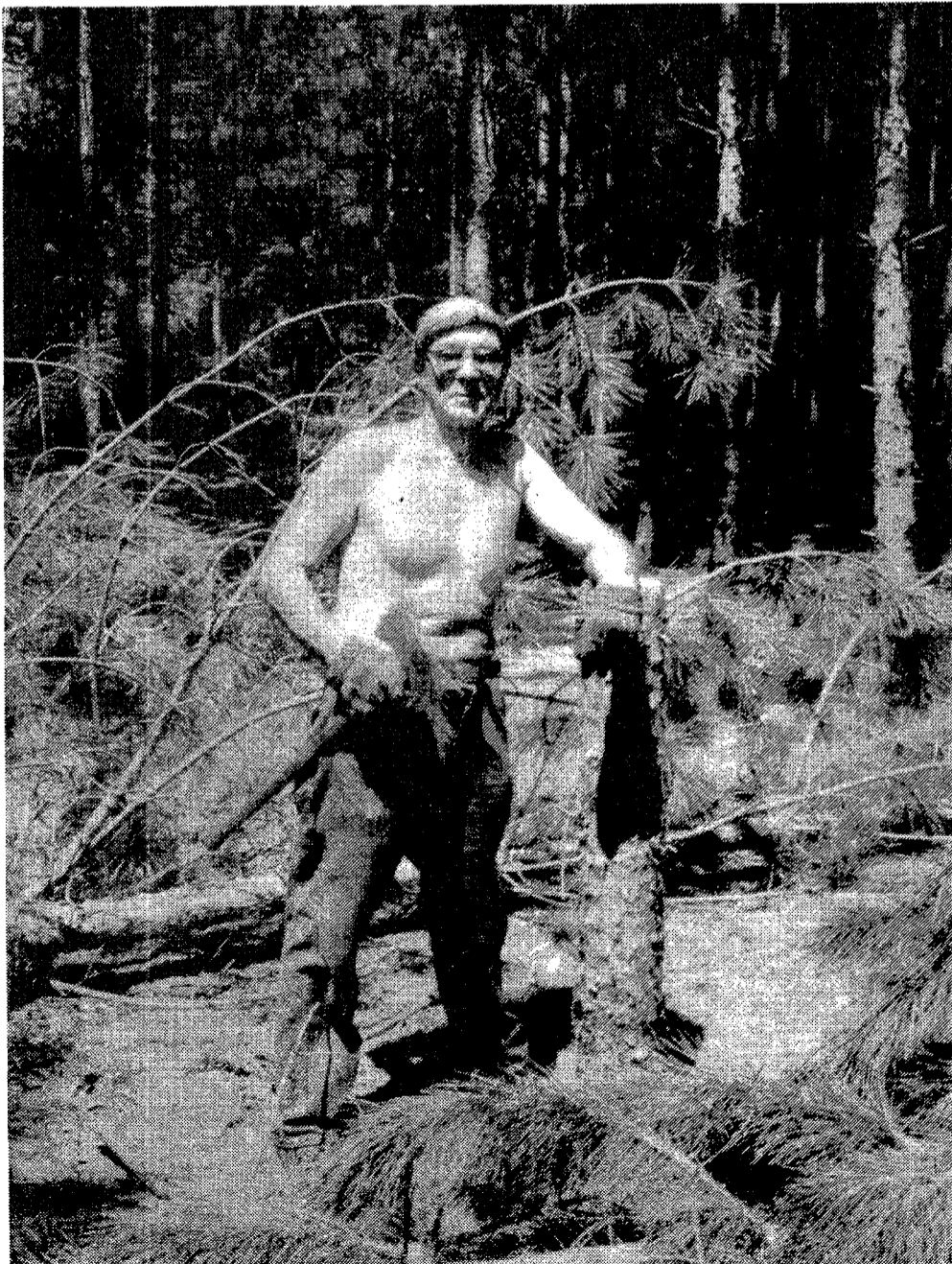

SETTLEMENT AREA - Route 1 - Start M-32 at Airport, to Adams Road, to M-66, M-66 to Rogers Bridge Road, to M-32 and South Maple to school.

RANNEY RUN - Route 2 - Start Bailey Road, to Ranney Road, to Graham Road, to Rogers Bridge Road, to Norwegian Road, to M-66, to Ellsworth Road (Christenson Ridge), to Elizabeth Street, to M-66, to Pine, to Ellsworth Road to school.

6 MILE LAKE & VANCE & WEST SIDE - Route 3 - Start Ellsworth Road to Miles Road, north, return to Ellsworth Road to Slough Road, to Miles Road, to Scofield Road, return to Vance Road, Vance Road to Schroeder Road, Schroeder Road to Old State Road, to Kidder Road, to M-66, to Eire Street, to Echo, McKenzie, Bridge Streets to school.

BOYNE ROAD & PENINSULA - Route 4 - Boyne Advance Road to Nelson Corners, return to Dutchman's Bay Road, to Peninsula Road, to Mountain Road return Peninsula Road to Ferry Road to Wurn Road, to Ridge Road, to Peninsula Road, to Bracy Road and return, to Dutchman's Bay West and return to Peninsula Road to school.

DEER LAKE & ALBA RUN - Route 5 - Start Alba Road, to Brighton Road and return, to Alba Road to Hejhal Road, to M-32 to Richards Road and return to M-32, to Pearsall Road, to Bergman Road, Rogers Road, to Deer Lake Road, to Wilson Road, to Behling and Dutchman's Bay Road, and return to Wilson Roads, to Crozier Road and return, to Healey Road and return, to Deer Lake

Road, to Roberts Road and return to Cherryville to school. (No pick-up or take home of students inside City limits living on the Deer Lake Road during the construction shut-off period.)

ELLSWORTH & IRONTON RUN - Route 6 - Start Ellsworth Road at city limits, to Lord Road, to Ranney Road, to LaCroix Road, to M-66, to Ironton Ferry Road to Sequonota Road, to Phelps Road, to Ranney Road, to Flag Road, West and return to M-66, to Metz Road and return to M-66 to school.

Buses leave bus garage for high school runs - 5:30, except Ranney Run, 6:15; middle school runs - 10:30, except Ranney Run, 11:15; and elementary runs - 7:00, except Ranney Run, 7:45.

Michigan School Code and East Jordan Board of Education Policy specifies that attempts shall be made to route buses so that walking to bus stops is kept to a minimum. However, it may be necessary for secondary students to walk up to one mile and elementary students to walk up to one-half mile to reach the bus stop.

Parents who have questions concerning bus routes should phone the bus supervisor for their branch of the school district.

BUS TRANSPORTATION REGULATIONS STUDENT CONDUCT

1. Students must be at the bus stop on time and wait off the roadway. The driver cannot wait for tardy students.
2. Students are to walk immediately to a vacant seat and sit down immediately.
3. Students are to obey the driver and report promptly to a school official when instructed to do so by a driver.
4. Students are not to eat on the bus.
5. Students should warn the driver of approaching danger if there is reason to believe the driver is not aware of the danger.
6. Students may leave the bus only upon consent of the

driver.

7. Students, upon leaving the bus to cross the roadway, must always cross in front of the bus at a distance of about 10 feet.

8. Students may ride a bus other than their own only upon written consent of a parent, guardian (approved by the principal), or building administrator.

ONLY THE BUILDING PRINCIPAL HAS THE AUTHORITY TO SUSPEND ANY TRANSPORTED STUDENTS FROM THE PRIVILEGE OF RIDING ON A SCHOOL BUS FOR A PERIOD OF TIME FOR WILLFUL DISOBEDIENCE OF RULES.

DISCIPLINE PROCEDURE

1. For small or habitual behavior problems, it is recommended that the bus driver personally contact the parent of a student who is causing problems. If the problem continues, the bus driver should contact the building administrator.

2. Bus drivers are requested to keep the building administrator informed about bus problems. This may be done with a phone call or a note.

3. The bus driver will not remove the student from the bus enroute. However, the bus driver may refuse to permit the student to ride the following day until after the building administrator has reviewed the incident. The bus driver must inform the building administrator immediately in all such instances.

Schools are clean and ready

Maintenance personnel in East Jordan have been busy this summer readying our school buildings for students who will occupy the facilities for the next 9 months. Because of a job well done by the men pictured, East Jordan youngsters will be housed in fresh, clean and pleasant surroundings.

Listed below are the housekeeping procedures necessary to put each classroom and building in a state of readiness.

1. Desks are removed.
2. Walls scrubbed.
3. Walls painted.
4. Desks are de-gummed and cleaned.
5. Floors stripped - removing old floor finish.
6. Floors scrubbed.
7. Remove stripper - old floor finish.
8. Apply clean water
9. Pick up clean water - make sure all old finish is removed.
10. Dry mop floors.
11. Two coats of sealer is applied.
12. Three coats of finish (wax) is applied.
13. Light fixtures are vacuumed for dust removal.
14. Windows cleaned.
15. Basic repair of trim, pencil sharpeners, etc.

Accident insurance policy for East Jordan students

The East Jordan School District will again provide accident insurance for all students of the school district. This is an "accident" insurance policy and will pay benefits where the family insurance policy leaves off. If the family has no other insurance policy, the plan will pay from the first dollar of expense. The plan will pay for care, treatment, and services, provided such expense is incurred for treatment rendered within 52 weeks from the date of the accident, not to exceed \$5,000 as the result of any one accident.

COVERAGE:

1. The school will send information to the insurance company stating the nature of the injury.
2. The insurance company will send the PARENT a claim form.
3. Medical bills are to be sent to the insurance company by the parents with the claim form.

The school does not become involved with the claim form. It is the parents responsibility to complete the

parents part and have the doctor complete the section so designated. Hospitals do not complete any portion of the claim form, if emergency treatment only and under \$25.00, it is not necessary for the doctor to complete the form.

CLAIM PROCEDURE:

1. The school will send information to the insurance company stating the nature of the injury.
2. The insurance company will send the PARENT a claim form.
3. Medical bills are to be sent to the insurance company by the parents with the claim form.

The school does not become involved with the claim form. It is the parents responsibility to complete the parents part and have the doctor complete the section so designated. Hospitals do not complete any portion of the claim form, if emergency treatment only and under \$25.00, it is not necessary for the doctor to complete the form.

Community Education

East Jordan has its own community education office

East Jordan now has its own Community Education office. The office located in the East Jordan Administrative Building will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The new community education phone number is 536-3241.

Jamie Baumann, who taught in the Twin Valley Community Education Program for the past two years, is the new community education director. She is planning several adult education classes for people with a wide variety of interests.

Classes will be offered in the daytime and in the evening, for enrichment, high school credit or college credit.

New classes now being planned which can be taken for enrichment or high school completion credit include: Magazine production, Life through Death Psychology, Family and Family Crisis, TV as a Leisure Activity, Woodworking, Typing, Local History and Genealogy.

Popular classes from last year which will be offered again this year for high school completion credit or

enrichment include: Language Arts, Independent Study, GED Test Preparation, American and Northern Michigan History, Exploring Your Retirement Years, Psychology in Your Retirement Years, Welding, and Women in a Changing Society.

The East Jordan Police Dept. has tentatively offered the services of Patrolman Don Cole to teach an exciting course entitled Crime and Justice. Articles which contain some of the lesson material for the 15 week course will be printed each Wednesday in the Petoskey News Review. Cole will be using guest speakers, films and other outside materials in the class which will be centered around discussion of our criminal justice system. This course will be offered for college credit through North Central Michigan College as well as for enrichment and high school completion credit.

Other enrichment classes still on the drawing board are: Needlepoint, Cake Decorating, Basic Sewing, Basic Drawing, Dried Flower Arranging, Beginning and Ad-

vanced Communication with the Deaf, Woodcarving, Weaving, Antiques, Chess, and Chair Caning.

If you would like to suggest a class offering, just call Jamie Baumann at 536-3241. The Community Education Program is for East Jordan residents. If you want to take a course which isn't being offered, there are probably others who want to take a similar course. We would be happy to try to offer that course next semester.

A brochure will be coming out in the near future which details the Community Education course offerings. You can register by clipping the registration form in the brochure and mailing it along with a check for the course fee to the Community Education Office.

Walk in registrations will be accepted during the day at the Community Education Office during the week of September 12-16. Evening registration will be held at East Jordan High School Monday, September 12 and Tuesday, September 13, from 7 to 9 p.m.

All classes will begin the week of September 19.

High school completion classes are designed with adults in mind

Have you been thinking about coming back to school? Now is the time to quit thinking and act. Stop by the Community Education Office at 610 Mill Street in East Jordan to have cup of coffee with Jamie Baumann, the community education director. She will be able to answer your questions about coming back to school. She will tell you frankly the requirements you may have to fulfill and approximately how long it will take to you earn a high school diploma. She will discuss the possibility of taking the GED high school equivalency exam with you.

High school completion classes are designed for adults who wish to continue their schooling. The high school completion teachers are very responsive to the wants of their class members.

Classes are conducted in a relaxed manner. Because the teachers on the high school completion staff realize that adults have many responsibilities at home, away from school, they are quite flexible and willing to work individually with their students.

Most high school completion classes are offered from 7 to 10 p.m. on night a week for 15 or 16 weeks. This year we will be offering some classes in 8 week units. After 8 weeks of class attendance, the student will be granted 1/4 unit of high school credit. Some daytime classes will be offered for those who cannot attend at night. There is no fee for tuition or books if a student is taking a class for high school credit.

For people who have been away from school at least two years, credit may be allowed for a variety of living-learning experiences including past employment, military service, and community involvement.

All classes will begin September 19. To find out more information or to register, you can call the East Jordan Community Education Office at 536-3241 to arrange a counseling appointment.



Norm Cook will once again be teaching his popular class Fundamental Welding. This class will be offered for enrichment or for high school completion credit. It is important to pre-register for this class because the student limit for the class is 8.

Right-To-Read will expand

The East Jordan Right to Read program will be expanded this year. We are looking for people who would be willing to donate an hour or two of their time weekly to teach someone to read. These reading tutors will be trained in some reading teaching techniques and paired with a nonreading adult to work on a one to one basis. Reading materials and tutor instruction are available through the East Jordan Community Education Office. Materials will be geared to the interests and backgrounds of each individual learner. Each learner begins at his or her own level and progresses from there.

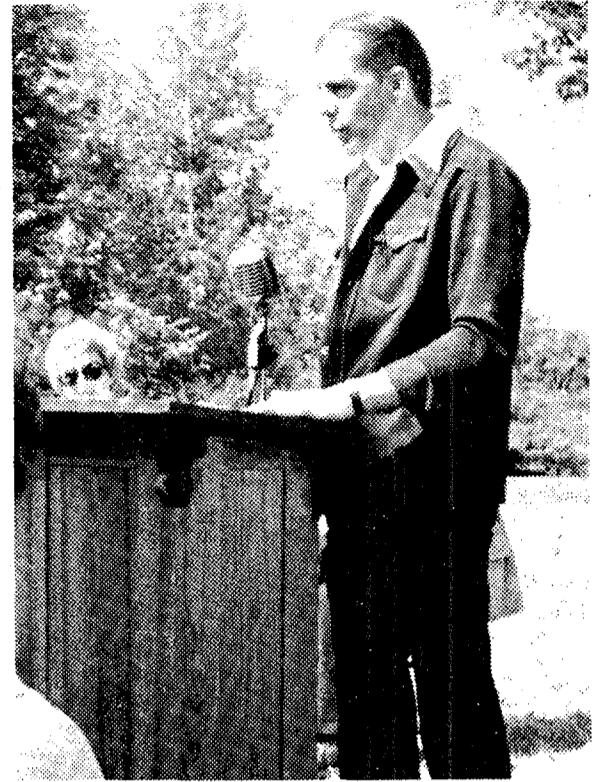
Language Arts, a remedial reading class, will be offered two evenings a week for those who are comfortable working on reading skills in a classroom environment.

Questions and Answers

Concerning Adult Education

Q. Who can get into high school completion classes?
 A. Anyone whose class has already graduated.

Q. I was a senior when I dropped out. How many credits must I earn?
 A. The same number of credits that your original class was required to have.

Q. How long will it take to earn a high school diploma?
 A. If you dropped in the 11th or 12th grade, chances are you could finish in one year. If you dropped out in the 9th or 10th grade, it will probably take two or three years.

Q. How can you complete two to four years in only one or two years?
 A. Credit is granted for the following: military service, courses or training you completed while in the service or in civilian life, work experiences for jobs you have held, community services you have been involved in, and approved correspondence courses you may have completed.

Q. How much time per week will it take?
 A. That depends on you. Each class meets once a week for fifteen weeks per semester. We'd rather you didn't rush, but some people take as many as four classes a semester for four credits in one year.

Q. What good is a high school diploma?
 A. It might help you get a better job. It might be something you wanted, but due to no fault of your own you did not get. It makes it possible to say to a son or daughter who is thinking of dropping out, "I'm going to school."

Q. Isn't it harder to learn when you are older?
 A. Apparently that is not so. The average age of our graduates is 35 years. The range is from late teens to 75 years young.

Q. How can I enroll?
 A. By getting in touch with us by phone, 536-3241.

Q. What are the G.E.D. tests?
 A. These tests measure what you have learned since you left school. They give you credit for what you know, and what you have learned outside of school. Successful completion of these tests qualify you for a High School Equivalency Certificate issued by the State Department of Education. These tests evaluate the examinee's skills of comprehension and interpretation in five subject areas:

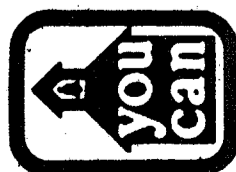
1. Correctness and Effectiveness of Expression
2. Interpretation of Reading Material in the Social Studies
3. Interpretation of Reading Material in the Natural Sciences
4. Interpretation of Literary Material
5. General Mathematical Ability

AGE REQUIREMENT: Minimum age for taking these tests is 18 and class graduated.
 PASSING SCORES: A minimum standard score of 35 in each of the five areas with an overall average of 45 is required for passing.
 ..Is it strongly recommended that adults planning to take the test enroll in the GED Preparation Course.
 ..It is possible, however, to take these tests without special preparation. Call 536-3241 for further information and for our testing schedule.

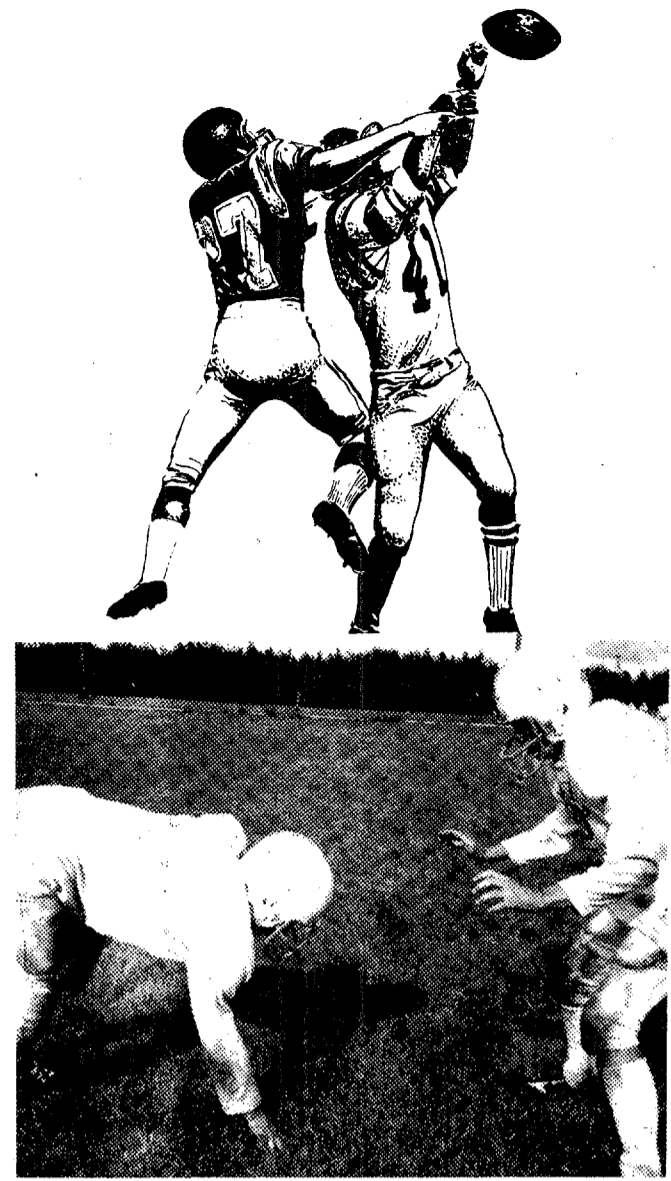

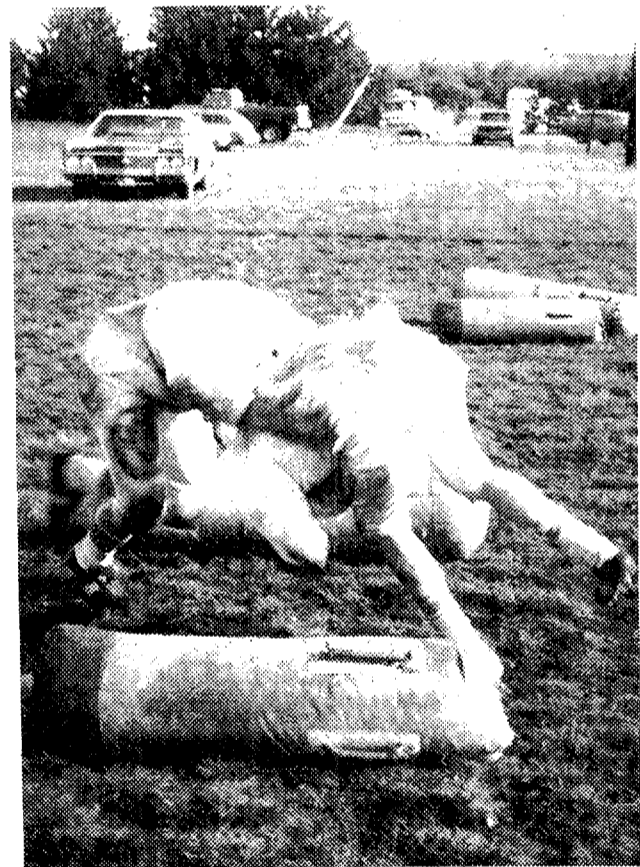

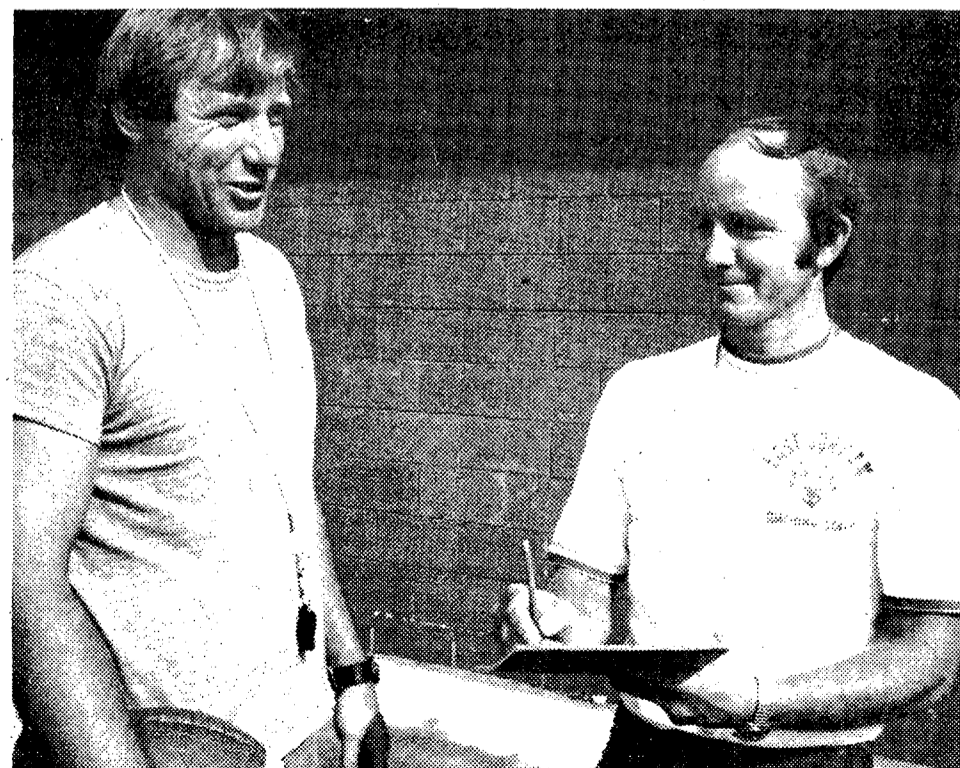

Elementary PREP Preschool Program

The East Jordan Elementary Preschool program has a new name and a new location. PREP - Parent Readiness Education Project - reflects a basic change in the Title I preschool. That change stresses the importance of parents as teachers of their young children. A parent or parent substitute such as a grandmother or babysitter will come to school one day a week with their preschooler to learn and participate in their child's development.

The preschool has moved from the Presbyterian Church to the new rooms recently constructed on the elementary building by the Char-Em Intermediate School District. These rooms will be shared with the Developmental Needs Program.

A monthly newsletter will be sent to all four year olds in the district as part of the PREP program.

The preschool will meet Monday, Wednesday and Fridays with classes beginning the end of September.

All children who will be four by December 1, 1977 will receive a letter inviting them to participate in a testing and screening program early in September. This will provide parents with information about their child's developmental skills as compared to other children their age.

All preschoolers have already received the first copy of the PREP newsletter. If you know of a child who will be four by December 1, 1977 who has not received a copy of the newsletter please call the elementary office, 536-7564 or 536-3131 and give us the child's name. This information will also enable us to contact parents about the screening program for the preschool.

New elementary parents handbook

A new Elementary Parents Handbook will be published in the next couple of weeks which will give all policies, procedures and information concerning the operation of your elementary school.

Included will be information which will help you and your children understand the day by day operation of the school.

Attendance policy, discipline procedures, lunchroom and playground procedures, etc. will be covered in the handbook.

A copy will be sent home to each family the first part of school.

PREP Preschool Newsletter

Do you have a preschool child who will enter Kindergarten in September of 1978? If so, your child should already have received the first of a monthly newsletter called the PREP Preschool Press.

Each month all four year olds in the East Jordan School district will receive a newsletter addressed to them and filled with fun activities and projects such as the Cooking Corner, Arts & Crafts and Let's Cut and Paste. Many of these activities will need a family members help. The PREP Preschool Press will reflect the underlying philosophy of the PREP Preschool program: it is important for children to interact with others - with parents, other adults, sisters, brothers and friends. Preschool

children learn best through play and in an informal atmosphere. We hope you all enjoy the PREP Preschool Press this year.

Prices for all non-varsity games will be \$1.25 for adults and \$.75 for students.

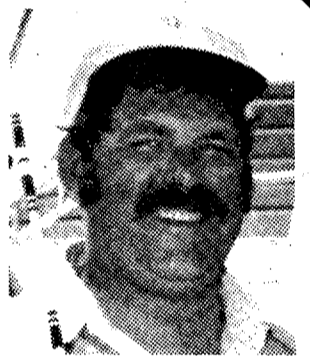
