FREEDOM FESTIVAL WILL HAVE FIREWORKS

East Jordan ready to celebrate

Fireworks will light up the sky for the Jordan Valley Freedom Festival in East Jordan this Saturday at dusk.

Zambelli International, the family-owned, fourth generation business which will stage the pyrotechnics, has produced shows for Elk Rapids, the Detroit Freedom Festival, New York City's 4th of July, and the Statue of Liberty re-dedication. The company was also the focus of a PBS television special.

Zambelli requires that a firefighter, police officer and an ambulance be on site during the event and the Fire Department's Lt. James Nowka will oversee safety for the city.

Officials have said they will discontinue the show permanently if unauthorized personnel cross a cordoned off perimeter around the staging area. The rain

date for fireworks is Sunday, June 28.

The East Jordan Area Chamber of Commerce is now rallying to secure additional funding for the fireworks and encourages patrons to purchase the \$2 festival buttons which also include a ticket for prize raffles. This year patrons won't be subject to do "jail time" for failing to wear the pins.

Proceeds from the buttons, along with the \$5 Festival 500 tickets will go toward the fireworks fund. First prize in the festival ticket drawing is \$500. Ten, \$50 prizes will be awarded as well.

The chamber will also accept cash donations to help cover costs. Make checks payable to the Jordan Valley Freedom Festival, and send to P.O. Box 435, East Jordan, Mich., 49727, or drop off at the chamber office.

THIS YEAR'S Mardi Gras theme means a weekend filled with music to suit almost everyone's taste.

Friday will feature a lip sync contest and gospel group "Jeanne and the Parables" in Memorial Park.

The "Up North Big Band" will take to the Civic Center for a live show on Friday from 9:30 p.m. to midnight.

The locally-based group plays music ranging from swing and fox trots to Glen Miller, Mike Dorsey and Count Basie.

The band formed a year and a half ago with only three members under the direction of musical director Frank North, and has grown since then to 18 musicians.

Tickets are \$5 each/\$8 per couple in advance or \$6/\$10 at the door.

THE FESTIVAL WILL send children atwirl on kiddie rides in the Huntington Bank downtown parking lot. The annual craft show and flea market will get going at noon and continue throughout the weekend. And new this year are the giant slide, bungee run and pedestal joist from noon-8 p.m. between Murphy Field and the men's ballfield.

For the athletes in the crowd, the gun will go off for the 13th annual triathlon at 9 a.m. on Saturday at Tourist Park. The contest begins with a .3 mile swim, followed by 19 mile bike race and finally a three mile

Search for new principal underway

20 candidates have applied for Boyne City High School job

The Boyne City School District has received nearly 20 applications for its soon-to-be-vacant high school principal position.

Current principal Xavier Gaudard submitted his letter of resignation to the school board in early May, after six years at the helm. His last day is June 30.

Most of the applicants are principals from other school districts within the state. Applications will be accepted through Friday.

The school board's personnel committee will review candidate applications before a June 29 special board meeting and interviews will be held shortly thereafter.

A final recommendation to the board will come through superintendent Bob Nakoneczny, based on the consensus of the interview committee, and after Nakoneczny completes a thorough background review of the top candidates.

This spring brought another job opening in the school when band instructor Becky Palmiter resigned after 12 years with the district. Her last day is Aug. 31.

Bricker reconsiders; he will take head football job

The search is over, at least for this year, for Boyne City High School's new varsity football coach.

Dave Bricker, who has coached at Boyne City since 1974, has decided to take the job left vacant by the resignation of Pat Klooster in late March. Bricker served as Klooster's assistant during his eight years as head coach.

Two months ago Bricker decided against

applying for the head job, saying he was content as an assistant coach. But times do change and Bricker has had a change of heart, although he has asked that he be hired as the interim coach.

"I will do it for a year and I expect to like it, but I'm not sure. I will see how I feel at the end of the season," Bricker said.

Back in April when the job opened

Bricker said he knew he could be successful as head coach but he just had too many other things going on and he had little time to consider the job.

"I had 122 kids running track, and my teaching job and organizing sixth grade camps and I didn't take a whole lot of time to think about it," Bricker said.

"Summer is now here and I'm not bur-

dened with all the other things going on. I had some time to think about and the window was still open. I chose to do it."

Bricker met with athletic director Steve Beyer and high school principal Xavier Gaudard last week. They told him Friday they would recommend his appointment to the

City considers new location for Boyne's farmers market

A discussion at last week's city commission meeting about relocating the Boyne City Farmer's Market struck a nerve in the produce vendors as well as plenty of townsfolk who don't want the 20-year tradition to be moved out of Old City Park.

Although the market may be moved eventually, the city has not made any formal decision, and is still investigating the best solution for a future move.

City officials want to re-seed a stretch of turf along River Street that has been worn to dirt where vendors sell their goods. It is also looking to address growth issues which has added to congestion in the area as well as spurred some vendors to drive right over the Park Street curb to access the park.

"Sure it would look a little nicer," said Kathy Churchill, a Mancelona resident who was selling perennials at the market last Wednesday. "But no one's going to stand right here and use the grass."

The most opportune time to plant grass this year would be in the fall when few vendors are still selling

produce.

The city has offered the market the use of a City Hall parking lot next to the Senior Center — which runs the market — if the city decides to seed in September, and perhaps make that space or another suitable area in town its permanent home.

Since the lot is already lined, the organizers may be able to better assign lots and still have extras for infrequent vendors. A left-hand turn lane on Lake Street will make turning into the site safer too.

Linda Mathers of Boyne City believes it would draw fewer customers. "I think its going to be really hot over there without any shade."

"It's a bad situation because of the wind on the lake and that blackout is hotter than a pistol in the summer," said vendor Don Dunaski. "Things will be blowing all over."

A chamber of commerce canvass of downtown businesses found most of them leery of a move because of the foot traffic it draws to the business district.

But Veteran's Park is also an option, say city officials, and it offers shade, plenty of parking, restrooms, water and potentially more business from visitors on boats. It is also in a scenic area, not too far off the downtown.

The East Jordan Farmers Market is run out of the Huntington Bank parking lot in the city's downtown, where a Willow Tree and a few other shady spots protect only the earliest arriving vendors. One retailer erects a big beach umbrella to help beat the heat.

"It is very sunny," said East Jordan Garden Club member Evelyn Gidley. But she doesn't think it detracts shoppers.

Most people come early, she said, and it even attracts plenty of off-the-boat traffic from the nearby marina.

The garden club manages East Jordan's market and uses the \$2 vendor fee proceeds for city beautification

Consumers finds cause of outages

Two recent power outages that left 400 or so Boyne City Consumers Power customers without electricity, were due to a burned jumper, said John Hall, public information director for the utility company.

The June 13 outage occurred around 2:30 p.m. and lasted three and a half hours. On June 18 electricity went out at 7 p.m. and came back on two hours later. Different customers were affected.

Since then, crews have investigated lines from the substation to town and have been replacing and upgrading jumpers throughout the city to insure the city doesn't face the same problem again, Hall said.

A jumper is a piece of equipment that attaches two energized wires on either side of a pole.

The occasional, momentary losses of electricity could be due to broken limbs falling on lines. In those instances, an oil circuit reclosure turns off power until the branch passes through. If a limb remains stuck, power is automatically shut off until it is cleared off the line. It's not unusual for these types of outages to happen following major storms.

projects.

East Jordan's streetscape construction project could put a crimp in the market's plans said Gidley, but if they have to, they'll find another spot.

Up to 30 local farmers, gardeners, florists, artists and crafters sell their goods from the edge of the park in Boyne City to the backdrop of the gazebo, towering trees and the Boyne River.

The reason the issue is being brought up now, said the city, is to give the market time to plan for a change.

The commission may wait until next year to decide the fate of the market, to avoid interruption of the selling season, which is already in full swing, and to fully research the options.

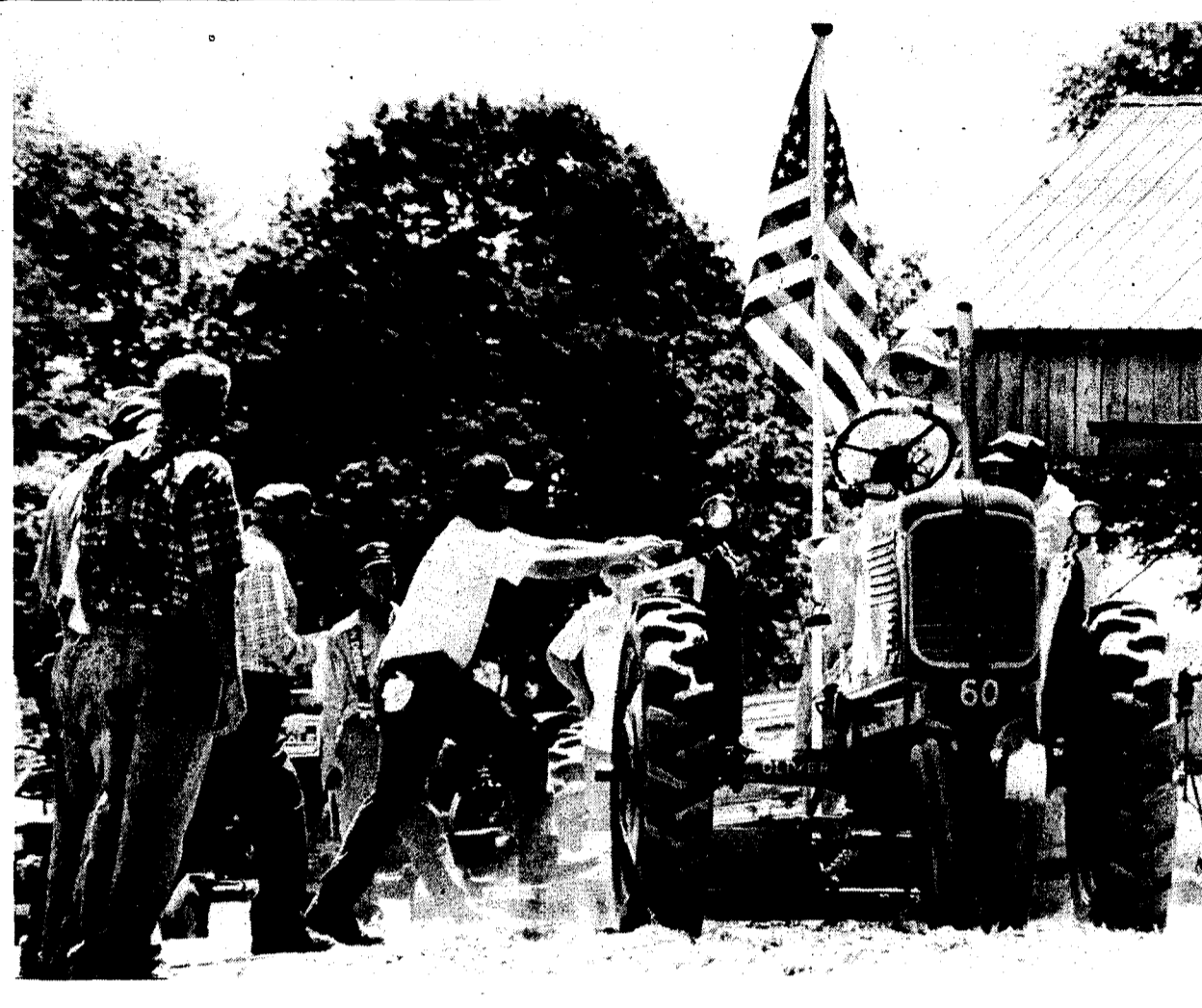
The proposed city lot hasn't ordinarily been used much said Strahl. City employees park on the opposite side of the building and the police park behind their facility. Occasionally Allied Signal workers park there.

This is the first year the vendors have prepaid to reserve a spot — one of the Senior Center's goals — and the center has already taken in more money than last year. It uses the proceeds to serve lunches to nearly 30 seniors each day.

"It's a landmark for weekends and Wednesdays," said art vendor Don Dunaski. "This is so established. It's been here for years."

The Boyne City Farmers' Market is open Wednesdays and Saturdays from 8 a.m.-noon. The East Jordan Farmer's Market will open July 3, and be open every Friday through September from 8 a.m.-noon.

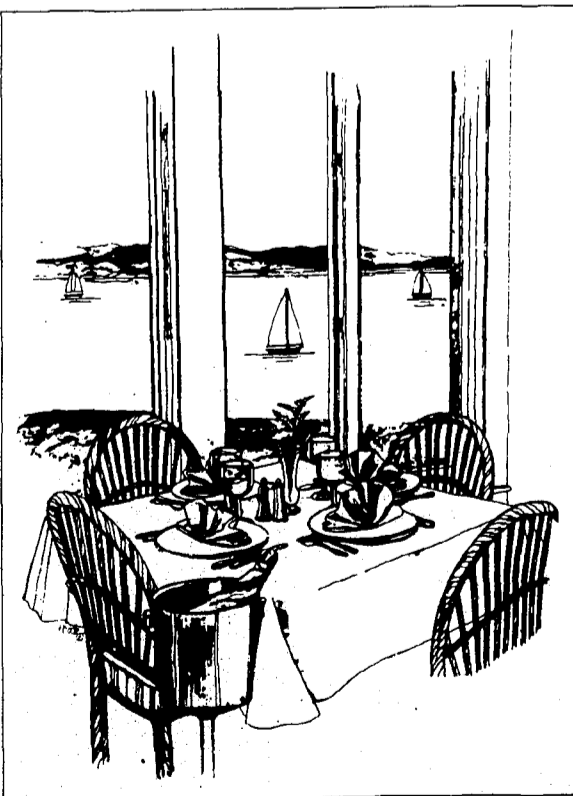
More than 20 local artists from the area will be featured and many works will be available for purchase.

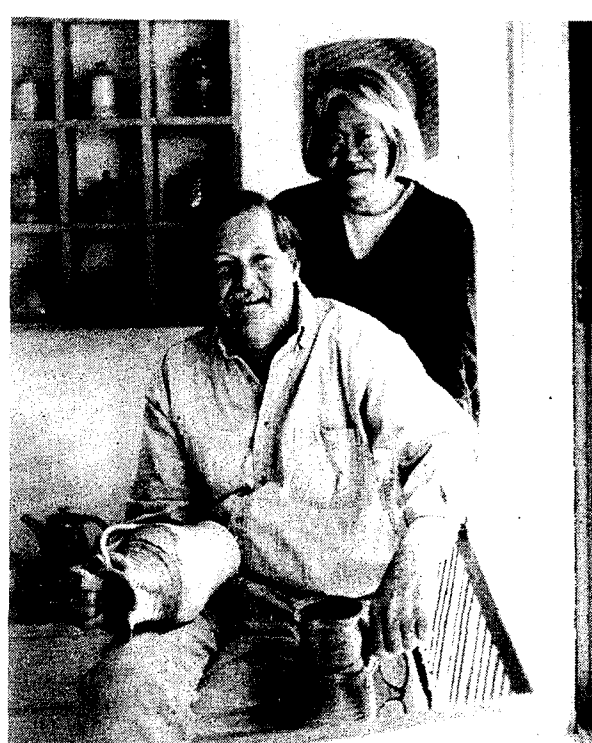

leads.

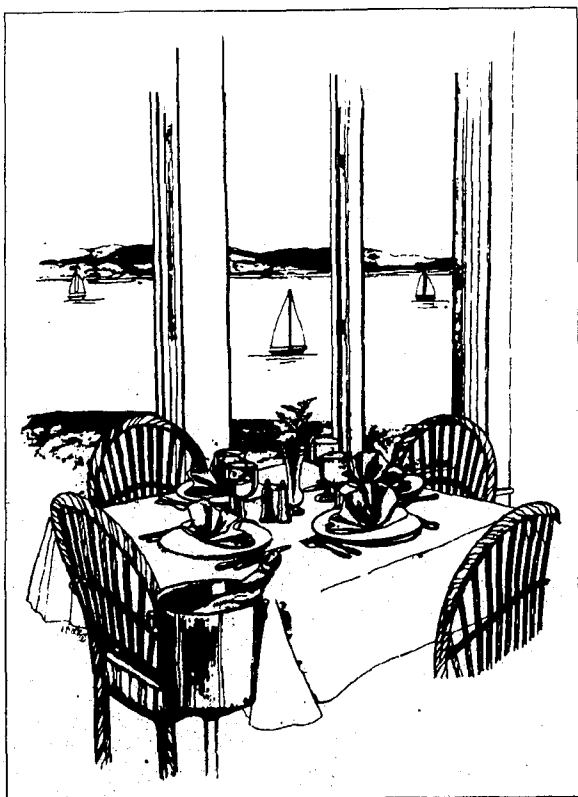
More than 20 local artists from the area will be featured and many works will be available for purchase.

River preserved today for generations of tomorrow

At the very northeastern tip of Antrim County's Chain of Lakes, just three miles outside of East Jordan, is a strip of river corridor nestled between St. Clair and Six Mile Lakes.

A handful of individuals who call themselves the St. Clair Lake-Six Mile Lake Natural Area (SCL/SML) Committee have been working to protect this stretch of river that constitutes the top of the necklace known as the Chain of Lakes.

In April, a major milestone was accomplished when the Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy obtained purchase options to secure and protect the last two privately-owned parcels along one and a quarter miles of river frontage in South Arm Township.

And then last month, most of the funding needed to complete the purchase was raised by individual members of the Malpass family of East Jordan. Their gifts were given through the Charlevoix County Community Foundation.

The SCL/SML Natural Area follows in the footsteps of other similar efforts in the chain such as the Grass River Natural Area and the Skegemog Wildlife Area.

Since 1992, the SCL/SML Committee has been working with both the Grand Traverse Regional Land

Conservancy, based in Traverse City, and the Little Traverse Conservancy, based in Harbor Springs, to expand protection of the riverway, piece by piece.

Since that time, nearly 190 acres with more than 8,700 feet of shoreline have been permanently protected for the natural area. Only one parcel of land along alongside the river is still privately owned.

"This has been a project that has required much patience, but that patience has certainly paid off," said Ty Ratliff, land protection specialist for Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy.

"These two most recent parcels are both shoreline properties — located on each side of the existing F. Bruce Malpass Preserve — with sensitive river wetlands."

"In the entire one and a quarter mile stretch of land that is now natural area, the only human-made structure is a dock," said Joanne Beemon, chair of the SCL/SML Committee. "This support from the many Malpass family members demonstrates what love of community, and family is really all about. The family members joined together to insure that their children, and all the children of the community, would forever have a place of beauty and wonder in which to play and learn and dream."

The project has been compared to a quilt or a

puzzle, and each piece has carried with it different stories that reflect how the natural area has captured the hearts of those who have traveled there.

Stories such as that of Clinton Davis who, just before his death last spring, left money for the purchase of a piece of the natural area as a lasting symbol of his love for the river. After his death, his wife gave the funds for yet another parcel to be purchased and added in Clinton's memory.

The landowners who are selling their properties for these latest additions to the natural area are Jim Ernst and Chuck and Dawn Ward. "I wanted my

property to be like a legacy to my son, so he would always have a place where wildlife will flourish. So it meant a lot to me to have it left natural," Ernst said.

Two anonymous donors established the campaign through the Regional Land Conservancy which has been working to protect land in the chain since 1991.

College students biking this summer coast to coast for Habitat

"I wanted to see America, what better way to do it," said Nick Madden. "You'd miss it if you were in a car."

Madden was one of 34 cyclists who passed through East Jordan and rolled into Boyne City last Thursday afternoon from Traverse City on a 73-mile leg of a 4,000 mile Habitat Bicycle Challenge to raise money for Habitat for Humanity.

The bikers only had 2,900 miles to go before the end of the coast-to-coast journey once they departed Boyne City.

Hot and exhausted, many of them discovered "a lake over there" (Charlevoix) and went for a quick dip before showers at Boyne City Middle School. The United Methodist Church served them a potluck dinner by "candlelight" — when the electricity in town went down for an hour or so.

The church's basement floor served as sleeping quarters and they were back on the road heading to Mackinaw City by 8 a.m. the next morning. The final destination of their 4,000 mile journey, which

started out in New Haven, Conn., is Vancouver.

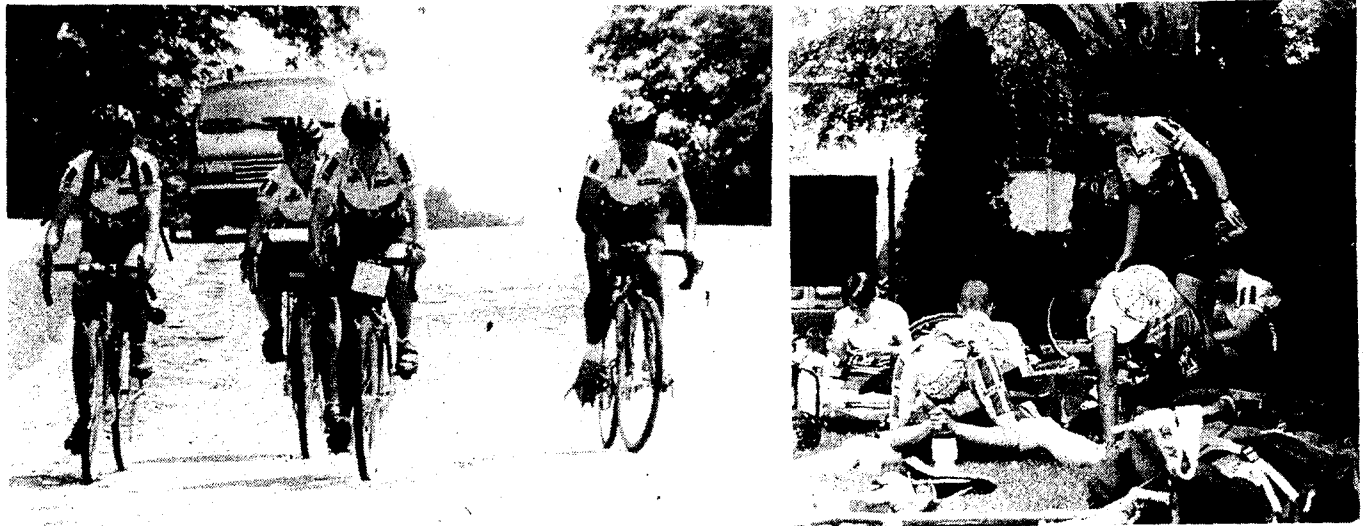
The cyclists were mostly Yale college students or recent graduates of the school. They aren't bikers, they said, and one participant only learned to ride six weeks ago.

Yale medical student Sandeep Bansal said this will be his last free summer. "So I thought I'd do something wild and crazy."

They had already secured pledges for the \$100,000 fundraiser, but rely on churches and community centers along their route for lodging and meals.

The money raised will benefit the Collegiate Build Project of New Haven, Campus Habitat Chapters throughout North America, and Habitat for Humanity International. The non-profit organization works to eradicate poverty housing worldwide with volunteer labor and donated funds.

Jonathan Griswold said the cross-country trip is not like anything he's experienced. "It's definitely up there with one of the most challenging things I've ever done."

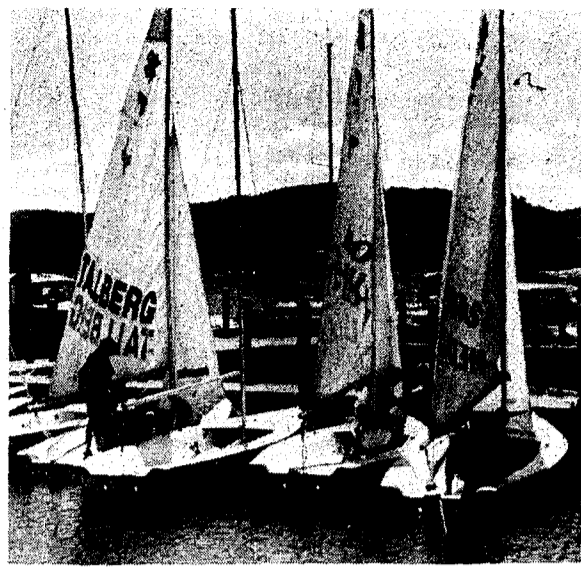

Back on the diamond

Boyne City fields fast-pitch women's softball team for the first time in more than 20 years

For the first time since the mid 1970s Boyne City has a fast-pitch, women's softball team.

That early 1970s team, Boyne City Merchants, even made it to the state championship one year, said coach Rick Simon. But he can't recall if they won the title or not.

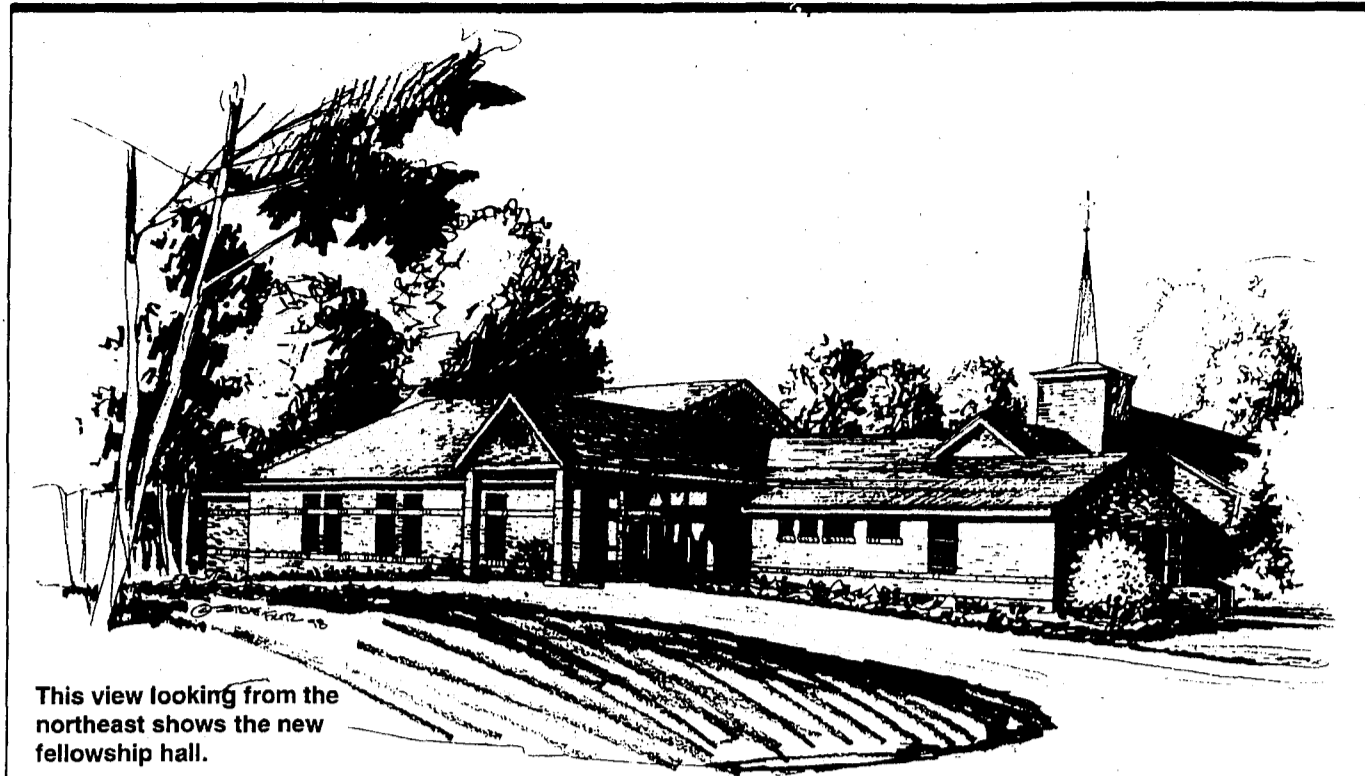
