## NAKONECZNY'S 11-YEAR REIGN COMING TO AN END

# Boyne superintendent resigns

After 11 years with the district, Boyne City School's Superintendent Bob Nakoneczny resigned from his position at the school board meeting late Monday night. His resignation will become effective on April 1.

"We agreed that it was time for a new direction," board president Kathy Anderson said. "We appreciate his service to the district."

"My wife and I had discussed our future plans and we've been indirectly talking with the board for a few months," Nakoneczny said of his plans to retire from the district.

According to Anderson, the board was content to let him serve out his contract which would have expired in the spring of 2000. He had a three-year contract that was renewed annu-

ally, but last year he did not ask for an extension.

"I just feel it's in the best interest of the district that they post the position now when they have the highest candidate pool and the greatest opportunity to seek new leadership for the district," Nakoneczny said. "As they go through that, sometimes an existing superintendent gets in the way."

In his resignation letter to the board, Nakoneczny said more candidates are considering career changes at this time and it gives a school district the best opportunity to find quality candidates.

The board will contact the Michigan Association of School Boards to assist with the search. They will also work with MASB and the Char-Em

ISD for interim help.

"Hopefully we will have someone hired by June or July," Anderson said.

Although Nakoneczny will leave the office on April 1, he will continue to support the district in the budget and financial areas through June 30.

#### East Jordan renews search for new high school principal

The East Jordan School District began its search again for a high school principal, posting the job description at colleges and universities on Monday.

The position became vacant last July when Gus Bishop left the job after five years to become the district's full-time director of curriculum and instruction, a position in which he had served part-time for the previous three years.

The board appointed assistant principal and athletic director Tammy Jackson as an interim principal, when they were unable to find a replacement.

The district received 18 applications for the job and interviewed two candidates last July. One of the applicants whom superintendent Chip Hansen said he would have been comfortable hiring, opted to remain at his position at Alma, where he had been promoted to principal.

Assistant athletic director Steve Hines, a former athletic director, and now a government teacher and girls varsity basketball coach, became the acting athletic director and assumed some assistant principalship duties.

March 12 is the deadline for applications. Hansen said interviews would probably be conducted the week of March 22.

#### Trees fall on lines, knock power out for several hours in parts of Boyne

Power was knocked out to 517 Consumers Energy customers in Boyne City last Thursday around 2:30 p.m. after trees fell on wires.

It was two hours before the first 208 customers had electricity and four hours until power was restored to another 298. At least 11 customers went without power for 9 1/2 hours, before the lights came on at 11:45 that night.

#### Sydney Campbell benefit dinner is Saturday



## Wertz Warriors

There was standing room only at Jake's Place in Boyne Falls Friday as 72 Wertz Warriors snowmobilers jammed into the roadside tavern where owner Kim Rotermund presented their honorary chairperson Mark "The Bird" Fidrych, with a \$4,178 check.

This was the first year Jake's has been a stop for the Warriors who drive 900 miles, criss-crossing the lower peninsula from Mount Clemens to Mackinaw City, collecting money from restaurants and watering holes along the way, to raise money for the Michigan Winter Special Olympics.

They are accompanied by 30 or so support crew, four semis and other vehicles, including a truck which holds repair equipment. Although below zero wind chills ushered them into Boyne Falls, the day before they could only drive 30 miles and had to load their sleds into the semis due to a lack of snow.

In 1982, former Detroit Tiger Vic Wertz started the ride-a-thon to help underwrite the Special

Olympics, an event in which hundreds of challenged children and young adults enjoy a week of fun and competition. Although he died in 1983, his dream lived on and 17 years later the group has gone from raising around \$40,000 per year to more than \$500,000. They are now approaching the \$5 million mark in total donations. In its 15th year, they raised enough to fund the entire winter program.

Contributions in Boyne Falls more than exceeded Rotermund's fundraising goal of \$3,000. The money came primarily from two events he organized and hosted from the bar. One was a pig and deep-fried turkey roast last August, the other a horse-drawn sleigh ride on Jan. 30, with everything for both events being donated from the community. He also sold construction paper cut-outs of snowmobiles for \$1 which were taped behind the bar with the purchasers name.

## Student gets his chance to sit in the seat of power

Cliff Leazier, a fifth-grader at Boyne Falls Schools, spent last Friday in Superintendent Patrick Smith's office, not because he was in trouble, but because he returned money to fellow students which was mistakenly given to him.

His act of kindness qualified him to pull a prize out of a jar — student-acting superintendent for a day — as part of the school's "Do Something" program which began on Martin Luther King Day on Jan. 18, and ended Monday.

The project challenged students to do good deeds and was aimed at raising their awareness of respect, honesty and courage — the virtues exemplified by Martin Luther King.

During the three-week program, students were recognized for 192 acts of kindness earning them prizes such as pizza,

soda, lunch tokens and more.

AmeriCorp volunteer and the project's coordinator, Lori Howell, pointed out more nice gestures than that were committed, even though they didn't all garner prizes.

The project also drew the greater community together, with businesses gladly donating gifts for prizes. "They were unconditional about supporting us," Howell said.

Although the program is officially over now, Howell said the school will continue to distribute one prize a month until the end of the year to a high schooler and grade schooler.

As for Leazier — an avid basketball player — his first official act as superintendent was to order fourth and fifth graders to spend recess in the gym for the day, just another act of kindness toward his fellow students.

# Chambers welcome new leaders

When Rene MacNaughton drives along the Lake Charlevoix shoreline from Advance and sees Boyne City in the distance, she said she literally gets goose bumps — but not the scary kind.

She can't imagine living or working anywhere else, so as the newly elected president of the Boyne City Chamber of Commerce, you can bet she means it when she praises the town.

"It's exciting," MacNaughton said of her latest role at the helm of the chamber's board of directors. This is her sixth year on the chamber board.

Her involvement with the organization started when her husband of 17 years, Shawn, served as a member three years before she joined when they owned a local T-shirt screen-printing business called Positive Image.

The business no longer exists, but Rene remained an active part of the board, and recalls the changes to not only the chamber, but to Boyne City itself since she moved here from West Bloomfield nearly 20 years ago.

The membership has grown, and people have become more involved, she said, citing that it's becoming easier to sell Auto Raffle tickets.

"Debbie (Thompson) has been instrumental in that," MacNaughton said of the chamber executive director. "She's been the backbone."

As a teenager visiting the area in the summer and on holidays, MacNaughton remembers plenty of empty storefronts. "Now they're clamoring to get in," she said.

With so much less turnover, she sees the downtown as having a more proper mix of business. The growth of the industrial park also speaks to the desirability to be in the community. Along with the mix of local artisans — showcased at the waterfront art and craft shows — MacNaughton feels compelled to promote Boyne City to potential businesses, residents and the people already here.

"We want members to feel they're more involved," MacNaughton said. The chamber's HUB Conduit newsletter is helping them to meet that goal, making sure members know what's happening with other community groups.

MacNaughton said that even though the Business After Hours events have been well attended, the chamber is going to focus on making them even better. They plan to enhance the ambassador program and MacNaughton said they've just started investigating the possibility of moving to a larger building.

"This is going to be an exciting year," she said.

Already, the ideas are flowing for the Boyne City Area Winter Festival, whose organizers have committed to carrying out the events, even if Mother Nature doesn't cooperate with the proper amount of snowfall.

MacNaughton's own personal favorite event is

the Harvest Festival, but she also favors the Fourth of July. "I love the excitement of the duck race."

Outside of the chamber, MacNaughton is also mom to 3-year-old daughter Lauren, and has worked at Pearle Vision for the last 1 1/2 years. Prior to that she was a hair stylist at the Powder Puff Beauty Shop for 13 years.

When she decided to put some of her office medical training to work at Pearle, the ever-dedicated chamber member seriously asked herself "can I work for Dr. Mellon, is he a member?" He was. It wouldn't have made her

decision to work there, but she would have convinced him to join if he wasn't.

She remembers back to when she visited Boyne City as a child, often wondering if it would be as wonderful to live here full time. Would it feel like a vacation? Nearly two decades later, it's just as she imagined with "responsibilities of course," she added.

But thinking about it brings on the goosebumps again for one of Boyne City's biggest fans.

Phil Hofweber's goal is to keep momentum going on city projects

A unanimous board vote put Phil Hofweber in the East Jordan Area Chamber of Commerce president's seat last month.

And already his vision for the next year is clear: to continue to work with the city, Downtown Development Authority and the schools to keep the momentum going on the progress they've made in the past few years.

"Since the DDA and city have made this heavy investment in the downtown area, we're poised for a lot of potential to expand our retail base in the heart of our community," Hofweber said. "And it will also have a positive effect on the other business districts in our community."

"The main thing is the foundation has been laid for future reinvestment," Hofweber said.

Hofweber himself has been instrumental in promoting the chamber membership through his tireless involvement in events, including his role as "Mr. Basketball" and the chairperson for last weekend's community basketball game.

He said promoting the area businesses and community is probably one of the chamber's strongest attributes, noting that Sno-Blast, the Freedom Festival and Leaf Peekers are several more ways in which the membership is highlighted.

Hofweber is also pleased to be working alongside chamber executive director Mary Faculak again. He said she has done an excellent job over the years. "She gets people to work as a team and have fun. She accomplishes a lot."

As for the chamber board, Hofweber said it is a melting pot for ideas and differing viewpoints, with some members having grown up in East Jordan, and others being a bit newer to the area. "It gives us the opportunity to be more representative of our membership."

More specifically this year, Hofweber and Faculak will lead the board in studying the feasibility of constructing a more spacious chamber building to accommodate the organization's growth. Feedback from members and city officials, has pointed to the corner of Main and Mill streets as a strong contender for the site of a potential new building.

Hofweber said the chamber will also continue working with other area chambers to glean ideas as well as pool resources to reach common goals.

The chamber, he said, acts as a conduit for business owners to voice their concerns and vision for the community to city officials.

He cites the close working relationship

between city administrator David White, schools' superintendent Chip Hansen and their corresponding boards, and the chamber, as critical to advancing the goals of the chamber's membership, adding that it's not only good for the business community, but for area residents too.

As the father of three children, and in his dual

role as industrial sales manager and northern Michigan sales representative for the East Jordan Iron Works, Hofweber himself has a stake in the community's development.

Prior to climbing aboard at the Iron Works five years ago, he worked for several northern Michigan heavy highway construction contractors. And as a graduate of Michigan Technological University and growing up in Clare, he is no stranger to the make-up of smaller communities.

And that's good news for his family, which includes Cheryl, his wife,

and daughters, Elizabeth, 5, Lacey, 4, and Abigail, 3. Cheryl too is involved in the community, most closely in its preservation as president of the Charlevoix County Land Conservancy and as a Friends of the Jordan board member.

"East Jordan is a community that retains that northern Michigan small town atmosphere," Hofweber said. "It's been easy to meet people, become a part of the community and feel at home."

**Foster's celebrates 10th anniversary**

Foster's Live Bait and Gifts is celebrating its 10th anniversary this year, and the business has come a long way since Alice Traylor and her son Charles started the business out of a two-car garage.

Back then they only had six packages each of hooks and sinkers, a tank for minnows, and a Styrofoam container for night crawlers.

Today Alice's business partner is her husband of two years, Roy Traylor, and the store, attached to their home, boasts an additional 800 square feet and a separate building for the minnows. Along with live bait and tackle, they sell fishing and trapping supplies, ammunition, hunting and fishing licenses, clothing, and more.

Alice and Roy may have never hooked up, had Roy not taken matters into his own hands. After being rebuffed by a busy Alice for a year or more, Roy finally convinced her to go on a date, with a variation on the old bait and switch maneuver.

As Alice tells it, he brought in a pail one day feigning a need to buy minnows. When she took off the lid, instead of an empty pail, there was a bag of ice. Puzzled, she looked underneath to find fresh, cleaned fish.

"Roy told me that if I would take time out of my busy schedule, I could catch some of them too," Alice said. "So the next week we went fishing and we've been together ever since."

The store is lined with trophy fish, antlers and animal skins, all caught by family members.

When Alice ventures away from the store, she prefers some of the smaller lakes because she likes to take the little boat and motor, and "because I can out-fish him sometimes," she said of Roy.

He takes to the bigger lakes, and luckily has a defibrillator to regulate his heartbeat when he gets a big one on the line. The mechanism stops and restarts his heart if it begins to beat too fast from the excitement.

He tells of a 20 pound King Salmon he had hooked during a fishing contest when his defibrillator went off. "But even with the shock, I never lost the fish," Roy said, "even though I was dead."

The duo has plenty of fish tales of their own, and have heard scads more from their customers, who come in regularly for their fishing and hunting needs.

This year Foster's is hosting the Boyne City Area Winter Festival's ice-fishing contest from Friday, Feb. 26 - Sunday, Feb. 28, and will offer prizes of \$100, \$75 and \$50 for the longest three catches in each of the Perch, Pike and Walleye categories. A \$75 gift certificate will be given for the largest Splake caught.

Business Assistant Pam Gibson who works with Nakoneczny, has also resigned from the district, effective March 1. The two departures were not related. Gibson has accepted a position with the Char-Em ISD.

According to Nakoneczny, they both have an agreement with the district to assist getting it through the budget planning process in June, and Gibson will assist with the regular audit this summer.

The board will owe Nakoneczny vacation and sick days totaling \$56,900 and will pay approximately \$4,000 in social security tax on that amount.

"We owed him that amount whenever he left," Anderson said. Nakoneczny said he's looking at a number of job opportunities at this time, and added that he and his wife plan to stay in the area.

"We love Boyne City," he said. "We want to continue to live here."

"When I retire permanently from whatever I might be doing, Boyne City will be our home."

"It's all part of bringing the community together," said Rotermund, a Boyne City resident who will have owned Jake's Place for three years in March. His catalyst for getting involved came from a group of participants in Alba who approached him about the cause, knowing Jake's is a stop for snowmobilers. "I saw their community and how it brought everybody together."

"It's an opportunity for everyone to get involved. It takes everybody, not just me," Rotermund said. "People have come out of the woodwork."

Rotermund also appreciates that

a portion of the funds stay right in the area because along with the \$45 Special Olympics entrance fee, there is also a rule that states, "No athlete or parent may be charged or be allowed to pay a fee to compete."

Of the money raised, 75 percent will go to cover the cost of the Winter Games, and 25 percent will remain in the community to sponsor local athletes.

Rotermund hopes the fundraisers become an annual tradition — he'll hold the pig and turkey roast the third week in August — and that Jake's Place will become a regular stop on the Wertz Warriors' cross-state trek.

"If we get a dollar," Rotermund said, "it's a dollar more than they had."

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# Japanese tea ceremony will bring ancient ritual to life

"Make a bowl of tea so that it is delicious, place charcoal so that the water will boil, arrange flowers just as they are in the field, keep cool in summer and warm in winter, arrive early when keeping appointments, carry an umbrella even when it doesn't rain, and be mindful of your fellow guests."

These are the seven rules laid down by Sen no Rikyu, the originator of Chado or the Art of the Tea Ceremony.

This ancient Zen ritual of serving tea to guests is still practiced today on special occasions or for ceremonies throughout the year in Japan as a sacred event.

Such a ceremony will open the exhibit, "Chado: The Japanese Way of Tea" on Feb. 14, at the Jordan River

Arts Center in East Jordan.

As a preface to the exhibit, 30 people, mostly novice potters, created tea bowls of their own from clay on Saturday, under the instruction of David and June Otis in their studio in East Jordan. Some of the bowls will be used by their owners in the tea ceremony this weekend.

The ceremony itself will feature tea master Yoko Watanabe of Novi, who was born in Niigata, Japan and studied at the Sekishu School of Tea.

Before moving to the United States in 1995 with her husband, Yasuo, she served as tea master consultant for Niigata Sogo Television. Since 1996 she has been a volunteer tea master, performing the ceremony monthly for the University of Michigan Museum of Art. She has also per-

formed the tea ceremony for the Shakunage Cultural Foundation, the Japan-American Society, Japan Business Society of Detroit and for various schools and clubs.

Toshiko Fujioka, a primary guest, and Naomi Hirano, a secondary guest, will assist in the ceremony. Both trained in the Senke School of Tea in Japan and recently moved to the U.S. with their husbands. Yasuo, a teacher of both modern and classical Japanese language and literature, will narrate the ceremony.

The tea master and her guests will be dressed in the traditional Japanese kimono and the setting will be a replica of a Japanese tea house constructed by Andy Poineau, who was aided by Ron Warnos and students of

the East Jordan High School wood working class, as part of a series of theatre workshops funded by the Frey Foundation.

Examples of sweets and matcha, a powdered green tea whipped to a froth with a bamboo whisk, will be served after the ceremony.

Reservations are required to participate in the Sunday, Feb. 14 ceremonies, which will be held at 12:30 p.m. and 2 p.m.

Tea bowls, some created by local potters, will be on display and for sale, and other Japanese artifacts on loan will be included with the rest of the exhibit, which will run through March 11. For more information, or to register for the tea ceremony, call Maggie Matthews at 536-7987.

"This year we're practicing on Sundays and we're starting tomorrow," Red Devils coach, player and


East Jordan Schools superintendent Chip Hansen chided his team at an after-game celebration.






