EJ fire chief at center of debate

The East Jordan City Commission adopted the proposed budget for the 2001-02 fiscal year at last week's regular meeting, after considering some last minute revisions.

One revision, proposed by commissioner Shane Williams, was to reinstate the position for a full-time fire chief in the new budget. The full-time chief's position was eliminated from the revised budget which was presented at the last meeting.

Commissioner Ruth Gee supported Williams's proposal, agreeing that there was a need in the community for a full-time chief. However, other commissioners voiced concerns

about the proposal.

"We can't afford a full-time fire chief," said commissioner Tim Hoffman.

The proposal failed to pass on a 4-2 vote. Commissioner Jerry Cihak then moved to adopt the new budget, and the motion carried, 5-1.

The debate over the fire chief's position sparked new controversy, as Hoffman raised his concerns about a "secret meeting" held at the Jordan Express by several of the firemen in the department.

He charged that only certain members of the department were invited to attend this meeting, and that people

at the meeting were deliberately going behind their fellow firefighters' backs in their efforts to get fire chief Glen Thorman removed from his position.

Hoffman then asked city attorney Scott Beatty if the members of the fire department who attended the meeting were guilty of insubordination. Beatty refused to comment until he knew specifically what the meeting was about.

The discussion became heated, and Gee objected, saying, "We can disagree without being disagreeable."

Mayor Ron Klooster then stopped the discussion altogether, asking chief

Thorman to investigate whether the firefighters at the meeting were guilty of insubordination.

Later, when the commission attended to the speaker request slips, assistant fire chief Steve Hall addressed the commission concerning the efforts to have chief Thorman removed from his position. He mentioned that when the fire department handed out surveys to all the members, to assess the efficiency of the department, chief Thorman was rated at 89 percent.

Hall asserted his belief that

Troubled waters

Boyne school board reinstates assistant to superintendent

Following the resignation last month of Boyne City schools superintendent Dana Compton, things haven't quieted down at Boyne City Board of Education meetings.

At last Monday's board meeting, residents crowded in to the high school media center as the board voted to reinstate the superintendent's assistant, Lynn Amato, following her suspension a few days earlier by

Compton.

Amato was allowed to read a prepared statement regarding the suspension despite a request from Compton to meet with him prior to allowing a board-level appeal of the action. In Compton's statement protesting the hearing, he noted that he had attempted to contact Amato by phone prior to the school board meeting, suggesting meeting times with both himself and high school principal Mary Jason.

Compton said that he did not hear back from Amato. "I believe that the board is hard-pressed to entertain and/or act on an employee appeal without having my final determination and recommendation regarding the employee," Compton said in his statement. "At this point, the board has neither of these things."

Following Compton's appeal, board member Jim Stackus stated that he believed Amato's "suspension was uncalled for... I want to get this over with tonight."

According to Amato's statement, the suspension resulted from an incident that took place on Wednesday, May 9, in the break room of the district's business office. Amato alleges that she was reviewing personal bills during her coffee break when Compton entered the room and asked to see what she was working on; when she replied that it was personal, she said, Compton "became enraged."

Remembering those who have served

Jordan Valley Glassworks creates colorful memorials for those who gave their lives for their country

Though many area residents will take part in parades and ceremonies to honor fallen veterans over the course of the Memorial Day weekend, one local business has a unique plan to commemorate those who have given their lives for our country.

At Jordan Valley Glassworks in East Jordan, preparations are being made by Glenna Haney, and Bill and Jay Bavers, to engrave colorful glass globes, called Nijiwa Floats, with the names of veterans who have died in war. The globes will then be placed around the City of East Jordan, a gift to those who find them and a lasting memorial to those whose names they honor.

This will be the second year the glassworks has carried out the memorial, though last year the floats were released in the Jordan River. "Instead of putting flowers in the water," said Jay, they decided the floats would be a fitting tribute. The globes are replicas of Japanese floats that were used to hold up fishing nets. Sometimes, said Jay, the floats would get lost in the Pacific, and wash up on far-away

shores to be found by passers-by. Those who found them consider the floats to be "spiritual and lucky."

Both Glenna and Jay have military ties themselves, with Glenna having grown up in a military family and Jay a veteran of the U.S. Army himself, so honoring veterans is a cause close to home. The

floats are not just a way to give veterans a deserving nod, though; those who find them are welcome to keep them, and so each piece, valued at about \$45 each, is a way to "express our appreciation," said Jay, for the support Jordan Valley Glassworks has received from the community.

Each globe takes about 10 minutes to create, and is unique in color and pattern. "You'd be hard pressed to find two exactly the same," said Jay. Glenna, Bill, and Jay had hoped to have created all the floats they'd need during the winter, but business kept them busier than expected, and so the trio was still creating the pieces last week.

The names inscribed on the globes are local, including veterans from East Jordan,

Boyne City, Ellsworth and Charlevoix. Last year, about 80 floats were released, and this year the glassworks plans to put out over 100.

The floats will be set out at various undisclosed locations around town three times a day through the course of the holiday weekend.

Concord student earns national recognition

TO THE EDITOR:

According to *USA Today*, there is a second school in Boyne City. Last week it listed Laura Warren as a student at Concord Academy Boyne, of Boyne City, Mich.

A senior at CAB, Laura was one of the 100 students across the country listed for the prestigious Toyota Community Scholars award from more than 12,500 students considered. In addition to the thrill of being chosen, she also received a scholarship worth \$10,000 over four years and an all-expense paid three-day trip to the award ceremony at Churchill Downs in Louisville, Kent.

The quality of education she has received at Concord Academy Boyne the past five years certainly helped prepare her to meet the academic and community service qualifications required for consideration.

Most of the schools in northern Michigan are good schools and CAB is no exception. The main difference is in size and focus and the fact that it provides programming with less money than most of the other schools.

Concord is a small public school that focuses on academics and fine arts (The fine-arts variety is what brought Laura to the school). Students from all backgrounds come from over a wide area to attend the school, including some that have been asked to leave other schools. Concord gives them another chance, usually with stricter rules.

Because it is small, it is also possible for teachers and administrators to spend more individual time with each student.

This really pays off for the students having problems or wanting greater challenges.

Obviously, it is a partnership that is working. Laura and Concord Academy Boyne are to be congratulated.

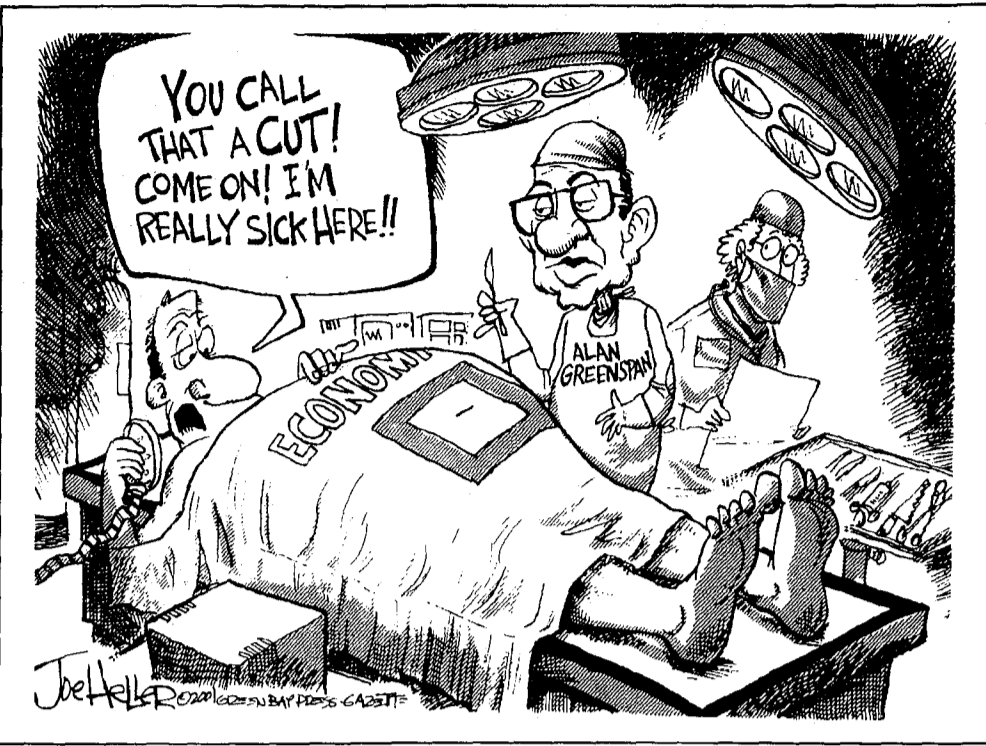

'Back to School Day' is back

Area senior citizens have come to look forward to the Boyne City Public Schools' Back to School Day. This year, the existing high school will be under renovation through the summer months, leaving the program without a home. No matter, decided program organizer Anne Thurston; the seniors will just go on the road.

And so this year's Back to School program will be a field trip, scheduled for Thursday, June 14, with senior citizens boarding school buses to head down to Traverse City and the campus of Northern Michigan College.

Those attending will enjoy a guided tour through the Dennon Museum, featuring a special exhibit on Egypt, as well as a tour through the

Great Lakes Maritime Academy.

Seniors will enjoy boxed lunches on the trip, as well as ample time to rest and peruse the museum gift shop. "It's going to be a laid back day," said Thurston. "It will be low speed, all the way."

With planning still in the works, times have not been set, but will be announced as soon as possible. Thurston also expects to line up a special guest speaker for the luncheon, also to be announced.

Back to School Day is an annual event started in 1999, in which area seniors are invited to enjoy a day of informative classes at the high school, as well as social events planned for both lunchtime and evening, all free of charge.

Initially, due to the construction at the high school, it was decided that Back to School Day wouldn't be possible this year. Ultimately, though, Thurston decided that "I just couldn't let it go."

Funding for the event is still an issue, though at a recent meeting of the Boyne City Board of Education, local businessman Mark Fruge offered the support of his company, Primiero Construction. According to Thurston, no matter what the funding details are, the program will still be offered to area seniors at no charge.

Compton directed Amato to leave the office pending further consideration of her job status.

Amato went on to accuse Compton and his friends and family of harassing her repeatedly following her decision to report alleged improprieties to the board, including that Compton had directed staff to increase his salary from \$85,000 to the budgeted \$88,000 without prior approval of the school board.

"I want my job back," Amato concluded. "The harassment has got to stop. It's time for our board of education to regain control of the Boyne City Public Schools."

According to Compton, the directive concerning the raise was the result of a misunderstanding of the process, one that was reversed as soon as he became aware of the error.

At the meeting, Compton was not asked to answer any of the charges, but later denied the alleged harassment, noting that until Amato read her statement, he hadn't even known for certain how the incident came to light. "I really didn't know for a long time," he said. "Until she made the statement, I wasn't sure how the information made the circuit."

"It's ludicrous to believe that I was verbally or physically threatening to Lynn Amato," he continued, "particularly under the microscope they've put me under."

Following Amato's statement, the board voted 5-1 (board president Marty Moody was not present) to reinstate Amato to her position, with the disciplinary action expunged from her record and full pay for time lost.

The one dissenting vote came reluctantly from board member Anne Thurston, who suggested that the board

move to receive some assistance from the Intermediate School District in resolving the issue, including arrangements regarding work environments for Amato and Compton. "As a board member, I do not want to approve a motion and throw it all back where it was," she said. "These two individuals have in their own way tried to put an end to a bad situation. I'm reluctant to have the board approve [the motion] and go home. It doesn't solve any problems."

"I was disheartened and dismayed by the accusations," Compton said later. "I don't know if in Lynn's mind she believes them, but I do not see the accuracy. We're at opposite ends of the spectrum as far as that situation."

As for moving forward, Compton said, he, Amato, and the board will have to "put all of that behind us," and keep working, he said, to do what's "best for the district."

Thorman was an excellent fire chief and expressed concern about commissioner Williams' handling of the issues surrounding the fire department.

"As a taxpayer, I think Shane should be spending his time bringing business to town, not arguing about the fire department," he said. "I would really like you to uplift this town, not bring it down."

When asked about the recent malfunctions of fire department equipment, Hall explained that the equipment is in good working order, and

the only reason the jaws of life did not start right away last time was because the engine was flooded, not because of improper maintenance.

Fire chief Glen Thorman said, "I don't want the citizens to worry that the equipment is not up to standards."

"For the residents, the issue over the fire department is causing panic," stated commissioner Jeannette Norton. "We need to resolve this, because the people need stability."

City administrator White stated that all concerns about the fire department's equipment will be addressed at the next meeting.

ALSO AT THE MEETING, Lee

Symonds, owner of Westbrook Motel, asked that the commission take responsibility for a water leak that occurred on his property, leaving him with a \$2,500 water bill.

Symonds has been making payments on the bill, as per an agreement between him and city administrator David White. However, according to city policy, the unpaid amount must go on the tax roll after a certain amount of time. Symonds objected to having his water bill be put on the tax roll.

After some debate, the commission came to a general consensus to put Symonds' bill on the tax roll and look into revising their policy in the future.

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Extended kindergarten pilot program gets BC board approval

The Boyne City Board of Education has approved a pilot project for an extended day kindergarten program beginning in September to be held at Boyne City Elementary School.

The extended day program will provide students with a safe, fun, exciting, and educational alternative to traditional day care. According to elementary principal Fred Sitkins, "The extended day program is based on the concept that many parents need and want an all-day educational experience for their kindergarten students. This program fills that need by offering our kindergarten students the opportunity to stay with us all day in a well-supervised, structured setting that is linked to the kindergarten experience."

The morning kindergarten students would come to school in the morning, attend the regular kindergarten classroom session, have lunch at school, and then spend the afternoon in a classroom with other extended day kindergarten learners. This classroom will be supervised by two para-professionals with a certified teacher as a consultant to the program.

The afternoon kindergarten students will have the same opportunity, however they will ride the bus to school in the morning, attend the extended day program in the morning, have lunch at school, and then go directly to the kindergarten classroom for the afternoon session.

Students enrolled in either the morning or afternoon kindergarten sessions will be eligible to participate in this program. Students can leave on the regular school busses at the end of the school day or they may stay at school in a supervised after-school program which is open to all students in grades K-4.

The cost for the extended day program will be \$2 per hour. This fee will include snacks and supplies, however lunch must be purchased or brought from home.

The extended day morning and afternoon sessions will be three hours each for a total of \$6 per day or \$30 per week. If parents choose to have their child remain in the after-school program, that charge will also be \$2 per hour. Financial assistance is available to eligible families through the Family Independence Agency.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for parents who are concerned about a quality experience for their kindergarten aged child," said Sitkins. "We hope to offer this program beginning in September to all interested families; however if the demand exceeds the available spaces, we will allocate the spaces based on the order in which students are signed up." For this reason, parents are being asked to contact the school as soon as possible to enroll in this program.

"It is our goal to provide children with the best possible educational experience," Sitkins added. "Our extended day kindergarten, with its direct link to our kindergarten classrooms, is the first step and a great start to public school education."

DAWN JOHNSON IS, AMONG OTHER THINGS; A MOTHER, A GRANDMOTHER OF ONE, AND YES, A LADY BIKER

Though the term "lady biker" might bring many images to mind, a small-town grandmother is probably not one of the first to spring up.

But that's exactly what Dawn Johnson is, among other things; a mother, a grandmother of one, and yes, a lady biker.

Johnson got her first real taste of riding last year, with her three children grown, she said, she felt it was time to start doing some of the things she'd always wanted to do. "I'd watch people go by [on motorcycles] and say, man, I'd like to do that," she said.

And so she did. She began riding with some friends, to try it out, and decided to take a motorcycle endorsement class in Petoskey offered through Ferris State University. Passing the class, she took to the open road, though not exactly with wild abandon. There's a difference, she said, between riding in a parking lot with instructors to being out on the road on your own, with "cars, animals, pot holes, all of a sudden jumping out at you," she laughed. Her friends, though, were patient. "I started following them around," she said, and finally invested in a bike of her own, a Yamaha Virago 750. "That's my speed," she noted.

"The more I ride, the more I love it," she said.

Though Johnson has found plenty of kindred spirits, both in the community and on the Internet, feedback from her own family has been, on occasion, a little less supportive. "Some of my family doesn't understand," she laughs. Her son, a mechanic for Vincent's Yamaha in East Jordan, helped her pick out a bike and also helps her with maintenance. "He certainly understands," she said. Her daughters, on the other hand, just don't get it.

"My middle daughter said, 'Do you want to get killed?'" she said. "And my oldest daughter, who has a lot of common sense, won't even look at my bike." Despite the difference of opinion, said Johnson, ultimately, "I'm doing what I want to do."

She does, however, understand their concerns. The danger of riding a motorcycle, she said, is "certainly greater than driving a car. That's why I took the [endorsement] class."

As for the perception of who lady bikers, or motorcycle enthusiasts in general are, Johnson said that for the most part the stereotypes are wrong.

"There was a time when people actually feared the motorcycle club organizations," she said. "But right now, you see so many different kinds of people. It bridges a lot of levels of people and culture."

"They see people in leather and headbands, it shows a sign of power," she said. "[People] are afraid of them." But in reality, the leathers are there for a reason, for protection. "I put on my doo-rag because I don't like to mess up my hair," she said. "I hate helmet hair."

There are, she admits, "some very tough ladies out there." But she said, no matter what their background or lifestyle, "they all have one thing in common. They love their machine. They love the freedom of the road. It brings us together, and we're respectful of different ideas, dress, culture."

She has noticed, too, over the course of the last year, that there is an increasing number of other lady bikers joining the ranks.

In her endorsement class, she said, six of the 12 students were women. "Most rode [previously] on the back of their husband or boyfriend's bike," Johnson said.

"But more and more ladies are becoming interested in riding [their own]. More and more ladies are not just riding behind but operating our own machines."



East Jordan resident Dawn Johnson, who took up riding last year, said that lady bikers come from all walks of life.

"Ladies come up to me and say, 'I've always wanted to ride,'" she said. "Then came the idea that it would be great to have a ladies' day, to promote lady bikers and motorcycles in general."

And so, the concept of the first annual "Lady Biker Day," was born.

On Saturday, Aug. 18, Lady Biker Day will be held in East Jordan, complete with a 50-mile poker run/cruise, an idea suggested by Johnson's friend, Curtis Smith, a local resident who builds custom motorcycles. "We wanted to do something rather than just bring the bikes in and line them up," Johnson explained.

Participants will break up into groups of 10, riding from East Jordan on a route to include Ellsworth, Bellaire, Central Lake, Alden and Elk Rapids, picking up one card in each town, to create a five-card poker hand. Upon their return to East Jordan, the best hand wins. The top three hands will actually win prize money, and in addition to drawings for other prizes, each participant will receive a special commemorative T-shirt. Johnson and other volunteers are working to find sponsors and donations, currently putting together a casino package as a potential prize.

"We do need sponsors," she said, noting that sponsor money will help not only with prizes but the production of flyers and banners.

Among the vendors expected to participate is a woman from Clinton Township who has, said Johnson, the exclusive rights to Lady Biker wear. Johnson also hopes to get a radio station interested in broadcasting from the event. Lady Biker Day coincides with East Jordan's summer sidewalk sales, and Peace Train Grill and Cafe will be set up for a cookout and other refreshments.

The event, though, is not just for bikers, but for other visitors and community members who are merely interested. "It's a chance for our community to put out the red carpet, and draw people back," said Johnson. "We want to make it an enjoyable experience."

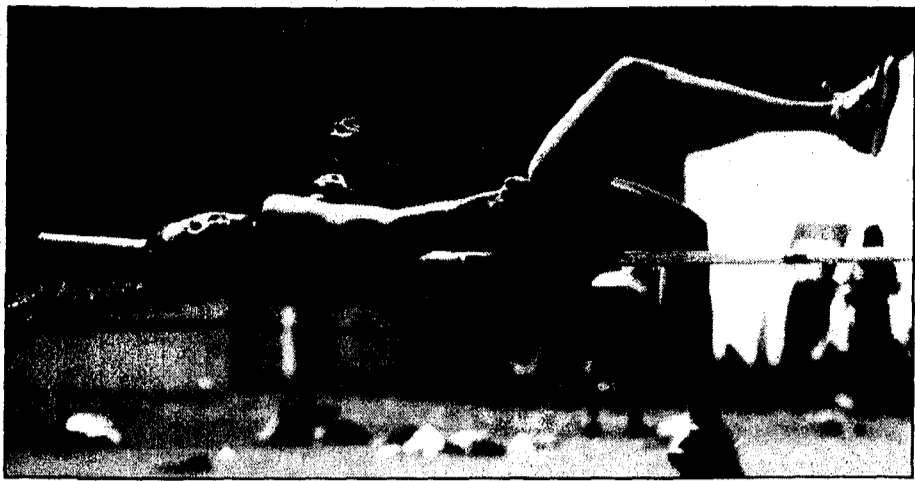

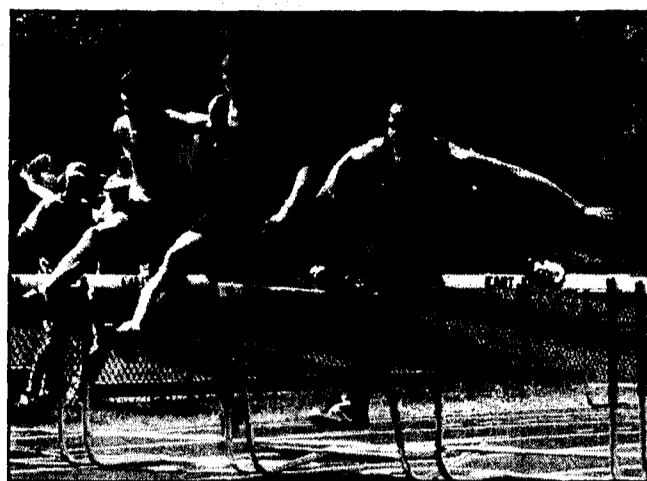

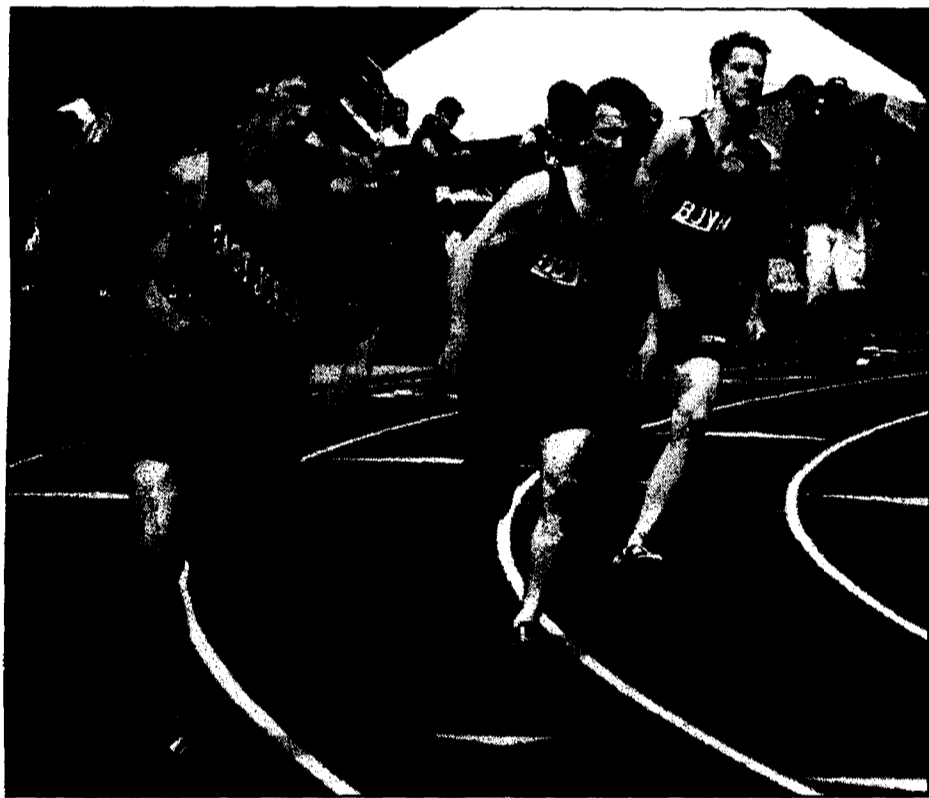
East Jordan's Ken Slough (center) placed fourth in the 110M hurdles. Slough took first in the discus and second in the shot put event.
