### BC School Board to hold special meeting

The Boyne City Board of Education will be holding a special meeting on Wednesday, July 25, as an open forum to assist the board in creating a profile to be used in advertising for an interim superintendent.

Char-Ed Superintendent Mark Eckhardt will be facilitating the meeting, and the public is encouraged to attend.

The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the lower level of the Boyne District Library.

Current interim superintendent Mary Jason was installed by the board last month on a temporary basis, to fill the role until an official interim could be found.

The board hopes to have an official interim in place as soon as possible, and plans to begin the search for a permanent superintendent for the district in early 2002.

The position became available in June of this year, after former superintendent Dana Compton, who had already tendered his resignation effective June 2002, accepted a buyout offer from the school board for the remainder of his contract.

### Boyne school physicals to be held Aug. 4

Boyne City Public Schools will hold annual athletic physicals on Aug. 4, from 8:30 a.m.-noon at the Boyne City Middle School.

Any student in grades 5-12 wishing to participate in athletics through the school is required to have a physical.

As in the past, all local doctors have been invited to participate in the physicals. Students should bring any insurance information and any special medical history information.

Coaches and referees are always needed, and training is available for volunteers who would like to learn more about soccer.

Players age 11-13 also have the opportunity to play on separate boys and girls travel teams.

## Polish Festival prepares for showtime

In its 27th year, the Boyne Falls Polish Festival promises once again to deliver the big family fun it's earned a reputation for. Scheduled this year for Aug. 2-5, the festival will feature all the favorite activities folks know and love, along with plenty of food to satisfy every appetite.

Thursday is Oldies Night in the tent with live music from 7-11 p.m. featuring the Fabulous Oldies But Goodies Band. Arnold Amusements will open the carnival on Thursday evening as well, running through Sunday. Thursday is also the first of a two-night run for the always-popular Flying Star Semi-Pro rodeo.

Youth Day will be held on Friday, with registration at the Boyne Valley Township Fire Hall from 10-10:30 a.m. for kids up to 10 years old. Games will begin at 10:30 a.m., and the day will feature door prize drawings, refreshments, a candy scramble, face painting, and crafts.

For bigger kids, the day has plenty

in store, with music and dancing in the Polka Tent starting at 12 noon and an old time threshing and steam engine show at 1 p.m. The Classic Tractor Pull and rodeo will give folks plenty to fill the evening, with a chance to wind down with the House Lighting Contest viewing by trolley at 9:30 p.m.

Saturday is Family Day, beginning with the 5K cross country run at 8 a.m., and the much-anticipated Grand Royale Parade kicking off at 11 a.m. Other big events for the day include the Heavy Pony/Horse Pull and the Boyne City Rotary Chicken BBQ, along with the continuation of the threshing and steam engine show and, of course, lots of fun at the polka tent.

Designated as Senior Citizens Day, Sunday will hold more family fun, including a horseshoe pitching tournament, and a four-wheel drive mud run.

Concessions will be available throughout the weekend, including

booths set up by the freshman, sophomore, junior and senior classes from Boyne Falls Public School. Proceeds from the students' booths will benefit their respective senior class trips to Hawaii.

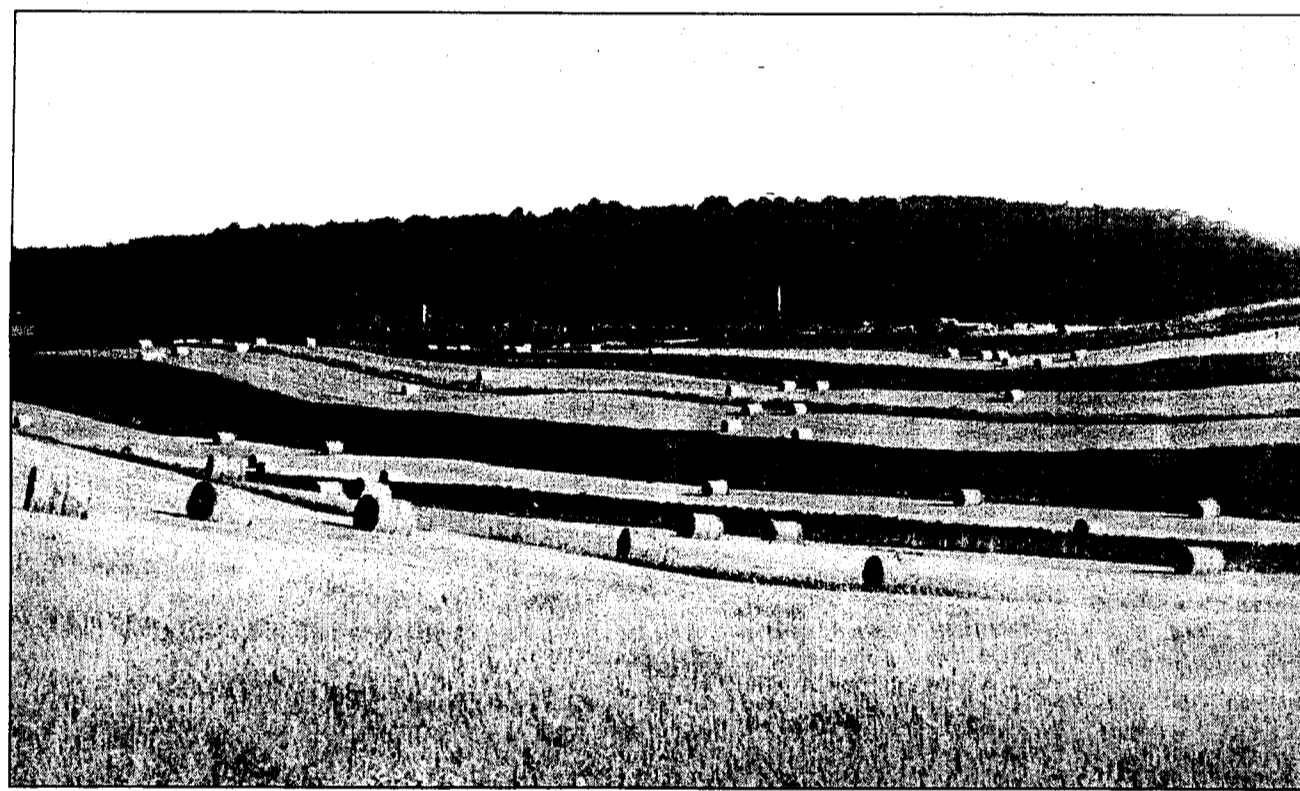


Keylee Wilson and Brandyn Reynolds have been selected as Little Miss and Little Mister for this year's festival.

## Remainder of EJ Main Street project to begin this week

The East Jordan City Commission voted last week to retain Capital Consultants for construction engineering services for the Main Street project. Capital Consultants previously served as the design engineer for the project.

According to city administrator David White, though the bid of \$46,100 is approximately \$10,000 more than a proposal received in 1999 as part of the design phase, the project has changed and expanded with the addition of more work along Division Street.

The project is set to include new water and sewer lines, sidewalks, streetlights, and parking along the west side of Main Street, from Garfield to Division.

With the work schedule approved by the Michigan Department of Transportation, construction is slated to begin this week, with an ending date of Oct. 5.

Capital Consultants representative Richard Beaupre stated at the meeting that the company is predicting about 10 weeks of full-time construction.

One lane of traffic will be maintained throughout the construction project.

During the meeting, the commission also approved the purchase of 21 new street lights for Main Street as part of the reconstruction project.

"By purchasing [the lights] direct,

[the city] is saving approximately \$20,000 on what was budgeted," White said. The total cost of the lights is \$31,728. The lights are similar in style to the street lights already installed on the completed portion of Main Street.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, citizen Clair Batterbee brought concerns about water to his home on Echo Street to the commission, stating that his water had an offensive odor. Commissioner Bernard Hammond said that he was aware of other areas in the city with the same problem, including his own home.

The commission, as well as the administration, agreed to look into the matter.

The commission also approved a request from the East Jordan Chamber of Commerce requesting the closing of one block of Main Street, from Mill to Esterly, on Aug. 17 and 18 from 8 a.m.-6 p.m. for Sidewalk Sales.

In conjunction with that request, the commission also approved the use of Memorial Park and the adjacent parking lot for registration, photos, award presentation, and display for the first-ever Lady Biker Day (Saturday, Aug. 18), as well as the use of the Civic Center for the event in case of rain, with a waiver of the regular rental fee.



The Parade of Power will take place at 2 p.m. each day of the show.

Currently more than 650 tickets will be distributed to needy children throughout Charlevoix County to attend either the afternoon or early evening performance.

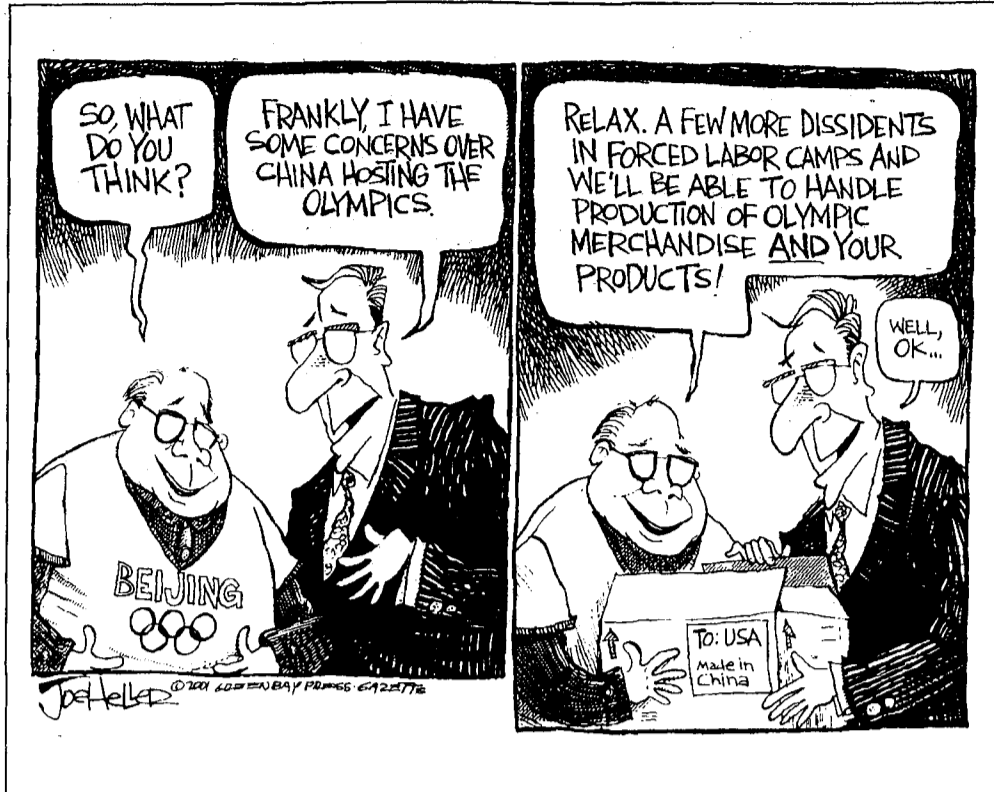

### Josh White Jr. appearing at Aten Place on Saturday

Josh White Jr. will bring his unique and varied talents once again to the Concerts in the Barn series at Aten Place on Saturday, July 28.

White is a guitarist, vocalist, and songwriter who works in folk/blues, pop and jazz, as well as an actor, teacher, social activist, and recording artist who performs concerts for both children and adults.

Since his first public appearance at the age of

four, on stage with his father, singer/guitarist/actor/social leader Josh White Sr., at New York's "Cafe Society" night club, White has hammered out a career in his own right on radio and television, as well as on Broadway and in concert halls and nightclubs around the world.

White has had many high points in his varied career, including a special Tony Award as "Best Child Actor" in 1949 for "How Long Till Summer," as well as guest starring on numerous TV shows and a 40-plus year recording career, including the Grammy-nominated instrumental jazz album Jazz Ballads & Blues.

He has also appeared on television variety and talk shows around the world, and, as a concert artist, has performed on some of the world's greatest stages, including the Kennedy Center, Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Odeon Hammersmith Hall, and Madison Square Garden.

In recent years, White has focused on doing children and family concerts, including school concerts for grades K-4, as well as a music/lecture session on his father for grades 5-12.

He has also appeared on the Nickelodeon Network and, along with friend Ron Coden, hosted the PBS special "Josh and Ron's Family Adventure."

The concert at Aten Place will begin at 7:30 p.m. Aten Place is located one half mile south of Cherry Hill Road on Old Mackinaw Trail in Boyne Falls. Aten Place concerts are non-profit events; the cost for admission is a \$6 donation at the door, to compensate performers. No food or beverage is available for sale on the premises, but guests are encouraged, though not required, to bring an appetizer or treat to share.

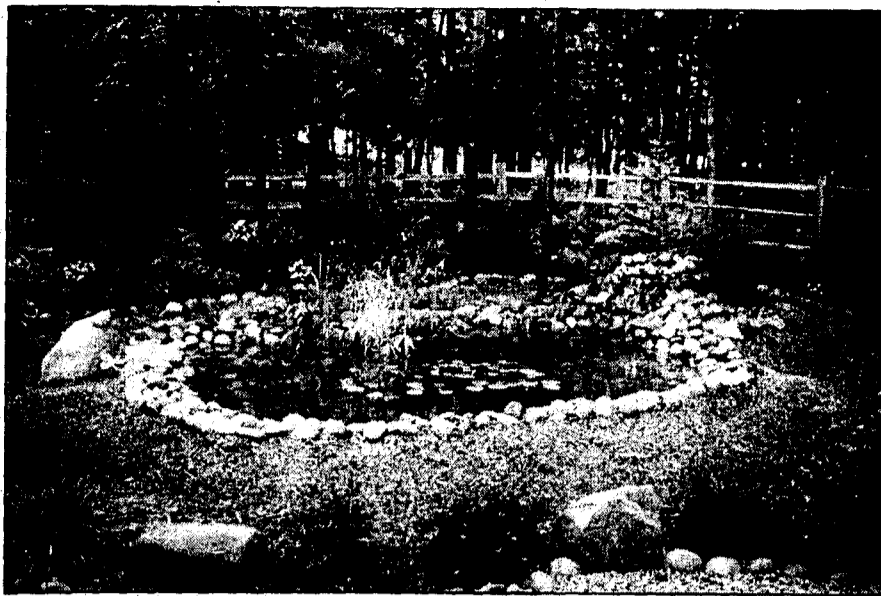

# Eta Nu Home Tour

The eighth annual Eta Nu Home and Yacht Tour will take place on Friday, Aug. 3, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The tour features five homes and a 50-foot yacht. Three of the homes are located on or near Lake Charlevoix between Charlevoix and Boyne City while the remaining two homes are in Boyne City within walking distance of the Harborage Marina. The 50-foot Viking motor yacht is docked at the Harborage Marina on Lake Charlevoix in Boyne City.

Tickets are priced at \$15 each, and are available in Boyne City at The White Rose, Boyne Country Books, Huff's Pharmacy and the Boyne District Library; in East Jordan at the E.J. Shoppe; in Petoskey at the Chamber of Commerce and McLean & Eakin Booksellers; and in Charlevoix at the Appletree.

The rest of the house is built from Tennessee nine-foot yellow pine and is a standard Jim Barna log home plan. The full porch and garage are major modifications to the design. The rustic interior is lodge style and the decor reflects the family's varied interests, such as Betsey's handmade quilts throughout the house. The window treatments, duvets and bed skirts are also her creations.

Follow the walkway through the cedar woods down to the beach area where you will find a miniature version of their home, a grass-roofed beach house which offers a perfect respite from the sun.

## The Mueller Yacht

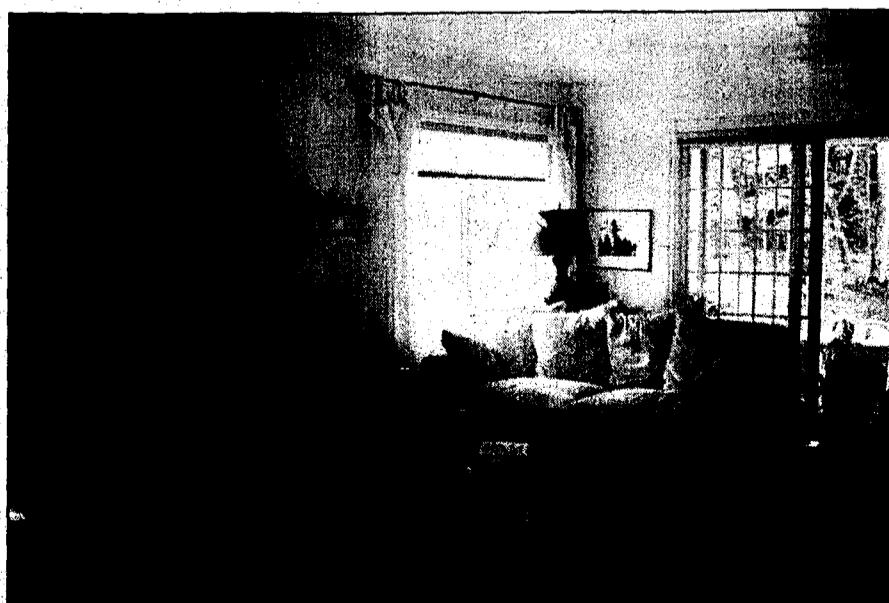

of Matelski Lumber, Co., a family business that he started with his brothers, and that is still going strong, with plenty of help from the Matelski's sons.

Raising seven sons and one daughter, all of whom still live nearby, the Matelskis have certainly played their part in building the Boyne Falls community. Their business has grown with the family, with an office in Wisconsin and logging operations in the Upper Peninsula. The home base, though, is indisputably Boyne Falls.

Marge, though primarily a homemaker, also had her hand in the business, working in the office for Ed and his brothers. That eventually came to an end. One day, she'd just had enough, she said, and so she went to Ed and his brother and told them she was quitting. "They said, 'you can't do that,'" Marge laughs now, but she did anyway. While they talk of an excursion to Las Vegas, one of their favorite places, it's clear that they have plenty to keep them coming home to Boyne Falls.

The Polish Festival, for example, has always been a part of their lives. Years ago, they'd volunteered to help out, and now most often attend just to enjoy the parade and many other events. In fact, said Marge, they have to go to the parade, because with 24 grandkids and four great-grandkids, more often than not "there's usually somebody in the family in it."

This year, though, Ed and Marge will be the ones waving as they travel down the parade route. And they'll have plenty of family members and friends, no doubt, waving right back.

**HONORED CITIZEN** William Kondrat would rather not talk about his qualifications to receive that particular designation. He can think of, he said, "a lot of other individuals" who would deserve the honor as much, if not more. The festival com-

For all his contributions, though, Kondrat is modest. "I'm not here to brag about myself," he said matter-of-factly.

"Hard work don't kill nobody. Dirt washes off."

He is, however, not shy about singing the praises of his community and fellow volunteers. The wonderful thing about the festival, he said, is "it takes everybody, volunteers to do it. Some give 15 minutes, some a day. But that's why it runs so smooth. Everybody does their jobs."

The women, he's careful to note only partially tongue-in-check, "orga-

# Deputy, EJ officer earn honor for service

Each year the Michigan Sheriffs' Association recognizes deputy sheriffs in the State of Michigan who have accomplished outstanding service to the citizens in their county.

Sheriff Lasater presented the Michigan Sheriffs' Association award to his son at the annual Michigan Sheriffs' Association conference in Midland in front of 60 sheriffs from Michigan. Sheriff Lasater has also recommended Reece and Alward for recognition through the National Sheriffs' Association, which is expected within the next month.

## LADY BIKER DAY ORGANIZERS HAVE FOUND THAT It takes many hands

Putting on a major community event takes many people putting in many hours of hard work, as Dawn Johnson found out when she began organizing Lady Biker Day.

"There are a lot of people involved in making this a successful day," Johnson says.

She has been very lucky to have the support of her many volunteers in her efforts to promote lady bikers by organizing a day just for them.

Lady Biker Day will take place on Aug. 18, and many activities are in store for the participants. To start the day, the bikers will be going on a "poker run" around Torch Lake, passing through Central Lake, Ellsworth, Bellaire, Alden, and Elk Rapids before returning to East Jordan.
