BC School Board to hold special meeting

The Boyne City Board of Education will be holding a special meeting on Wednesday, July 25, as an open forum to assist the board in creating a profile to be used in advertising for an interim superintendent.

Char-Em Superintendent Mark Eckhardt will be facilitating the meeting, and the public is encouraged to attend.

The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the lower level of the Boyne District Library.

Current interim superintendent Mary Jason was installed by the board last month on a temporary basis, to fill the role until an official interim could be found.

The board hopes to have an official interim in place as soon as possible, and plans to begin the search for a permanent superintendent for the district in early 2002.

The position became available in June of this year, after former superintendent Dana Compton, who had already tendered his resignation effective June 2002, accepted a buyout offer from the school board for the remainder of his contract.

Boyne school physicals to be held Aug. 4

Boyne City Public Schools will hold annual athlete physicals on Aug. 4, from 8:30 a.m.-noon at the Boyne City Middle School.

Any student in grades 5-12 wishing to participate in athletics through the school is required to have a physical.

As in the past, all local doctors have been invited to participate in the physicals. Students should bring any insurance information and any special medical history information.

Polish Festival prepares for showtime

In its 27th year, the Boyne Falls Polish Festival promises once again to deliver the big family fun it's earned a reputation for. Scheduled this year for Aug. 2-5, the festival will feature all the favorite activities folks know and love, along with plenty of food to satisfy every appetite.

Thursday is Oldies Night in the tent with live music from 7-11 p.m. featuring the Fabulous Oldies But Goodies Band. Arnold Amusements will open the carnival on Thursday evening as well, running through Sunday. Thursday is also the first of a two-night run for the always-popular Flying Star Semi-Pro rodeo.

Youth Day will be held on Friday, with registration at the Boyne Valley Township Fire Hall from 10-10:30 a.m. for kids up to 10 years old. Games will begin at 10:30 a.m., and the day will feature door prize drawings, refreshments, a candy scramble, face painting, and crafts.

For bigger kids, the day has plenty

in store, with music and dancing in the Polka Tent starting at 12 noon and an old time threshing and steam engine show at 1 p.m. The Classic Tractor Pull and rodeo will give folks plenty to fill the evening, with a chance to wind down with the House Lighting Contest viewing by trolley at 9:30 p.m.

Saturday is Family Day, beginning with the 5K cross country run at 8 a.m., and the much-anticipated Grand Royale Parade kicking off at 11 a.m. Other big events for the day include the Heavy Pony/Horse Pull and the Boyne City Rotary Chicken BBQ, along with the continuation of the threshing and steam engine show and, of course, lots of fun at the polka tent.

Designated as Senior Citizens Day, Sunday will hold more family fun, including a horseshoe pitching tournament, and a four-wheel drive mud run.



Remainder of EJ Main Street project to begin this week

The East Jordan City Commission voted last week to retain Capital Consultants for construction engineering services for the Main Street project. Capital Consultants previously served as the design engineer for the project.

According to city administrator David White, though the bid of \$46,100 is approximately \$10,000 more than a proposal received in 1999 as part of the design phase, the project has changed and expanded with the addition of more work along Division Street.

The project is set to include new water and sewer lines, sidewalks, streetlights, and parking along the west side of Main Street, from Garfield to Division.

With the work schedule approved by the Michigan Department of Transportation, construction is slated to begin this week, with an ending date of Oct. 5.

Capital Consultants representative Richard Beaupre stated at the meeting that the company is predicting about 10 weeks of full-time construction

One lane of traffic will be maintained throughout the construction project.

During the meeting, the commission also approved the purchase of 21 new street lights for Main Street as part of the reconstruction project.

"By purchasing [the lights] direct,

[the city] is saving approximately \$20,000 on what was budgeted," White said. The total cost of the lights is \$31,728. The lights are similar in style to the street lights already installed on the completed portion of Main Street.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, citizen Clair Batterbee brought concerns about water to his home on Echo Street to the commission, stating that his water had an offensive odor. Commissioner Bernard Hammond said that he was aware of other areas in the city with the same problem, including his own home.

The commission, as well as the administration, agreed to look into the matter

The commission also approved a request from the East Jordan Chamber of Commerce requesting the closing of one block of Main Street, from Mill to Esterly, on Aug. 17 and 18 from 8 a.m.-6 p.m. for Sidewalk Sales.

In conjunction with that request, the commission also approved the use of Memorial Park and the adjacent parking lot for registration, photos, award presentation, and display for the first-ever Lady Biker Day (Saturday, Aug. 18), as well as the use of the Civic Center for the event in case of rain, with a waiver of the regular rental fee.



The Parade of Power will take place at 2 p.m. each day of the show.

Your support to these kinds of programs does make a difference. Role models are so important in shaping the values of young people. How gratifying to know that the ticket you sponsored could change the direction of a child's



I can certainly, without a doubt, say that I have never seen an athlete with poorer sportsmanship than some of the parents who come to the games. Even Charles Barkley had more respect for his opponents than some parents do for their children's opponents.

Of course, I realize that not all parents behave this way, and I am thankful for those who don't. If all parents were this verbally and mentally abusive to their children, it would be a sad world for us all.

The point is, if we want children to be confident in themselves and learn to respect themselves and others, we all need to pitch in and show them how it's done.

Eta Nu Home Tour

In any season, this home has a warm and inviting atmosphere for family and friends to gather and enjoy the retirement life with Bill and Helen.


The Mueller Yacht

of Matelski Lumber, Co., a family business that he started with his brothers, and that is still going strong, with plenty of help from the Matelski's

Raising seven sons and one daughter, all of whom still live nearby, the Matelskis have certainly played their part in building the Boyne Falls community. Their business has grown with the family, with an office in Wisconsin and logging operations in the Upper Peninsula. The home base, though, is indisputably Boyne Falls.

Marge, though primarily a homemaker, also had her hand in the business, working in the office for Ed and his brothers. That eventually came to an end. Later, she said, "I got to thinking, I bet I can draw unemployment." She went to the unemployment office to sign up, and when queried as to why she left, she told the woman there that she'd been working with her husband and two brothers-in-law. "She said, 'How'd you stand it that long?' and signed me up,"

Ed said with a grin.

But it's not likely that she will be back in the office anytime soon. With the kids taking over most of the aspects of the business, Marge and Ed, who recently celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary, are looking forward to retirement and the chance to travel and enjoy their family. While they talk of an excursion to Las Vegas, one of their favorite places, it's clear that they have plenty to keep them coming home to Boyne Falls.

The Polish Festival, for example, has always been a part of their lives. Years ago, they'd volunteered to help out, and now most often attend just to enjoy the parade and many other events. In fact, said Marge, they have to go to the parade, because with 24 grandkids and four great-grandkids, more often than not "there's usually somebody in the family in it."


Kondrat is employed with Town and Country Homes, but has also spent time working in other businesses outside of town, and has traveled all over the world, including Japan and Switzerland.

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

Each year the Michigan Sheriffs' Association recognizes deputy sheriffs in the State of Michigan who have accomplished outstanding service to the citizens in their county.

Deputy sheriff Lasater and officer Reece were recommended for the


