



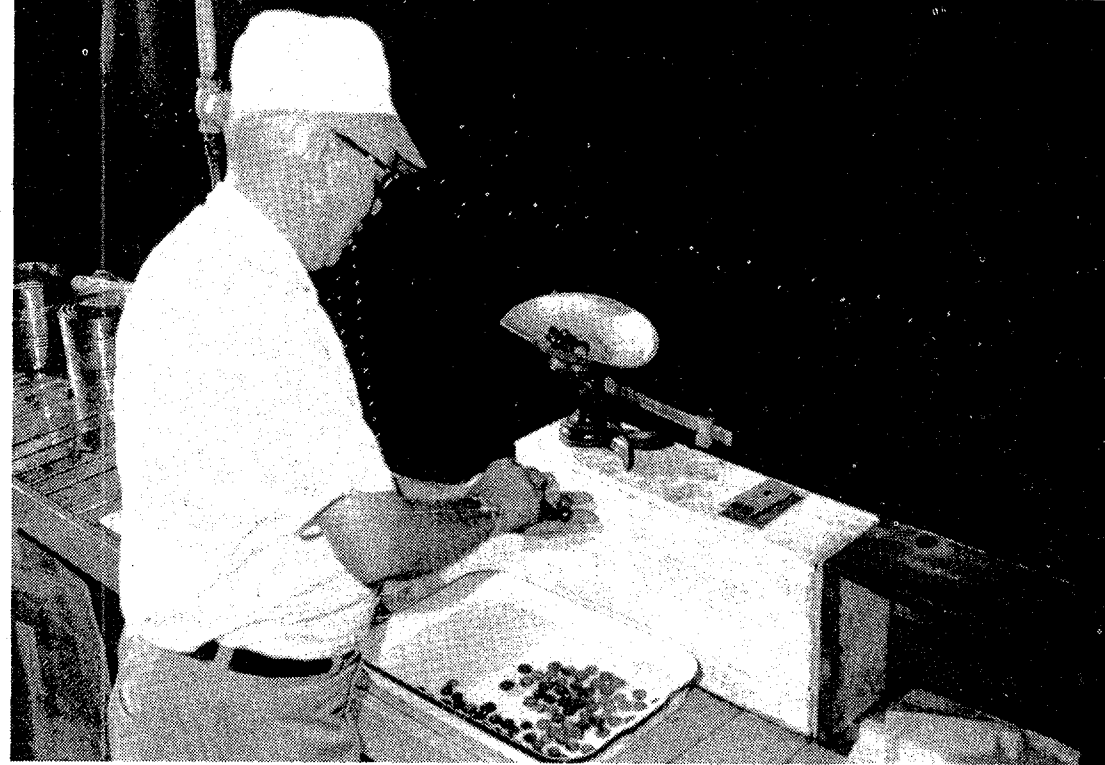

The journey's a long one for local cherries

The journey from the top of a sprawling tree to the head of the table is a long one for a little cherry! Picked, poked, pitted and packed, Michigan's sour and sweet cherries run the gamut before they are quietly laid to rest in your favorite pie.

Professional pickers, kids earning school clothing money, and Moms helping the budget are all now in the trees at Sherman's Orchards between Boyne City and East Jordan. Up and down 10' ladders from early in the morning right through the hot afternoons, the pickers fill 16 quart lug after lug for 80¢ each - 90¢ if they stay the full season - and all they can eat, which has no appeal at all after the first day.

At the beginning of the week each picker is given a card to keep track of the number of lugs picked. Walking through the orchard there's a busy atmosphere with music from portable radios and chatter as hands swiftly pluck the fruit and drop it in waist-high pails held by a harness. Little children are busy playing in playpens under the shady trees while the rest of the family stacks the lugs to be picked up by a tractor, at which time they are given a small ticket for each lug. At the end of the day the tickets are turned in and the number of lugs recorded on the weekly card. Professional pickers can pick as many as 30 lugs a day, while the average local person will pick about 15 lugs. Sherman's have about 14,000 trees, yielding about 8 lugs each. The season lasts only 3 - 5 weeks, so the 200 pickers each

day are kept plenty busy. Some of the cherries are harvested by a new automatic shaker which grasps the main limbs, giving them a good shake. Cherries rain down into large tilted canvas screens and roll down to a conveyor belt which carries them up to a bin - all in two minutes!

When the bins of cherries arrive at the East Jordan Cannery, they are weighed before a State Inspector grades them according to size, color and defects. Lines of girls sit on each side of a conveyor belt and sort out defective cherries before they drop in the round slots of one of the five pitting machines. As the drums revolve around, the pits are automatically pierced out and they travel on down to the filling tables where girls stuff them in institution-size cans and check the weight. Cans ride through a 50' steaming exhaust box to remove the air before reaching the closing machine where lids are smashed on.

Cans are stacked in large, round metal racks and lowered into boiling water kettles to cook for 12 minutes before being plunged into cold water. Labels are applied in the brick warehouse where the institution size cans are stored to be sold to wholesalers, Uncle Sam, bakeries and also exporters. Approximately 300,000 cans of Charlevoix County cherries travel all over the United States - and the world! Some stay right here at home. Maybe those little bright red cherries that paid for your school clothes will be half way around the world before you start school!

Lansing - Preliminary research indicates that it still only takes ordinary cleaning and cooking steps to make all Michigan fish -- from panfish to salmon -- safe for eating, reports the Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

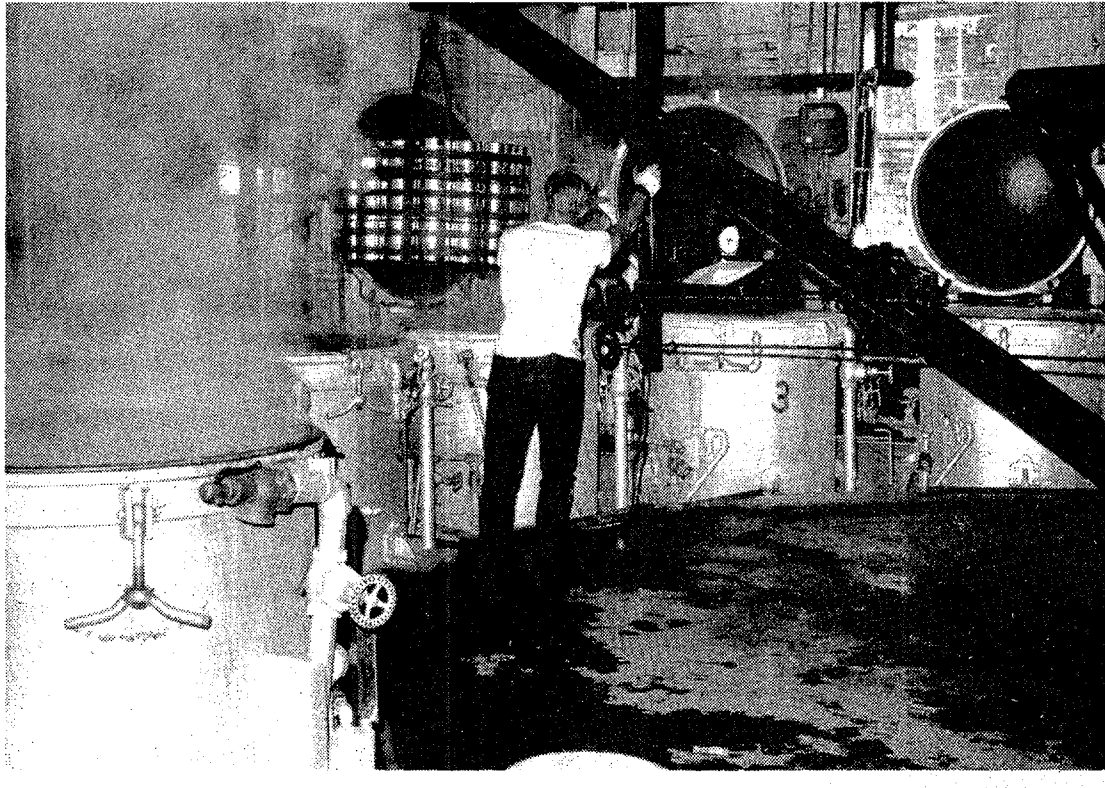
The evidence at hand, gleaned from laboratory studies by Michigan State University and the U. S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries (BCF), should come as good news to the state's sport fishermen who are expected to land about one million pounds of salmon from the Great Lakes this fall.

For several months, Michigan's salmon fishery has been shrouded by a pesticide scare which ballooned when more than 30,000 pounds of frozen coho from Lake Michigan were taken off the market because they contained too much DDT.

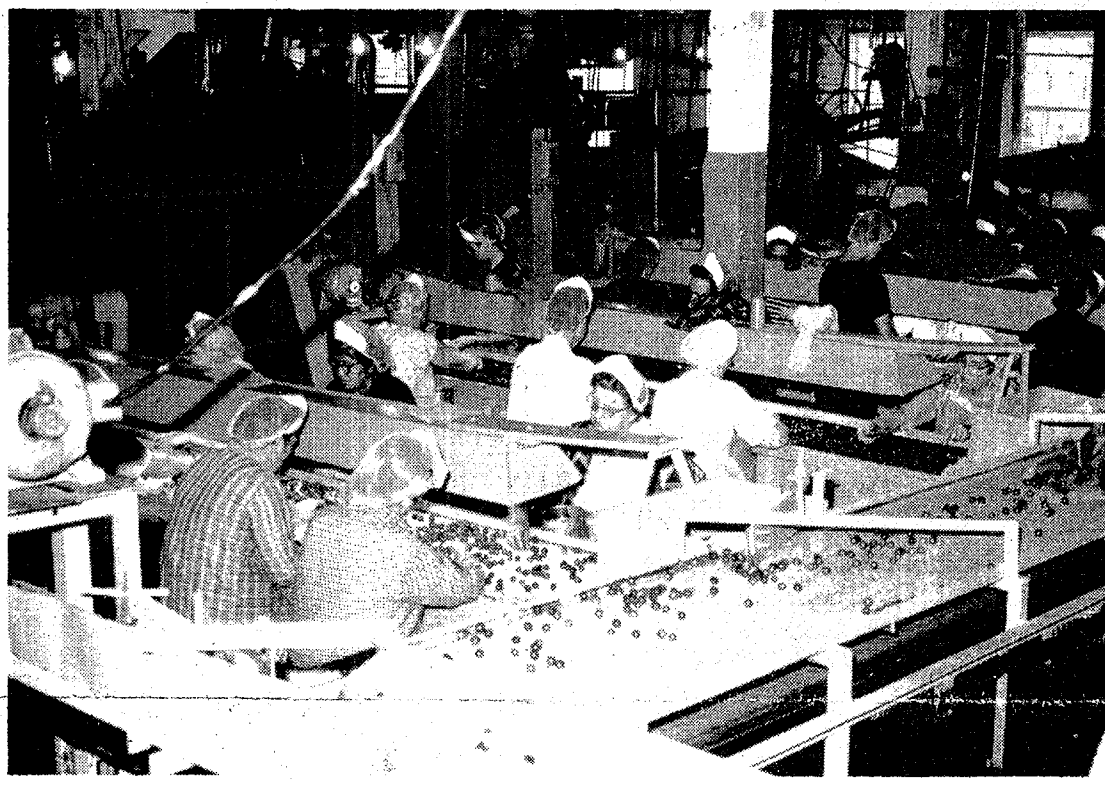
Shortly after that, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration set an interim DDT limit of 5 parts per million (ppm) for the edible part of fish market-bound through interstate channels.

The FDA's action triggered studies to learn if and how fish could have their DDT residues brought under that level and, thus, make them considered fit for the table in the minds of housewives and their families. MSU scientists tested adult coho taken from the Little Manistee River last fall by cooking the fish in many ways known to anglers -- pan frying, deep-fat frying, poaching, baking, broiling, and broiling in foil jackets.

Samples measured afterward showed that every one of these

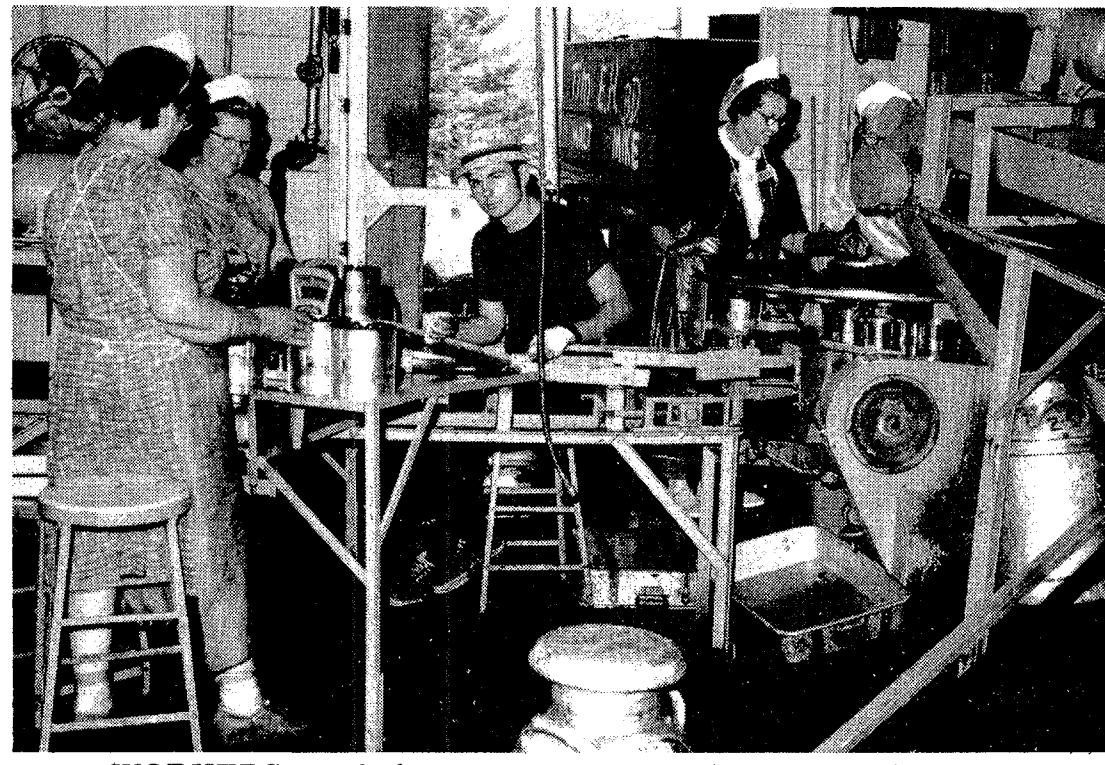


AN operator removes cans of cherries from a cooker, then plunges them into cold water.

WORKERS stuff cherries into cans, then weigh them.

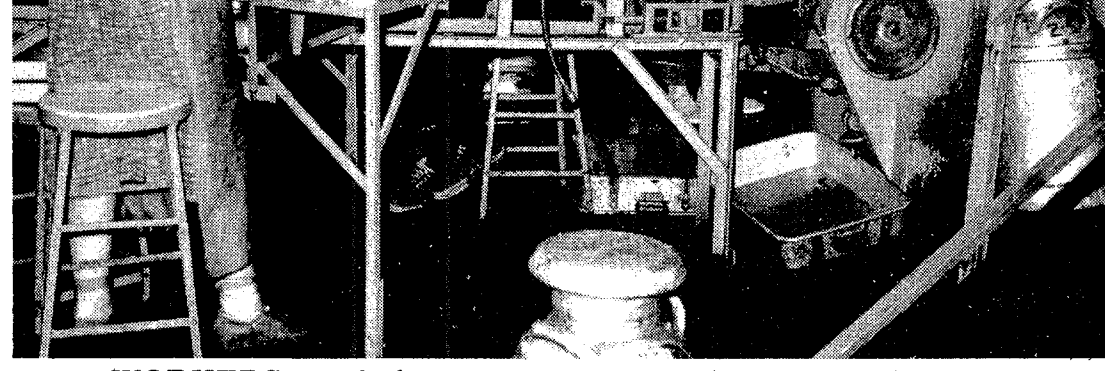


LIDS are automatically stamped on cans of cherries before cooking.

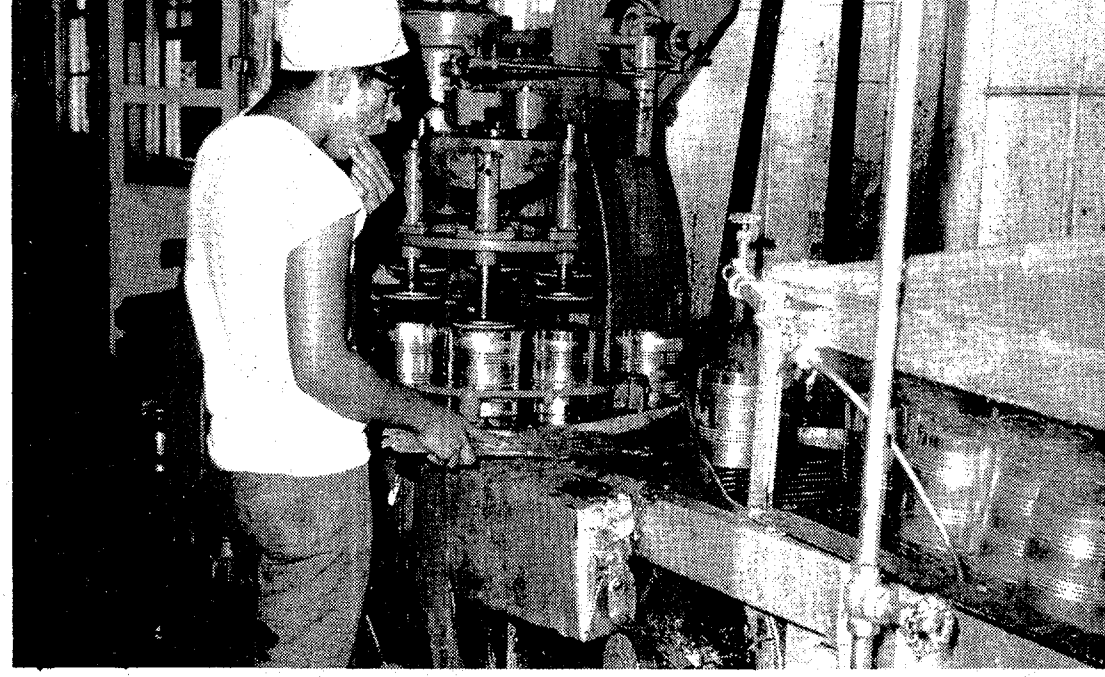

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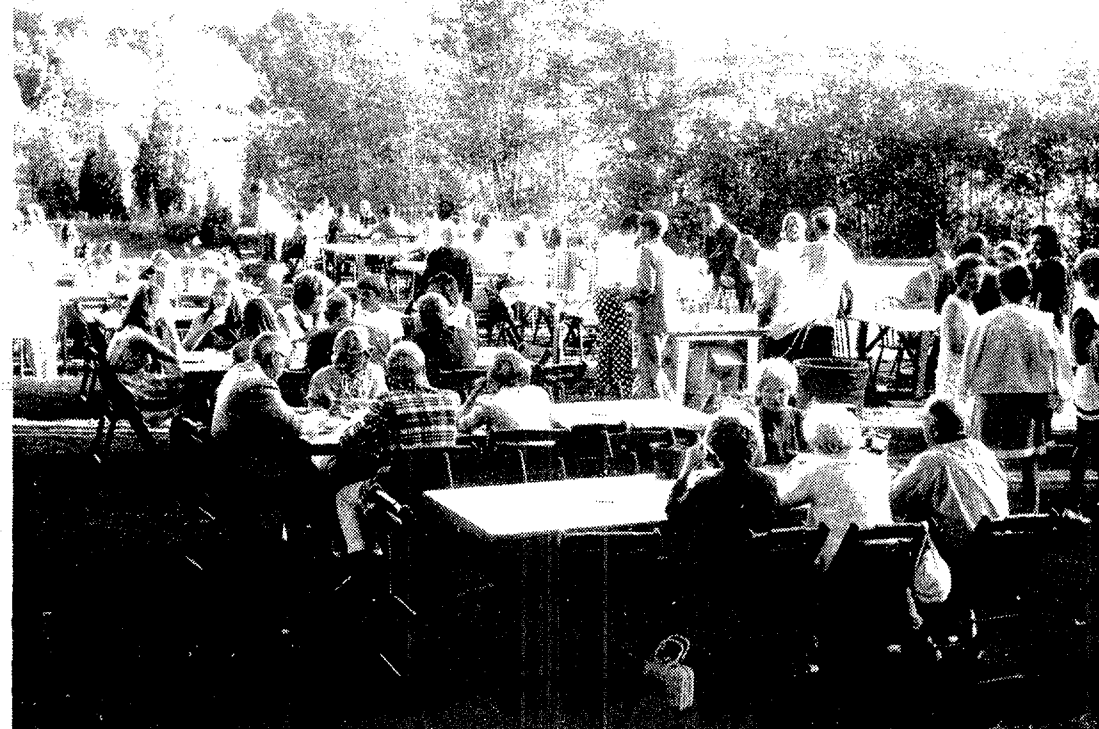

Six recent seizures of 57 pounds of hashish arriving in the United States mails points up the increased use of this method of attempted smuggling. 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Coho runs twice as big as last fall

Salmon fishermen and salmon watchers are expected to be twice as numerous this year as last along the Great Lakes to give Michigan its busiest fall tourism season, according to the Automobile Club of Michigan.

The anticipated increased interest in Michigan-brand salmon is due mainly to four factors: Michigan will have its first mature chinook (King) salmon runs this fall.

Mature coho runs up four streams feeding into Lake Huron will take place for the first time.

Almost twice as many streams are expecting coho runs this fall as compared with a year ago. With more streams expecting salmon, there will be added areas where spectators can watch the salmon being mechanically harvested at weirs and trucked away commercially.

Mature chinook -- weighing an average of 15 pounds -- will be caught for the first time in this state as they prepare to make spawning runs up the Big Huron River in Lake Superior and the Little Manistee and Muskegon Rivers in Lake Michigan.

Coho will be taken from Lakes Michigan, Superior and Huron where 21 streams were stocked with coho during spring, 1968 -- almost twice the number streams with mature runs last fall. (The accompanying Auto Club map shows the areas where coho and chinook have been planted and where salmon are expected to run this fall.)

A few coho jacks will be taken from the Sturgeon River in Lake Superior and the Big Cedar, St. Joseph, Manistique, Kalamazoo and Grand Rivers in Lake Michigan which were stocked for the first time this spring.

"Few chinook taken this year will go over 20 pounds," states Jerry E. Fisher, Auto Club's touring manager. "Coho hooked will weigh anywhere from 8 to 18 pounds."

The largest recorded coho caught in Michigan weighed 21 pounds and was 32 inches long. It was hooked in Lake Michigan near Manistee in September, 1967.

Chinook usually mature at four years old as compared with three years for coho salmon. However, a few precocious chinook are expected to make spawning runs at three years old. It is expected that some salmon will not attempt upstream runs until they are five years old.

Although the only three-year-old chinook expected to be caught this year will come from Lakes Michigan and Superior, some Lake Huron chinook will be taken as they gather to spawn as two-year "jacks at the Ocoqueoc River near Huron Beach and the Thunder Bay River at Alpena. Early chinook runs are also expected near Lake Superior's Cherry Creek, at Marquette.

Last year, chinook were released for the first time in Thunder Bay River which empties into Lake Huron and the Anna River which empties into Lake Superior.

Salmon fishing begins to peak in August when the giant salmon gather for spawning runs at the mouths of streams in which they were planted. The runs extend through early November. (Coho season ends December 31 on most small streams while it is allowed year-around on major rivers and the Great Lakes.)

Coho can literally blacken the water when they make upstream runs but are difficult to hook once in streams. Most productive coho fishing is done off the mouth of streams or in bays and along shorelines adjacent to spawning streams.

"Last year was disappointing for many coho fishermen," states Fisher. "The best fishing occurred before Labor Day and fishermen who waited until then to try their luck missed out on the best action."

Rough waters on Lake Michigan also kept many fishermen on shore last fall and warm weather forced the coho into deep water where they remained undetected.

With mature coho now available on both sides of the state and in almost twice as many areas as last fall, we expect less pressure at past popular locations with more fish caught than previously," adds Fisher.

He points out that East Michigan anglers will probably have more fishing days available to them because Lake Huron is usually less turbulent than Lake Michigan in fall.

Strong winds often lash the relatively exposed Lake Michigan coast, making fishing a difficult if not some times dangerous sport. The Grand Traverse Bay area, however, is expected to give West Michigan salmon fishermen sheltered water.

Although it does not advise fishing for coho from anything smaller than an 18-foot boat on the Great Lakes, the Auto Club points out that a large boat is no substitute for wise seamanship. Since coho are often fished five miles from shore, fishermen should keep a watchful eye on the weather.

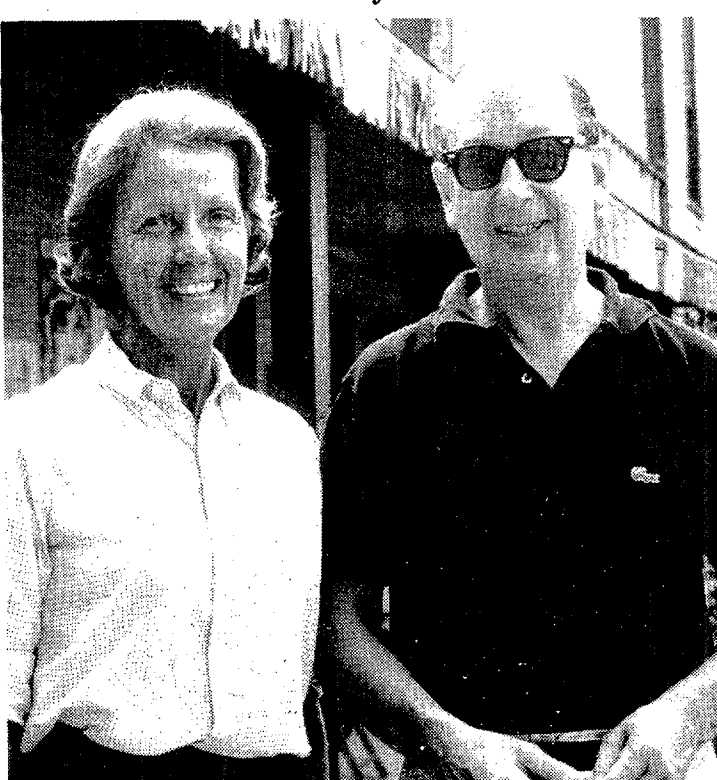

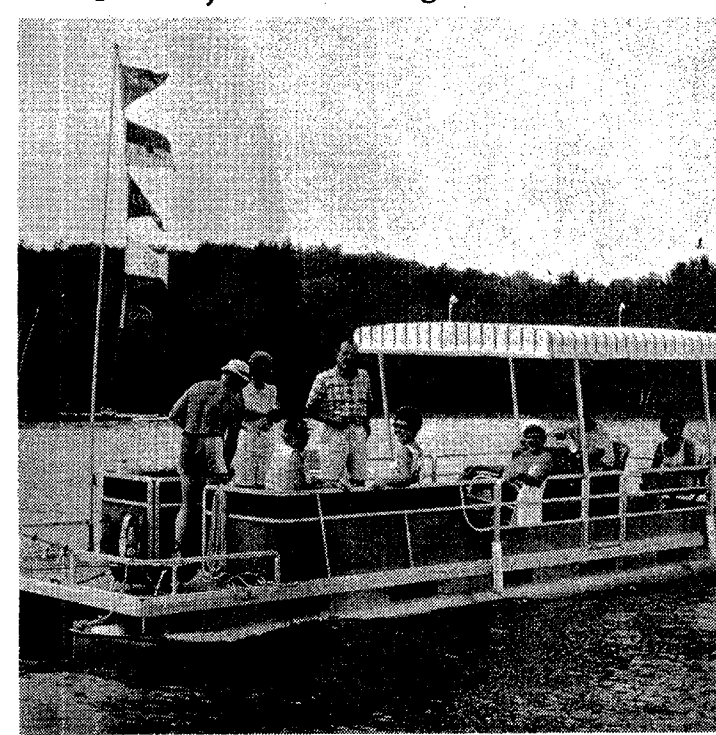
