

He bares no rancor toward the United States for sending him off to a war, thousands of miles across barren oceans, "I learned a thing about war. It's better to wage a war on someone else's soil, than it would be in our

own backyard. about the war in Viet Nam, now- kind of does for me. It keeps City. ever.

"There were times when we were allowed to fire back, and times when we were ordered not to shoot and not to kill anyone. I never could undersand the sense in that. Or why we fight the war according to the rules laid down by the South Vietnamese. We should fight it our way.

"This is the longest war in the smallest country that the United States ever fought a war in. and we can't win it.

We conquered the Japanese in less time; we were only in Korea about 3 years.

"If 'they' would go in and let us fight, we could get the war over, I feel.

"Sometimes, over there, it would be peaceful and quiet, and all of a sudden our artillery would open up and start laying shells into big fields and into the jungles. "When we'd ask what the shoot-

ing was all about, they'd tell us that they were just throwing a scare into enemy infiltrators. "But there were a lot of other times when the enemy was laying it into us, and the artillery was always late in showing up. "This always seemed peculiar to me."

Carlton has purchased some land near Walloon Lake. The government will allow him \$12,500 toward construction, of a home provided it is of the proper type for a paraplegic, equipped with ramps, and with all appliance outlets and fixtures at suitable heights so they can be operated from a wheel chair.

He gets an initial allowance of \$1,600 for his first auto; he draws \$117 from the social securityadministration as a disabled veteran, and his pension is \$700 monthly.

"My plight isn't sobad, in view of the security I have," Carlton quickly admits. What he leaves unsaid is that he'd like to swap security for a couple of legs -- the kind he had before
