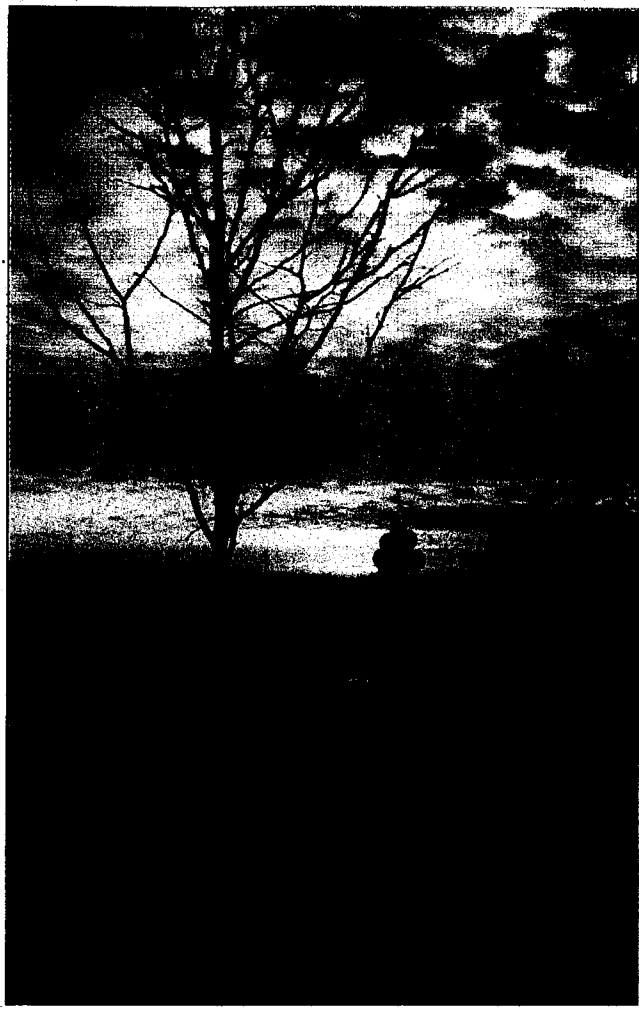
Parent Teacher Conferences will also be held on Thursday, March 7, from 5-9 p.m. A full day of school is scheduled for students on that day.

## River walk ready to go

The Boyne City Downtown Development Authority recently approved a bid from H&D, Inc. for construction of the Boyne City Riverwalk, signaling the beginning of the long-awaited project.

After receiving the building permit from the Army Corps of Engineers in October, the request for bids on the project was made. Bids were opened last week, with H&D coming in with the lowest of the six received, with a total amount of \$361,352.35, about \$1,300 over the estimated construction cost of \$360,000. According to city manager Eric Strahl, the bid was reviewed by the project architects at Beckett & Raeder, and was recommended for approval.

Other bids received were: Tri-County Excavating, Harbor Springs, \$369,750; Robert T. Cole, Inc., Traverse City, \$390,526; R.B. Lyons, Inc., Charlevoix, \$423,600; Graham Construction, Inc., Saginaw, \$443,602; and Nationwide/Genesee Fence & Supply Co., Flint, \$462,807.

According to Strahl, the bulk of the project is projected to be completed by Aug. 1, with landscaping and any additional work finished by Oct. 1.

Subcontractors will be utilized for land-

scaping, electrical work, pile driving, installation of brick pavers, and construction of the boardwalk and railing.

Strahl said that signed contract materials will be delivered to Beckett & Raeder this week, and a pre-construction meeting will be held after that. Following the pre-construction meeting, the DDA will schedule an informational meeting for business and property owners along the north side of Water Street affected by the project.

Work is expected to begin in earnest sometime in March, Strahl said.

The Riverwalk project, in the works since the late 1990s, will include a wooden boardwalk to extend from Lake Street to Park Street along the south side of the Boyne River, intended to bring people from the waterfront up through town along the river, to access businesses and city parks.

Fishing platforms are included in the design, along with a guard rail, benches, and lighting.

Plans also include paving the back alley that currently runs along the river.

The project is being funded in part by a 1999 Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund grant in the amount of \$187,926. The rest of the expected \$400,000 price tag will be footed by the DDA.

## Making progress

To those driving by, there may not seem to be much in the way of activity going on at the new Boyne City High School, as work has moved indoors in recent months. Inside, however, the project has made huge strides towards completion, with the project continuing on schedule in preparation for a projected opening in the fall of this year.

Crews had worked hard to get walls and roofs in place before the harsh weather of winter came, and have been pleasantly surprised that winter hasn't turned out to be all that harsh, after all. "No doubt that [the good weather] has helped us out," said project manager Leigh Woodbury of the Christman Company. "We would have worked around [the weather], but there's no doubt not having snow has helped us to stay on schedule."

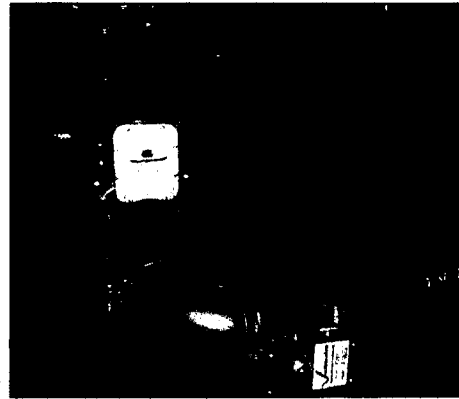
On schedule and on budget have been the status quo throughout the project, along with no big surprises, facts that Christman's Jason Beckman said aren't the case with all projects. "The architects and engineers have done a great job, especially for a job of this size, this complex," Beckman said. "The whole building has been done exceptionally. That's half the battle — if you don't have a good architect

and engineer, it makes our job tough."

Progress on the auditorium is the most impressive to visitors — now fully enclosed, the structure, which lies to the left of the main entry to the building, boasts a curved staircase and facade, along with

## Boyerne Falls School fixes floor problem after 'freak' accident

While the junior varsity athlete injured in a freak accident at Boyne Falls School a couple weeks ago has been recovering nicely, school administrators have put in a little overtime to remedy the problem that caused the incident in the first place.

On Feb. 1, the student was participating in a junior varsity basketball game, when, according to school superintendent Mark Parsons, he slid on the floor while diving for the ball. "He got up and came over to the coach, and said 'I can't catch my breath,'" Parsons said.

The coach checked him out, only to discover that his belly was being poked from the inside "out about an inch, inch and a half," though the skin was not pierced.

At first, a broken rib was the suspected culprit, but when the coach went to inspect the spot on the floor where the injury was sustained, it quickly became clear what had transpired.

"It was a splinter from the floor," Parsons said, "a little over 10 inches long."

After the student was transported by ambulance to Northern Michigan Hospital in Petoskey, it was discovered

that the splinter had glanced around the backside of his ribcage and ended up between muscle and the body cavity. Fortunately, Parsons said, no organs were injured, and surgeons were able to remove the splinter.

"Personally, I visited him the next day, and he was sitting up and chatting," Parsons said.

The student returned to school the following Thursday, Feb. 7, and has a doctor's note which allowed him to return to the court on Feb. 18.

**FOR ADMINISTRATORS**, the next biggest issue, after assuring that the student was going to be okay, was to determine how and why the accident occurred, and to take the necessary measures to eliminate the possibility of future injury.

Along with administrators, coaches, and members of the board of education, the floor was examined by a local building contractor, a local cabinetmaker, representatives of Comstock Construction (who had built the school in 1999-2000), and the company that had originally installed the floor, Keifer Flooring.

In all, 44 areas of concern were identified, with damage determined to have

been caused by a maintenance lift, purchased in July of 2000, that was simply too heavy for the floor to withstand.

According to Parsons, 38 of the problem areas were repaired by routing out the top portion of the board and installing a cap; the other six areas were filled and sealed.

"We feel the problem has been addressed," said Parsons emphatically, who added that he is fully confident that the floor is safe.

In response to some rumors that have circulated since the incident, Parsons noted that the school carries SET/SEG liability insurance, and the accident is indeed covered under the provisions of the policy.

"Things are being taken care of," he said. In addition, rumors that the gym floor was not sealed correctly when installed, are also incorrect, Parsons said. The floor, in fact, did receive the appropriate three coats of sealant when it was installed.

Anyone with questions or concerns is invited to call Parsons or principal Bill Aten at the school, 549-2211. "Bill or I are happy to answer their questions," Parsons said.

They seldom brag unless it's about their grandchild in Little League or a music recital.

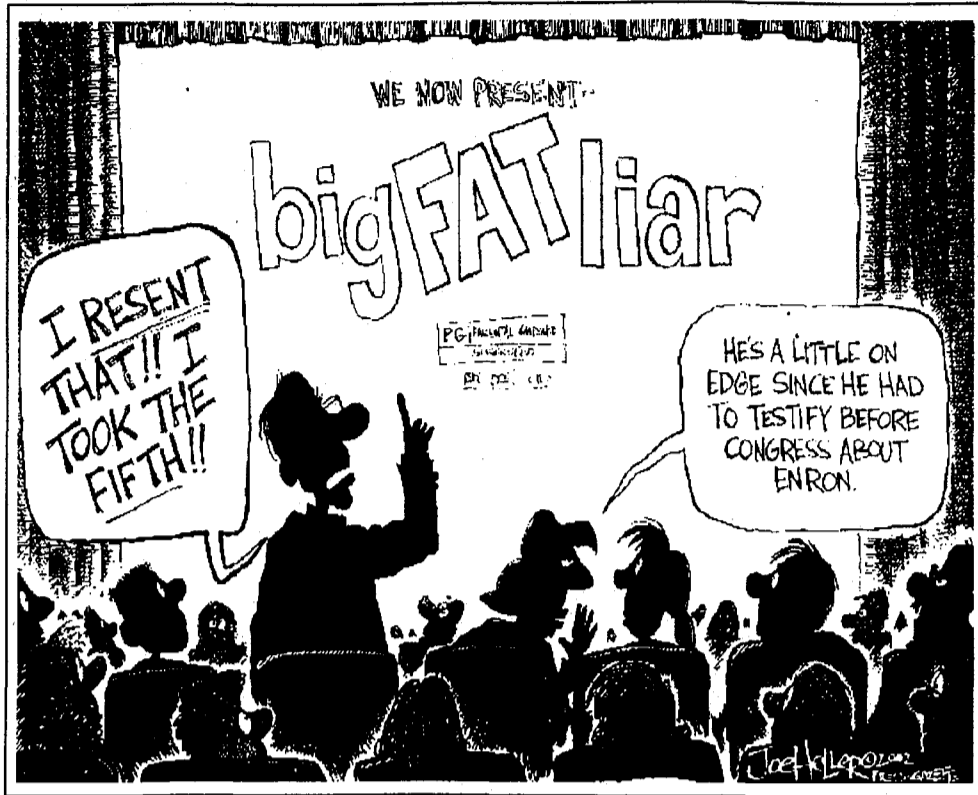
Our country needs Geezers with their decent values and common sense;

### Boyne City utility rates topic at February 26 commission meeting

DURING THE Feb. 26 City Commission meeting Larry Fox, of Capital Consultants will give a report on the Water/Wastewater Study. From this report, it will be determined what steps the city will have to take to make sure our water and wastewater systems meet all state requirements and are in an adequate financial condition to serve Boyne City in the future. Most of you have probably read about upcoming water and sewer rate increases in Petoskey, East Jordan, and other cities. Boyne City is also looking at increases. Please attend the Feb. 26 noon City Commission meeting, ask questions, and provide input to help our city commissioners decide exactly what should be done. This is a very important decision for the future of our town.

DURING THIS period of light snow, the street department has been working on improvements to Taylor Street. This previously undeveloped street is the westerly border to Rotary Park. Making this a through street will provide better ingress and egress, as well as additional parking for the new soccer, baseball and softball fields.

LOU AWODEY, Jeff Wellman, and Jim White were recently reappointed to the Boyne City Downtown Development Authority for four-year terms. Mike Sheehan and Steve Baker were appointed to the Parks and Recreation Commission.

AT THE PARKS and Recreation Commission meeting on Feb. 14, there were two main topics of discussion. The first was snowmobiles at Avalanche. This trail has existed for several years, and the plan was to evaluate snowmobile use after several years of operation. This evaluation process is also important now in light of the planning for the future improvements at Avalanche that are just beginning. There will be further discussion of this topic at the next Parks and Recreation Commission meeting at 7 p.m. on Thursday, March 14, at City Hall. The second topic of discussion was the state requirements for well head protection. As many of you know, the south Boyne wells are located close to the Avalanche parking lots. As the city's development of a well-head protection program to meet state requirements progresses, there will be a need to evaluate and plan for both the current and future development of Avalanche in relation to the need to safeguard the city's drinking water supply.

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# GETTING READY FOR CURTAIN TIME

## BCHS DRAMA DEPARTMENT



Planning to close out 24 years of productions on the elementary school stage with a bang, the Boyne City High School drama department is busy preparing to perform the melodrama, "Little Mary Sunshine." The production will mark the department's final performance at the venue, as the new 600-seat auditorium at the new high school is slated to be complete for the next school year. This will be the last show with folding chairs," director Bob Wollenberg laughed. "We'll have to have a folding chair bonfire sometime."

There's been little time for such in the way of reflection or sentimentality, though. With about 75 kids involved, including 60 cast members and 15 crew, along with a group of dedicated adults from the community, rehearsals, staging, and set preparation have kept everyone busy in recent days.

The musical selected for this year is one that Wollenberg expects will be, simply, a lot of fun. "It's very much 'Dudley Doornight' stuff," Wollenberg said. "It's supposed to be overdone. The crowd can hiss at the bad guy, cheer for Mary. She will get tied to the railroad track." Naturally.

"We're having a lot of fun with it," he said. "It's a major comedy farce."

Set in the Rocky Mountains of Colorado, Mary Sunshine (played by Mallory O'Brien) is the victim of bad guy Snidley Yellowpants (Kevin Paul), who's looking not only to make sure that she loses the mortgage on her property, but also wants to make her his own. "Of course, she hates him," Wollenberg said. Ultimately, the hero, Captain Jim (Jeff Meads), comes to the rescue, and "it all works out in the end."

Other lead players include Betsy Weber as Nancy Twinkle, Katie Grice as Betty Bright, Pat Cassidy as Uncle Oscar, Ted Polleys as Mayor Brownbottom, and Eric VanHorn as Milly Jester.

"We had some really good comedic guys," said Wollenberg of the casting process, as well as "a bevy of super girls."

"The fun thing about doing the genre [melodrama], is that everything is overdone. Mary Sunshine has the back of her hand to her forehead a lot. It's very affected fun."

As always, community support will be

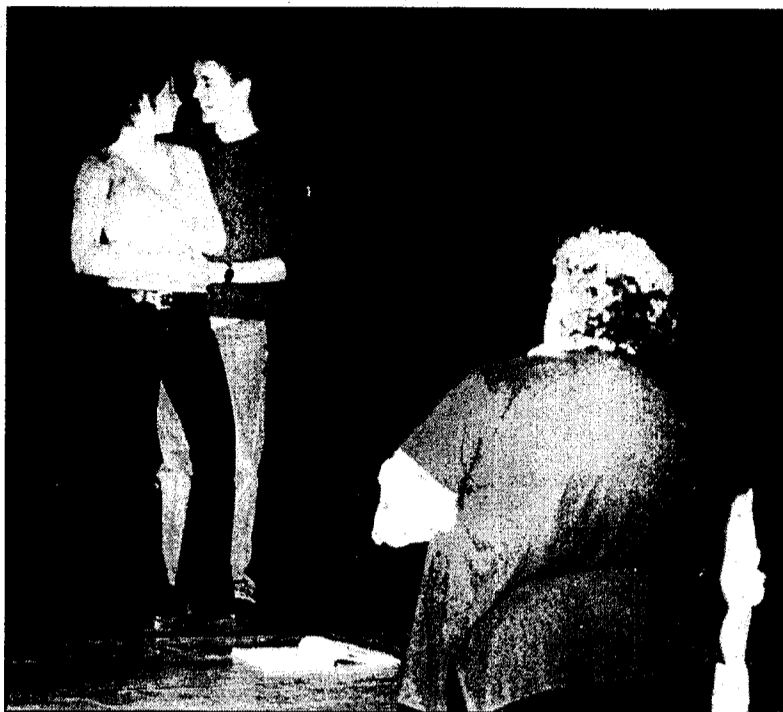

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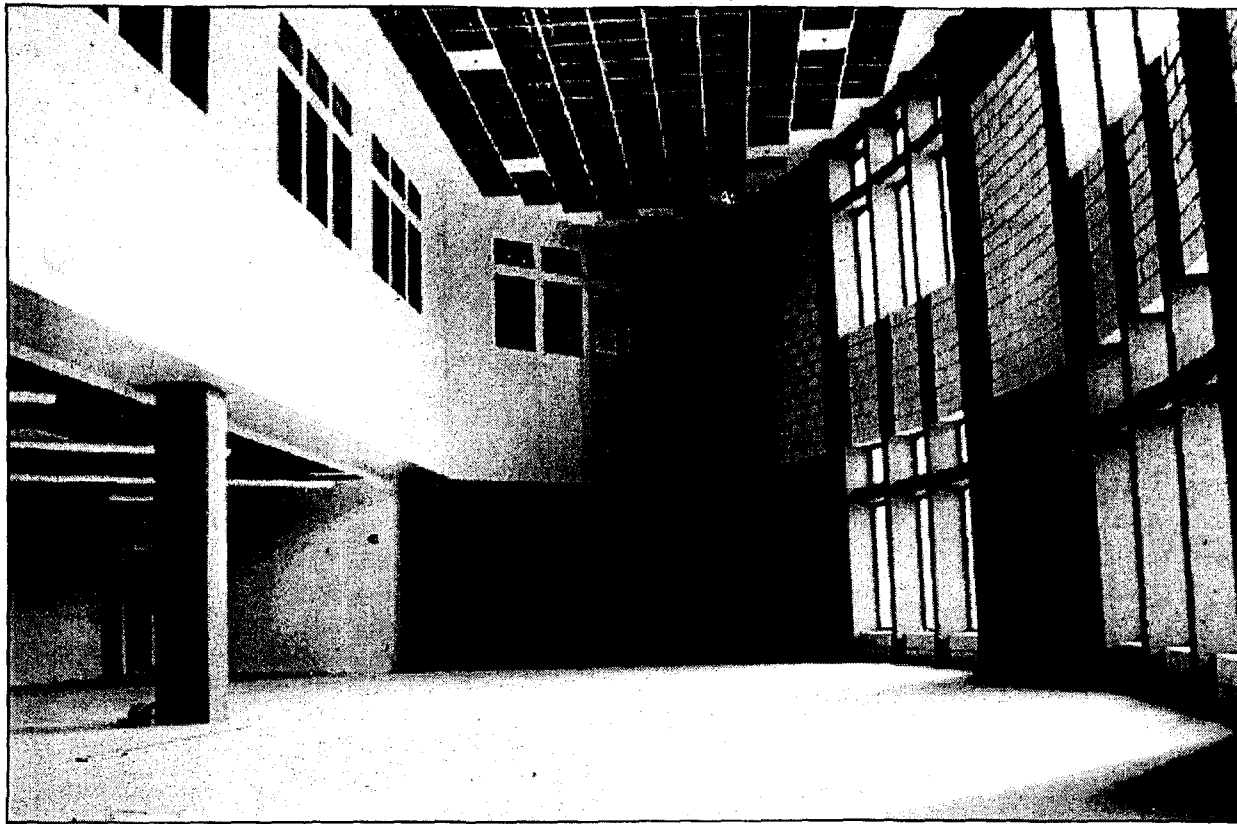
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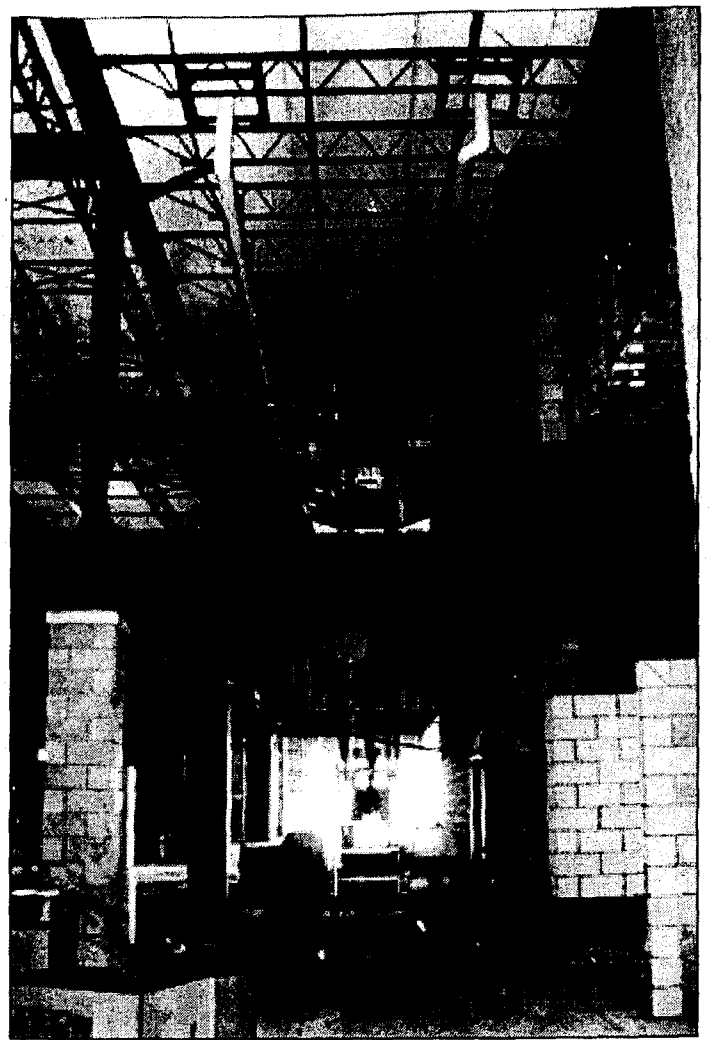
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The media center, said interim superintendent Jim Cooper, will be one of the new school's focal points, with its curved facade and banks of windows.

ticket window and concessions area also accessible to the gym across the hall. Of all the aspects of the new building, the auditorium, with its slanted seating area, orchestra pit, and complicated rigging, has presented the most challenges for work crews. "We pretty much had to start from the inside and work our way out," Beckman said.

The gym is nearly complete, save for bleachers and the planned mural, as well as the floor, which is slated for a June installation. Adjacent locker rooms have seen plenty of activity in the last couple of months, with lockers and tile already installed in both the athletic and physical education locker areas.

Outside of the gym, the "commons" area, taking the place of a traditional cafeteria, is taking shape along with the kitchen and food service areas. The most distinctive feature of the commons is the slanted roof on the outside wall, which though currently covered by plywood, will eventually be all glass for maximum light utilization.

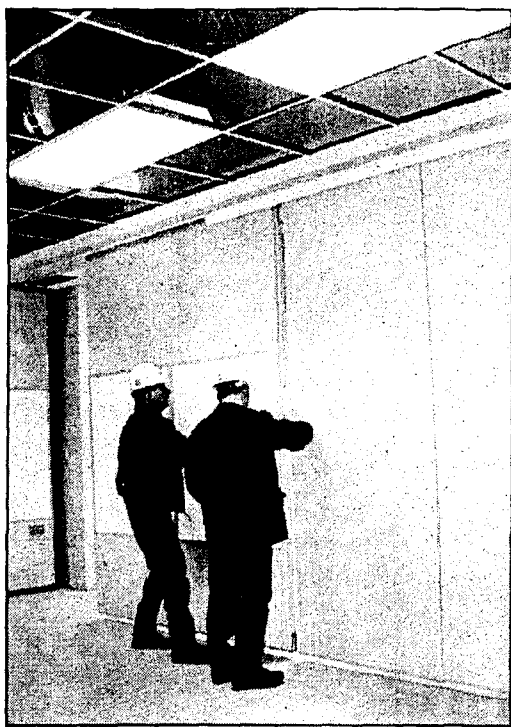
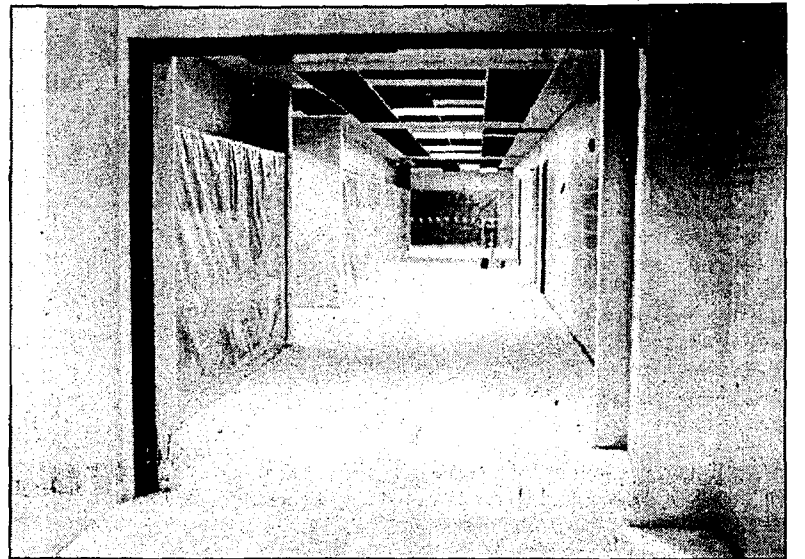
Nearby, the band room, mechanical rooms, and the voc/tech wing are also well on their way to completion. The band room, lined with private practice rooms, is awaiting block filler and the installation of what Beckman calls "an elaborate ceiling system" complete with sound baffles.

The classroom wing, which is where construction work began back in the fall of 2000 and which includes the media center, school store, and science lab areas, is mostly complete, save carpet, ceiling tiles, and doors.

According to interim schools superintendent Jim Cooper, the project, on the whole, couldn't be running more smoothly at this stage of the game. "The nice thing is [The Christman Company keeps] you informed about everything that happens. I don't walk into a monthly meeting [to find] a list of [problems]."

Woodbury concurs, citing a "great group of contractors," most of whom, including the three biggest contracts, are based in northern Michigan. "The electric foreman is from Boyne City. He has a new baby who will go to school here," said Woodbury of the connection many of the workers have to the project.

## VETERAN OF THE MONTH

### Norman T. Kerr

The Veteran of the Month for February is Norman T. Kerr.

Kerr was born March 7, 1930 in Boyne City. He joined the U.S. Air Force in the spring of 1950 and served at many air bases in the Orient.

On April 12, 1967, shortly after take-off from Cam Ran Bay Airbase, the C-141 on which Kerr was the flight engineer crashed, killing Kerr and seven others of the crew of nine. The C-141 was the largest jet being flown by the Air Force at that time and was on a support mission at the time of the crash.

Kerr served during the Korean War and Vietnam War and had attained the rank of T/Sgt. While serving in Korea Kerr married his wife Connie, the former Kyong Cha, in 1965 and had made Tacoma, Wash. their permanent home.

Kerr was the first Boyne City casualty of the Vietnam War and was laid to rest May 2, 1967 in Maple Lawn Cemetery Boyne City, with full military rites performed by an Honor Guard from Kincheloe AFB, assisted by the Smelt City VFW Post Honor

Kerr is being honored by his brother Pete from Ellsworth.

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

In the second quarter, the Yellowjackets matched the Loggers point for point. A three-pointer from Utley was followed by a three on the other end, a jumper from Dunlop was followed by another two points at the opposite basket, and on and on it went. At the half, the score was tied at 31.

The Loggers outscored the Yellowjackets 19-9 in the third quarter. They started out the quarter on an eight-point run before allowing Vanderbilt to score.

In the final period, the Loggers picked up another 15 points to Vanderbilt's 14.

Griffen led in scoring with 19 points, followed by Dunlop with 16 and Utley with 14.

The Loggers played Alanson Tuesday and are off this Friday. They will host Wolverine next Tuesday in a conference game.

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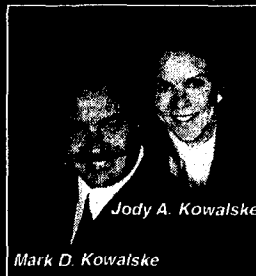
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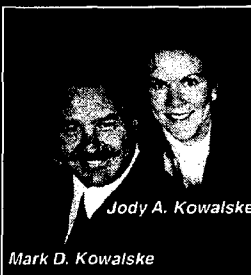
