Police release composite of suspect in assault case

The Michigan State Police are investigating a Criminal Sexual Conduct/Assault case in response to an incident that took place in Boyer Falls on Wednesday, May 21.

According to police, the incident occurred when the

victim's car broke down. The suspect stopped and offered the victim a ride; subsequently, the suspect groped the victim and requested sexual favors, at which time the victim jumped from the suspect's moving vehicle. The suspect drove off when the victim ran for help.

A composite drawing of the suspect has been created. He is described as a white male, 40-50 years of age, with a full beard and smaller build. He may have decaying/crooked teeth, and dirty hands (possibly a mechanic).

The suspect was driving a light blue, older model car that was very dirty inside and out.

The Boyer District Library will host its annual summer reading programs for preschool, elementary, and middle school aged kids.

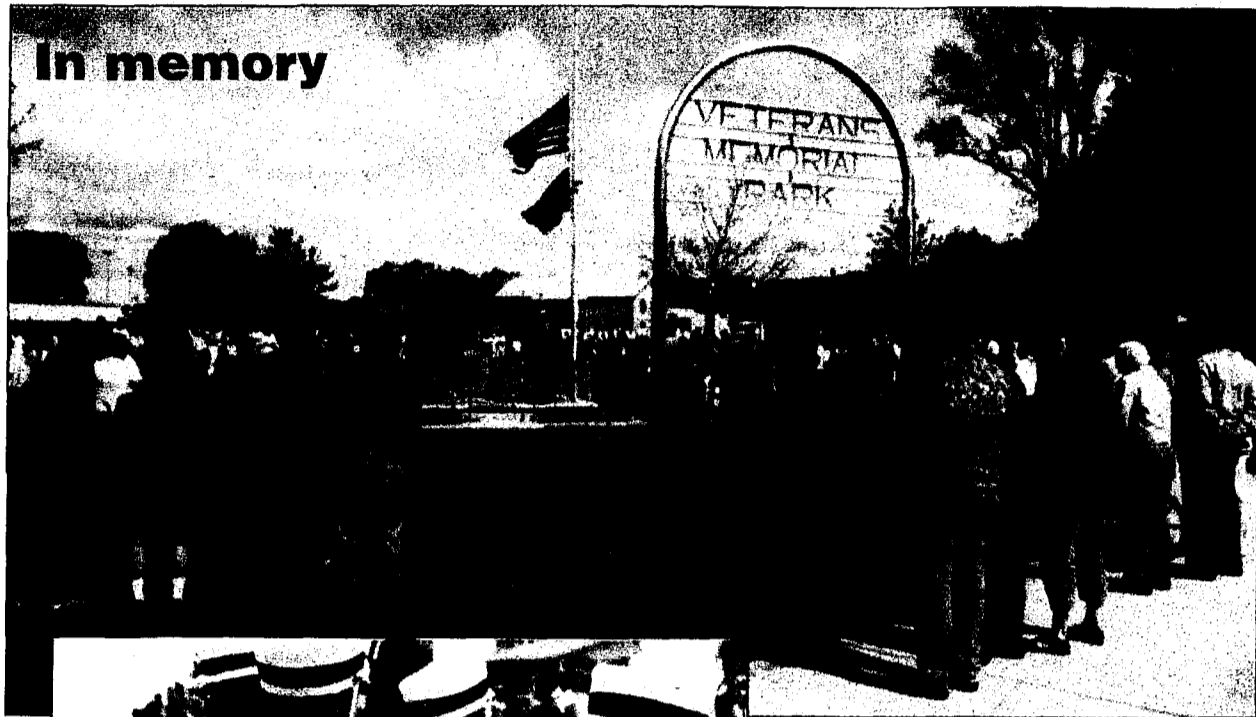

Marina proposed

Marina plans at Big C property creates questions

A marina proposal presented to the Boyer City Planning Commission last week left the board with more questions than answers, as members performed their preliminary review of the plan.

Proposed by the Devlon Corporation, which was represented at the meeting by BETA Design Group's Dan Harding, the marina and upland development is planned at the existing "Big C" property on North Lake Street. The plan includes the razing of the current industrial building, to be replaced initially by parking space, a beach house, and landscaping, maintaining a better than 50 percent view corridor. As presented, all public and private easements would remain as drawn, with new public easements to be drafted for the inclusion of an eight-foot wide concrete public walkway along the length of the waterfront.

"There was some positive feedback [from the board] on things they liked, like the landscaping," said city planner Tim O'Leary.

According to O'Leary, however, that's where any simplicity in last

STUDENTS IN BCHS' NEW VISUAL IMAGING CLASS ARE

Visualizing the future

On any given day, Boyer City High School's Visual Imaging class, new to the curriculum this year, is all about problem solving. In the space of an hour, instructor Randy Calcaterra is called upon to help students coordinate a multitude of project elements, while students are expected to work together to assimilate their own duties into finished products. It is, to be sure, a lesson in the real world.

"That's the way it happens in a production house," said instructor Randy Calcaterra.

Though the 20-odd students in-

involved in the class have been quietly working their magic throughout the year, the general public will get their first real glimpse of the students' work in the "Senior Send-Off" video production, to be shown for the first time in the Boyer City High School auditorium after graduation ceremonies on June 8.

The send-off project is the culmination of the students' individual quest to learn the skills of the visual imaging trade. In the Visual Imaging classroom, the excitement is palpable. "It's so unprecedented," Calcaterra

said of the level of work the students have achieved. "There's a lot of excitement about this."

The ability to reach that level has depended on a number of things, but the basic philosophy is this — no one student can learn everything there is to know to accomplish a polished product by year's end; therefore, each student is charged with becoming proficient in an area of specialization. In the real world, Calcaterra notes, individuals in imaging professions work

Lady, The Sound of Music, and Hello Dolly. During their high school years, the girls attended Interlochen, and sang the National Anthem at the 1992 boys basketball state finals at The Palace in Auburn Hills.

All along, though, the Mickeys knew they wanted to go to Nashville. After high school graduation and two years as musical theatre majors at Hope College, the two transferred to Belmont University in Nashville, to take part in the school's commercial music program.

Both graduated in 1998 with business majors and music business minors. Internships in the music industry gave Amy and Julie a first-hand look at the business; most recently, The Mickeys have become regular players at big Nashville clubs like Tootsie's Orchid Lounge, the Gibson Guitar Cafe, Third and Lindsley, and the Boardwalk Cafe.

The sound they've honed in their years of performing is unique, combining country, Celtic, bluegrass and Americana sounds. Despite the mix of influences, "our music is about simplicity," Julie said. "We're moving away from the overproduced sound that is prevalent among today's artists."

The sisters co-wrote five of the project's 11 tunes, and shared production duties with John Albani.

Two arrested for passing counterfeit cash in Walloon

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department is investigating the passing of counterfeit money in the local area.

On Friday, May 23, sheriff's deputies responded to Walloon Lake Village where a male subject had attempted to pass a counterfeit \$20 bill at a local store.

Deputies subsequently arrested the 24-year-old male and 20-year-old female, both of Oakland County, for Possession of Marijuana. According to Charlevoix County Sheriff George T. Lasater, both suspects have seasonal ties to the area. Lasater said that the suspects admitted that they had spent other counterfeit money in Boyne City, West Branch, and Petoskey.

Deputies have recovered

counterfeit \$10 and \$20 bills; the suspects were lodged in the Charlevoix County Jail and posted bond. According to Lasater, they will appear in the 90th district court at a later date.

The counterfeit money

investigation is expected to be referred to the U.S. Secret Service for additional follow-up.

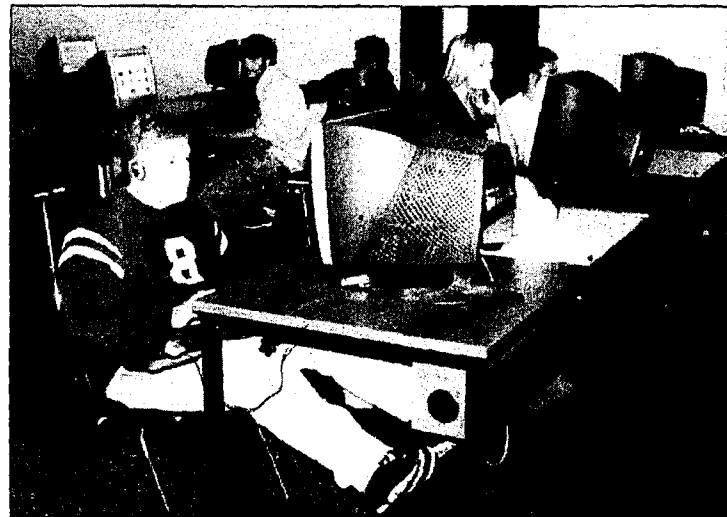

work in a specific area, whether it be animation, editing, graphic design, or any other of a multitude of possibilities. The class mimics a professional production house setup, assigning students with a specialty at the beginning of the year based on their personalities and areas of interest. "If it's something they're interested in, they'll do better," Calcaterra said simply.

The students, he adds, have risen to the occasion, working essentially from scratch to become a fully functioning production house of their own. Throughout the year, they've created some public service announcements for a local TV news station,

with some students entering their own work in outside contests and receiving awards, even at the state level. The goal for the year, however, was to create the Senior Send-Off, which includes not only the high-tech audiovisual program to be shown at graduation, but also a DVD to be distributed to each senior to keep, featuring the Send-Off program as well as features on each individual senior and fun DVD extras like outtakes and making-of features.

The send-off will become a yearly project for the class, though, Calcaterra said, "what they have done in the first year is going to be very difficult to top. That was my goal, and the bar is set pretty high." The send-off

will not, however, be the only project the class tackles in the future, with plans already in place to create an

interactive kiosk in the high school commons area, as well as branching out to work on projects in the com-

munity. "It's great... but I don't think we've even reached the pinnacle yet," Calcaterra said.

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Grandvue has shown ability to adapt over the years

(Editor's note: The following information is part of an on-going series of articles provided by the Grandvue Medical Care Facility Auxiliary).

The history of Grandvue Medical Care Facility that we have been presenting has demonstrated the ways in which Grandvue has evolved to meet the needs of the citizens of Charlevoix County and northern Michigan. No other chapter presents this adaptation quite as clearly as the development and changes that have occurred with the addition of the unit on the facility's north end.

After the North Wing opened in 1968 and the additional 12 beds were quickly filled, it was once again apparent that more space was needed due to changes in regulations and clientele. The concept of a Supervised Residential Care Unit — a place for those people who did not need skilled nursing care but still required supervision and some assistance in daily living activities — was developed, and planning for this new section got underway. Construction began in 1978, and the first resident moved into the SRC unit on March 24, 1980.

Changes in the nursing home population in the 1990s led to further changes within Grandvue. More and more of the seniors who required less care were living in assisted living facilities and homes; while Grandvue, with its 24-hour-a-day nursing staff, was seen as the place to go to receive a higher level of care. For years the state had not allowed facilities to add any skilled nursing beds. When they opened a program that would allow for 200 skilled Alzheimer's Disease beds in facilities throughout the state, Grandvue was among the first to apply. Grandvue was awarded the maximum 20 beds allowed, and in 1996 the conversion of the SRC Unit began. On December 5, 1997, the Horizonvue Alzheimer Unit opened with specialized programming that included a university affiliated music therapy program. Research from Grandvue's music therapy program has been presented in two national publications.

Current statistics indicate that nearly 50 percent of those over 85 years of age and 10 percent of those over 65 will develop Alzheimer's Disease, and Grandvue's reputation for skilled dementia care continued to grow. The state standard for operating a skilled Alzheimer Unit stated that a facility could have a maximum of 20 beds from the state pool of 200. When it was discovered that there were beds in the pool that had not been applied for, however, Grandvue's Administrator Penny Drury went to work with the Certificate of Need Commission to revise the standard to allow facilities to receive another 20 beds.

The standard was changed, and late in 2001 Grandvue received approval to add another 20 skilled beds for the care of residents with Alzheimer's Disease. This timing corresponded with our newly approved expansion project, plans were combined, and the project was soon underway; once again evolving to meet the needs of Charlevoix County citizens.

A pictorial history of the evolution of Grandvue can be seen along the hallways of the facility.

Teen-oriented sports meet with criticism in BC

According to Amelia Ryan in the May 14 Citizen-Journal, the new disc golf course in Boyne City is a blemish, a pimple if you will, on the face of Avalanche Preserve. She also stated that there has been an increase of trash and destroyed wildlife because of the new course, all of which she placed on the golfers using the course.

Ryan has every right to her opinion regarding the new disc golf course. As a local citizen it upsets me when Avalanche is not clean. Everyone who visits Avalanche has the responsibility to keep it beautiful. However, Ryan does not have the right to stereotype disc golfers as the persons solely responsible for the increase of garbage and trampled foliage on Avalanche.

Thousands of people use Avalanche every year. These people include locals and tourists. These people include hikers, cyclists, mushroom pickers, horseback riders, and disc golfers. All of these people may or may not have a hand in creating the increase of cigarette butts, beverage containers, and crushed plant life, which Ryan says has become a "regular occurrence" since the addition of the new course.

Ryan also states that discs themselves have become litter. Anyone who has purchased a golf disc knows they're not cheap. Golf discs range in price from \$10-\$20. When discs are left in the woods, it's because they are lost, not "forgotten" by an "unwilling" golfer.

Ten years ago at age 13, sports such as skateboarding, rollerblading, and snowboarding were really starting to take off in this quiet little town. People involved in these sports were viewed as punks, vandals, subversive, and substance users. Although a minority may have fit the above description, the majority were decent kids trying to have a good time while expressing themselves. The same is true for disc golfers. The free course at Avalanche gives everyone a chance to be who they are while having a good time.

week's presentation ended. Though drawings by BETA Design submitted to the City include a 113-slip marina, with slip lengths ranging from 45 feet to 130 feet, Devon had asked that the planning commission consider only the plans for the upland development at this time. To further complicate the matter, the upland development includes a proposed Phase II, which entails the construction of a four-story building, the

nature of which has not been presented. Though the proposed four-story structure would exceed height allowances for the property, which was previously rezoned from industrial to waterfront marina, according to O'Leary the commission has the discretion to grant a variance based on a proportional increase in view corridor.

Without knowledge of the function or appearance of the building, the board was reluctant to move forward; commissioners took

no action on the proposal, instead giving the developer a list of information needed for further consideration. "There will have to be an agreement on the riparian lines, for one," O'Leary said, as well as more information on "the parking issue in relation to the marina." The timeline on further consideration will depend on the developer's furnishing the requested information. The plans are available for review at Boyne City City Hall.

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EJHS students compete at state MITES fair

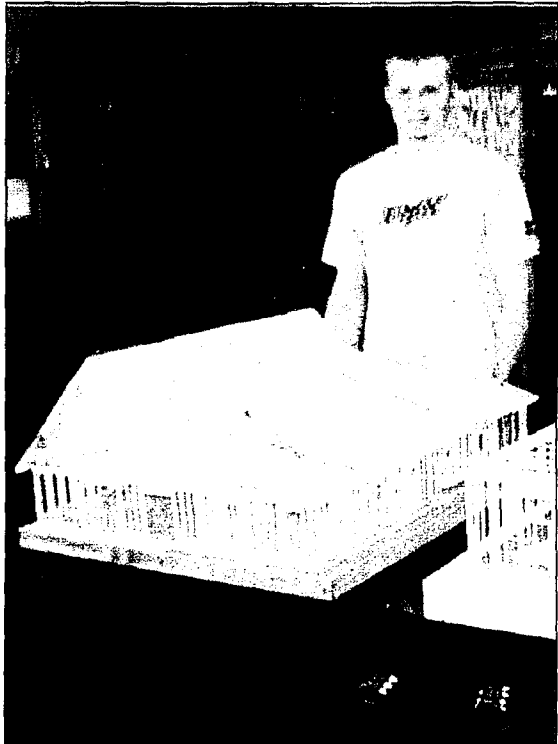
