Auto accident claims life on **BC-EJ Road**

A traffic accident on a local road claimed one life over the weekend.

According to Charlevoix County Sheriff George T. Lasater, the sheriff's department responded to a one-vehicle crash on Sunday, June 1, at 12:26 a.m. on Boyne City-East Jordan Road near Bieshlag Road in Wilson Township. The vehicle involved in the crash left the roadway and struck a tree; the driver, who was the only occupant of the vehicle, died at the scene.

At the request of the family, the name of the driver is being withheld until all family members have been notified. The crash remains under investigation. The sheriff's office was assisted by the East Jordan Police Department, the East Jordan Fire Department, and East Jordan EMS.

Citizens' help sought in death of chickens

Charlevoix County Animal Control officer Julie Whitley is asking for citizens' help to solve a mystery that's costing a local family its livestock.

According to Whitley, a Boyne City family reported last week that one or more loose dogs has been killing the chickens that they raise on their in-town property. The family had lost 10-12 chickens in a three to five day period last week, according to Whitley, who noted that the attacks are taking place during the day, as the chickens are locked up in their coop at night.

"Somebody out there knows this dog is bringing home chickens," Whitley said. She's hoping that the owner, or anyone else who has knowledge of the situation, will come forward. "They're not looking to prosecute, but they'd like to be reimbursed [for the lost chickens]," she said. Anyone with information is asked to call Whitley at 582-6667, or leave her a message by calling 911.

■ Boyne City's Fourth of July committee puts out call for funds, volunteers

As organizers work to put the finishing touches on Boyne City's annual Fourth of July festival, they're reminding those who enjoy the festival that support is still needed to keep the event moving forward.

Financial support, said organizer Liz Kroondyk, is always an issue. "We've got a good start on the money, but we need more," she said. A number of major sponsors are on board, including Great Lakes Energy, which sponsors the parade, as well as Bank One, the Harborage Condominium Association, Eta Nu Sorority, the Boyne City Rotary Club, and the Carroll family. Funds are still needed, however, not only to support the fireworks display but also some of the many other events that take place throughout the day, including the soap box derby and kids games.

"We know times are tough," Kroondyk said, "but we're hoping

people will respond." Volunteer assistance, too, is always a need, especially in this year's running race. Though the event, like most others, has a subcommittee with leadership in place, a key team member. someone with the technical knowledge to run the start and finish of the race, has not been found. "If we don't find someone, the running race won't happen," Kroondyk said.

Volunteers are also needed for the day of the event, whether it be setting up, cleaning up, or any task in between. Even an hour or two will help, organizers said.

Despite the always hectic lastminute details, and call for support, the event is shaping up to be the same family favorite that folks travel from miles around to take part in.

Set for Friday, July 4, the day will kick off with the downtown parade, followed by music in the park, kids games, a craft show, food, and, of course, spectacular fireworks.

LAKE CHARLEVOIX TREATED IN FIGHT AGAINST INVASIVE SEA LAMPREYS

New Great Lakes lampricide program gets underway By LINDA GALLAGHER

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service recently unveiled a new weapon in its ongoing war against the sea lamprey. the most insidious invasive exotic species ever introduced to the Great

Using Bayluscide, a chemical recently registered for use as a lampricide, biologists treated six acres of water inside Boyne City's harbor on the shores of Lake Charlevoix in mid May. Lake Charlevoix has long been known as a larval sea lamprey nursery area.

The chemical, used in other applications as a molluskicide, has proven deadly to juvenile sea lamprey, which burrow into the sand and silt on the bottom of lake harbors for a period feed on species such as lake trout, walleye and perch, and proved devastating to the entire Great Lakes fishery until the first control programs were implemented in the 1960s.

"Along with our other sea lamprey control programs, such as the use of

low head electrical barriers, and TFM treatments in streams, this program will become part of our overall lamprey management program," said Darrian Davis, USFWS Fisheries Biologist from Marquette, as he watched technicians load the granular chemical into spreaders mounted on the stern of a USFWS boat. "We've found the TFM treatments were very successful in Great Lakes tributary streams, but we weren't having any success reaching young lamprey in the burrowing stage in open lakes. We were missing millions of young lamprey."

Using data of young lamprey numbers in the harbor compiled over several years, technicians from the Marquette office set a rate of spread of the Bayluscide to boat speed that of three to six years prior to the adult would prove lethal within moments parasitic stage. makes it sink to the bottom of the lake," said the biologist. "It then dissolves along the bottom, out of harm's way of most fish species." Applications are timed to avoid prime lake

spawning and egg hatching periods of bottom feeding species, such as carp, suckers, and bullheads, and effects on invertebrate insect populations are also thought to be minimal.

"Studies by various state game agencies, tribal agencies, and international partners in Canada have shown

BOYNE CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT

CATHY L. ALLEN

BACKGROUND: native of Boyne City, married, 1 son

WHY HAVE YOU CHOSEN TO RUN FOR THE SCHOOL BOARD?

I feel that one term on the Board is not enough time for a person to do a really good job. The first 2-1/2 years are used for schooling and then it's just the basics. Serving on the board provides continual education experiences for members.

WHAT QUALITIES/EXPERIENCES DO YOU HAVE TO OFFFER AS A BOARD MEMBER?

I have served on the board for four years (three years as Vice-President). For the past seven years I have been continually active with the "At-Risk" (now called the "Student Success") Programs. I am also a certified Board Member through the Michigan Association of School Boards.

WHAT DO YOU FEEL ARE THE DISTRICT'S GREATEST STRENGTHS? GREATEST WEAKNESSES?

Our district has a wonderful staff. With all of our buildings on one campus now, our staff members are able to interact for the betterment of our district. We offer a great curriculum with some excellent vocational classes. Lack of budget dollars is our greatest weakness. We want and need to provide a quality education for all students.

Our budget. With all the funding cuts mandated by the State, our biggest challenge will be to keep our quality programs for the students. I feel the current board has already begun to address this challenge by continually monitoring, trimming and revising the budget while keeping the focus on our students.

This sense of community has helped the school district to move forward on a number of challenging initiatives, such as the NCA Transitions endorsement.

The greatest weakness of the East Jordan Public Schools, as I see it, is not unique to EJPS, but is the state of affairs in most schools. This state of affairs is the inability to provide a unique learning opportunity to each child in a community school. Now, I

may be idealistic, but my expectation is that every school should provide each child with the opportunity to learn at a rate equal to their personal potential. This potential is different for each child because each child has different talents, and the potential is frequently limited by family issues as well as personal motivation. I believe schools, in general, can do a much better job to help students to reach their potential. I believe teachers frequently teach to a narrow slice of the student population because they know of no other strategy to reach the wide breadth of student capabilities in their age grouped class. This limits the growth potential of many kids. On the other hand, I think EJPS has taken some fine strides to address the breadth of capabilities issue. For example, in the EJPS elementary school there is a position for a reading specialist to help children with reading difficulties, and a position for a gifted and

One of the most obvious problems facing EJPS is the economic climate of the state, and the foundation grant monies provided to the local school

district. The foundation grant, as it is structured today, does not provide an equitable distribution of funds across school districts. EJPS being a rural school district receives a lower rate of funding than many other school districts in the state, or even the local region, forcing the school district to be very judicious with spending. Fortunately, due to a slightly growing student population, and professional budget management by the EPJS administrative team, EJPS is positioned to weather the storm as well as any rural school district can be expected. One suggestion for this challenge is that the state needs to consider a more equitable way of distributing the foundation grant monies to rural and low economic area schools so that these schools receive the same state funding as wealthier school districts, so that educational opportunities at all schools, especially in times of a state budget crunch, can be placed on a more equal footing.

The second challenge I see for EJPS relates to the issue I mentioned earlier about schools working to help each child reach their potential. EJPS has made more positive steps than most schools of an equivalent size to improve the educational opportunities of the community's kids, but there is the need for continuous improvement. The challenge to EJPS is for continuous improvement to integrate new ideas and teaching strategies that allow for different rates of learning. These ideas and strategies do not need to be revolutionary, but practical and proven ideas for improvements.



tional partners in Canada have shown that non-target species kill has been negligible, but it is very effective on young lamprey, usually within an hour of application," said the biologist.

As a molluskicide, there is a bonus effect in that application of Baylucide has also proven fatal to invasive zebra mussel populations.

"But the amount of chemical that would be required to even put a dent into the zebra mussel numbers would be staggering," said Jason Krebil, a fisheries biologist from the Ludington Biological Station.

"Using this chemical is not inexpensive – using a mandated rate of 156 pounds per acre, we're using 24 fivegallon buckets of Baylucide here today just to cover six acres of water, and each one of those buckets costs approximately \$500."

"And this is only the beginning," said Davis.

"This program was originally developed for use in the St. Mary's River, which has been a River. prime target area for many years. Infested with sea lampreys, experimental treatments in the St. Mary's in 1999 showed a fantastic 88 percent kill rate in the small areas treated there.

Over the entire river, which was an extraordinary international effort between Fisheries and Ocean Canada, the United States Fish & Wildlife Service, and the U.S. Geological Survey coordinated through the Great Lakes Fishery Commission, the spot treatments eliminated 45 percent of sea lamprey larvae over the entire length of the river. We'd like to see that type of success everywhere in the Great Lakes.'

To facilitate that effort, the lampricide will be applied this summer to the waters of Lake Michigan outside of the harbor of Manistique, and once again, in the St. Mary's



More than 24 buckets of Bayluscide, at a cost of approximately \$500 each, were used to treat the waters of Lake Charlevoix inside Boyne City's harbor.

"We'll be treating 33 acres of water over the course of three days at Manistique, and repeating our 1999 efforts over 200 acres over the course of three weeks in the St. Mary's, which will be done in conjunction with Canadian efforts on that side of the border," said Davis.

Populations of sea lampreys, particularly in Lake Michigan, are thought to be up slightly, said Krebil.

"We're barely holding our own right now. But we are holding our own. It's highly unlikely we'll ever win the war against the sea lamprey. But we are making headway, a little bit at a time.

The Great Lakes Fishery Commission has set a goal of an 85 percent reduction in sea lamprey populations throughout the entire Great Lakes within the next 10





Cyclists from near and far 'Ride the Charx'

■ Sponsored by the North Country Bicycle Club, 'Ride the Charx' offers fun for cyclists while promoting tourism in beautiful Boyne country

To paraphrase an age-old question, which came first, the bike club or the ride?

In the case of the North Country Bicycle Club, it was, in fact, the ride — "Ride the Charx" (pronounced "Ride the Shark") which, in its third year, is expecting a turnout upwards of 300 riders.

From that wildly successful ride, a club was born, in a rather incidental way once organizers realized that it would take a club to adequately publicize the ride they'd started. According to Mike Sheean, the North Country Bicycle Club started out as a club in name only, "used to promote the ride." In the ride's second year, Sheean and co-organizer Paul Servais got it in their heads that since they already had a club, "why don't we have members," Sheean said. After drafting an application and leaving them on countertops in bike shops around the area, members signed on, with 35 family members in the first year. The interest made sense to Sheean, who said that, if ers, the club is by no means one looks at the bike activity scheduled for the season, Boyne is "the center of bicycle activity in northern Michigan. [Most scheduled rides] occur within 25 miles of here."

Membership in the North Country Bicycle Club means being a recipient of the club's newsletter, and being kept apprised of recurring rides led by members and other clubs. As the club grows, however, organizers are looking at ways to better serve the membership, looking to members themselves for input. "We held a goal-setting session in the fall with a cross section of members, to tell us if they want a club or not, and if they have a club, what do they want it for?"

As it turned out, the club is indeed wanted; organizers are looking to add some educational events to the annual schedule, as well as increasing the social component with a mid-summer get-together.

And though many of the members are seasoned rid-

exclusive. "Not only are we not exclusive," Servais said, "but we're being assertive on finding people who want to ride but haven't. We're looking for people who are motivated to ride, but are reluctant to get started." Added Sheean, "we're trying to create an environment that allows people to follow that ambi-

tion [to ride]." Certainly, the Ride the Charx event, scheduled this year for Saturday, June 28, assists in the creation of that environment. The event, with its varied ride lengths and spectacular scenery, is as rider-friendly as it gets. Featuring four rides ranging from 20 miles to 105 miles, the nonprofit event features sag vehicles equipped with tools and repair materials, rest stops with refreshments, and a barbecue lunch from Lester's BBQ.




