## A good start

Boyer City 'Main Street' gets off to a running start with town meeting, two-day reconnaissance visit

After being named one of only four communities in the state to take part in the pilot State of Michigan Main Street Program, Boyne City learned a bit more last week about just what that Main Street involvement means.

As the subject of a Michigan Main Street Reconnaissance Visit on July 14 and 15, Boyne City hosted a team of professionals comprised of representatives from the Michigan Department of Economic Development, the National Main Street Center and the Michigan Safe Housing Development Agency. The visit, essentially a time for evaluation, was by all accounts a success.

"[Team members have] all concluded that we definitely picked the right community," said reconnaissance team leader Robert Trezise, Jr. of the MEDC. Boyne City, he said, "has the potential to go from a good level to an even higher level. It's an exciting challenge."

The visit comes just weeks after the announcement that Boyne City was selected by the MEDC to participate in the fledgling State Main Street Program, having been chosen through a highly selective application process. Participation in the program means

an award of technical support through state and national experts, though, Trezise is quick to point out, not financial support. "Ironically," he said at a town meeting held last Monday night, "it's all on you." That fact, however, is right in line with the thinking put forth in the Main Street philosophy. "It's your downtown," he said simply.

Last week's visit followed a "very aggressive agenda" according to Trezise, which included meetings with the Main Street committee members, Downtown Development Authority members, city manager Michael Cain, and mayor Eleanor Stackus, as well as with downtown merchants, property owners, and other community leaders.

On July 14, the team conducted a Town Meeting presentation, which included what is known as a SWOT session — an activity that entails identifying and ranking issues or characteristics in four areas, Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats.

A group of about 50 local residents and businesspeople participated in the

process, which will be formally assessed by team members with results being presented to the city at a later date.

Initial results showed that the majority of those present ranked "water" and "historic buildings" as the community's top strengths; "lack of consensus" and "lack of marina space" as the community's top weaknesses; "[creating a] vision for the future" and "water-front uses" as the top opportunities; and "apathy" and the "lag in technology" as the biggest outside threats.

The town meeting, Trezise said, was encouraging, leading team members to come away "with absolute confidence that the community overall is kind of pulling together."

The Main Street philosophy is, in essence, a set of tools to help facilitate that pulling together, as well as the steps needed to help the community move forward.

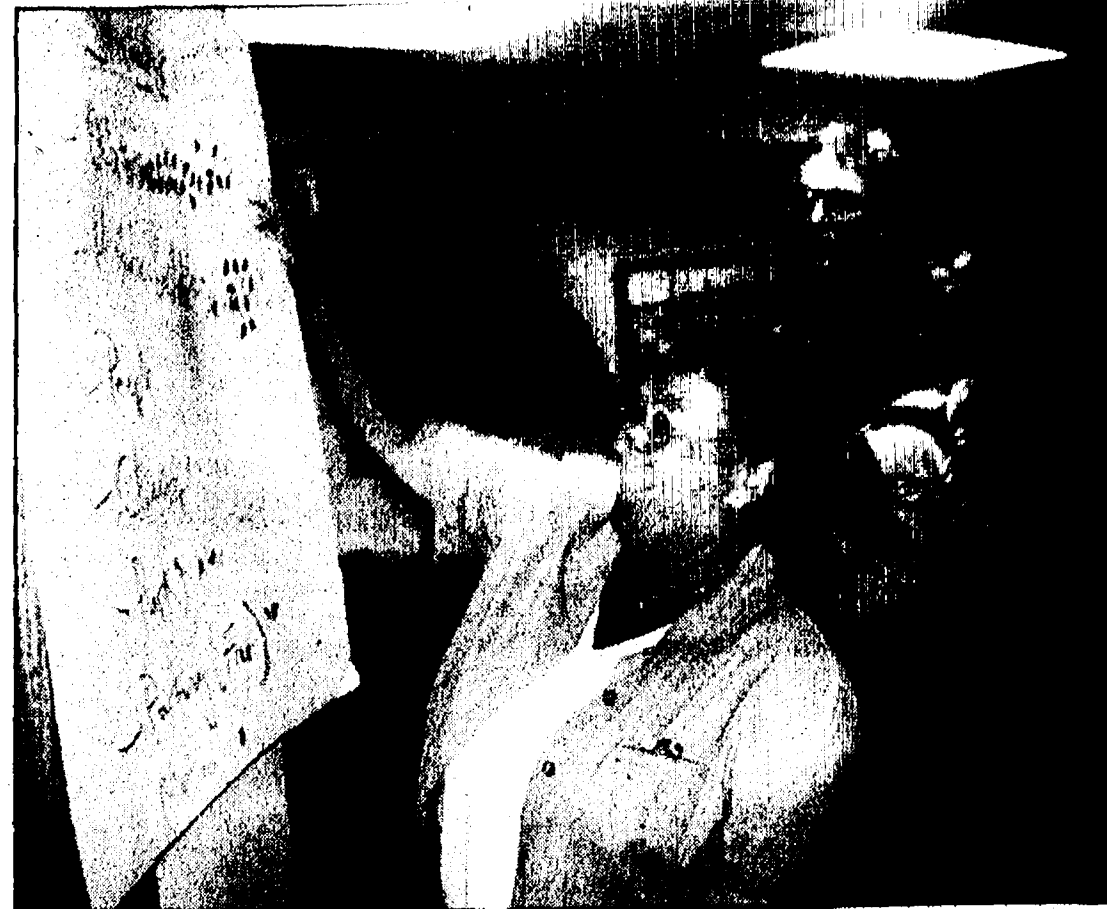
The Main Street Program focuses on strengthening and revitalizing down-

towns. Developed by the National Historic Trust, it merges historic preservation with economic development, through four main elements: design, organization, promotion, and economic restructuring.

The program has been utilized in commercial districts nationwide over the last 20 years, cumulatively generating more than \$12 billion in new investment, with a net gain of more than 193,000 new jobs and 51,000 new businesses in more than 1,200 communities. Designed to be adopted locally, all initiatives stem from local issues and concerns.

In Boyne City, the Main Street Program committee has been in place in recent years, as a collaborative effort under the umbrella of the Boyne Area Chamber of Commerce.

The next step for the State Main Street team in moving forward with its involvement in Boyne City is to get feedback, assess the information gathered during the visit, "make our own judgements from our expertise, and make recom-

mendations," Trezise said.

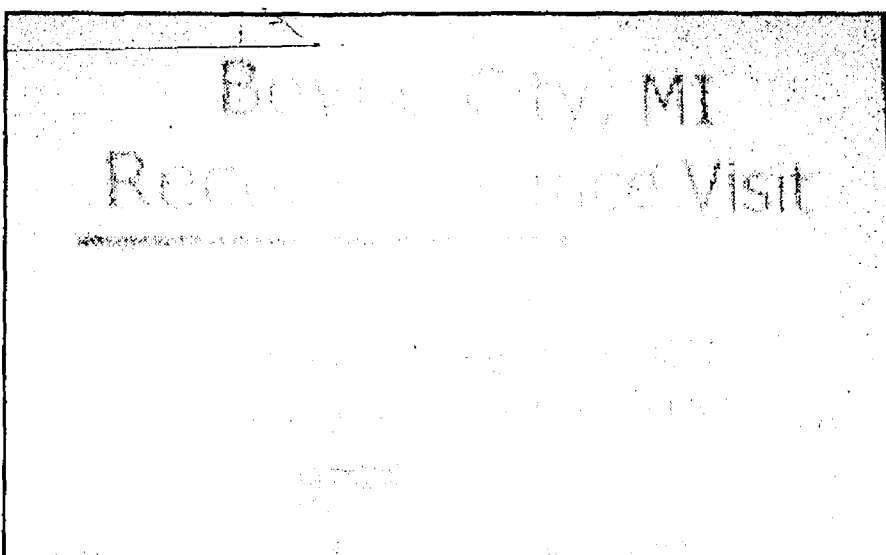
The next few weeks for Boyne City will be an organizational period, including one major step, hiring a Main Street manager, a goal Trezise feels should be

completed by the end of September. In September, that manager and board and committee members will travel to Lansing for a "Basics 101" training in the tenants of Main Street.

Though the activity in the coming weeks will be fairly low-key, it is as important, if not more so, than higher-profile activity to come. "We're putting the building blocks in place," Trezise said. "The whole house is going to be built on that foundation."

City manager Michael Cain, for one, has confidence in the process that's begun in Boyne City with the Main Street program. "Boyne City is on the leading edge of downtown revitalization," Cain said. "As great as things are downtown, they can always be better."

"This is the beginning of the future of downtown Boyne City."

Following is a description of the tour:

## THE COLMAN HOME

This welcoming waterfront single-style home, owned by Andy and Debbie Colman, is wonderful for entertaining friends and family for extended visits. Designed by Andre Poineau and constructed by Larry Shaun of Lazer Construction, the house has an open floor plan and ample bedroom space for guests.

Upon entering through the front door into the foyer, the open floor plan offers views into the living room, dining room, kitchen, and Lake Charlevoix beyond through the windows. The living room offers comfortable seating in front of the beautiful stone fireplace. The accommodating kitchen is complete with modern stainless steel appliances, a generous gas stove, and expansive tiled counters.

The large master suite has access to the deck, perfect for sipping that first cup of morning coffee. The master bath offers plenty of individual space for the owners, and is beautifully appointed. The bedrooms on the second floor also have personal bathrooms, and there will be no shortage of clean clothing with washers and dryers located on each floor.

Visitors will note details such as the woodwork throughout the house, the butler pantry, and the outdoor shower just outside the side door.

## THE SHEAR HOME

This home, owned by Bud and Nancy Shear, will impress admirers of craftsmen architecture and workmanship. This bungalow, designed by Dino Franchino and Fred Franchino, was built by Dino in 1997. Great care was taken with the project in selecting materials and design concepts to create a stylish home.

Upon entering into the foyer, the easy flow of the house is apparent. Pine flooring was used throughout the house, and a wonderful neutral color palette accents each room. The dining room, accessible from the living room and kitchen, features beautiful built-in cabinets and a honed slate fireplace. The kitchen features granite counters, custom cherry cabinets, and stainless steel appliances.

Many rooms feature built-in cabinets, bookshelves, or window seats, all classic elements of Craftsman architecture. Cherry millwork was used throughout the interior of the home, and the exterior of the home is a classic combination of wood siding, shingle, and rafter tails.

## THE BUTLER HOME

A short walk down the winding drive will reveal an English country house, owned by Frank Butler. This new home, with construction completed in 2000 by Primiero Development, was designed to take advantage of the spectacular lake views from nearly every room.

Visitors will admire the beautiful oversized front door while passing through the main entry into the spacious foyer. The home is finely appointed and designed by interior designer Jennifer Butler. The living room features wonderful views of Lake Charlevoix, while the kitchen mixes modern materials with English country details with granite counters and distressed custom cabinetry and iron bar stools. Off the kitchen is a light and airy sunroom, which, painted in yellow, will lift visitors' spirits, sunshine or not.

Few details have been overlooked in Butler's home, with cherry hardwood flooring on the main level and hickory floors on the second, in-floor heating throughout the house, and unique windows. Don't miss the master bath, and admirers of vintage posters will be delighted with the collection displayed in almost every room.

## THE REGAN HOME

Though it began as a one-bedroom guest cottage in 1989, the John and Lindsay Regan home is now a remodeled family home. Working with an architect and designer the home went from 680 square feet to 1,800, while matching the additions with the existing design. Andre Poineau

Woodworking completed the work for John and Lindsay in 2003.

The lower level offers wonderful details beginning with stained glass decorating the front entry. Masterful woodwork is featured throughout; lakeside rooms offer magnificent views.

The upper level is the main floor, with the kitchen, living area, and master bedroom. Stained glass is again used at the entrance to the master bedroom, with three pieces designed to depict a view of the lake in three of the four seasons. Visitors will also notice the unique light fixtures, both inside and out, as well as the matching hardware. Finally, guests will want to linger while taking in the lake view from the second story deck of this finely crafted contemporary home.

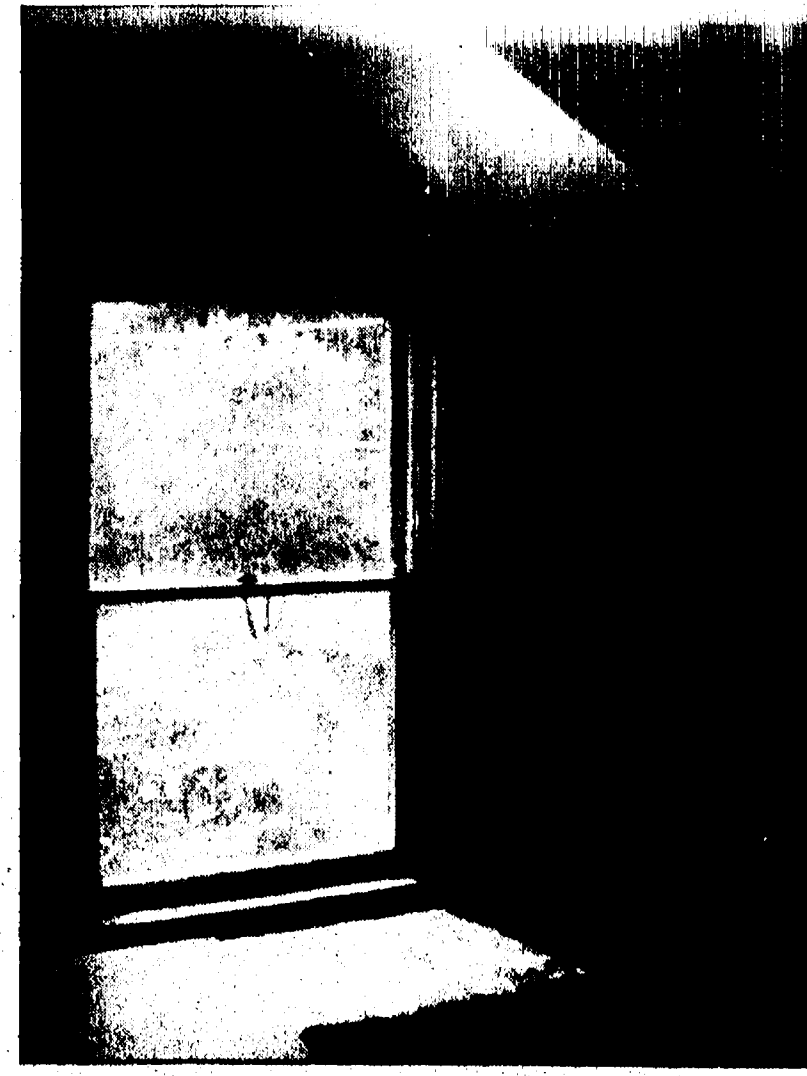

Well a quick search on the internet soon revealed Boyne City as the locality. I can only assume it must be from that woman's daughter. Simply remarkable, hence my letter.

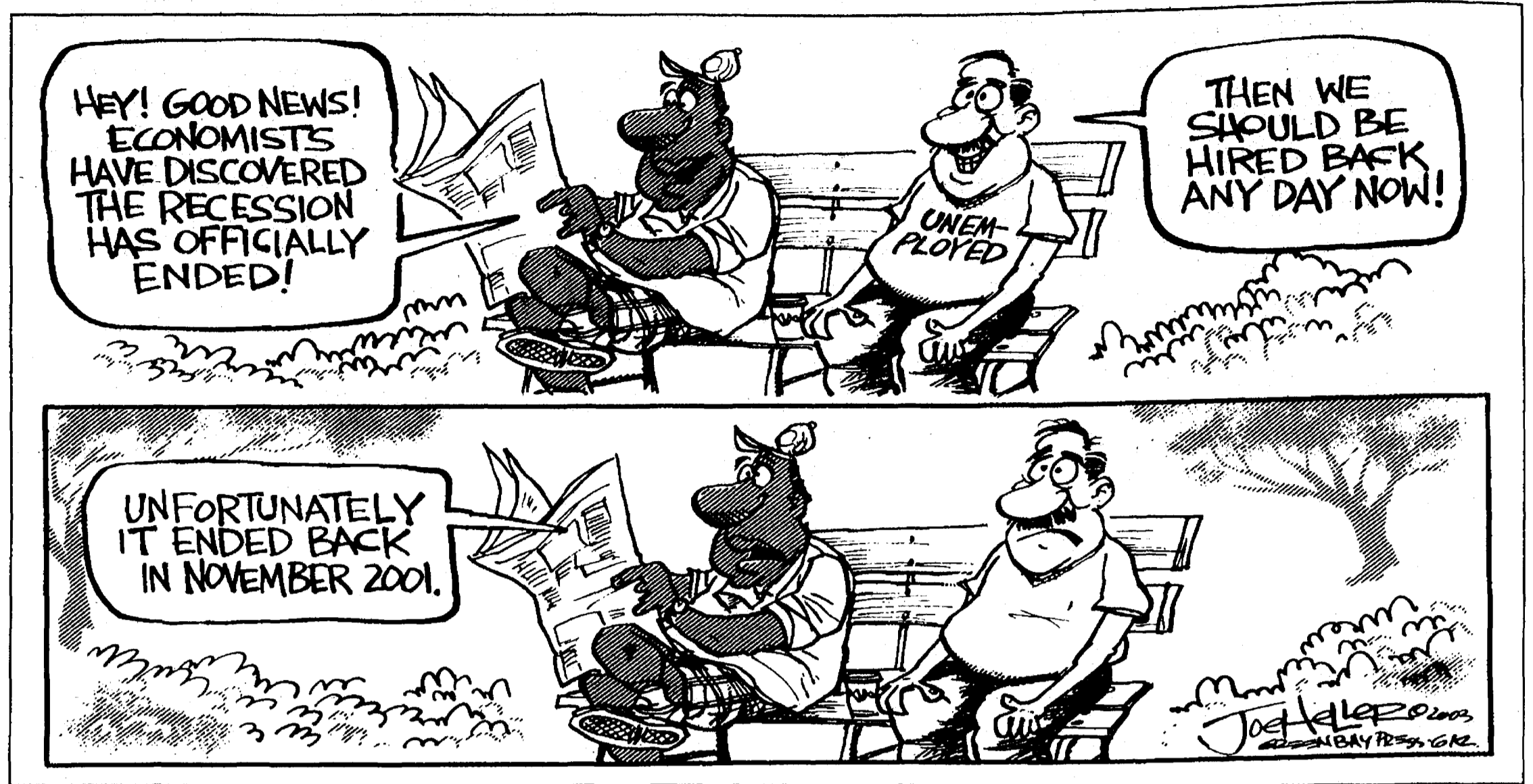
What a wonderful opportunity those young players had to play softball, have fun and learn about another part of the global village.

### Finding no rest from the wise guys

Just as we've asked our soon-to-be teenager, who also happens to be our youngest child, to be kind to his parents and a nice teenager, just then the smart aleck monster is beginning to take over his brain.

Having already raised three teenagers (and one of them being of the female persuasion), my husband and I really felt that we'd paid our dues. We've lived through three sets of curfews, three driver's training classes and the subsequent learner's permits, car insurance hikes, and white knuckled road tests.

We've learned to bite our tongues when once again a "friend" has turned out to be not so much a friend, and to understand the difference between giving our opinion and laying down the law.

And, having lived through all this, frankly we're tired. And, unfortunately, the last kid in line knows it.

So we once again find ourselves living through the emotional adolescent years; riding that roller coaster that typifies life with a teenager. Only this time, we think he's learned some things from his siblings' lessons.

So, as we prepare to enter the no-man's-land known as the teenage years, we find ourselves comforted with one fact. The next time we have to deal with an adolescent's pathos, it'll be as grandparents.

And that's when the fun will begin.

### Building project moving along

If you have visited or driven past Grandvue Medical Care Facility recently, you can't help but notice the extensive construction project that is underway.

Excitement is building as we count down the days until the completion of Phase I of our three-part renovation that provides an additional wing on our Alzheimer's unit and two additional wings in our main medical care facility.

The new Alzheimer's wing will add 20 beds to the facility, increasing our Alzheimer's unit to 48 beds. A new sunroom/living room, activity room, dining room and kitchenette are also included in the expansion.

Our residents living in the main medical care facility will enjoy the benefits of heightened privacy and dignity that are available with private and semi-private rooms, and recessed niches in the hallways provide sitting areas for visiting or reading.

Three octagonal dining/living rooms have also been constructed, and with their elevated ceilings, gilded cupolas, and large windows, they provide natural daylight year round.

They will allow residents to have their meals together in smaller, more intimate groups closer to their living areas. Each is decorated in a theme. A mural of hot air balloons surrounds visitors to the Lakevue Dining Room.

The Courtyard Dining Room offers diners a classic style complete with ivy-wrapped columns. The Valleyvue Dining Room, in addition to the flowering lattice décor, in the Valleyvue Dining Room, offers residents the opportunity to gaze out the window at the deer that come to feed on Grandvue's grounds.

During Phase II, the current Valleyvue, or south wing, and the original Alzheimer's wing will be renovated. Upon completion of Phase III, Grandvue residents will have access to "Main Street," the central hallway connecting the Alzheimer's unit to the main medical care facility. Main Street will house a theater, beauty shop, library, chapel, and "street side café" and will be decorated with faux store fronts to complete our Grandvue town. The office areas and kitchen will also be renovated.

VISITORS ARE WELCOME to attend an ice cream social and mini open house at Grandvue on Wednesday, July 30. The ice cream social is free and open to all from 3 to 4:30 p.m. and tours of the new medical care facility will be available from 3 to 6 p.m.

# Boyne City man faces charges in vehicular death of Ellsworth woman

A tragic accident last Thursday evening took the life of an Ellsworth woman.

According to the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office, at approximately 10:15 p.m. on July 17, Frederick and Tonya Cords were sealing a local resident's driveway on M-75 near Dam Road in Boyne Valley Township.

The couple was finishing the work when a male driver from Boyne City struck both of them.

Tonya, 32, suffered extensive injuries, and was transported to Northern Michigan Hospital, where she was pronounced dead.

Frederick, 31, suffered non-life threatening injuries,

and was transported to Northern Michigan Hospital by Boyne City EMS where he was treated and released.

The driver, Christopher D. Thompson, was immediately taken into custody by the sheriff's office and was lodged in Charlevoix County Jail. He was charged by Charlevoix Prosecuting Attorney Mary Beth Kur with operating under the influence of liquor causing death, which carries a 15-year maximum sentence.

Thompson also faces a habitual offender - a third offense sentencing enhancement that could increase the maximum penalty of the charge to 80 years.

He remains lodged in the Charlevoix County Jail with a bond of \$250,000.

The sheriff's office was assisted at the scene by the Boyne City Police Department, Boyne City EMS, Boyne Valley Fire Department and First Responders.

Tonya is survived by four children. Her funeral is Wednesday, July 23, at 2 p.m. at the Central Lake Chapel of Mortensen Funeral Homes

Memorial contributions may be made to the Tonya Cords Children Memorial Fund, in care of the Alden State Bank.
