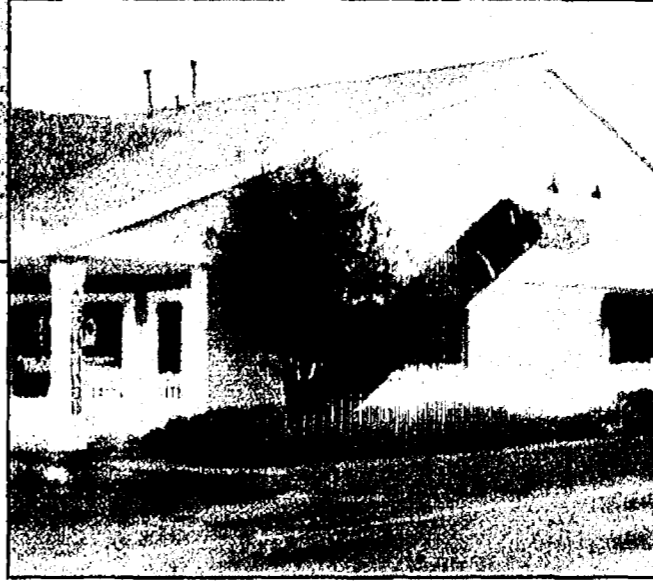

## New face on board

### Jim Jordan will fill seat on EJPS School Board

The East Jordan Board of Education has appointed a local pastor to fill a vacant position on the school board.

Jim Jordan, pastor of the Lighthouse Missionary Church in East Jordan, was approved by the East Jordan School Board at last week's regular meeting, taking over a position left vacant by longtime board member Larry Chanda, who resigned last month due to health reasons.

Jordan, who is a member of the school district's Strategic Planning Steering Committee and the School Improvement Team at East Jordan Elementary School, is also an EMT with the East Jordan Emergency Medical Services Department.

Jordan and his wife, Ruby, have two daughters, Sarah and Leah. He will serve the remainder of Chanda's four-year term, which expires in June of 2006.

In other business, the board approved bids associated with the purchase of 90 computers, as part of the school's annual technology replacement program. The computers will be dedicated to two elementary school

## Home again

### Kevin Lockman returns to Boyer City as a DNR officer

Area residents who spy the familiar green pickup truck of the local Department of Natural Resources officer around the area may notice a familiar face at the wheel; after several years of working outside of the area, Boyer City native Kevin Lockman has returned to his roots, as the DNR officer in charge of Charlevoix County.

Lockman, who started his career in the DNR in Mount Morency County in 1997, is pleased to be back. "It's a nice area," he said. "We have three kids, and I can't think of a better place to raise them."

Lockman replaces previous officer Tom Sweet, who retired from the position a couple of years ago. Due to staffing problems, the county had been covered under the jurisdiction of other area officers until Lockman took the job in July. "My wife's from Alpena," Lockman said, "but we always said if this position opened up, we'd take it." Lockman's wife, Karla, is currently employed at Red Mesa in Boyer City. The couple

## A PLACE FOR KIDS

### East Jordan groundbreaking at the Jenni Kenny Memorial Kids Pond marks the next phase of a project that aims to get kids fishing

With the signatures in place on the final permits, the kids' fishing pond project in East Jordan is at last moving into the action phase, with an official groundbreaking and pond-naming ceremony having taken place last week.

Henceforth to be known as the "Jenni Kenny Memorial Kid's Pond," the stocked pond to be located at Sportsmans Park in East Jordan is becoming a reality.

Named after an East Jordan resident who passed away in 1998 due to complications from Downs Syndrome, the pond, according to project organizer Tom Durecki, will be a place that will help rekindle an interest in fishing in the area. Plans include a pond 450 feet in length, 10-30 feet wide and 8-10 feet in depth. Five piers will be built for use by young anglers, including an open pier on each end of the pond, and three covered piers in the middle. The project, which includes a 10-foot wide asphalt walkway along the pond's length, will be handicapped-accessible. Once completed, the plan is to have the pond stocked with blue gill and trout, for catch-and-release fishing.

Begun in 2002, the effort to establish the pond

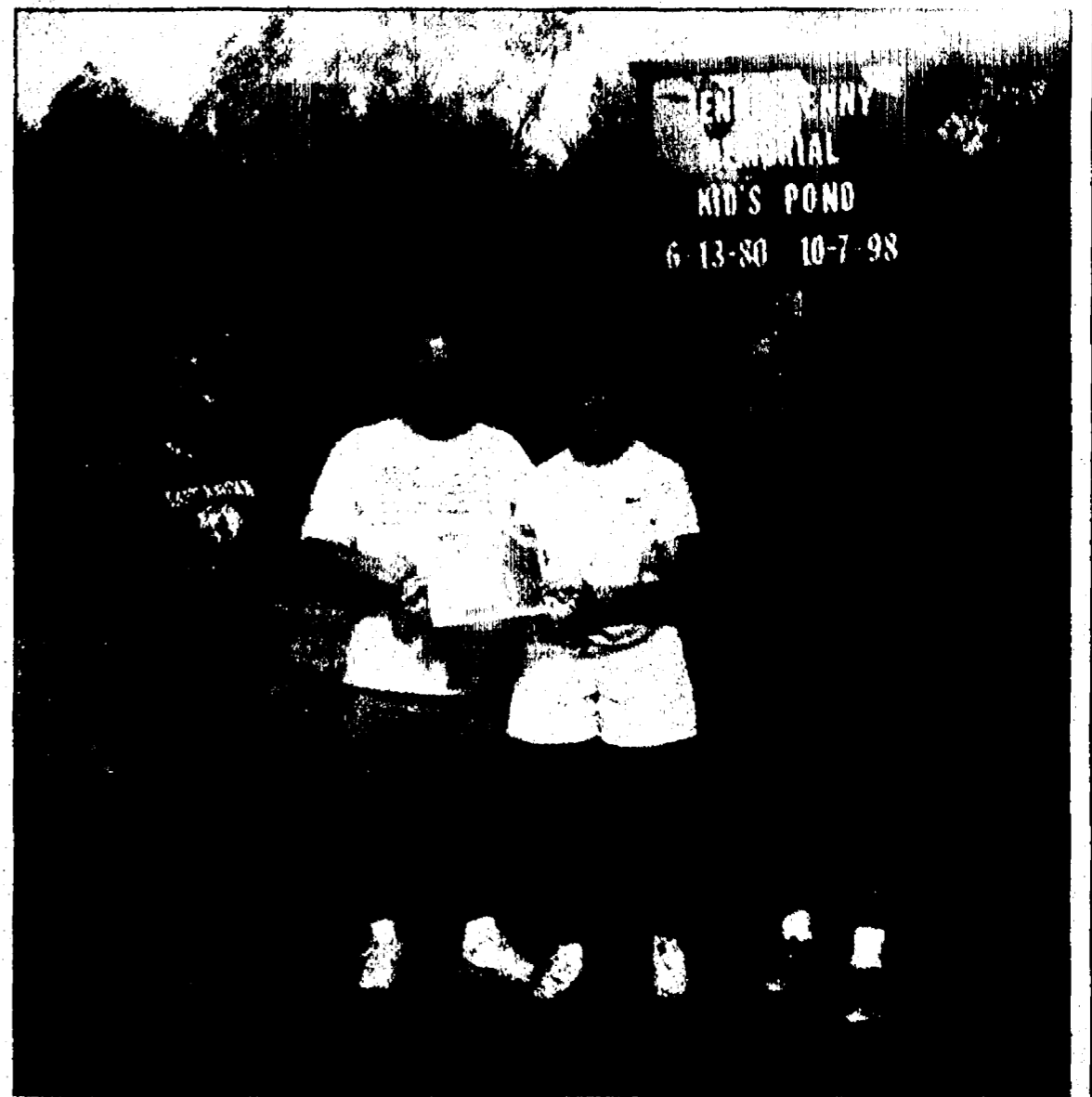
came out of early meetings of a local fisheries committee, comprised of members from East Jordan, Boyer City and Charlevoix. Nationwide, Durecki said, "we're losing 300,000 fishermen a year" to other areas of interest. With a trout tournament already established in Charlevoix, and stocked trout ponds for kids already a reality in Petoskey and the Boyer area, Durecki knew that it was East Jordan's turn to find a way to get kids fishing.

Driving by Sportsmans Park one day, he said, he realized that "God gave us the perfect site."

After doing some checking with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, Durecki sought support from the East Jordan City Commission, which he received unequivocally. Pursuing the plan in earnest, Durecki, found plenty of red tape to cut through, mostly in the form of permit applications.

Funding was also an issue, something that's been whittled away at through local fund-raisers, and grant applications. "We've raised about

# Honeywell Foundation makes big donation to Challenge Mountain

They began ski operations in 1984 with the donation of a 160-acre facility formerly known as Walloon Hills by Everett

Kircher and his family. Over the last three years the lodge and facility have undergone great renovation. New handicapable bathrooms have been installed, electrical work done and renovation to the lodge interior began with a first aid room and quiet room/office being added.

In 2001, Challenge Mountain began hosting the Northern Michigan Special Olympics Winter Games. In 2004, the games will move from an area game status to a Regional status.

Handicapable hiking trails were added in 2002 at Challenge Mountain, as were traditional hiking trails; both were greatly expanded in 2003. Challenge Mountain moved

from winter programming to full year programming in 2002, with sailing and wilderness camping added as summer activities.

Groups accommodated for the 2003 ski season included Michigan Parents of Visually Impaired Children, Great Lakes Bum Camp and Camp Quality as well as private individuals from all over the United States. New programs are being continually evaluated and researched for usefulness with Challenge Mountain clientele. Programs are added as funding is available and volunteers are sought and trained.

## Fish-in brings in big bucks

### Over \$288,000 raised for the American Red Cross through auction of fanciful fish

The Great Northern Michigan Fish-In ended with an auction event last week, reeling in over \$288,000 for the cause. Bidders were in a buying mood at Saturday's event, held at Bay Harbor, where all 44 fish had spent a week on display before being sold to the highest bidder.

The fiberglass fish sculptures had each been decked out by Michigan artists, using a range of media including rocks, glass, paints, and clay, sponsored by area businesses, organizations, and individuals. The fish then spent the summer on display in a number of area communities, including Boyne City and East Jordan.

All proceed from the event benefit the Northern Lower Michigan chapter of the American Red Cross for disaster relief, health and

safety programs, blood services, and armed forces emergency services.

All the fish brought in money for the cause, but some were tangled up in bidding wars, leading at least two area artists, Kimiko Barney and Glen

McCune, to commit to creating similar fish in order to satisfy eager art-lovers.

Barney's two stained glass fish brought in over \$42,000, while McCune's two "Rock Bass" were snatched up for a combined \$38,000.

### Local residents open Bed & Breakfast in Boyne City

The decision to open up her home to guests as the Avalanche Lodge Bed and Breakfast was not a difficult one for Boyne City's Angela Kuhn. "My mother has owned a bed and breakfast in Gladstone for the last six years," Kuhn said. "I'm real comfortable having people in my home."

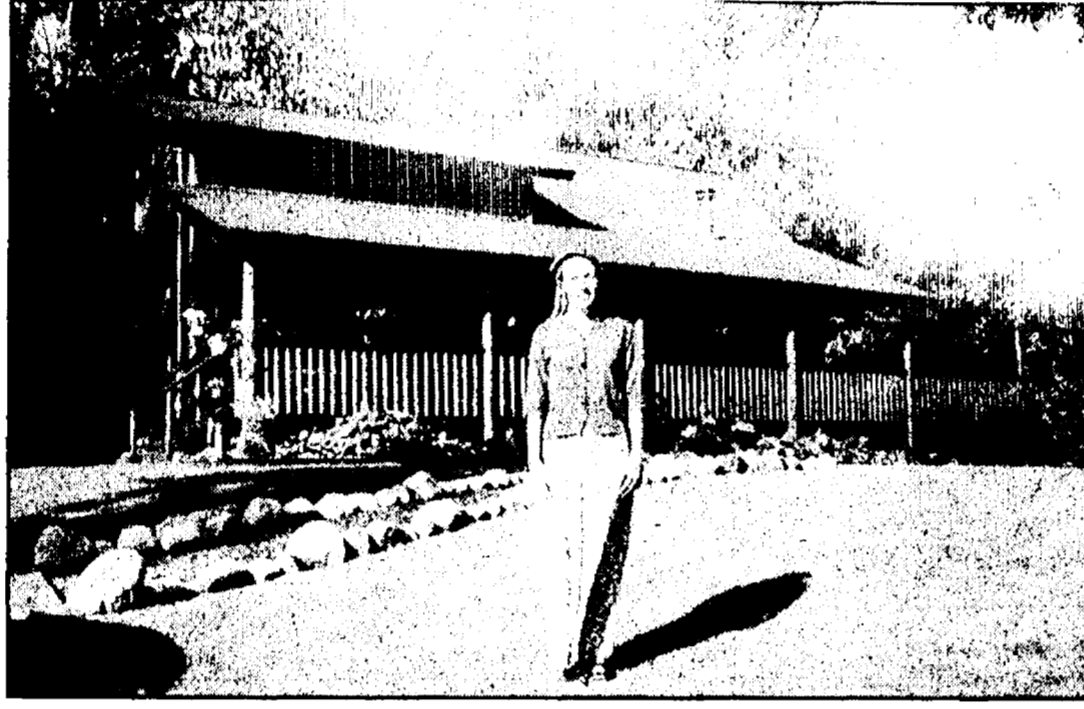
A nurse by profession, Kuhn has, in recent months, decided it was time to make a change. The idea of a bed and breakfast was "planted in my head" in April of this year; by May, she said, "we were open."

For Kuhn and her husband, Billy, a carpenter by trade, that meant opening two bedrooms and one bath to guests, as well as the use of their kitchen, living room, and the fully-finished basement recreation room. Their cedar-sided two-story home is nestled in a particularly scenic location, flanked by the deep woods of Avalanche Nature Preserve and boasting a spectacular hilltop view of Lake Charlevoix, enjoyed to its best advantage off of the home's wraparound deck.

The home itself was a la-

bor of love for the Kuhns, who constructed the structure themselves in 1994, going so far as to cut their own cedar out of the woods, which they stripped by hand. The enjoyment of her own home has, for Kuhn, only been enhanced by sharing it with visitors. "The goal was to share our home with people, and to give them a great place to stay when they come to Boyne," she said. Her visitors have given her as much as she's given them, she said. "Other people bring the world to you. We've really been blessed. Every single [guest] has been wonderful."

Though the Kuhns have done no formal advertising, and without even the benefit of a sign on the road to mark their presence (recently approved by the City, a sign is currently in production), the guests have been arriving steadily since the spring. In fact, the operation hadn't even been officially opened by the time the first guests arrived back in May. "I'd applied for my [Federal] tax ID number, when the [Boyne Area] chamber called and

asked if we were open," Kuhn relates. Looking at the tax ID number in her hand, she said, "I said, 'yeah.' [The guests] were here in five minutes."

The chamber, she noted, has been "tremendously supportive," as have other area B&Bs such as Horton Creek and Deer Lake. "We are the only bed and breakfast in the city limits," Kuhn said. "[Certain]

people do look for and target bed and breakfasts."

Though no official grand opening or ribbon cutting has been announced, one may be scheduled through the Chamber in the future.

Avalanche Lodge offers guests two bedrooms with a shared bath as well as a full breakfast, use of the game room with TV, pool table, and hockey game. The non-smoking estab-

lishment does not allow pets.

Visa and Mastercard are accepted, as well as personal check or cash.

## Nuclear medicine at Charlevoix Area Hospital receives national accreditation

It's been just three years since Charlevoix Area Hospital launched its nuclear medicine department. But in that short period of time, staff members have perfected their highly specialized diagnostic services and patient care to meet the American College of Radiology's rigorous practice standards.

A recent evaluation by the ACR has resulted in a three-year accreditation of the department—making Charlevoix Area Hospital the only facility in northern

Michigan to be so designated.

The American College of Radiology awards accreditation to facilities after a thorough peer review conducted by board-certified physicians and medical physicists who are experts in nuclear medicine. Michelle Potter, nuclear medical technologist who oversees the hospital's department, says the meticulous accreditation process looks at the skills and training of staff, procedure protocols, scope of services,

and quality of equipment.

"This ACR accreditation confirms that we're able to provide high quality care, and serves as a measure of excellence for our patients, referring physicians, and health insurers," she explains. "It's a challenging process, but one we volunteered to undertake. I'm pleased that we were recognized for our hard work."

The nuclear medicine department uses radioactive tracers to identify various types of conditions—from heart disease and thy-

roid problems, to bone abnormalities or gall bladder disease. During a diagnostic test, the patient ingests or is injected with a very small amount of radioactive material that travels to the organ or tissue under study.

Once introduced, the radioactive isotope gives off gamma rays that can be seen by special imaging equipment called a gamma camera, and those images are studied by radiologists to determine a treatment plan.

Tests, which are, according to the hospital, painless and take only a short time, are usually performed on an outpatient basis.

Charlevoix Area Hospital's nuclear medicine accreditation joins the mammography department, which received ACR accreditation in 1992. More information about the facility's nuclear medicine capabilities is available by calling Charlevoix Area Hospital Nuclear Medicine Department, (231) 547-4024.

### Fair ordinances are key in preserving water resources

TO THE EDITOR:

The newest buzz in the world of storm-water runoff is "Natural Stormwater Management." Storm-water managers have officially recognized that "Mother Nature" can do for flooding and pollution what tons of concrete and expensive infrastructure have failed to do.

Undisturbed, naturally vegetated land has very little surface runoff. When it rains, water percolates directly into the soil and slowly recharges aquifers, streams, wetlands and lakes. When there is surface runoff from natural lands, it is in the form of a sheet flow across the saturated soil.

The water infiltrates other areas or flows through natural depressions, drainage ways and wetlands into larger streams and rivers.

This creates a natural drainage scheme and involves slow input into surface water systems that lessens flooding and erosion to streams and lakes. With less erosion, sediment in storm-water is less and the water quality of lakes, beaches and streams remains high.

Today, storm-water managers and regulators are encouraged to look at the Watershed "big picture," to recognize the importance of natural systems and to protect natural drains, streams and wetlands by preserving buffers, greenbelts and by using common sense "best management practices."

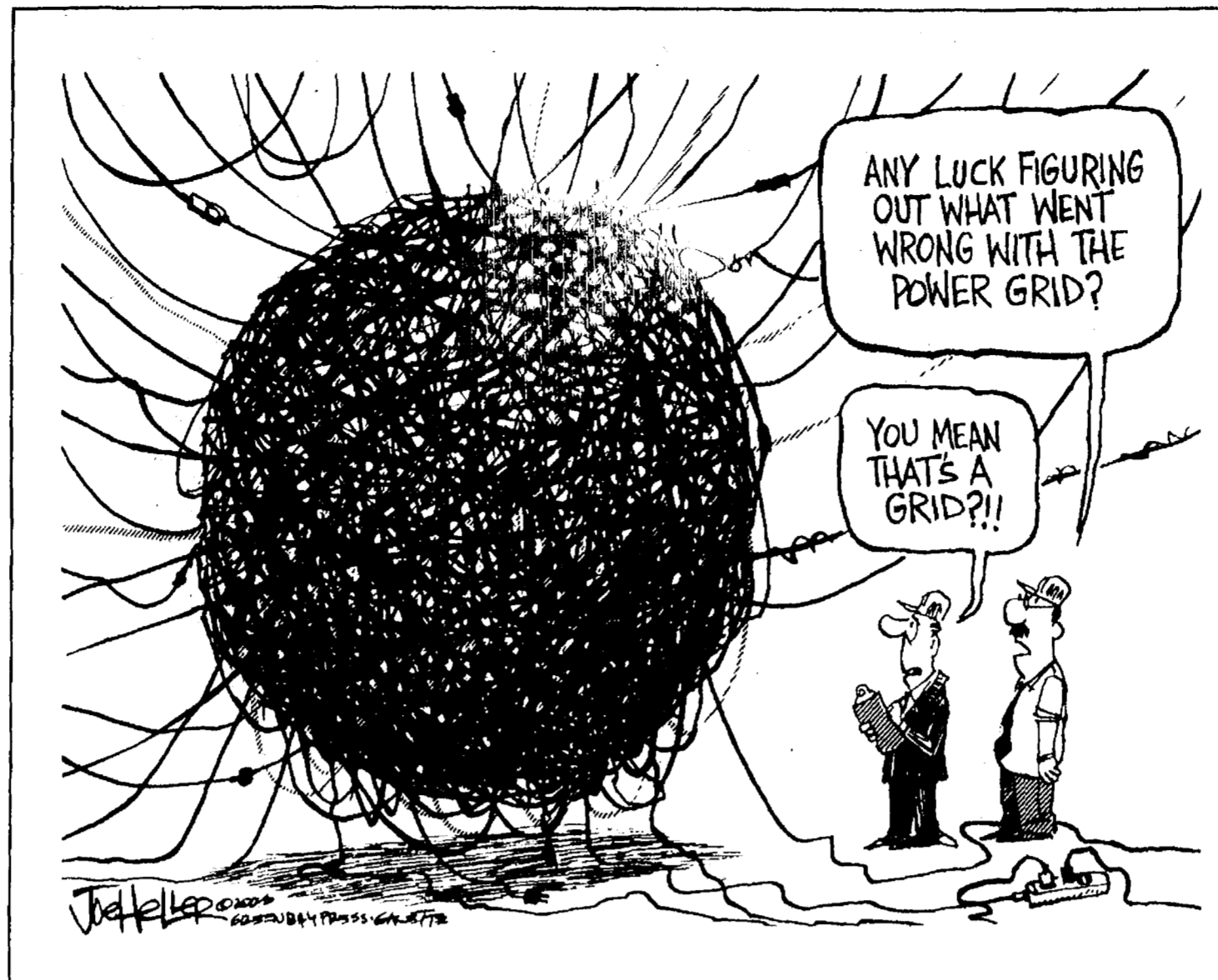
When streams are channeled and wetlands are filled, their natural capacity for absorbing storm-water and filtering pollutants is lost.

In order to avoid flooding, erosion and the loss of our fisheries, these natural environmental assets must be protected or replaced with expensive infrastructure. In the past, much of this cost was born by the taxpayer.

Responsible developers are careful to respect the land. Greenbelts along our waterways, pollution prevention, good housekeeping, and public education help us protect the water and land we love, and are economically advantageous as well.

Fair and equitable county soil and sedimentation and storm-water ordinances are essential to preserving our quality of life and natural resources.

VETERAN OF THE MONTH

Alvin James Gardner

Veteran of the Month for August is Alvin James Gardner.

Born on March 2, 1919 in Boyne city, Gardner graduated from high school in 1937. On June 25, 1940 he married Pauline Adeline Smith in Boyne City.

Gardner worked as a finish carpenter until his induction into the Army on April 12, 1944, entering into active duty at Fort Sheridan, Ill.

Following basic training, Gardner departed the United States on Sept. 22, 1944 arriving in the European Theater of Operations on Sept. 30, 1944. He participated in campaigns in the Rhineland and Ardennes. While serving as a squad leader near Bitburg, Germany, Gardner, with disregard for his personal safety, exposed himself to direct enemy tank fire and threw a smoke grenade; under cover of the smoke screen, he fearlessly led his squad to safety for which he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal on March 2, 1945.

On March 4, 1945 Gardner was wounded by exploded shrapnel, almost losing his leg. He was hos-

pitalized in England until June 8, 1945, when he departed England arriving the United States on June 23, 1945. He was hospitalized at Fort Campbell, Ky., and later at Percy Jones General Hospital, Fort Custer, Mich. where he received his Honorable Discharge on July 17, 1946, having attained the rank of Private First Class.

Gardner received the following decorations and citations: European African Middle Eastern Theater Ribbon with two Bronze Battle Stars, American Theater Ribbon, World War II Victory Medal, Combat Infantry Badge, Good Con-

duct Medal, Purple Heart and Bronze Star Medal.

Gardner returned to the Boyne area where he worked as a finish carpenter until his retirement in 1981. He enjoyed hunting, fishing, camping and nature, and time with his grandchildren until he answered the final call on May 3, 1994.

He is being honored by his wife Pauline and daughter Nancy. The Veteran of the Month program is available for any deceased veteran who served honorably in the United States military.

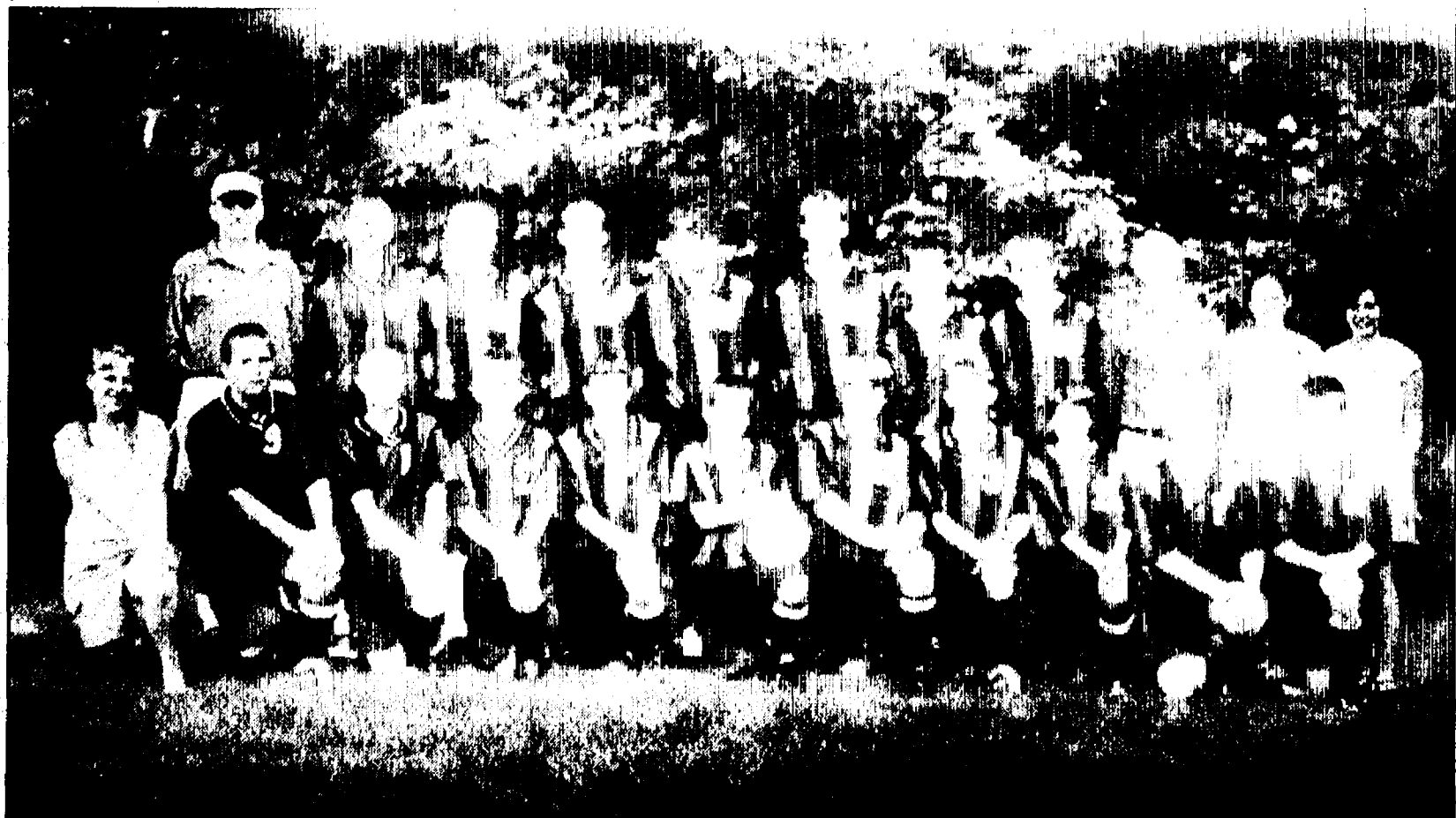

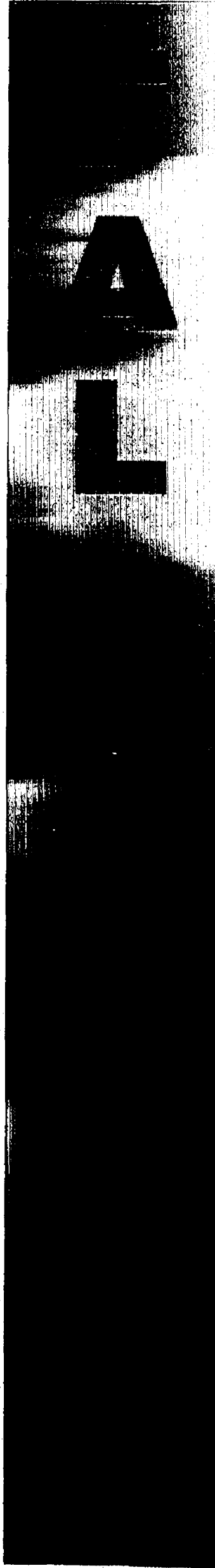

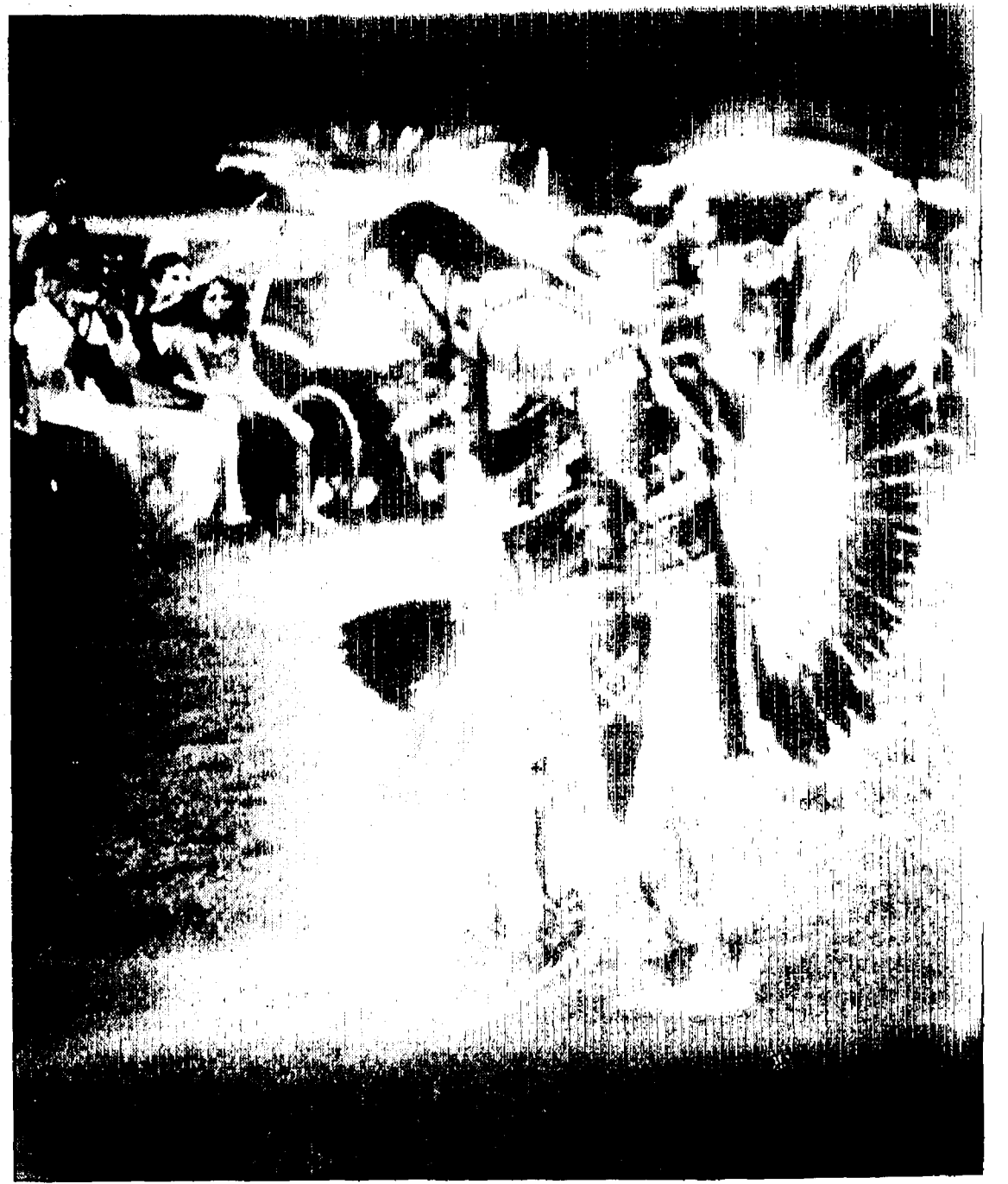

**Aspirin For Your Heart**

Aspirin has been shown to have beneficial effects for people with heart disease due to its anti-clotting effects. However, according to the New England Journal of Medicine, ibuprofen and other similar NSAIDS may block this important effect. The study found that taking ibuprofen (such as Advil or Motrin) a few hours before aspirin interfered with aspirin's protective effects regardless of the timing of the aspirin dose. Acetaminophen (Tylenol) didn't block the aspirin. Ask your doctor for advice.

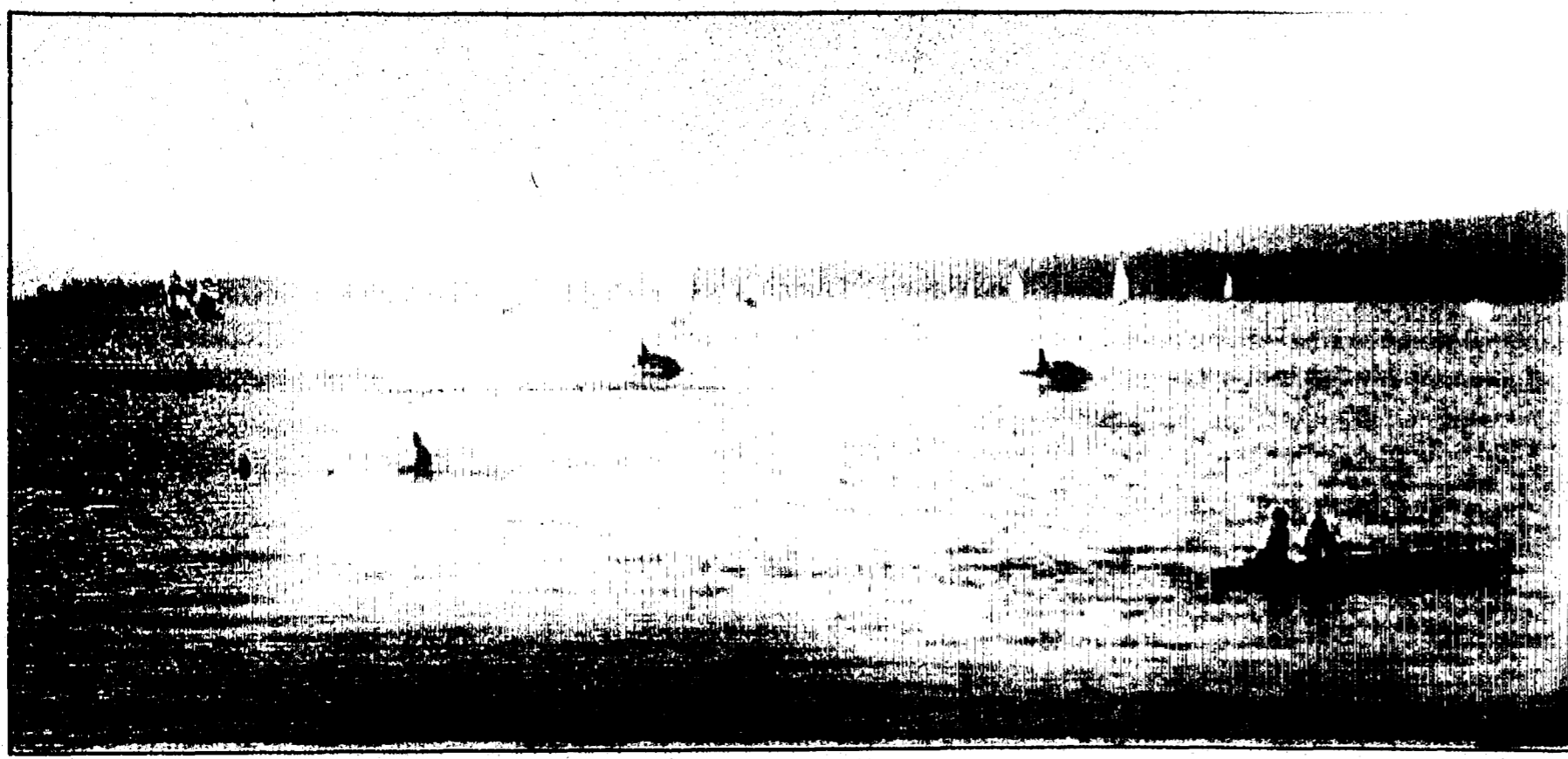

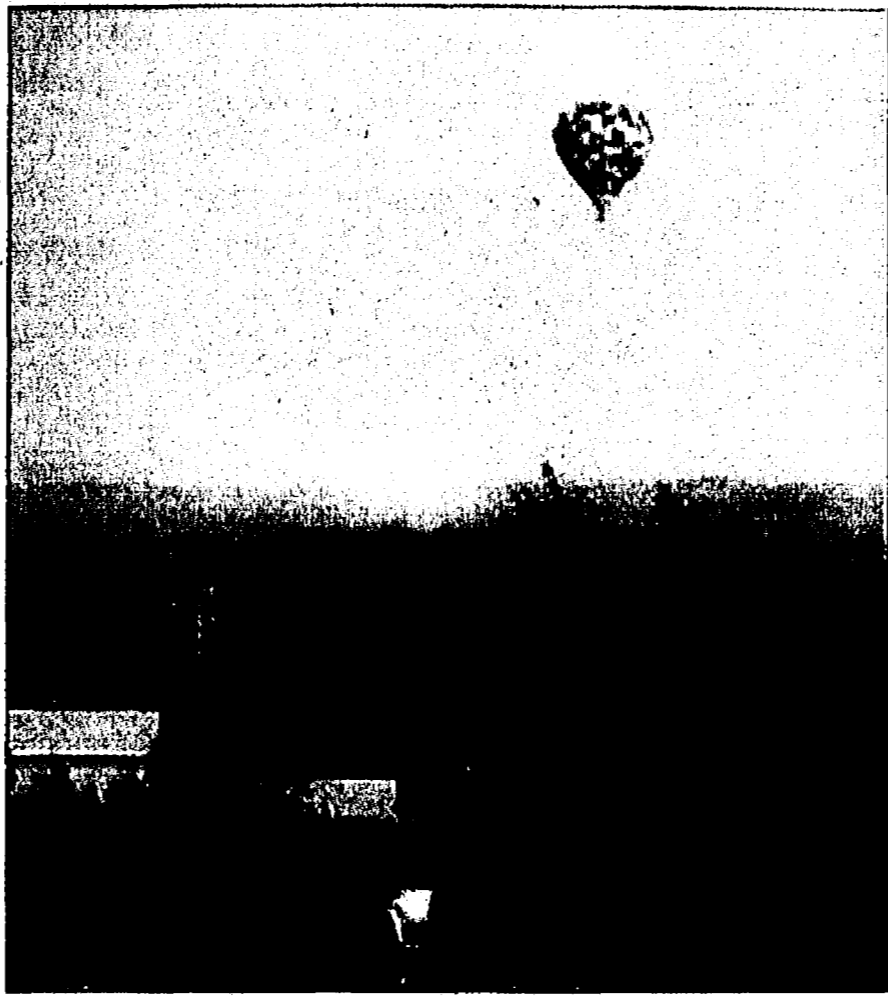

## Boyne City grad receives education honor

Boyne City High School graduate Patricia A. Carlisle, formerly Patricia A. Davis, special assistant to the chancellor and equal opportunity/affirmative action officer for Purdue University North Central, is one of 10 LaPorte County (Indiana) leaders earning the March of Dimes "Mission in Motion" awards. Carlisle was selected for her contributions to education in LaPorte County.

Award selection criteria included "having a creative and innovative approach to supporting students; finding means to engaging and inspiring students and having the message for better education heard by the larger community."

Other award areas included youth services,

volunteerism, spiritual, business, arts/culture, health, media, strengthening families and community support.

Carlisle is the daughter of Clara Davis and the late Warren Davis. She is a member of the Boyne City High School Hall of Fame. Carlisle has been with Purdue North Central, located in Westville, Ind., since 1982. She's held several positions and has a series of accomplishments to her credit. She was key in organizing the annual conference "Women on the Move," the implementation of women's programming and a number of advocacy initiatives including a "return to learn" program for women returning to post-secondary education, giving

them the tools and confidence to return to school.

In 1984 Carlisle became the founder and director of PNC's Student Support Services; a project funded by the U.S. Department of Education serving students with disabilities, low-income students and first generation college students. Through the years, Carlisle advised, motivated and provided a role model for countless students. Many had no support network at home, and no one to encourage them or help guide them through the intricacies of "the system" and she provided the support and encouragement to succeed.

As special assistant to the chancellor, she has been a driving force in the PNC

Chancellor's Leadership Seminar, a program designed to help students attain leadership skills. She is a member of many university, local, state and national organizations, committees and associations dedicated to advancing women's issues, enhancing diversity, equal opportunity and multi-culturalism, including Healthy Communities of LaPorte County;

Michiana Resources; Dunebrook children's advocacy center; the LaPorte County Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration Committee, Chesterton/Dune and Chamber of Commerce; the El Puente Community Center and is a volunteer with United Way of LaPorte County. She was presented the Athena Award from the Michigan City Chamber of Commerce in 2002.

has three children, Ethan, Brandon, and Kortney, all of whom will be attending Boyne City Public Schools this fall.

Born and raised in Boyne City, Lockman graduated from Boyne City High School, moving on to study fisheries and wildlife management at Michigan State University.

After a short stint with the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department, Lockman went to work for the DNR, a career move that had long been his goal.

"I grew up around Tom [Sweet]," he said. "I had that influence."

As a law enforcement officer for the DNR, Lockman's job focuses on everything from boating and RV recreational activities to fishing and hunting. "This time of year, I spend a lot of time on the lakes [monitoring fishermen]," he said.

\$2,500 on our own," Durecki noted at the groundbreaking on Aug. 21 through things like hot dog sales and a spaghetti supper.

Acquiring the bulk of the funds for the project, however, which will cost in total an estimated \$68,000, is still a concern.

"I'm working on grants with the Charlevoix County Community Foundation, the Frey Foundation, and the Coastal Zone Management Unit," he said.

Letters have also gone out to a variety of fishing tackle manufacturers, seeking donations of funds or products to be used in fundraising efforts.

Local enthusiasm, he noted, has been evident.

"The support we've got from this community has been unbelievable," he said.

Though the groundbreaking marks the beginning of the construction of the pond, the completion of the project

depends wholly on the future commitment of volunteers and funding.

"I want the kids to be in this pond next summer," Durecki said. There's plenty to do in the meantime, however, from clearing brush to building decks

and rails, to organizing more fund-raising activities.

"We're always looking for volunteers," he said.
