Variance granted for hotel project in BC

Despite another bump in the road, the Devlon Corporation's plans for a condominium hotel on Boyne City's waterfront will move forward, after the Boyne City Zoning Board of Appeals granted the developer a variance allowing full kitchen facilities as part of the hotel's rooming units.

The move came at the regular ZBA meeting, held Tuesday, after the board denied an appeal from Devlon regarding the zoning administrator Dan Reed's denial of their application for a zoning permit.

The site plans for the hotel were

approved in May by the Boyne City Planning Commission. A hotel is one of the usages permitted in the Waterfront Marina District, which is where the property, commonly known as "Big C," is located. Per zoning requirements, the Devlon development, dubbed the Boyne Beach Club, must assure that 90 percent of the hotel's 30 rooms be used as short-term rental, or transient, facilities. Three rooms, or 10 percent of the total, can be utilized as permanent residences.

Last month, Reed denied Devlon's application for a zoning permit based

on the fact that the rooming units depicted in the hotel floor plan included full kitchen facilities. Reed maintained that such facilities were not in accordance to the definition of a hotel in accordance with the City's zoning ordinance.

"I looked at the ordinance to determine if what was being applied for met the ordinance," Reed said at the meeting, adding that he utilized past planning commission minutes, as well as previous action and the language of the ordinance. "I took all that and made the decision that this was

not a hotel."

Reed requested that if the Zoning Board of Appeals felt that there was some ambiguity in the ordinance, that the board uphold his denial and subsequently look at a use variance for the property.

Speaking for the Devlon Corp., owner James Hevey referred to the "conundrum" created by this latest development. "I've been involved in the community with this project for four and a half years," Hevey said. "It's always been my proposal that this hotel/marina development be a "Ing to be." Zoning Knurick, wo of the pla firmed that discussion please."

Boyne River file three suits against MDEQ

The Friends of the Boyne River have added a third filing to their collection of suits against the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality, related to claims that the MDEQ didn't follow proper procedures in granting a permit for Boyne City's planned wastewater system upgrade.

In August, the Friends filed a petition in Ingham County Circuit Court for an evidentiary hearing in relation to the permit process, as well as, in conjunction with the Coalition to Save the Boyne River, an appeal to the MDEQ director Steven E. Chester regarding the steps taken in the permitting process.

Adding to the list is the most recent filing, in which the Friends of the Boyne River have filed a petition for a contested case with the MDEQ Office of Administrative Hearings. All of the filings, according to FOBR and coalition member Larry Maltby, are related to "the same idea, with different direction."

All maintain the same premise — that the MDEQ issued the permit to the City of Boyne City for construction and financing through the State

When Sgt. Troy Drebenstedt, a member of Boyne's American Legion Post #228, was home on leave from Iraq recently, he agreed to take time away from his family for an interview with fellow Legionnaire, Maxine Hough.

Maxine: When Jennifer Lehto, who was home on leave recently, left Iraq she said her plane was fired upon. Was your plane fired upon?

Troy: Yes, we fly over the war zone. But, we have good pilots who use

M. Your mailing address says you are in Camp Anaconda in Iraq. Tell me

T. Our camp is situtated in one of Saddam Hussein's former palaces. When Hussein fell from power the United States took over that area. It's rather nice in many ways. We have both indoor and outdoor Olympic size swimming pools; a workout room with all kinds of equipment, and some of the larger buildings in camp are rather nice.

M. What kind of living quarters do you have?

T. There are two kinds: some are just tents and some are more permanent buildings.

M. What about the heat? Are they well ventilated?

T. In the tents we use like window air conditioners for temporary relief from the heat. Other buildings have window air conditioners permanently mounted in the windows.

NMC Health Agency warns of chickenpox outbreak

Despite the availability of vaccine tiredness. According to Meyerson, once preventing the disease, several cases of chickenpox have been reported in it could also be passed on to those at Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego Counties in the past year, according to officials from Northwest Michigan Community Health Agency, the health department that serves the four coun-

Chickenpox symptoms are usually mild, but chickenpox can be serious, es- had chickenpox. People who do not get pecially in young infants and adults. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 12,000 people are hospitalized each year in the U.S. for chickenpox and about 100 die, including about 20 children, as a result of

"With the school year approaching, it's a good time for parents to check the children's immunization records to be sure they've received the varicella vaccine – that's the immunization that prevents chickenpox," said Joshua Meyerson, MD, Medical Director.

"One of our primary goals at the health department is to prevent communicable disease outbreaks, including chickenpox, in the community."

Chickenpox can be very uncomfortable for healthy children and adults. with rash and blister, inching, fever, and chickenpox takes hold in a community risk of severe infection: infants, pregnant women, and patients with cancer, for example.

The Childhood and Adolescent Immunization Schedule recommends one dose of varicella vaccine at 12 months of age or at any age if they have never the vaccine or chickenpox until age 13 or older including adults, should get two shots, four weeks apart, to protect them from chickenpox.

The chickenpox vaccine is available from physicians' offices and at health department offices in Charlevoix, Petoskey, Gaylord, Bellaire, and Mancelona. However, the Michigan Department of Community Health wants to assure this vaccine is available to all children, regardless of families' availability to pay. For more information, call the health department during regular business hours at (800) 432-4121.

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



M. A tent isn't insulated - doesn't the cool air just go through the canvas? T. Yes, but every little bit helps.

M. How do you stand the heat when you're on duty?

T. We just have to deal with it. The heat collects under our helmets and stays trapped in there; and it builds up inside our bullet proof vests, over which we have slung our ammunition belts. The weight of the vest and belt is probably over 65 pounds.

M. Don't you sweat a lot? Do you drink lots of water?

T. Yes and yes. We are supplied with bottles of water. Lack of water can kill you and too much water can kill you, too. We add Gatorade, which comes in small packets like Kool-Aid, to our water bottes. That way we keep replenishing the minerals and electrolytes the water washes out of our bodies.

M. I see you are wear-

ing glasses. Are those compatible with the GI military goggles I see in pictures of soldiers? T. Absolutely not. I ran

out of my contact lenses over there and first thing I did when I got home was get a new supply. The military goggles have to fit very snugly across the forehead, and around the side of the face and across the bridge of the nose so shrapnel can't get inside and injure the eyes. Until I could come home. I wore night ski goggles over my glasses, which was the best I could do.

M. I understand the climate is very dry in Iraq. That's not quite compatible with wearing contacts.

T. We have to use a special moisurizer for contacts—not Visine or Murine, or even the regular kind of moisturizer, Most glish. optometrists carry it as do some pharmacies.

M. What is your ongoing realtionship with the Iraqi people?

T. They go to great lengths to make the soldiers

feel more comfortable and we try to make the Iraqi people feel more secure while the Iraqi government is slowly taking back their control.

M. What about the chil-

T. Some of them look really pathetic and raggedy. When they come alongside our vehicles, we throw them the wrapped candy and gum and sometimes even our MRIs. While I'm home, I'm trying to find a lot of Tshirts that have the American Flag on them or say USA or have English writing on them, to take back to the kids. It's part of "Operation Outreach." The kids need the T-shirts for clothing, but they'll also be showing our flag and the United States of America and maybe they can learn

M. What kind of things can we send to you and your fellow soldiers? We don't want to be sending a bunch of junk you don't

At its second annual Pink Ribbon Ride in memory of Kathy McDonald, Charlevoix/Emmet County Chapter (Boyne Bike4 of BreastCancer raised over \$16,000, bringing its total contribution over two years to \$26,383. Proceeds from the event are donated to Northern Michigan Hospital Foundation and Charlevoix Area Hospital Foundation, to assist them in their efforts to provide education, support programs, and mammogram screenings for those in need throughout the North-

ern Michigan service area. This year's ride, held at Veterans Park in Boyne City, included 98 participants from across the state. Riders chose one of three routes based on their skill levels. Local businesses and residents donated supplies, food, drink, and prizes, and even the Ironton Ferry was kept busy as it transported pink ribbon clad riders during the final leg of their 42mile journey around Lake Charlevoix. Other routes took riders through town on a 17-mile ride to the Ferry, or on a simple spin around the park. As a result, Bike4BreastCancer is once again helping the women of Northern Michigan understand that a diagnosis of breast cancer need not be a death sentence.

Plans for the third annual Pink Ribbon Ride are already underway, as the organization prepares for another event on June 18,

Founded in 1996 by President Kathy Betz of Bel Air, Maryland, the Bike4BreastCancer organization strives to raise awareness of the devastation of breast cancer, and to provide the latest information relating to all aspects of breast cancer detection and treatment.

Rather than raising funds for all important research and treatment programs, Bike4BreastCancer prefers to involve itself at the grass roots level, by sponsoring individual Pink Ribbon Rides in small towns and cities throughout the country, and utilizing the proceeds within the community. The organization currently sponsors pink ribbon rides in Havre De Grace, MD; Greenbelt, MD, and Boyne City, MI, and has to date raised over \$50,000 for local pro-

In 2002, when word of this effort reached Boyne City resident Kathy McDonald, herself a breast cancer patient and avid cyclist, she knew it would be perfect for her community, and set about organizing the annual event. Kathy herself did not survive to participate in the inaugural ride in 2003, but the support of friends, family, and countless volunteers see that her dream of helping

others stays alive. On the national level, Kathy Betz herself will embark on her first bi-annual cross-country cycling trip. After departing from Los Angeles on Aug.27, she hopes to average 125 miles per day, arriving in Maryland on Sept. 22. Visiting small towns and cities along the way, Kathy hopes to bring breast cancer awareness to the forefront, as well as assisting those who wish to participate in their own commun nities.

An early season showdown

For the past several years, the last game of the regular season for the Boyne City Ramblers was a date with Traverse City St. Francis. And for many of those games, much was at stake: a playoff berth, a conference championship or an unbeaten season.

This year, the schedule is reversed. Instead of closing out the season, the two teams will open the Lake Michigan Conference with a game at Traverse City's Thirlby Field Friday night. The Ramblers enter the game 2-0 after an exciting 33-25 victory over Rogers City last Friday. St. Francis is 1-1.

minium hotel project all along, "Every [planning commission] board member was aware that currently, in this day and age, there are kitchens in hotels," Knurick said, "Dan is right, because he is going by our ordinance, but the planning commission was well aware that kitchens were involved."

The board ultimately decided, by a vote of 3-2, to deny Devlon's request to overturn Reed's decision to not issue a zoning permit. However, subsequently, the board voted 4-1 to grant Devlon a use variance, allowing the kitchens facili- trict. ties to be included in the hotel plans.

According to some members of the audience, the issue really boils down to problems within the zoning

ordinance itself. "In this case, the floor plans look very much like multiple family housing units," said local resident and builder Todd Wright. "[The zoning ordinance] does not prohibit condos but it does prohibit multiple family dwellings [in the Waterfront Marina District].

"At the very least, there's ambiguity in the ordinance. There are some real holes in the ordinance."

The hotel project is the first to be presented following a 2003 ordinance amendment that added hotels as a permitted use for the three properties within the Waterfront Marina Dis-

The district itself was created in 2001 as part of a comprehensive overhaul of the city's zoning ordinance.

Revolving Fund prior to the expiration of the 30-day deadline contained in the required public notice. The suit claims that the MDEQ approved the construction, and a loan of \$7 million, without certainty of the discharge location and effluent requirements.

The filings are just the latest developments in the Friends' and the Coalition's efforts against the City's decision to locate the wastewater discharge outfall in the Boyne River. The group has vocally opposed the river discharge option

throughout the wastewater system upgrade planning process.

Though the suit is not being brought against the City of Boyne City, Boyne City commissioners voted last month to retain counsel, Philip Erickson of Plunkett and Cooney, for matters that may arise from the suit. The legal action, however, has not affected the City's progress on moving forward with the system upgrade, according to city manager Mike Cain, "It hasn't affected the progress at all," he said. "We're still on all of our timelines, still moving forward on it."

Cain maintains that the City has, and will continue to, "remain open and con-

sider the options." The City recently approved funding for an attainability study regarding a

wetlands discharge option. "We're keeping an open mind to any reasonable issues or suggestions," Cain said, adding that "We're still comfortable with our direc-


