We can all agree on a new Boyne Area Senior Center

With the presidential election heating up and coming into its final, frenzied days, it's easy for other election-day candidates and issues to be overshadowed in the minds of voters.

At the local level, however, there's one issue that is, or should be, of particular interest to all segments of the population, and that is the Boyne Area Senior Center millage request. If passed, the .35 mills sought will make it possible for a new senior center facility to be constructed, giving Boyne seniors a place of their own at last.

And it's not, it has been emphasized, just for Boyne City seniors. I made the grievous error in last week's Citizen-Journal of repeatedly calling the project the Boyne City Senior Center. I, of all people, should know better, having reported on the Boyne AREA Senior Center project numerous times over the past few years. It's easy, it seems, to fall into the habit of tagging that "Boyne City" moniker on anything that happens to be located within the city limits (just ask the Boyne AREA Chamber of Commerce how often that mistake is made!).

It is of the utmost importance to note, however, that the senior center truly is for the seniors of the entire Boyne area, and not just within the city limits. Though it will be located in town, on property provided through the Boyne City Housing Commission adjacent to the Deer Meadows and Litzengruber Place senior apartment complexes, the facility will serve seniors from throughout the surrounding area, including those in Bay, Boyne Valley, Evangeline, Eveline, Melrose and Wilson townships.

Currently, seniors from these areas are served in a small meeting room at Boyne City City Hall, a space for which they've been grateful, but have clearly outgrown. Lunches and special events are overcrowded, and are occasionally displaced as other groups need to utilize the "senior center" space. Scheduling for special events and services is limited on the whole. A new senior center will provide ample space (5,400 square feet of it) to provide senior services, including health and exercise programs, recreational events, and educational courses (much of which is funded, mind you, through the already-renewed county senior services millage). It will also provide a central place for area seniors to dine, visit, and simply enjoy the simple benefits of community.

If there's one thing we all have in common it's that, no matter what our political party affiliation, we will all be senior citizens sooner or later. A new facility for the Boyne Area Senior Center should be something we all can agree upon.

First of all I want to thank you all for the many well-wishes, cards, flowers, and chocolates (ok, maybe a little wishful thinking) that were sent my way during my recent illness. It seems that many of you have at some point suffered through Kindergarten Momitis and lived to tell of it. Still others are experiencing the early symptoms and are relieved to know that they are not alone.

As for me, I'm well on my way to recovery. I have a few relapses now and then—like when we had those beautiful autumn mornings and I wished I had all three of my children home to enjoy them with me. Then I realized, whom was I kidding? With Eleri and 9-month old Paxton it seemed we were rarely ready to get out the door much before Trenton got home from his half-day schedule! Anyway, the Kleenex box is no longer a permanent fixture in my hand. Well, that's not altogether true. I do believe that Trenton was kind enough to share with Paxton and Eleri not only his new-found knowledge, but also his first run-in with school germs. My tissues were put to good use on them.

My Momitis recovery took a little time. Every time I started to feel better little things would set me back again. Like a mom carrying a sobbing little girl away from school on the second day. "What's wrong?" asked the mom. The girl cried harder, barely making out the words, "I miss my bubby!" "He'll be home soon," comforted the mom as they walked away, heedless of the fact that my eyes were brimming as I thought of how often Eleri asked when Trenton would come home.

But my strength did return, aided by the fact that Trenton

loves school—his teacher, his new buddies, and especially the class reading center. He even enjoys the class job he gets every week, although I still can't figure out why it's so exciting to pick up the toys at school and not in his bedroom. In fact, Trenton's only complaint about school, other than having to get up in the morning, is that kindergartners are not allowed to check books out from the school library. It was a mild problem, easily fixed by an afternoon trip down to the public library.

Every day I travel farther down the road to recovery, listening to the stories (10-20 of them) that Trenton has to tell us all. Each Friday folder brings the color back to my cheeks as I'm able to see the things he's learning and the many projects he creates. When he received a certificate for the "Best Listener" from a substitute I almost felt like my old self again.

However, the most important part of the healing process—and something I would advise anyone still suffering from Kindergarten Momitis to do—would be this: visit the classroom. I had the opportunity to take snacks to class for Trenton's birthday and see first-hand how and what he was doing. Judging from his smile, the interaction with the other students, and the pride in his voice as he showed me around, I'd say he's doing just fine.

Which means I'm doing just fine. And while I expect a relapse two years down the road when Eleri heads out to kindergarten, and again when Paxton walks out the door, I know that despite the misery, I will survive. Now if we can only make it through the flu season...

SA VANESSA D. LEGG of Boyne City recently graduated from the Naval Recruit Training Command in Great Lakes, Ill.

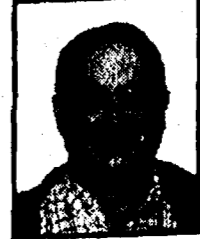
She will be attending Seamon Apprenticeship School in Great Lakes before leaving for her first duty station in Guam upon USS Frank Cable AS-40 in December.

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OUR SOLDIERS OVERSEAS

Troy Drebenstedt

Troy Drebenstedt, a member of American Legion Post #228, Boyne City, and resident of Charlevoix County stationed in Iraq, began his tour of duty last year by telling his mother he had good news and bad news. The good—he had an opportunity to travel; the bad—he would start in Iraq. Hot, hot, HOT weather, camel spiders and more sand and gravel than he has experienced in 21 years of life, are central to his list of new experiences.

Never one to sit around, Troy, a former Petoskey High School athlete, is preparing to compete in a 10-mile race on Oct. 24 and, as competition likes company, he has persuaded eight of his unit buddies to take part in the ten-mile relay being run at the same time. Running allows him to unwind from tension caused by conveying supplies to various military locations around Iraq.

When asked about his mission, Troy becomes eloquent regarding the good that is being accomplished for the Iraqi people by the Coalition troops stationed there. He talks about hospitals and supplies, schools and supplies, and electrical hookup and clean water for some who have never had those facilities, among other beneficial activities. He also mentions the thankfulness of the average Iraqi citizen.

His unit was involved in Operation Generosity I, a program to

supply some fun items for the children among whom they live. The 369th family members have sent items such as colored ballpoint pens, summer sandals, soccer balls, small toys and stuffed animals, backpacks, sunglasses, small writing/drawing/coloring pads, matchbox cars and tons of wrapped candy and snack bars.

Now through Operation Generosity II, the unit is attempting to gather winter clothing to be shared in their area. When asked, Troy states the temperature is down around 70 degrees and feels like 30 degrees to those who have been experiencing temperatures holding around 120 degrees for the past several months.

While home on leave in September, Troy spoke to local school children about the Iraqi children.

The support of the people across the nation helps the troops as they have carried on their missions across Iraq. Troy has been especially proud of his northern Michigan community as packages, letters, newspapers and magazines flow to the unit from his home area.

state funding for schools. "The problem is that, even though we've kept the per-pupil grant the same, the costs have gone up exponentially. We've had absolutely huge increases in health insurance. We've had huge increases in amounts of retirement benefits that have to be paid. It's important for people to know that Michigan is third in the country in terms of the amount of money it de-

votes to K-12 education, but it's 44th in the country in terms of how much of that money actually reaches the classroom."

Elsenheimer said this area has a tremendous amount of administrative overhead and that we need to seek out ways to deal with that.

"For example, in Grand Traverse County there is one school superintendent for the whole county. We have at least five in Antrim County and three in Charlevoix

County. Some of the superintendents have discussed this. There might be a situation where we can relieve some of the administrative costs through consolidation or annexation of districts. The bottom line is that it's time to look at some creative solutions on the expense side.

"The only way that we're going to be able to increase the foundation grant and provide more funding for schools is to improve this economy," he said.

third through a tax credit to the business. Besides offering more affordable access to health care, McKimmy said the program would provide money for preventative care.

"Preventative care is wonderful, because the investment in prevention obviously helps to decrease costs later on—both for the individual and everyone. Health care has to become a public responsibility, not an employer responsibility."

In addition, McKimmy supports Granholm's effort to use Michigan purchasing power, as well as coalitions with other states, to decrease the cost of prescription drugs for senior citizens and Medicaid clients.

If approved and levied in its entirety, it is estimated that the 0.35 mills would raise an estimated \$35,816 for the township when first levied in 2004.

This millage shall be levied only if approved by the electorate in all of the following municipalities within Charlevoix County: Bay Township, City of Boyne City, Boyne Valley Township, Evangeline Township, Eveline Township, Melrose Township, and Wilson Township.

BOYNE VALLEY TOWNSHIP BOYNE AREA SENIOR CENTER MILLAGE

This proposal will permit the Township to levy up to 0.35 mills for the purpose of providing funds for planning, coordinating, evaluating, and providing services to older persons, including the construction of a senior citizen center.

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be imposed on taxable property in the Township of Boyne Valley, County of Charlevoix, State of Michigan be increased by up to 0.35 cents (\$0.35 per thousand dollars (\$1,000)(0.35 mills) of the taxable value on all taxable property in the township for three (3) years, 2004 through 2006, inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for planning, coordinating, evaluating and providing services to older persons, including the construction of a senior citizen center? If approved and levied in its entirety, it is estimated that the 0.35 mills would raise an estimated \$29,282 for the township when first levied in 2004.

This millage shall be levied only if approved by the electorate in all of the following municipalities within Charlevoix County: Bay Township, City of Boyne City, Boyne Valley Township, Evangeline Township, Eveline Township, Melrose Township, and Wilson Township.

CHARLEVOIX TOWNSHIP

Shall the previously voted increase in the 15-mill tax limitations imposed under Article IX, Sec. 6 of the Michigan Constitution on general ad valorem taxes within Charlevoix Township be renewed at (2) mills (\$2.00 per \$1,000 of taxable value) for the period of 2005 through 2010 inclusive, for the purpose of providing Capital Improvements, Ambulance Service, Water System Improvements, Sewer Development, Road Work, Fire Protection, and other operating costs; and shall the township levy such renewal in millage for said purpose, thereby raising in the first year an estimated \$305,741.73?

CHARLEVOIX TOWNSHIP

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be imposed on taxable property in the Township of Evangeline, County of Charlevoix, State of Michigan be increased by up to 0.35 cents (\$0.35 per thousand dollars (\$1,000)(0.35 mills) of the taxable value on all taxable property in the township for three (3) years, 2004 through 2006, inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for planning, coordinating, evaluating and providing services to older persons, including the construction of a senior citizen center? If approved and levied in its entirety, it is estimated that the 0.35 mills would raise an estimated \$18,988 for the township when first levied in 2004.

This millage shall be levied only if approved by the electorate in all of the following municipalities within Charlevoix County: Bay Township, City of Boyne City, Boyne Valley Township, Evangeline Township, Eveline Township, Melrose Township, and Wilson Township.

EVELINE TOWNSHIP

This proposal will permit the Township to levy up to 0.35 mills for the purpose of providing funds for planning, coordinating, evaluating, and providing services to older persons, including the construction of a senior citizen center.

To the playoffs

■ Boyne City Ramblers rally to earn playoff berth with a dominating 33-14 victory over the visiting Blazers

What a difference a few weeks made for the Boyne City Rambler football team.

Two weeks ago, they were on the brink of missing the playoffs for the first time in four years. They had just lost to Grayling, their record was 4-3, and most alarming, their offense was missing in action.

Two weeks later, the Ramblers have found their offense, they won their final two games by a combined margin of 78-14, and most impressively, they will make their fourth straight appearance in post season play.

The Ramblers will face LeRoy Pine River in the opening round of the playoffs Friday. Kick off is 7:30 p.m.

Boyne City earned its berth in the playoffs with a dominating 33-14 victory over Kalkaska last Friday night. Like they did the week before, the Ramblers scored early and often,

building a 33-8 lead at the half. And the defense was also on the top its game, holding Kalkaska to a minus 15 yards rushing.

"We are playing much better up front," said Boyne City head coach David Hills. "We had the ball for an awful long time Friday night."

Just how long? The average number of offensive plays is 60 per game, Hills said. Against Kalkaska, the Ramblers ran 83 plays. They rushed 67 times for 336 yards and quarterback Grant Ameel connected on 7 of 14 passes for 95 yards.

The Ramblers opened the scoring on their second possession of the evening when Jordan Sweet scored on a 12-yard run to cap off a 60-yard drive. The extra point attempt was no good.

Sweet came close to having Boyne City's second touchdown when he intercepted a Kalkaska pass and ran 35 yards to the end zone but the play

was called back because of a Rambler penalty.

William Brown scored the Ramblers' second touchdown early in the second quarter when he went the final yard to cap off another lengthy Boyne City drive. With the successful 2-point conversion, the Ramblers led 14-0.

The Ramblers increased their lead when Reed Ameel scored on a six-yard run midway through the second period. With Sebastian Klodda's successful extra point, the Ramblers were comfortably in control with a 21-0 lead.

But the Ramblers kept coming. Dillon Olmstead recovered the ensuing kickoff on Kalkaska's 32-yard line and a few plays later Boyne City was knocking on the door once again. This time it was quarterback Grant Ameel's turn to shine. He went back to pass from Kalkaska's 10-yard line but was flushed from the pocket and scrambled into the end zone for the score.

Kalkaska finally got on the board late in the second quarter when the Blazers connected on a long scoring pass. With their successful two-point conversion, the Blazers trailed 27-8.

The Ramblers, though, still had some gas left in the tank and with just 45 seconds left in the half, Brown scored from two yards out to give the Ramblers a 33-8 lead at the half. As it turned out, that was all the scoring except for a Kalkaska touchdown late in the fourth quarter.

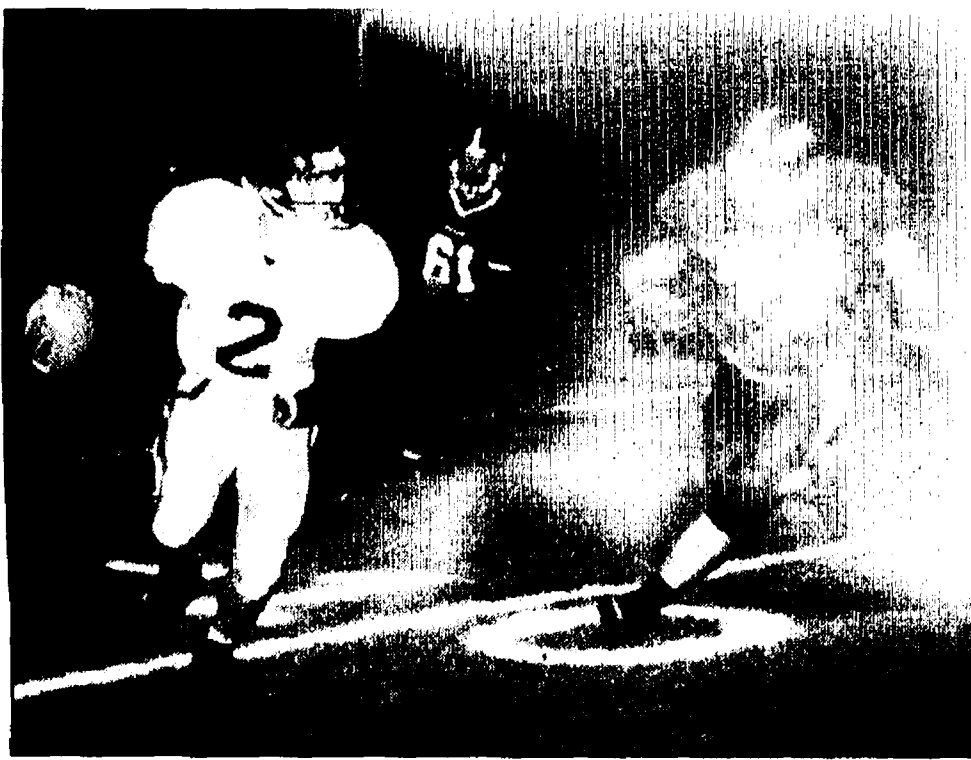
Offensively, Sweet led the team with 18 carries for 92 yards. Right behind him was Sweet who carried 11 times for 84 yards.




