# It all comes down to election day

While the neck-and-neck presidential race has been the contest on most folks' lips this election season, several local races and ballot issues will also be put to the vote on election day, Tuesday, Nov. 2. Polls in local cities and townships will be open at 7 a.m., and will close at 8 p.m.

In Charlevoix County, Republican candidate John Jarema, who beat out incumbent Republican Mary Beth Kur in the August primary, will go toe-to-toe with Green Party challenger Ellis Boal for the county prosecutor's seat. Also up for grabs

# AHAUN'ING IN BOYNE CITY?

■ BELIEVE IT OR NOT, NORTHERN MICHIGAN HAS IT'S OWN STORIES OF THINGS THAT GO BUMP IN THE NIGHT

When it comes to ghost stories there seems to be three different audiences: the believers, the non-believers and the believers who say they are non-believers.

The believers need no convincing when it comes to ghost tales; they fully accept the fact there are "ghosts," and concur with the thought of them being an existing element of the land-of-the-living. The non-believers are the exact opposite: nothing could convince them ghosts exist and sightings are the result of mere imagination.

Lastly, there are the believers who say they are non-believers; this group seems to be the most common. In something of a denial stage, these folks are driven by fright, anxiety, nerves and emotions. They tell themselves, and others, ghost stories are simply stories with no truth behind them; yet their stomachs tie in knots when they drive by a cemetery at night and the thought of entering an abandoned "haunted" house sends chills up their backs.

Many of us have heard the famous ghost stories of northern Michigan; Bowers Inn Harbor of Traverse City, The Lamp Light Restaurant of Central Lake and Bois Blanc Island off the shores of Mackinaw Island. Yet, what about ghosts in our area? Is it possible we have visitors of the past that do not want to leave, right here in Boyne City? According to some local residents, this is not only a possibility, it's reality.

PATRICK McCLEARY, a former Boyne City resident now living in Petoskey, is a believer. "Absolutely, there is no doubt in my mind," said McCleary when asked if he thought his great-grandparents' old fieldstone house in Boyne City is haunted.

According to McCleary, the Colley house in Boyne City is as full of spirits as it is history.

Built in 1902, the Colley house has had various owners and as the story goes, some don't ever want to leave. "People have told me a little boy has been seen peering out the upstairs window of the house," McCleary said. "A local handyman claimed he wouldn't even work on that street anymore because he didn't like that he was always being stared

"I have also been told that two little girls haunt the house and are seen in windows running through the quarters,"

It is said that when the house was built it was originally used as a brothel for many years. Other strange happenings in the house McCleary noted are lights shutting on and off at all hours of the night, along with mysterious shadows and unclear objects seen in the windows.

"I've been in there once, and I'm not sure I ever want to

go back," he said.

In fact, ever since he heard stories from his family that the house was haunted, McCleary became interested and decided to find out for himself what is, or who it is, that moved into his great-grandparents' house years ago, and doesn't want to move out.

On a hot day in July, Patrick went to the house, hoping to explore it and find out more about its rich history. After climbing the cracked cement stairs that enter the abandoned home McCleary felt that he was not the only energy present at the house on a dead end street.

McCleary entered the house and attempted to pick up broken glass from a window pane he saw scattered across the original hardwood floors — it was then the room went freezing cold, the hair on his neck stood straight up and the air went from humid to dead dry in seconds. It only took a couple seconds after that for McCleary to gather himself and flee

the home. Was this situation just a coincidence? Did Mother Nature

## Boyne City loses a leader

After a long battle with cancer, Boyne City's Sally Roselli finally found her rest when she passed away on Sunday, Oct. 24. Her impact on the Boyne City community, however, will live on. As the sitting president of the Boyne Area Chamber of

Commerce and co-owner of Thick N' Juicy restaurant in Boyne City, Roselli continued to put community involvement at the top of her priority list, as long as she could.

"Even up through when she was the most ill, she still wanted to be actively involved to the best of her ability, she still wanted to contribute to her community," said Boyne Area Chamber director Scott MacKenzie. "She asked that we send her the agendas and fax her the board meeting minutes so she could stay involved,"

Though only a member of the community since 1998, Roselli's roots in Boyne City ran deep, with a sister and brotherin-law, Julie and Jeff Wellman, who are longtime residents, as well as parents, Richard and Shirley Holzwarth, who are parttime residents.

Arriving in Boyne City only six years ago, however, Roselli


threw herself into the community. Opening Thick N' Juicy with her husband Frank, Roselli immediately took an interest in the downtown, starting a campaign to clean up the sidewalks and flowerbeds on Water Street.

In 2003, however, a diagnosis of cancer meant subsequent surgeries and chemotherapies that extended for more than a year. The community, for its part, showed its love and support through a spaghetti fund-raising dinner this summer, and friends created and signed a large poster for Sally that was displayed for weeks in the front window at Thick N' Juicy.

Now, that support will be extended, to be sure, to Sally's husband Frank and their son, Frank, Jr.

"She was a bundle of energy and enthusiasm," MacKenzie concluded. "She cared deeply about our community in all aspects, You couldn't ask for a better citizen and she's going to be sorely

#### JRAC exhibit features "created space"

Art patrons, designers, and artists crowded into the Jordan River Art Center for the opening of the exhibit, "Creating Spaces with Art -- Personalizing Interior Design." According to JRAC member Jane Diller, the comments were favorable, and included: "Most beautiful show I've ever seen and I have been in a lot of shows," "I am very impressed, so much in such a small space, well coordinated," "Incred-

ible, exciting, the designers did a good job," and "Very ambitious, beautiful show, but then JRAC always does it up right."

The JRAC gallery has been divided into traditional living spaces by 15 hanging panels created by John Stevens. Twelve interior designers worked cooperatively from a floor plan designed by Jill Compton. The designers used mostly original art from area artists and included some antiques and collectibles from area patrons and businesses to create a very individualized "home."

It was the team's goal, headed by Sylvia Walworth and Chuck Hershberger, to demonstrate the use of fine and utilitarian art in everyday use, yet creatively designed. 





#### John Jarema -

Position sought: Charlevoix County Prosecutor

Party Affiliation: Republican

Background: Former Charlevoix Asst. Prosecutor 1995-1999; Charlevoix Chief Asst. Prosecutor 1999-2002; Personally tried over 100 trials; Instructor for OUIL training for other prosecutors. Presently working for Joseph, Corcoran, Telgenhof & Snyder P.C.

Why are you running?

I have a passion for prosecution and seeking the truth and justice. I feel that the prosecutor plays a vital role in ensuring the safety of our community. A prosecutor achieves this by consistently enforcing the laws and by educating the public on the ramifications of crime. A prosecutor needs to be proactive in educating the public, especially our youth, on the ramifications of drug abuse, property rights etc.

What skills will you bring to the office?

My seven years of prosecutor trial experience is invaluable. I have personally tried over 100 trials in all three courts in Charlevoix. I have championed victim's rights in those cases. I have a good relationship and open communication with law enforcement, as evidenced by their endorsement of me in the primary over the incumbent.

#### 105TH HOUSE SEAT

After a crowded primary, the race for the 105th House Seat has come down to two voices - Kevin Elsenheimer of Bellaire and Jim McKimmy of Kewadin. The district includes Antrim, Charlevoix, Otesgo and parts of Cheboygan counties. The candidates recently shared their thoughts with us on issues such as education, protecting the Great Lakes, the state's economy, and health care costs.

#### Kevin Elsenheimer -

The race to represent the Republican Party for the 105th House Seat at the Nov. 2 general election was one of the most watched and heated races in the primary and Kevin Elsenheimer of Bellaire emerged victorious.

Elsenheimer, a Bellaire attnorny, has focused his campaign on several key issues including the state's economy and improving area business, funding education, rising health care costs, and protecting the environment. The relationship between those issues is closely tied together, he said. The economy of the state is having a significant impact on the funding of schools. Improving the economy by increasing business in the area will have an impact on environment.

#### State economy

A point that Elsenheimer and his opponent differ greatly on is the Single Business Tax. Elsenheimer would like to see the SBT get back on course to be phased out over the next 20 years.

"I can tell you that a tax that is based in part upon the amount of payroll that you have is a tax that negatively impacts an entrepreneur ability to hire new people," Elsenheimer said of the SBT. "It is a disincentive to increase your payroll."

"And it's not just the SBT tax McKimmy is opposed to getting rid of," Elsenheimer continued. "He has indicated on votesmart.org that he favors increasing income taxes, that he would support increasing capital gains taxes, he would support increasing, which means restarting, the death tax in Michigan. Basically, there's not a tax that I'm aware of that he's not in support of raising and that's the wrong thing for the economy at this point."

Elsenheimer said increasing taxes is the wrong direction for the state to take to improve the economy. He added that the state is not providing decent enough incentives to keep businesses within its borders. He would like to see certain obstacles removed that would make the state more attractive for new businesses.

"We not only need to promote these kinds of tax credits for companies that are adding jobs, but we also need to make sure that there are not disincen-

tives in the tax code to hiring new people," he said. "The most important issue of our time in Northern Michigan is making sure we transition from the post-industry age type jobs to the information-age type jobs. We have got to keep and attract those kinds of jobs in Northern Michigan."

Michigan is falling behind other states and countries in its ability to attract new and existing businesses, Elsenheimer said.

"It's not about giving huge tax breaks necessarily, although that's part of it. It's also about making sure that we have the infrastructure in place. It's also about making sure that there's a tax structure in place that provides incentive for investment. It's about making sure there is sufficient capital available and making sure, frankly, that we have a quality workforce available, and that is something we do have in Northern Michigan. We have an awful lot we should be bragging about to businesses throughout this country."

#### **Great Lakes**

With growth in business, in particular industry, in Northern Michigan there is a natural concern for the environment. Elsenheimer said that he will be diligent about protecting the Great Lakes and ensuring that the state's waterways are never compromised.

"We need federal legislation to be passed immediately regarding bilge water deposits," Elsenheimer said. "That is one of the best ways we can stop invasive species from entering our Great Lakes. Step one is the bilge water issue. Step two is making sure we're working with Chicago and Illinois to put appropriate blocks in place to stop the Asian carp for migrating into Lake Michigan. Third, we need to make sure we do nothing to water down the abilities of Great Lakes governors to veto any water diversions from our Great Lakes. I think Republicans and Democrats alike all agree that we, as stewards of this land and this water, have to ensure that there are no diversions of Great Lakes water."

Elsenheimer said that Democrats are pushing right now for the Water Legacy Act. This act would regulate water withdrawal based on capacity, not actual use, he said.

"They're pushing this Water Legacy Act as a way to open up discussion regarding the Charter

Annex 2001, which is an agreement between all the states in the Great Lake Basin and the provinces in Canada in the basin. I am on record saying that the Charter Annex 2001 is a very flawed document. It actually provides a process by which someone can withdraw water out of the Great Lakes basin. I am not at all comfortable with that document and I'm not comfortable with the Water Legacy Act as the predicate to that document. I believe enacting both pieces of legislation will make it more likely to have a withdrawal of Great Lakes water rather than less likely. We have the power right now to stop diversions of Great Lakes water. We need to make sure that whatever we put into place, in terms of water regulation, there is an absolute prohibition on the withdrawal of Great Lakes

#### **Farm Land Preservation**

In addition to protecting the Great Lakes, Elsenheimer is supportive of townships in the area seeking the Farmland Preservation and Open Air Ordinance. Elsenheimer said the process by which this ordinance is being presented is a great example of the importance to local government.

"I believe that local municipalities have a right to enact this kind of legislation," he said.

Elsenheimer attended a recent forum in Elk Rapids that highlighted the efforts of a Pennsylvania community to preserve land under the act. The community, Lancaster, has secured thousands of acres of land over the past 20 years.

"It has been very successful with regard to preserving the quality of life, the farming culture, within that county," he said "I'm fully supportive of their (local municipalities) ability to go ahead and enact that kind of ordinance. That's what local control is all about. I believe in giving people the opportunity to vote on those kind of things, to make those kind of decisions. That's exactly what's going on. The process is work-

#### Jim McKimmy

Democrat Jim McKimmy believes his strong background in education has put him in an ideal position to understand and represent the needs of the 105th State House District.

McKimmy, of Kewadin, secured his party's support in the primary, and now faces Republican Kevin Elsenheimer in the Nov. 2 election. The two are seeking the 105th seat, soon to vacated by term-limited Republican Ken Bradstreet.

While the district offers many diverse elements – from population to land use - McKimmy believes several key issues are important to everyone in the four counties he hopes to represent.

"I believe education, health care, jobs and the economy, along with environmental concerns, including the Great Lakes, are all issues that are having an effect on our area," he

Education is a special concern for McKimmy. During his 37-year career, he has spent time as a teacher, coach, and administrator at various levels including time as a superintendent in Cadillac, Charlevoix, Midland, and Jackson.

One of the most significant concerns he has is the state's role in funding education.

"When Proposal A was passed in 1994, its goal was to shift the reliance for school funding from local property taxes to a combination of statewide property taxes and additional sales tax. That was a good move, however, it also meant a shift from local control to the state. People trusted the legislature to oversee that process, and in my opinion the legislature has • Use Michigan's tax laws wisely, so failed."

He said lawmakers have constantly taken money away from funds they originally committed to schools, including a reduction of the six percent sales tax on business-related items totalling \$1.9 billion over the last eight

"Those reductions translate to less money per pupil each year. My opponent believes schools have enough money and is quick to talk about gains in school infrastructure - but those gains are through local initiatives. It's irresponsible to use those numbers to divert attention away from the legislature, who ultimately decide how much funding schools will receive for each student.

"School funding, as it exists today, cannot work as long as it is reliant on components tied to the general fund."

While McKimmy believes schools should always strive to improve, he doesn't believe charter schools or vouchers are the answer. In his opinion they lack accountability, while taking students and public funds away from existing schools.

"Charter schools now receive the same amount of money as our public schools - but they don't have to pay for many of the required items that public schools pay for like transportation or a specific percentage for retirement funds. They can also be selective as to which students they will take. In my mind, they're private schools."

#### Economy/Jobs

With unemployment higher than the state average across a large majority of the 105th District, McKimmy believes working to attract new businesses to the area is a key step toward addressing the problem.

To do this effectively, he said the state's tax, business and labor laws need to work in coordination with business owners, their employees and local communities. What's his plan to make this happen? He offered five primary elements:

they attract companies looking for places to do business, and discourage sending jobs to other states or coun-

• Guarantee a well-prepared work force by providing quality educational programs for youth, and provide retrain-

ing opportunities for those who lose jobs due to outsourcing.

• Develop programs that provide affordable, accessible medical insurance options for more employed citizens and their families.

 Encourage and support local government to plan for and market local business opportunities in their communities to secure jobs for their residents.

 Connect sources of business financing, like venture capitalists, with local chambers of commerce and entrepre-

He also said eliminating the state's single business tax isn't the answer.

"When the tax was enacted in 1975, it replaced seven other taxes. It has performed as intended, yet it has become the poster child of something that needs to be eliminated. Recent cuts in the tax have not been effective, because we are still exporting jobs out of our state.

"We can't eliminate a tax that represents 10 percent of the state's budget and still maintain our commitments to social programs," he said, "especially in a time of financial crisis. We do need to take a closer look at it, and make sure that it is equitable. In other words, we shouldn't tax a portion of our economy that isn't growing, but may need to look at areas that have shown growth - like the service industry. Right now, I'm not proposing a change, but I am open to examining it.

#### **Great Lakes**

While concerns over the environment often arise during an election, none have generated more attention this year than the Great Lakes.

McKimmy said he shares the same belief as U.S. Representative Bart Stupak that "there should be no diversion of the problem. Great Lakes water - period." He also supports strengthening and immediately passing the Water Legacy Act for Michi-

"We must position ourselves to protect the water and the quality of the water in the Great Lakes basin," he said.

"Passage of the Act will allow Michigan to become a full partner in the Great Lakes Basin Water Resources Compact. The Compact is an agreement among the eight Great Lakes states to join together in an interstate compact to enhance joint decision making about the use of Great Lakes water.'

He said Michigan is the only state within the Compact without the basic statutes to fully participate.

"We can't wait for additional information to be acquired, thus delaying our ability to protect one of our most valuable resources. Delaying only enables commercial enterprises to divert or withdraw water without adequate

regulation." McKimmy believes improvements are needed regarding implementation agreements to the Great Lakes Basin Water Resources Compact (known as Annex 2001) but that the first priority should involve passing the Water Legacy Act - which would allow Michigan to serve as a full partner in developing the final Compact provi-

#### **Health Care**

McKimmy said of the 44 million people in the United States without health care, 1.8 million live in Michi-

"This means that their medical needs are being met through Medicaid or by unpaid emergency services," he said. "This cost is then shifted to those individuals who can afford to pay in full or to insurance companies. Obviously, the result is increased

McKimmy believes that the "Third-Share Partnership" proposed by Gov. Granholm in her 2004 State of the State address would better address

Essentially, the program would require employees to pay one-third of their health insurance costs, with the employer picking up another third, while the state would cover the final

#### We can all agree on a new **Boyne Area Senior Center**

With the presidential election heating up and coming into its final, frenzied days, it's easy for other electionday candidates and issues to be overshadowed in the minds of voters.

At the local level, however, there's one issue that is, or should be, of particular interest to all segments of the population, and that is the Boyne Area Senior Center millage request. If passed, the .35 mills sought will make it possible for a new senior center facility to be constructed, giving Boyne seniors a place of their own at last.

And it's not, it has been emphasized, just for Boyne City seniors. I made the grievous error in last week's Citizen-Journal of repeatedly calling the project the Boyne City Senior Center. I, of all people, should know better, having reported on the Boyne AREA Senior Center project numerous times over the past few years. It's easy, it seems, to fall into the habit of tagging that "Boyne City" moniker on anything that happens to be located within the city limits (just ask the Boyne AREA Chamber of Commerce how often that mistake is made!).

It is of the utmost importance to note, however, that the senior center truly is for the seniors of the entire Boyne area, and not just within the city limits. Though it will be located in town, on property provided through the Boyne City Housing Commission adjacent to the Deer Meadows and Litzenburger Place senior apartment complexes, the facility will serve seniors from throughout the surrounding area, including those in Bay, Boyne Valley. Evangeline, Eveline, Melrose and Wilson townships.

Currently, seniors from these areas are served in a small meeting room at Boyne City City Hall, a space for which they've been grateful, but have clearly outgrown. Lunches and special events are overcrowded, and are occasionally displaced as other groups need to utilize the "senior center" space. Scheduling for special events and services is limited on the whole. A new senior center will provide ample space (5,400 square feet of it) to provide senior services, including health and exercise programs, recreational events, and educational courses (much of which is funded, mind you, through the already-renewed county senior services millage). It will also provide a central place for area seniors to dine, visit, and simply enjoy the simple benefits of community.

If there's one thing we all have in common it's that, no matter what our political party affiliation, we will all be senior citizens sooner or later. A new facility for the Boyne Area Senior Center should be something we all can agree

I have a few relapses now and then - like when we had those beautiful autumn mornings and I wished I had all three of my children home to enjoy them with me. Then I realized, whom was I kidding? With Eleri and 9-month old Paxton it seemed we were rarely ready to get out the door much before Trenton got home from his half-day schedule! Anyway, the Kleenex box is no longer a permanent fixture in my hand. Well, that's not altogether true. I do believe that Trenton was kind enough to share with Paxton and Eleri not only his new-found knowledge, but also his first run-in with school germs. My tissues were put to good use on them.

My Momitis recovery took a little time. Every time I started to feel better little things would set me back again. Like a mom carrying a sobbing little girl away from school on the second day. However, the most important part of the healing process—and something I would advise anyone still suffering from Kindergarten Momitis to do — would be this: visit the classroom. I had the opportunity to take snacks to class for Trenton's birthday and see first-hand how and what he was doing. Judging from his smile, the interaction with the other students, and the pride in his voice as he showed me around, I'd say he's doing just fine.

Which means I'm doing just fine. And while I expect a relapse two years down the road when Eleri heads out to kindergarten, and again when Paxton walks out the door, I know that despite the misery, I will survive. Now if we can only make it through the flu season...

Troy Drebenstedt, a member of American Legion Post #228, Boyne City, and resident of Charlevoix County stationed in Iraq, began his tour of duty last year by telling his mother he had good news and bad news. The good—he had an opportunity to travel; the bad—he would start in Iraq. Hot, Hot, HOT weather, camel spiders and more sand and gravel than he has experienced in 21 years of life, are central to his list of new experiences.

Never one to sit around, Troy, a former Petoskey High School athlete, is preparing to compete in a 10-mile race on Oct. 24 and, as competition likes company, he has persuaded eight of his unit buddies to take part in the ten-mile relay being run at the same time. Running allows him to unwind from tension caused by convoying supplies to various military locations around Iraq.

When asked about his mission, Troy becomes eloquent regarding the good that is being accomplished for the Iraqi people by the Coalition troops stationed there. He talks about hospitals and supplies, schools and supplies, and electrical hookup

and clean water for some who have never had those facilities, among other beneficial activities. He also mentions the thankfulness of the average Iraqi citizen.

His unit was involved in Operation Generosity I, a program to

While home on leave in September, Troy spoke to local school children about the Iraqi children. The support of the people across the nation helps the troops as they have carried on their missions across Iraq. Troy has been especially proud of his northern Michigan community as packages, letters, newspapers and magazines flow to the unit from his home area.

- · Inspect each treat before permitting your child to eat it. If you should find any contaminated food or safety violations, please report them to the sheriff.





