Keeping the season *GREEN*

Members of the Boyne Valley Garden Club gathered last week to do their part in adding a little holiday green to the winter landscape, assembling more than 400 of their holiday wreaths at the Eagles Hall in Boyne City.

It's an effort that, with three dozen or so members, is accomplished in a relatively short two-to-three hour period. But, according to past president Betty Shaver, the work that goes into preparing for the big day is months in the making.

"We make all of the big bows, so we start in October and hold two or three workshops," Shaver said, adding that the pinecones, six per wreath, are also cleaned and wired during the months preceding the assembling date; the pinecones, she notes, are of the native variety, collected by herself and

anyone else she can recruit, throughout the year. "It's a year-round production," Shaver said.

It's a production, too, that has a long history, likely beginning more than 20 years ago. At that time, Shaver said, "it started out with the ladies going into the woods and cutting the greens themselves," later assembling the wreaths in a member's front room. Later, she said, Boyne Falls resident Bernie Kondrat cut greens for the group from his woods; these days, greens are ordered from various suppliers.

Orders for the popular wreaths are taken in the fall, collected by a "calling

Townships must make voice heard in library issues

TO THE EDITOR:

To the Township Boards and the taxpaying citizens of: Evangeline, South Arm, Wilson townships in Charlevoix county and Echo and Jordan townships in Antrim county.

"Taxation without Representation" is NOT just a phrase with a Revolutionary War flavor. Every one of us suffers it today!

You provide the major source of funding for the Jordan Valley District Library, far more than does the City of East Jordan but you have NOTHING to say about how the library is run!

The Library Board consists of eight members, FIVE of whom are residents of the city and, because they are in the majority, run the library to suit themselves ... or, more correctly, provide no leadership at all.

There is a solution but you all must turn out to support it.

The Board has in hand (but will not read) a proposal to amend the by-laws to provide that each tax-paying municipality will appoint one board member and that there will be no other appointees. The next library board meeting is in the community room at the library on Wednesday, Dec. 8, at 5:30 p.m.

The time is critical. Rumors suggest that Gov. Granholm will revise the law to provide that all district library boards will be elected in district-wide elections. This sounds good BUT remember that a) elections are expensive and b) they will be won by the people with the deepest pockets. You will NOT be represented fairly.

Only if a massive number of you turn out and demand that the proposal be read, acted upon and approved will YOU be represented on the Board!

A perspective on religious expression at Christmastime

Each year - - in the festive weeks leading up to Christmas - - the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) and its many like-minded allies deliberately bully individual citizens, schools, and government officials into removing any mention of Christ or Christianity from the public celebration of Christmas.

Christmas has historically been one of the most celebrated holidays of the American people. In recent years, misconceptions and controversy about the fictitious socalled "separation of church and state" and the celebration of Christmas has led many public officials to "remove Christ from Christmas" in places such as schools, parks, libraries, and government offices.

This was not the intent of the founding fathers. In addition, no court has ever ruled that the Constitution requires government officials to censor Christmas carols, eliminate all references to Christmas, or silence those who celebrate Christ's birth.

In order to eliminate any confusion with regard to your right to publicly celebrate Christmas, the following will equip you with the information needed to dispel the myths and excuses that are used to silence the public celebration of Christmas.

Carols may be sung in public schools without offending the Constitution. Religious Christmas carols may be sung by individual students or by a group of students during school activities such as choir, Christmas programs, and other events [Florey v. Sioux Falls Sch. Dist., 619 F.2d 1311, 1319 (8th Cir. 1980)]

School officials may refer to the school break in December as a "Christmas holiday" without offending the Constitution. The Supreme Court has acknowledged with approval that government has long recognized holidays with religious significance such as Christmas [Lynch v. Donnelly, 465 U.S. 668, 676 (1984)]. For example, Congress has proclaimed Christmas to be a legal public holiday [U.S.C.A. 6103 (a) (2004)].

School districts may not ban teachers or students from saying Merry Christmas. The Supreme Court has stated that teachers and students do not "shed their constitutional rights to freedom of speech or expression at the schoolhouse gate [Tinker v. Des Moines Indep. Cmt. Sch. Dist., 393 U.S. 503,506 (1969)]. In order to violate the Establishment Clause, a teacher would have to use his or her authority to promote religion to his or her students [Sch. Dist. of Abington Tp. v. Schempp, 374 U.S. 203, 225-26 (1963)].

The religious origins of Christmas can be studied in the classroom without offending the Constitution. The Supreme Court has stated that "the Bible may constitutionally be used in an appropriate study of history, civilization, ethics, comparative religion, or the like [Stone v. Graham, 449 U.S. 39, 42 (1981)]. The Court has also explained that the "study of the Bible or of religion, when presented objectively as part of a secular program of education," is constitutional under the First Amendment [Sch. Dist. of Abington Tp., 374 U.S. at 225].

The Supreme Court has held that the Constitution "affirmatively mandates accommodation, not merely tolerance, of all religions, and forbids hostility toward any [Lynch, 465 U.S. at 673]. First Amendment rights, such as the rights of freedom of speech and expression, accompany each student throughout the school day both inside and outside the classroom [Tinker, 393 U.S. at 512-513]. Consequently, school officials must permit students to convey religious sentiments through their school assignments [Hazelwood Sch. Dist. v. Kublmeier, 484 U.S. 260, 273 (1988)], selection of reading materials, and clothing that conveys a religious message through words or symbols.

Public school officials may display religious symbols such as a nativity scene without offending the Constitution if they have a clear educational reason for doing so. The Supreme Court has held that the display of a nativity scene is constitutional if it is displayed for legitimate secular purposes, such as to celebrate a holiday and to depict the origins of the holiday [Lynch, 465 U.S. at 681].

Public officials may display religious symbols such as a créche or nativity scene without offending the Constitution. To determine the constitutionality of municipal religious displays, lower courts evaluate whether the religious display passes the Supreme Court's three-prong Lemon test [Bridenbaugh v. O'Bannon, 185 F.3d 796, 802 (7th Cir. 1999)].

Under the Lemon test, courts will inquire "whether the challenged law or conduct has a secular purpose, whether its principal or primary effect is to advance or inhibit religion, and whether it creates an excessive entanglement of government with religion" [Lynch, 465 U.S. at 679 (citing Lemon, 403 U.s. 602, 612613 (1971))]. Like in public schools, the Supreme Court has held that the dis-


play of a nativity scene is constitutional if it is displayed for legitimate secular purposes, such as to celebrate a holiday and to depict the origins of the holiday [Sechler v. State Coll. Area Sch. Dist., 121 F. Supp. 2d 439 (M.D. Pa. 2000; Clever v. Cherry Hill Tp. Bd. of Educ., 838 F. Supp. 929 (D.N.J. 1993)].

In addition to the Lemon test, courts often look to the endorsement test or "The Three Reindeer Rule," which asks whether a reasonable observer would believe that the municipal display constitutes an endorsement of religion by the government. This Rule requires a municipality to place a sufficient number of secular objects in close enough proximity to the créche to render the overall display sufficiently secular.

The Constitution does not require government officials to eliminate all public religious expression of Christmas. In fact, as documented above, the right of public school students and public officials to publicly celebrate the Christmas holiday is protected by the U.S. Constitution and the various court decisions. The bottom line is: It is okay to say Merry Christmas, regardless of the legal threats from the ACLU and its allies.

To support and encourage others in your community to exercise their right to say Merry Christmas you'll be part of an important effort to protect and preserve the rights of people everywhere to practice and observe their beliefs. We must protect what we have, reclaim what we've lost and shape who we will become.

know what to do. It sounds simple but there's more to it than just swallowing some pills with a glass of water.


