Fire causes no damage at school

A fire in the Boyne City Elementary School boiler room last Thursday was the result of a power outage, according to school superintendent Jim Cooper.

"When we lose power, we end up losing motors or circulating motors, which are burning themselves up when we lose a phase," he said. "In this case, a circulating pump ignited in the boiler

The school called the fire department, but the fire had extinguished itself by the time firefighters arrived.

"We had activities scheduled in the building," Cooper said. "We wanted to make sure that the smoke wasn't toxic."

The administration then requested that the fire department check the other school buildings as well, as a preventative measure.

There was no damage to the elementary school, the building remained open and safe to use, and the other school buildings were cleared by the Boyne City fire de-

olly Bricker, the third of Dave and Robin Bricker's six daughters, and a 1998 graduate of Boyne City High School, is named Mystik Dream Dancer in cyber space.

Bricker earned an associate's degree at Aquinas College in Grand Rapids. before she left Michigan in the hope of finding her new calling in life. She journeyed around the United States for a few months, but her adventures -

Her childhood dream, she said, had been to "provide succor to those in need in Africa," and so she followed that dream to Ghana, where for six weeks she taught elementary school. At the end of that brief sojourn, she reluctantly returned to the United States and other responsibilities. But for the mystic dreamer, a deep reality had seated.

"I had fallen in love with a country, a culture and an existence that renewed my zest for life and satisfied my soul," Bricker said. She knew she wanted to go back — but she also knew that she needed a marketable skill and a means to travel, so she headed to Colorado to earn a certificate in massage therapy.

She interned with the Denver AIDS Project, and was confirmed in her desire to work with AIDS patients - and her call to Africa.

"So after obtaining my massage therapy certificate, I headed back to Ghana to do some more volunteer teaching and to explore different avenues with prospective HIV and AIDS work," Bricker said, "I recognized firsthand the need for education and outreach programs.'

Bricker left Africa the second time with an aching heart, she said, but she was certain of her calling and came back to the States with a desire to find an organization with integrity, a solid reputation and core values that

matched her own. But first to work.

"Since then," she said, "I have been gaining life experience and some

financial security, while continuing to search for the right organization." She is working as a massage therapist at The Spa at Pebble Beach and at the Post Ranch Inn, near her home on the Monterey Peninsula in central California. She loves what she does; her heart is in helping people, and massage therapy keeps her heart where it belongs.


But Africa is her passion and her mission, and she continued to look for opportunities to work with a reputable volunteer program that she could really believe in.

Lois Lewis is a regular at the Quilt Cottage in East Jordan, and a member of Boyne City's Piece Makers, a quilting group.

One day while browsing at the Cottage, she spotted a new selection of children's fabrics and her ever-present creative spark flared into a flame.

"They were so cute, and I thought what fun it would be to make kids' quilts," she said.

Lewis hit upon the idea for a challenge for the quilting group, which was started by De Fleming. She purchased enough fabric to give each participant an 8inch by 9-inch piece of each of 34 different fabrics, with the challenge to create a child's quilt using all of the fabrics in the body of the quilt and all of the fabrics again in the binding.

The contestants could add whatever fabrics they chose, and make the quilts. any size between infant and twin, but had to use each of the 34 different blocks.

There was a deadline, and the quilts were to be given away, either to a family member or to the Women's Resource Center (which gives each child who is a visitor at the safe house a quilt of his or her

Lewis invited three women to participate in the challenge, sending them the fabrics and instructions, but allowed a loop-hole.

"If you should decide this project doesn't fit your schedule or interest, simply consider it (the fabric) a gift," she wrote.

"They could just keep the

pieces and let them marinate in a closet," she said. But they didn't.

Fleming, Sally Cyr and Sharon Kane joined Lewis in the challenge and the result was a bouquet of bright-colored quilts created with kids in mind.

"I liked the brights, and I like kids." Cvr. a teacher for 30 years, explained. Her quilt not only contained all the fabrics, but she arranged them to create a puzzle for those restless

"A challenge really gets your creative juices flowing," Lewis said.

As the women sat around a small table at the Quilt Cottage, discussing the finished project, and considered what a future challenge might be, a pattern began to emerge with Fleming.

"I want to make that apron," she said.

And another time, "I want to make that quilt for my grandson ... I want to knit a scarf like that ... that's my problem - I can't do it

The ladies agreed.

"I have UFOs all over the place," Cyr admitted, "Unfinished Objects. I just keep starting new things. Now I'm into felting."

Fleming said that all craft people have attention deficit disorder. Lewis said, "Once you

get the secret for how, something's done, you're done." Making the quilts a challenge made the finishing easier.

"Having a deadline works - if it's for someone else." Lewis said. "It

City receives grant for industrial park upgrades

An \$87,705 grant for Boyne City's industrial park will fund most of the costs for improvements to water and wastewater facilities and an upgrade to the water booster station that provides fire protection to the park's largest resident, LexàMar Corporation.

The Air Industrial Park are home to about a dozen husinesses. . .

"The grant will go for upgrades in the infrastructure and will help LexaMar meet its needs for future growth," said Dan Meads, superintendent of the city's water and wastewater departments. He spoke to city commissioners at their Feb. 8 meeting at city hall.

The grant, along with approximately \$10,000 of city funding, is allocated as well for the engineering design and construction bidding performed by Capital Consultants, Inc. of Lansing and Gaylord. The firm's estimated fee is \$11,350. The engineering design phase of the project is underway and the entire project is scheduled for completion this summer,

The federal grant money was administered by the Michigan Economic Development Corporation, which chooses community projects deemed viable for economic growth.

Also at the Feb. 8 meeting, commissioners heard from organizers of the second annual BoyneThunder Poker Run. The commission approved the July 15-16 dates for the boating event that raised \$30,000 last year, with 70 percent of the proceeds donated to Camp Quality, a summer camp for children with challenging illnesses. Proceeds also help fund the Boyne City Main Street organization. The fundraising goal this year is \$50,000.

"We expect about 42 boaters to participate this year," said Jim Carter, chairman of the event.

The boaters in the BoyneThunder Poker Run travel a route that includes Charlevoix, Beaver Island, Bay Harbor, Horton Bay and return to Boyne City. Poker cards are drawn from each stop and winners are determined by a drawing in Boyne City for cash prizes. The event includes dinners, an auction, a boat parade and a pub-crawl.

Volunteers are appreciated, Carter said, and are encouraged to call 582-9009.

City commissioner Chuck Vondra reported on the progress made on several city goals, including the emergency service upgrade, park improvements, sidewalk repairs, waterfront plans, the Main Street projects and technology upgrades. Other board commissioners and Mayor Eleanor Stackus joined Vondra in recognizing the accomplishments of city staff and the com-

Paul Harris started Rotary International 100 years ago on February 23, 1905.

It offered, in Harris' words, "fraternity without rituals, passwords and secrets,"

and was the first international service club, and the blueprint from which many subsequent service clubs were built. Harris named the

club Rotary because originally meetings were rotated between members' businesses.

The Houston Chronicle, in 1919 said of Rotary, "He (Harris) organised a strange kind of club, for which men get nothing, but actually pay for the privilege of doing good."

It was never true. From establishing "public comfort stations" in Chicago, to facilitating the eradication of polio, Rotarians have long received much in return for their unselfish service.

Today in Boyne City, after 83 years of local existence, the tradition of serving is still strong. In honor of Rotary's

centennial, the Boyne City club is building a pavilion at Rotary Park. According to Doug Shields, the pavillion will house a concession stand, covered seating, public restrooms and storage. Its projected

budget is \$110,000, and they look forward to the project's completion in 2006.

"We are looking for donations from both corporations and individuals," Shields

said. "We only have 35 members - this is a pretty difficult undertaking for a little club. But the enthusiasm is high - higher than the funds.

"At this point we have about \$35,000. We had a very good meeting with the 4-H soccer program, and they donated \$5,000.

"The more people know about it, the more excited they will get," Shields said. "That will make bringing it to fruition faster and easier."

A new way to fund the arts

■ Stock car racing, highspeed thrills and Broadway?

Most people don't associate jazz musicians, ballerinas or tap dancing with stock car racing, but they will go hand-in-hand at the upcoming fundraiser for the Boyne City High School Performing Arts program.

The event is March 10 from 5-9 pm at the BCHS gym-

Most folks will never have the chance to sit behind the wheel of an actual race car, but they can experience the next best thing by driving a Micro-Reality stock car. Micro-Reality stock cars are 1/10th scale, slotless race cars that speed around a banked, oval track at scale speeds of 200 mph. Each car looks just like a real NASCAR, and measures two feet long? The cars race around a 24' x 16' track, lapping, tapping and t-boning each other as the drivers jockey for position and open up the throttle for their place in victory lane.

Proceeds generated by the fundraiser will go toward funding the Performing Arts Center events other than those produced by the school. The Performing Arts Center boasts many features, providing Northern Michigan with a state-of-the-art facility. The theatre itself is appointed with plush seating that accommodate, 620 guests. The stage includes an orchestra pit, moveable floors, and a complete fly rigging system (16 pulleys) that allow for professional and elaborate performances to take place. The lighting, acoustics and sound system are state-of-the-art. The goal for the Performing Arts Center is to host at-least four professional events per year, ranging from well-known country music artists to ballet, dance, cinema, speakers and more.

Each professional event sponsored costs between \$10,000 and \$15,000 to host. The goal is to promote attendance by keeping ticket prices down. Fundraisers and corporate sponsorships will be sought to generate the money needed, ensuring fair ticket prices for the

Tickets for the fundraiser are available at the Boyne City Chamber of Commerce, Boyne Country Book Store, Boyne City High School Ticket Booth, and through volunteer community members.

Tickets are \$10 each and enter participants into a drawing for the "showdown" race for first, second and third place cash prizes. You can also buy tickets the night of the event or just "Pay-to-Play" with each race costing only \$3. Admission to the event is free.



Bigger than cards, roses and chocolate

Valentines Day is my son Sam's birthday.

I was 3 years older than he is now when he was born, and I remember it just like it was - well, not yesterday, but not 21 years ago, either.

I didn't have him in a hospital; he was born in a room in my doctor's offices while his older sister, at one-anda-half, watched from her daddy's arms. It was early in the morning on that holiday in celebration of love, and Sam was the second child my doctor had delivered that day.

The doctor told me not to go anywhere, that he was going to run home for a shave, and wanted us to wait until he got back. (My first child, Katie, was also born in that place, an old house with wonderful rooms, converted to facilitate a family doctor's practice, but still homey and warm. We were at our own home by the time she was two hours old.)

He came back with a bouquet of carnations, red, and sweet-smelling in a musky, hothouse way.

Valentines Day was one of my favorite holidays since I was little, when we used to make our own cards with red construction paper and doilies.

Mom would make a perfect heart-shaped pattern maybe two (there were seven siblings with 30 cards to make - each) out of the cardboard retrieved from an empty Kleenex box. There would be sheets of red construction paper in the middle of the round maple dining room table, Elmer's glue and doilies. We would sit around that table, tracing the cardboard hearts carefully, first right-side-up and then up-side-down, so as not to waste a scrap of red paper. My oldest brother Bill was surely the fastest, and so his heavy scissors would be the first ones making the "cruh, cruh" sound as they worked through the thick con-

My mother would buy Dentyne gum and we would tape a stick in the middle of the doily, which was centered and glued on our carefully hand-cut hearts

The names of our classmates would be pencilled in our finest penmanship on the back, signed un-self-consciously, "love, Jane."

Usually ours were the only hand-made cards, and the wastebasket by the teacher's desk would be filled with construction paper hearts at the end of the day. But for once the teacher would let us chew gum at school, and thus I was not disappointed in the success of my Valentine's offering

We lived about a quarter of a mile off US-31, in one of two houses at the end of a dirt county road that the bus didn't risk. The walk to the bus and home each day provided a treasure-trove of memories: scrumping fruit en route to the bus stop in the fall; collecting colored stones that I kept in an empty check box; February afternoons.

On February afternoons, the walk home was enchanting to me. Even on cold days, it seemed the sun would melt the banks along the side of the road, turning them into lacy crystal fairy palaces, with fascinating rooms you could just barely peek into, if you were small yourself, and your imagination was big enough. February sunwarmed snow banks were valentines, with their fragile lace edges

It was only one day in the middle of February that we carried home white paper bags decorated and drawn on and packed with colorful cards with pictures of little blond Dutch girls saying, "Wooden Shoe Be My Valentine?" But every sunny day was a reminder, a version of that magical day.

And so it has always been. As childhood summers are long and hot and carefree in memory, so Februarys have all been sun-warmed and filled with valentines.

It was as if those wonderful childhood winter days, the time spent gazing into crystal rooms trying to catch a glimpse of the tiny magic things they held, the breathtaking splendor of blue skies and fat white clouds were, hinting to me of Februarys to come.


February, a friend tells me, is the longest month of the year. It is a long, cold, rafter-cracking month. Sunny days lead to starkly clear nights that bring such colds as makes the trees and rafters crack, a rifle report in the dark.

But Sam has kept me grounded in the Valentines month of my childhood. His birthday makes that wonderful redand-white, sweet and lacy holiday stay pristine, unsullied by time and cynicism.

It is bigger than cards and chocolates and roses and dinners out.

It is a celebration of a life that has given me unspeakable joy and happiness.

Happy birthday, Sam.



Remember winter?

This photo of the Jordan River, taken after the last significant snowfall several weeks ago, serves as a reminder of what winter should ∍look like. But take heart, enthusiasts, it may be back: the National Weather Service predicts that there will be snow Wednesday through Monday, with most of the accumulation occuring on Wednesay and Thursday, and daytime highs only reaching into the 20s through the weekend.

Is Boyne City's historic preservation effort genuine?

TO THE EDITOR:

It is a constant amazement to see the amount of coverage downtown Boyne City receives wherein historic preservation is mentioned as a prominent feature of the downtown environment

In the several years I've lived here I have watched in dismay as structures were altered well beyond the limits allowable under the guidelines for eligibility to the National Register (NR). Many of the economic incentives for structural rehabilitation are predicated on NR eligibility. and there is very little left intact in downtown Boyne.

There have been several very nice ersatz historic-appear-

ing structures built in recent years, but they are not even—that has taken place in Boyne City so far will be necessary. potentially contributing structures for a historic district in the foreseeable future. Most of the historic character of downtown Boyne is confined to the second-and-above stories of downtown commercial structures. Whether or not these buildings are actually NR-eligible seems to be of little interest since I have seen no effort at all to nominate any historic districts other than the far-too-long-awaited Pearl Street, which receives apparently no useful recognition for its historic status. Boyne City is taking years to accomplish weeks worth of work.

It certainly is possible to save Boyne City's historic character. However, much more than the ample amount of talk It really does not seem as though any serious commitment to saving Boyne's historic sites, structures and objects has been made at all, and I make that statement having been watching closely for several years.


One of the bad things sometimes spoken about historic preservation is that it is too costly. Boyne City is a good example of how that comes to pass, with a good deal of money having been spent to no good effect.

The recent design guidelines, in which Boyne City is characterized as a "Victorian" city, call into question the expertise of whomever assembled that information. The Executive Summary of a recent marketing study states that Boyne City should capitalize on its "historic character" as a major port and railroad juncture, basing this concept on the supposed visible evidence of same which is said to be extant in the downtown environment.


These statements are preposterous in that there is no visible evidence of either except some rotting pilings in the lake and a former railroad station so heavily altered that its historic identity is near to complete loss. A fake water tank won't cut it. Even the very handsome building in which your newspaper has its offices, which is the historic home of a railroad company, shows no visible evidence of that

After so much talk and money, one would have expected more in the way of hard results; otherwise it is nearly impossible to believe in the seriousness of the effort.





child services and AIDS prevention education and the care of AIDS patients, caught Bricker's attention.

"Beginning in February," Bricker said, "I will spend six months in northern California, training with Campus California Teacher Group and Humana People to People, two nonprofit organizations whole-heartedly battling the HIV and AIDS crisis in Botswana, Africa.

"Following this preparation in the U.S., I will spend six more months in Botswana, working directly with the AIDS epidemic before returning to the U.S. to share my knowledge with others."

According to Bricker, Sub-Saharan Africa has just over 10 percent of the world's population, but more than 60 percent of all the people living with HIV or AIDS. That is, 25 and a half million people. In addition, the AIDS epidemic, Bricker said, has lowered the life expectancy of Botswana's citizens from 72 to 39 years.

Bricker's role in Botswana will be to train local AIDS and HIV counselors, promote voluntary HIV testing and counseling, ensure that HIV and AIDS programs are in the schools and workplaces, organize the care of AIDS orphans and "stage actions to fight discrimination, fear and stigmas that surround the epidemic."

Bricker admits that while she

believes that she has a calling to help combat the AIDS crisis in Africa, and provide comfort and counsel to its victims, she still faces a funding challenge.

Having self-funded her previous trips, and with student loans still outstanding, the financial burden of volunteerism is weighty. Anyone wishing to assist is welcome to contact Molly Bricker at P.O. Box 854, Etna, CA 96027.

"My loans are not federal so they can not be deferred during the 14 months of this program," Bricker said. "Some very compassionate, generous members of our beautiful northern Michigan community have already contributed to this cause, for which I am eternally grateful."

Bricker, mystic and full of dreams as she may be, longs to have her feet planted in the African soil, where she can face the nightmarish challenges of an AIDS-ridden country with head and heart and hands.

"I truly believe that when we share our love with our brothers and sisters within our own communities and throughout the entire world, reaching out to one another across the globe as family, we will live together in peace," she said

The cost is \$3 for chamber members and \$5 for prospective members.




