> urt Willson began his latter-day career after already having a long and successful employment life as a carpenter, contracting with Bernie Kondrat to build log homes for almost 30 years. But outside the work place, he was a horse man, and loved to take his horses to pulls at county fairs and festivals. So when the long hours on the road got to be too much for him, he quit building log homes, and went into the logging business.

It may seem that felling trees and driving work horses is a younger man's job, and these days, Burt would agree. Over

the past year, he has had a stroke, knee replacement, a quadruple bypass, carpal tunnel. and got "smacked in the shins" by a tree in the woods

"There ain't nothing else. unless I croak," he said optimistically. So, he said, he has some young guys who can drive the horses in the woods these days. Young guys around fifty years old, he added with a grin. It isn't work for a greenhorn, even with an old hand

like Bob. Bob is a 22-year-old workhorse, who has been hauling logs out of the woods for a good number of those years.

"He works good in the woods - he's worked in the woods all his life,' Willson said. But he said that horses are like people,

and Bob doesn't respond to mistreatment. "Don't slap him with the lines. Don't get after him. He's paying attention - he's just making sure you're paying attention.

Grand jury indicts King

A federal grand jury recently issued an indictment against Robert Lee King for allegedly distributing schedule II controlled substances that resulted in the death of Emily Waskiewicz, a 20-year-old. If convicted, King faces 20 years to life in

prison and a fine of up to \$1 million. A 2002

graduate of East Jordan High School, Emily was known by her family and friends as "Emma," a tiny, outgoing bundle of

energy. She

was artistic,

athletic and a lover of animals and underdogs. She was a competitive skier and jumped horses. One year she was a cheerleader for EJHS.

"She was super active," her dad, Tad Waskiewicz, said. "Loving, giving, wanting to please people.

But, he added, she could be a "tiny, little pit bull" if someone was doing something she thought was wrong. "She would stand up for anyone,"

he said.

In 2001, Emma had an accident that would change her life forever. A serious fall broke her back in three places, and caused a closed head injury. Recovery took a long time, both as a patient in the hospital, and rehabilitation afterward. For the first time in her life, Emma was sidelined, unable to participate in those sports and other activities that she had so enjoyed.

She became somewhat depressed. In addition the head injury had its incumbent symptoms: inattention, memory loss and mental confusion

With high fuel prices, and winter closing in on us, people are looking anxiously at the thermostat and weather reports. Some predictions say that we are in for an unusually mild winter - the silver lining in the fuel costs cloud. Others say that nature runs on a cycle, and that we are due for record snowfall.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, known as NOAA -- pronounced like the original weather forecaster, "Noah" --isn't taking sides. Long range temperature outlook on the NOAA website for the Great Lake State is "equal chances for above average, normal or below average" temperatures, and the same goes for precipitation. In other words, expect lots of cold and snow, or the normal amount, or less than usual.

If that doesn't satisfy, maybe it is time to consult nature herself for a forecast.

For centuries farmers and sailors have been consulting the clouds, sun, moon, animal, bird and insect behavior, and many other natural signs to predict the weather.

"Thunder in fall, no winter at all," "Red sky at night, sailor's delight," and "A tough apple skin means a hard winter," are all weather-predicting proverbs. Some are pretty accurate, some are not, but most coincide often enough with predicted weather patterns that they have never completely been tossed to the wind whether or not they deserve to be."

Proverbs are based on centuries of observa-

tion by people whose livelihoods depended on the weather, so they are often at least somewhat accurate. Even those, such as Job's, "Fair weather cometh out of the north," are accurate or inaccurate in direct relation to geography. It wasn't written in Michigan.

Here are some that are generally true:

"Geese fly higher in fair weather than in foul." This is true of other migrating birds, as well, as has to do with their pressure "ceiling." Low pressure indicated stormy weather, and fair weather is accompanied by high pressure. The birds' ceiling is raised with a high pressure system. Also having to do with pressure, "The higher the cloud, the better the weather," is an indication of dry air and high pressure systems.

"When smoke descends, good weather ends," is also true, and also indicative of a low pressure system, which forces smoke downward before a storm.

In addition, a drop in barometric pressure can affect people with joint pain, bad teeth, corns or bunions, so if someone says, "It's going to snow, my left big toe hurts," it may not be as crazy as it sounds.

And how about the old story about the woolly bear caterpillar, which is supposed to have a thicker band of orange predicting a harsh winter. Or is it a narrower band of orange? No one seems to remember, and that's okay: a caterpillar's coat is not a reliable predictor of weather patterns. In fact any correlation at all is coincidental.

Similarly, a large nut harvest, leading to the proverb, "When squirrels lay in a big store of nuts, look for a hard winter," doesn't tend to be

accurate. A large harvest may tell more about the last winter and spring than it does the impending ones. "A year of snow, a year of plenty," is more like it - because unbroken winter snow cover can deter carly blooming, protecting the fruit (and nuts) until after killing frosts are over. Thawing and re-freezing is a killer of winter grains as well.

It is true that a halo around the sun or moon is an accurate predictor of rain - and a somewhat less accurate predictor of snow. The brighter the halo, the greater the possibility of precipitation. It is also true that when leaves are showing their undersides, it is a foreteller of rain.

Long range forecasters ply their trade by the use of real-time computer processing, satellite data and numerical models, and the accuracy







Boyne City citizens have been able to watch the expansion and renovation of the Boyne Rehabilitation Center as they drive along State Street. What they can see is a major building project, but what they can't see is the treatment options the expanded facility will bring back home to Boyne.

The center, a wholly owned subsidiary of Charlevoix Area Hospital, provides a full spectrum of physical, occupational and speech and language therapies.

According to the Center's records, patient treatments have grown to over 24,000 annually since opening in 1994 in a small strip mall in Boyne City. The existing building was purchased in 1996, but has since outgrown the rising patient demand for rehabilitation services. The staff of licensed and certified professionals now numbers 10.


The expansion is doubling the size of the existing facility and will add important modalities not before offered on site. including a warm water therapeutic pool and expanded gym areas. The number of treatment rooms will also be doubled, allowing ten rooms for individualized care in a private setting. Industrial medicine patients will see improved and expanded space for evaluations and treatment, and the pediatric treatment area will be greatly improved with additional space as well.

The Charlevoix Area Hospital Foundation undertook to raise the \$500,000 needed to finance the project, which ended up in the able hands of a dedicated community fund-raising group headed by Floyd Wright.

"The community has been very supportive," said Cindy Banner, one of the Center's founders. "That's absolutely wonderful they are taking time out of their busy lives. to help us, because they realize how important this is to our community." Banner added that the community group is always looking for people who would like to be involved in the fund-raising effort

To date, \$316,000 has been raised. But even when the \$500,000 goal is reached, fund-raising efforts will continue to help the Center finance new equipment for the expanded facilities.

They will need to purchase "plinth" treatment tables, traction units, altrasound machines, electronic muscle stimulation units, treadmills, bikes --- much equipment is needed to accommodate the anticipated

increased service load.

"We have a lot of existing equipment," Banner said, "We will make it work. It adds up very, very quickly."

Banner said that she believes the Center's growth is largely due to people recognizing quality service. With the rehabilitation and health centers, she said, we now have one big health campus." With the expansions over the years, Boyne Rehab has gone from providing general physical therapy alone, to supplementing it with many specialized services, ranging from sports injuries and back pain, to women's health services and foot therapy. to neurological conditions.

The expanded facility will allow for greater availability of pediatric services, with more than twice the original space allotted for the care of children.

The remodeled gym will provide space for group exercise classes: pilates and pre- and post-natal exercise classes. Sport-specific rehabilitation and training will be done on-site. A new elevated ceiling will allow for an indoors golf fitness program.

The occupational therapy services will also be expanded, with improved facilities to meet the demands of a growing industrial patient population.

Each new or expanded service is planned with the view of providing patients with comprehensive care at a convenient distance, understanding that physical discomfort and Michigan winters make traveling for services difficult. "One big thing, the community room,


7pm & 9pm Tickets \$25 & \$35 will be utilized outside the scope of our facility," Banner said, indicating that the Center hopes the community room will be put to use by CAH for local classes on different health care issues such as osteoporosis and cancer awareness. Community programs on health, wellness, fitness, injury prevention, diabetes, healthy diets, smoking cessation, high blood pressure, weight loss and many others will be available onsite for the first time.

The need for funds is not over, although the building project is getting closer to its projected mid-February completion date. The \$500,000 goal has not yet been met, Project should call (231) 547-8502





When Sheriff Lasater first came to work for Charlevoix County, the jail had four or five, maybe six inmates. They were all there for drunken disorderly charges, maybe the occasional breaking and entering. They ranged in age from 25 to 35 years.

Today the jail is full, and the average ages are 18 to 25, and the charges range from murder on down to "minor in possession." The population is not that much larger than it was in 1977. The problem is that much worse.

Kids are dying because they are overdosing on prescription drugs illegally gotten and distributed.

They are taking prescription opiates (you know, like heroin, only in a bottle from the drug store): morphine, codeine, hydrocodone, hydromorphone, oxycodone and oxymorphone --- which means the drug can come in any

Lady Loggers edge Mackinaw, 48-46



And sure enough, Bob will stand still in the woods, patiently waiting for the skidding tongs to be attached to a 10-foot length of heavy log, scanning the edge of the woods for the cleared path he will take out of it. At a word from his driver, he effortlessly pulls the log out of the woods, maneuvering easily between the standing trees, and responding quickly to the spoken whoa" or "easy on, easy on" of the driver.

Once Willson said that a new driver wouldn't listen to advice, but slapped and shouted at the big horse, who deliberately went the wrong way around the tree, tangling the line between himself and the driver.

"The guy didn't think he knew what he was doing," Willson said, but Willson is sure Bob was acting intentionally. "He's been doing this his whole life --- you're just getting started."

Bob can break in a green driver, he knows his job so well.

Willson works with Augie Stolt, driving horses and hauling logs. These days he watches from a fourwheeler, while Stolt (a "young guy" at 64) and Rick Lundy drive the horses

"I miss that," he said. "I miss being in the woods, working those horses."

Lundy, who is a less experienced driver, drove Bob, who made his steady way through the woods, barely breaking a sweat pulling the heavy logs. Augie took Mike, a huge chestnut, who is youngerss and not as used to working in the woods as Bob.

Mike pulled the logs out enthusiastically, waiting just long enough to have the tongs attached, and then plunging ahead while Augie pulled back on the lines, slowing the pace. Mike worked hard and his breathing matched. He seemed to think every log that made it to the field was the equivalent of a Olympic passed baton, and he rushed to drop it off, and rushed to get the next one.


He required more direction from the driver, and was less patient about finding the shortest, clearest route out of the woods. Augie is a strong man.

"He's like a colt today, he wants to run," Lundy called from behind Bob.

"Yeah, yeah," Willson said. "You want to try this one?"

"Nope. Looks like Augie's got his hands full," Lundy said. Augie said nothing. He had his hands full.

Mike, after another log. Mike



stood, and his breathing quickly stilled, while Augie removed his hat and wiped off his forehead. "Not that he needs it — I do," he

said, grinning. Logging with horses is better for the woods, Willson said, than removing trees with heavy equipment.

"A horse's side can't skin a tree." he said. "You don't have to build as many roads, so it don't tear up the woods. With a horse, you slide a log from tree to tree so it doesn't roll.

"A horse can take a hundred logs out in a day - just trim a little trail through the brush."

He said that when the woods are properly logged, they can be relogged within 10 or 15 years. If trees are taken when they are too small, the woods may never be "Take a break," Augie said to harvestable again.

"We don't cut anything under 16

"There's a lot to learn in the woods, but if you pay attention, you can do a good job," he said. He likes to leave the woods looking natural, with the branches on the tops cut down so there is no obstruction of view, and the tops can decompose more quickly. "If you finish, and it looks good to you, it will look good to the owner.

"I never get complaints -- except people who think I should cut smaller. They'll say, 'I should've gotten someone else.' You could have. But you'd never cut again," Willson said

With her back broken in three places, Emma had Harrington rods inserted to stabilize her spine, a method of fusing vertebrae. As she continued to grow, Emma began to experience severe chronic pain. Always independent, at 18, Emma began seeking medical treatment without her parents. At the same time, she was making lifestyle choices and had developed relationships that were harmful to her.

Over the course of the next year and a half. Emma was prescribed, one at a time, Oxycontin, fentanyl and methadone. The prescribed methadone eventually caused her to have respiratory difficulties so severe that she landed in Charlevoix Area Hospital, where her parents were advised that the dosage was too high.

Shortly thereafter, Emma moved back into her parents' home. Her mother, Kathy, was solicited to administer any medication, and Emma even let her parents manage her money. Emma also acknowledged to her parents that her friends were not a good influence in her life.

For three months, the Waskiewicz family began to heal . They made a trip in Oct. of 2004 to see Emma's older sisters, and had a wonderful Thanksgiving and Christmas together.

Treatment was reduced to a prescription for Celebrex, with vicodin administered as needed for pain by Kathy. Emma had been treated for depression - symptomatic of closed head injuries and also a result of her inability to engage in activities she loved. But her parents felt that she had turned a corner.

"When she came back home and got on a schedule, it helped a lot," Kathy said.

On Jan. 7, Emma and her parents went to see her counselor. The counselor felt Emma was doing so well, she said she did not need to see her for another month.

On Jan. 8, Emma told her parents she was going to a movie and out to dinner with a friend, and requested some of her money to cover those expenses. It was her second evening away from her parents' home since her return in mid-October It was the last time the Waskiewiczs saw their daughter alive.

They spoke on the phone, though, and Emma assured them she was having a good time, and was going to spend the night. Kathy was concerned about disrupting the schedule of Emma's medication, but, against her better judgement, she said, she acquiesced.

"We could have gone over and picked her up - which is what I would have done two years earlier," Tad said. "But at 20 and a half, she didn't have to come.'

The Waskiewiczs called again in the morning and got no answer, and called again in the early afternoon. This time they spoke to Charlevoix County Sheriff's detective Chuck Vondra. It was Sheriff George Lasater who came to the house to let them know their daughter had been gone since 9:30 on Sunday morning, the ninth day of January

That morning, Vondra had been called to the home of Emma's friends, when the deputy on scene referred the case to him. He arrived to find Emma deceased, and immediately enlisted the aid of Charlevoix County Prosecuting Attorney John Jarema.

The death was deemed worthy of further investigation by Jarema, Lasater, and Vondra. Emma's body was sent to Grand Rapids Blodgett Hospital for a forensic autopsy.

The investigation began even before the autopsy was completed, with Vondra questioning witnesses and taking careful notes on the scene. But the autopsy confirmed the worst: Emma was deceased due to the presence of fentanvl and methadone --- two medications she had not been taking by prescription for several months.

Almost immediately King emerged as a suspect. Jarema and Vondra researched the charges that could be brought against him at the state level. Second degree murder was the closest, they said, but it didn't quite fit the facts: Emma had not been forced to ingest controlled substances, she had willfully taken them. They also considered a drug delivery charge, but discarded it as not being a strong enough offense in light of the fact that this delivery had resulted in Emma's death.

"That led us to Assistant United States Attorney, Ray Beckering," Jarema said. "He knows what is going on with these drugs and people are dying." Beckering took an unusual step when he accepted the case without question.

Vondra, Lasater and Jarema agreed that it was a good case, partly because they were able to convene so early on.

"A key to any investigation is immediate responses you get and evidence gained at the scene," Vondra said. "Untimely or unenthusiastic response would have cost that onscene evidence. The response was good: (my) bosses made the right calls to get the ball rolling."

All kinds of interviews were done with the people who were actually in the house, and others who had a history with the suspect. When Beckering took the case, the "meat and potatoes" of the investigation had already been done.

With Beckering in charge, witnesses were subpoenaed for an initial grand jury hearing which took place on March 31, where witness testimony was preserved for the record.

"I commend the witnesses for openness and candor during the investigation. I didn't get the impression they tried to cover anything up," Vondra said. "They offered absolutely helpful information.

"The law protects their testimony to foster truthfulness," he added.

"There is not much we didn't do in this case, whether it was helpful or not," Vondra said. "I can't think of a stone we didn't turn.'

Jarema will have an easier time prosecuting at the state level the next time: as of January 1, 2006, Michigan prosecutors will be able to charge drug dealers who deliver controlled substances that result in death with homicide. Jarema and the law enforcement team who work on these cases agree that it will help in the battle against drug-related crimes.

"You need to hammer the ones you do get." Jarema said. Both Jarema and Lasater praised Vondra's work on the case, attributing the recent indictment to his tenacity and dedication.

"He is a bad guy getter," Jarema said.

But it still leaves the Waskiewiczs with empty hearts. "We thought we did everything we could to intervene," Kathy said. "It still wasn't enough."

"From October to the end of the year, things were really on the upswing. We were getting our hands around things. Emma had accepted the fact; had said, 'Mom and Dad, I can't do it alone," Tad said, fighting his emotions. "And then this had to happen."
