Letters helped soldier survive days in Vietnam

EAST JORDAN - It was 1970, and December was bringing it to a cold close when young Tom Durecki boarded a plane.

He wasn't bound for holiday celebrations with friends and family, but for Oakland, Calif., and then Vietnam.

Durecki had been drafted into the U.S. Army in June 1970 and had completed his basic training at Fort Knox, Tenn., and advanced training at Fort Polk in Louisiana. He was an infantryman, and he was going to join up with COD 57th Infantry, where he was to spend the next 13 months of his life.

Young Katrina Reid was boarding the same plane, in her case, homebound with her family after having spent the holidays in Michigan with relatives.

Tom remembers that she was wearing a pink mini-jumper, a white blouse, and nylons. She had a monarch butterfly press-on tattoo showing through the nylons. She had black hair and dark brown eyes, and—Tom said—she jungles of Vietnam? was gorgeous.

He, of course, was a young man in uniform. And what girl could resist a man in uniform even in the early 70s, when the war that raged at home was almost as heated as the war in the

Alger, currently the superintendent of Shepherd Public Schools, was selected Thursday, May 18 at a special meeting. Alger and Mancelona Public Schools Supt. Matt Miller were the two final candidates considered by the board at the meeting.

"It's just a matter of the board trying to come to some sort of consensus as to where we are right now and what we need," Board President Ed Vondra said of the deliberation process.

"I will miss him as a board member," said Supt. Gary Urman. "He was the treasurer of the board and he did a very thorough job of preparing himself as the treasurer of the board."

Board member Kurt Wilson was appointed as acting treasurer, Urman said.

They talked all the way to California, and Tom met Katrina's parents, who invited him to supper, and, if he had time, to a tour of their fair California

As it turned out, Tom's flight was delayed and he did have time. For the next few days, Tom spent a lot of time in the company of Katrina and her family. But eventually he left, after having a promise extracted that he would write to Katrina, that he would return home safely, and that he would visit on his return.

Tom kept his promise.

For the next harrowing 13 months, while he and his comrades ran night patrols and did surveillance, taking care not to engage the enemy, but to observe and report back.

Tom wrote Katrina as often as he could. There were times when he was in the field for days on end, and those days were lightened by the knowledge that he would find as many as three letters waiting for him from the faithful Katrina. She wrote as many as five times a week the whole time Tom served his country in Vietnam.

It was a difficult war. In Vietnam, Tom said, you did not know who your enemy was. There was animosity toward officers, many of whom came fresh out of officer training and began ordering men who had gained hard-won field experience, men who understandibly were unwilling to trust their already tentative safety to greenhorns.

There were so many casualties. When he was in the field, Tom said his instinct for survival was at times dependent on those waiting letters.

"The girl pretty much saved my life," Tom said recently, and his eyes welled up in a memory no one else can reach. "I had something to look for-

In January 1972, Tom left Vietnam and flew to Washington State, where he was discharged from the service. The young soldier's first move was to fulfill his promise to Katrina, and he flew back into Oakland and spent a week with her and her family

before returning to Michigan.

They kept in touch for months longer. But eventually, the correspondence stopped. A large stack of thick letters was left with his duffel bag at his parents' house. Tom and Katrina both got on with their lives, each marrying others, and perhaps forgetting at times.

But the memory of Katrina, and the debt of gratitude he owed her, never completely left Tom. A couple of time over the years he tried her parents, phone number but received the same message: "This number is no longer in service."

Years later Tom's marriage had ended, and he was now the owner of Tom's Bait and Tackle in East Jordan. When the war started in Iraq, the nagging thought began to recur more frequently that he needed to know what happened to Katrina Reid.

And then his mother died.

In the process of sorting through the family home, the thick stack of letters — put in chronological order by Tom's late father - were discovered. They brought with them a rush of memories, and the grief at the loss of his mother mingled with a refreshed grief over the different loss of Katrina. With the help of his computer-savvy sisters, Tom was determined to find her.

They placed an ad in the San Leandro Times, and began an Internet search. The Times was so interested in the story they decided to run not just a personal ad, but a feature story on the search.

Annie Kosiara, Tom's sister, quickly found an incredible answer: the "last-known" address that Tom had memorized was still home to members of Katrina's family and the number he had been calling was not disconnected. He had transposed two digits in the area code. When the right number was dialed, a connection, lost for 34 years, was made and a message left.

"I (am) sitting with him waiting for the phone to ring," Annie said, in describing the wait for the return call. "Hoping that the call will come with some information. (Tom) is sobbing, like I have never seen before. Torn between wanting to know and

not, I told him that after 34 years of searching, he has to know

"The casualties of war are not only those who were killed or wounded. They include those who lost the innocence of youth and came back men. who have seen the unthinkable to those left behind. Men now dealing with what might have been."

The call came: At last, Tom had a number for

The call went something like this:

"Is this Katrina Reid?" "Yes, it is."

"Did you ever write to a serviceman in Vietnam in '71?'

"Oh my God! Tom, is that you? Is this Tom Durecki?"

And then ensued an hour-long reunion. Katrina is a wife and the mother of four children, two in their 20s and two still pre-teen. She still has his class ring, his uniform and other mementos, though she recently gave a silk Vietnamese dress he had sent her to a Vietnamese friend. (Her daughter had worn it to prom several years earlier.)

"We're going to write and call," Tom said, still unable to dam the tears that overwhelm him. "It's a relief. This is the first time in 34 years I've felt alive-probably knowing she's alive.

"It's closure, like when you bury someone. A sad time, but a happy time. I'm happy. For her," he said, and added, "For me."

"When I was out in the bush, I was always looking forward to getting to base came because I knew there'd be two or three letters. It made me try and stay alive," he said, weeping unabashedly.

While the most romantic version would not have included a husband in California, Tom is not disappointed that he found Katrina.

"If she'd have told me she was single and available, I'd be on a plane right now," Tom said. "At least for a visit.

"But I am glad I did it. I needed to know what happened. I think we'll be friends for life now. We know where each other are."

Cooper retired from Harbor Springs Public Schools in 1999. He was hired as superintendent by BCPS in 2001.

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

## Clear as a bell

### Veteran relives memories of WW II

JORDAN TWP. - The year was 1939 and Garland Russell was a young man, sitting in a truck and driving to the big cities of the East.

"So when December 7 came I was in Albany, N.Y., and we were a half mile or more from the restaurant," he said. "We did not go that half mile for breakfast, but instead waited until the noon meal to be served, as we were without a load that certain Sunday."

Russell recalls sitting at the table when he heard the radio announcer say, "We interrupt this program to report that Japan has bombed Pearl Harbor and other that island

In the later days, Russell said, the army was taking their drivers in the draft, in such increasing numbers that there were not even two drivers to be placed on a truck.

"I was sent out alone carrying two log books," he said. "I hauled a number of strictly government loads east and west, anywhere I had a license to travel. Went from Boston to Washington, D.C., and west to Indiana and south to Kentucky, and even to Michigan."

Russell was drafted based on orders from the Chicago draft board, on June 1. He was notified that weekend and told to leave his load at his present location in Dayton, Ohio.

"Our first processing was to the Chicago Armory and from there we went to Rockford, Ill." he said. "Then we went to Jefferson Barracks for airplane mechanic school which included major overhaul of engines and that ended in mid-December 1942."

Following that, Russell was sent to Camp Stoneman in California where he received his shipping orders to the Pacific theater after one week.

"I was stationed in Hawaii in an old squadron with men of four years of service already having had served," he said "Being a new man, all I was allowed to do

was clean up other men's messes. Wipe grease off airplanes or clean up grease from the floor."

"They had one guy there and I don't think he had a grade school education at all. He had two months seniority on me and until he learned the things first, I was not allowed to do them. My officers would not let me do it. They would not let me do anything. He had to do it first."

Russell said there was an opening on the gas trucks, which he applied for and received.

'Our squad had old B-18s (a medium bomber), which were too old to be sent into combat," he said. "Later on, we got new B-24s which were modified to long-range, but that was not until early 1944."

In his spare time, Russell volunteered for the photography area, taking lots of pictures of the troops as they prepared to go to Saipan, Japan.

"Our landing field was too small at first for B-29s, so that had to be greatly enlarged." Russell said. "When the first B-29 came in, I refilled them with my gas truck until the larger trucks arrived which carried 6,000 gallons of gas."

According to Russell, these large plans could travel all the way to Tokyo and back, non-stop

"Our 24s did not have range enough and we would have had to refill the at the Iwo Jima site," he said. "The Japs were already using it for that purpose and they were certain we were not going to get in."

Russell said, as ground personnel for the planes, they didn't do the main fighting, adding the Marines and infantry division took care of that.

"When the 12 Betties (a Japanese medium bomber) came in, 10 were shot down that night after midnight while the other two got until the next morning before they could get back to Iwo Jima," he said. "I was not there when they came in on the blind radar

Upon his arrival at Saipan, Russell said fighting was ongoing at the north end of the island and there was plenty of sniper fire around so they had to be on the

"Four of us went toward the east field, helping ourselves to a Jap truck, towing it back to our squadron. A Jap showed up in the mouth of the cave, and he sure was not bashful in following us posed with his rifle aimed directly at me. I tell you, I was scared and I don't deny it."

Russell said his mother, who was stateside, woke up in her sleep because she sensed he son was in great danger.

"She came out of bed on her knees and started to do some praying," he said. "The Jap did not shoot me, but he was out there for 11.5 hours."

Russell recalled burying eight soldiers and animals to assist in corralling the stench around the

"I did not have to do any handto-hand combat, but our combat men got their share of it," he said. "Our work on Saipan became mostly cleanup work to better things for the occupation forces to come.'

The men were busy constructing such things as huts, tents, an air strip, roads, wells and other things needed for survival.

These things were all taking place by each unit," he said."Being called up to work. I even drove a dump truck for a while. My helper stayed on the gas truck taking care of that end. He was a Filipino man."

Russell said he could have been put back on his gas truck in a hurry if he needed to be.

"When those monsoon rains came that soil is nothing but mud," he said. "So we used coral rock as gravel. It sure makes a good solid place to drive cars, trucks or for airplanes and that is what I was doing with the dump truck, but it was borrowed truck from another unit."

Russell spent about four months on the island of Saipan, witnessing a typhoon coming across the ocean at one time.

The sky turned black in good shape where it crossed," he said "Anything not anchored down would have been gone with the wind. We had 300 regular soldiers or prisoners and 30 or more of their officers as prisoners of war on my return trip to Hawaii. They had been told Japan had taken the Hawaiian Islands at the beginning of the war."

Russell said his squadron might not have been made a big notice for themselves, but at least they were there doing what they

He wa discharged from the service on Oct. 7, 1945.

A life-long Antrim County resident, Russell also found time to serve on the Civilian Conservation Corps and now lives on a 40acre farm, which has been sold off from its previous 140-acres.



us who have hay fever and allergies to pollen tend to forget what the rest of the year is like. Since there is no pollen floating around through the air, things

get pretty easy for us. But like I mentioned, I received a rude awakening a little while ago one that told me winter was definitely over and allergy season had begun.

I had left the Leader office to go pick up some lunch and was pulling back into our tiny little parking lot on the side of the building. 
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### Controversy over immigration may be leading to new racism

I have been out of the news loop since we moved.

I am a news junkie. but if I go for a few weeks without it, I not only live, I fret less. It's probably good for me.

On the other hand, I think it's a good idea to be as informed as you can about things, especially if you want to express your opinions.

And most of us have a plethora of expressed opinions, informed or otherwise.

So I admit my information is a bit sketchy, but it seems to me that the news is still immigration. Specifically and significantly, illegal immigration.

The president's speech a week and a half ago won the approbation of some staunch liberals, and won the scorn and

condemnation of some equally stannch conservatives. I confess I didn't hear it, nor do I know what to think about the solution to the illegal immigration problem. But I think most of us agree that

one exists.

So here is a terrible thing: one night a group of young men became engaged in a brawl in a northern Michigan bar which seemed to them. inexplicable. They said that they were attacked without any

more provocation

were in the company of a man presumed

to be Hispanic. The fight ended without any real damage, but the young men were infuriated by what they

perceived as I was skeptical. I

didn't think people were that racist, even under the influence. Something else must have provoked the scuffle.

But talking about it to a person with a Hispanic last name, I was informed that things are changing, and that a prejudice against Hispanics is becoming noticeable.

Since I was raised outside Traverse City, in cherry country, it was natural that our summer days were spent working in the

workers.

Their rapid-fire Spanish was unintelligible to all of us but my oldest sister (who profited more from her many years of Spanish class, than I did mine).

They were fast workers and picked clean, and lived with apparent contentment in "picker's quarters." These were often low. dark buildings, with rooms strung together under a long roof, a row of one-room apartments. I do not know what was available for

On the small farm where I grew up, the former owners, picker's quarters consisted of two rooms, enough to house two families of migrant workers, who must have used the outhouse.

restrooms.

Racism? I don't

The farmers depended on the migrant workers, and the workers returned summer after summer, forging relationships that spanned generations.

If a demonstrative racism is beginning to emerge in northern Michigan, the surely the problem is worse in parts of the country more affected by illegal immigration.

If the bar fight (and I do not know this to be true) was in all reality influenced by the presence of a darker-skinned, darkhaired, dark-eyed fellow for no other reason than that, it would be deeply troubling.

While I absolve no one of blame for personal prejudice, I do lay blame elsewhere, as well.

First of all, our borders are vulner-

able, and if we are as infiltrated by lawbreakers as we are told, prejudice is a predictable outcome. Not justified, mind, but predictable—on both sides of the racial divide.

Secondly (and perhaps I contribute, as this is my second column on the subject), a few months ago we were not talking about this at all. So much of it seems media-driven. We are whipped into a froth without moderation over an issue that was a nonissue for all but a few a scant handful of months ago.

Our borders, and in particular our southern border, have been perforated for years.

But suddenly every news outlet and politician is engaged in frantic handwringing over the problem of the borders, reminding us of the millions of people who are feeding at the public trough-and paying no federal income tax. Does that make

you mad? The wrong kind of media attention feeds the kind of anger that leads to that demonstrative racism.

I think the borders need to be secured. and the illegal immigration problem dealt with in an equitable and just way-and swiftly.

I think individuals, each of us, need to depress any feelings

of blanket rancor based on ethnicity or race. But I sure do wish the media would spend more time informing, and less time inflaming. It's irresponsible and dangerous, and not conducive to solving the problem.



Sec. 11-72. Definitions. For the purposes of this article, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section:

Household waste means any and all waste products generated in the day-to-day operations of a household, excluding human waste which is disposed of through a sanitary sewer or septic system.

Open burning means a fire from which the product of combustion are emitted directly into the open air without passing through a stack or chimney.

Rubbish means unwanted or useless material including food, paper and building debris. Yard waste includes leaves, brush, tree stumps and vine growth, vegetation, yard clippings and

paper. (Ord. of 10-1-96)

Sec. 11-73. Prohibited open burning.

No nerson, firm or corpo maintain any open burning of any rubbish or household waste material in any incinerator, barrel, can, pit or similar container or enclosure.

No person, firm or corporation shall permit or engage in the act of burning leaves or other yard wastes within the corporate limits of the city.

## Good times and great picking a mainstay at festival

BOYNE CITY— Rylee Kibler can't tell you where he picked his prize-winning mush-

"It's a secret," the eight-year-old said. But he sure can de-

other activities.

Carnival-goers soared over the crowds in Veterans Park and craft-seekers browsed vendors' wares, where popular items were wood or cement morel replicas that are surely easier to find than their natural counterparts.

In downtown Boyne, though, real morels were on display on the Mushroom Pole. The event, in its third year, awards morel-hunters for mushrooms in categories like biggest, smallest, most unique and best dressed.

Bernice Carson of West Bloomfield entered a mushroom that she knew was unusual when she saw it in the woods Friday.

"I think it's special," she said of the morel, which had an extra, very small morel growing from its stem.

Carson won the Oldest Mushroom Picker category in the pole.

Marilea Grom, on the Boyne City Main Street board of directors, said the Mushroom Pole is a family event in which everyone can participate. She said people were so anxious to enter that they were already waiting when she and Main Street manager Kelly Larson set up the pole at 11 a.m. Saturday.

Larson said people focus on the morel all weekend and the pole helps get them into Boyne City's streets.

"It's a little fun, a little unique that people would want to get out of the park," she said.

A little after noon, morel seekers in the official funt returned from the hunting grounds with their mesh totes of mushrooms.

Lion Mike Brown said the hunt was successful as usual, despite the number of mushrooms being down from over-picking.

"It's all in good fun," he said, adding that with the changing weather, more mushrooms should pop up in the next weeks.

Money raised from the weekend's events helps pay for Lions programs that work to "solve blindness in our neighborhoods," Brown said.

Pamela Hall of Midland was named Grand Champion of the hunt after finding 31 morels.

"It wasn't the best

year, but it wasn't the worst," Hall said.

She said she's been entering this hunt for eight years and admitted that this had the best weather. Some hunts have been held in the cold or even snow.

Hall has been on hunting morels since she was about 5 years old, when her proximity to the ground gave her special skills. She described morel hunting as a little like "an adult Easter egg hunt."

That fun of the hunt is one of the reasons Larry Joe Campbell and Jeff Boucher spent a year making a documentary about morel hunting.

Campbell, a Cadillac native who plays Andy on "According to Jim," and Boucher, a Kalkaska native, grew up mushroom hunting. Campbell said.

He said describing to the morel to people doesn't get the point across.

"When I tell people how great the morel mushroom is they stare blankly at me," he said. So he and Boucher

decided to show them with a documentary.

with a documentary. Rapi Boucher said there's a siste unique subculture to the Citiz

morel, and the intent of the film is to show the passion and look at some of the debate within the morel community: Are mesh or paper bags better? Do the mushrooms grow, or do they pop up?

Campbell said he wanted to expose the mushroom to his friends who "live on cement in a big, huge city."

"(There's a) magic, really, to this fruit." he


