Discovery Channel picks BC school films for airing

BOYNE CITY — Mix science, graphic imaging, dedicated students, a can-do director and imagination, and the result is a call from cable television's Discovery Channel.

The call last week was from the show's producers to Boyne City High School's graphic imaging department. Students and others had created three films and sent them to the show in response to a contest by the channel.

Chosen out of thousands of entries worldwide, excitement is high throughout Boyne City High School and the community members who had worked from the ground up to produce the films.

It all began one evening last fall when graphic imaging director, Randy Calcaterra, was viewing the channel. A commercial called for entries in a contest put on by the show. The challenge was to create a

spoof of one of the channel's programs. The rules: entries must be no more than 10 minutes in duration, and oh, yes, they were due in to the Discovery Channel by Nov.

1, 2006 — less than four weeks away.

Calcaterra immediately formed a team of about 30 people, some from the school and some from the

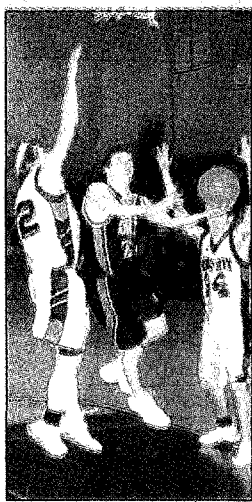
community. Ideas were written into scripts, of a sort. Sets had to be built, animation and graphics created, sound perfected, the actual

County settles lawsuit for health benefits with former employee

CHARLEVOIX — The county has settled a case brought by a former employee for health insurance benefits.

Jacqueline Rozema sued the County of Charlevoix for violation of the Whistleblower's Protection Act and fraud in connection with the termination of her

health benefits. The suit was filed with the Charlevoix County Circuit Court on Jan. 26, 2006.

The case had reached the Michigan Court of Appeals and that court issued an order that dismissed the case on Feb. 13. The settlement amount was not available.

Charlevoix county by a resolution provides lifetime health benefits to retirees if they were hired before 1992, and if they do not

have an interruption of service. Rozema worked for the county from 1981 to 2004.

But, the county claimed Rozema would receive double recovery if she were to be awarded health benefits through age 62. The county's position was that it, therefore, would be in violation of Michigan law that prohibits double recovery.

The double recovery

claim by the county is based on a former lawsuit by Rozema against the county and its former prosecutor. Rozema claimed violation of the Michigan Whistleblowers Protection Act and hostile work environment in that case. A violation of the Persons With Disabilities Civil Rights Act was later part of her claims. That case was tried before a jury in May 2005, and Rozema was awarded damages totaling \$505,714.

Boyne citizens appeal plans at waterfront

BOYNE CITY — An appeal of the approval of One Water Street development's site plan has been filed with the Boyne City Zoning Board of Appeals.

A public hearing in front of the ZBA is set for 5 p.m., Tuesday, March 6.

A group of citizens object to the planning commission's approval on Dec. 18, 2006, stating the development is in violation of the city's zoning ordinance. Violations alleged include lack of requests for variances, and a failure to meet the recommendations of the city's comprehensive plan and its waterfront master plan.

Resident Sue Hobbs is one of the citizens seeking a hearing.

"Throughout the past 20 to 25 years, the citizens have let the city know they don't want a wall of condos on the waterfront," Hobbs said.

Despite that, Hobbs named several instances of development gone awry.

The homes built in designated open space between the Harborage and Tannery Park, and garages in the no build zone at East Main and Front streets, are two such instances.

The goal of the group of citizens is for One Water Street developers to follow the zoning ordinance, Hobbs said.

"I don't expect them (developers) not to build, but they should meet the requirements of the zoning ordinance," she said. "The zoning ordinance is based upon public input, yet it was ignored."

With respect to One Water Street developers failing to ask for variances from the zoning board, however, city planning director, Dan

Reed, said the planning commission has the authority to waive that requirement.

A waiver was approved for height, for instance. Section 20.20 of the zoning ordinance restricts building height in the Waterfront District to 35-feet and two and a half stories. The waiver approved 45-feet and four stories.

But, the waiver option is meant to be used for the benefit of preserving waterfront view, Hobbs said.

Section 20.30 (e) of the zoning ordinance states that standards may be waived if it is determined necessary in order to preserve public views and scenic vistas.

The waiver was not issued for those reasons, but instead for allowing building height so high that it obstructs the view, Hobbs said.

Another violation asserted by the citizens group is the approval of multi-family units that are not allowed in the Waterfront Marina District. Single-family residential is allowed only over first floor commercial businesses, yet the One Water Street project is approved for two additional floors.

Reed defends the project's approval.

"It's a very good example of the type of project we want downtown," he said. "Their (citizens group) interpretations are, frankly, wrong."

That doesn't deter Hobbs and the others.

"Lake Charlevoix and the waterfront is why people travel here and if you can't see it, they won't come," Hobbs said. "If we close off Lake Charlevoix, we close off the economic and recreational benefits."

Hobbs urges people to attend the March 6 meeting.

Author encourages reading in EJ

EAST JORDAN — Nearly a week ago, the students at East Jordan Elementary School attended an assembly as a part of their kick-off to "March is Reading Month," an event which takes priority every year in schools across the nation.

While planning reading activities for this year's reading month, the staff identified the most popular books in the elementary school's Media Center. At the top of the list were the American Chillers series by

Michigan author, Jonathan Rand. Rand topped the charts at EJES in the 2005-06 school year, having books he had written checked-out to students nearly a thousand times.

Last Thursday, Feb. 15, Rand spent an entire day with staff and students. The visit, supported by a grant from the East Jordan Learning Alliance, enabled Rand the opportunity to share his love for reading and writing to the school's first through fifth grade students.

During the assembly, Rand described how he became an author and had some words of advice for the room full of captivated students. According to Rand, "A book is something you put in a place you go."

He continued by telling the five hundred students in attendance that, "When you open a book you are opening a door."

According to Marie Haley, the district's reading specialist, Rand is "an awe-

some influence for young people. Children and adults cannot help but to be captivated by this man. We are so fortunate to have a guest of his caliber to deliver the message that reading and writing are not only fun activities, but that doing both well is a necessity in our world today."

"He inspires you explore the world of literature," Haley added, also noting that all sixty-five copies of American Chillers in circu-

shoot and editing completed - all with people learning on-the-job.

"There was no practice," Calcaterra said. "It was sink or swim, literally."

The students in the graphic imaging department smile broadly when they remember receiving notice that their films were chosen by the channel.

"When he (Calcaterra) told us we were finalists, I was shocked," high school senior Amy Anderson said. She was one of the 22 students who hit the ground running and produced the films within less than four weeks.

"I was on all of the sets, writing down the scenes and what we needed for props each day," Amy said. Working at a computer, she logged and captured scenes.

Senior Oliver Ryan was also part of the team that produced the films. "I was excited because with Boyne City being a small town, it's great to be chosen," he said. Oliver is one of the stars in a film.

"I was the one pelted with water balloons," he said cheerfully. One of the films is a spoof on the Discovery show "Mythbusters," a show designed to amaze, entertain and teach viewers about science.

This spoof film known as "The Myth You've Heard a Thousand Times," features a number of students from the high school.

The films will premier at the high school auditorium, tentatively on Saturday, March 10, Calcaterra said. He suggested check-

ing with the school's Web site the first of March to confirm that date. The Web site address is: boyne.k12.mi.us. Click on high school, student gallery and then Mythbusters. Or by telephone, the number is: 231-439-8100.

The channel aired the films on Sunday, Feb. 25. The specifics of the film that spoofed "Mythbusters" are being held by Calcaterra so that people will be surprised when they view the film.

In the spoof of Mythbusters, six "scientific" tests were performed and "each test raised the level of 'ridiculous,'" Calcaterra said.

High school senior, Shelley Kotesky, worked on the spoof. "I enjoyed working on the projects and being able to see the results," Shelley said. Her interest is in graphic design and illustration and she plans to study in those fields when she enters college.

"This was a good opportunity to learn how to do a major project," Shelley said.

The other two films are spoofs of "Survivor Man" and "The Mike Rowe Parody."

The Boyne City Fire Department had a part to play in the projects. Calcaterra said the city and the community were all helpful and willing to participate.

"The fire department and the city were so fantastic to work with. It couldn't have happened without their support. Everyone came together."

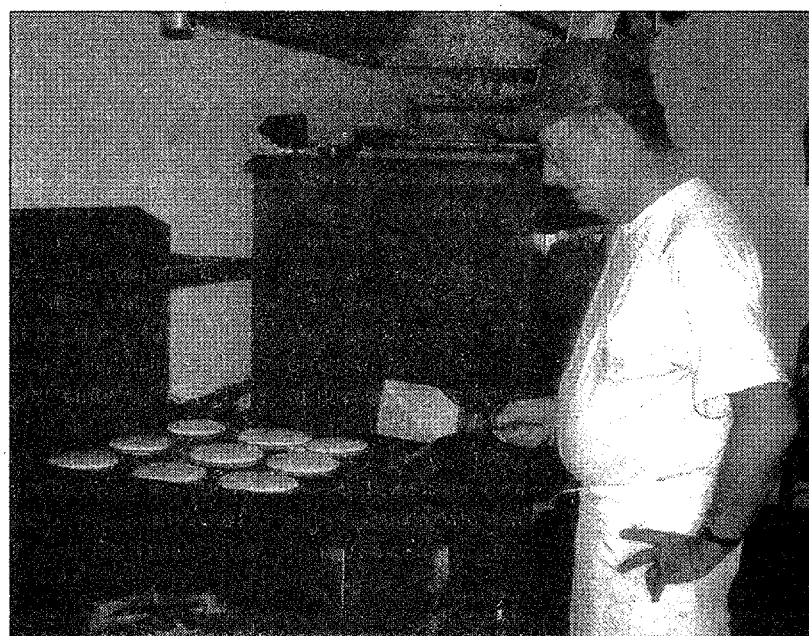

Each February brings the children of Camp Quality and their families to the Boyne area for a day in the snow at Challenge Mountain. The children and their families arrive on Friday and are housed in nearby motels. On Saturday they travel to Boyne City where breakfast is sponsored and served by the Knights of Columbus.

Then it's off to Challenge Mountain for a day of fun in the snow. The Mountain staff are on hand to help the children use the special adaptive equipment and fit them with boots and skis, serve lunch and snacks and help the children enjoy the day.

At day's end, it's back to the Knights of Columbus Hall for a pizza party provided by BC Pizza, ice cream and

games and dancing. At 7 p.m., all return to the motels for swimming and, finally, sleeping.

This year about 150 children, parents and staff attended Snow Day, which was under the direction and coordination of Linda Ward of Petoskey, who has coordinated the event for the past nine years.

Camp Quality is an international program founded in 1985 in Australia. Camp Quality is a non-profit volunteer organization dedicated to giving children with cancer the opportunity for outdoor adventure though camping and leisure outdoor fun. Camp Quality of Michigan was founded in Boyne City in 1987 Eleanor West is the director of Camp Quality Michigan and has been with the program since its start.

In addition to Snow Day, the Camp Quality program has a number of events and activities for the children and their families. In the spring, they will visit the campus of Central Michigan University, stay in a dor-

mitory and visit the student activity center. The third week of August is busy with preparation as Camp Quality moves to its summer home, Camp Daggett on Walloon Lake.

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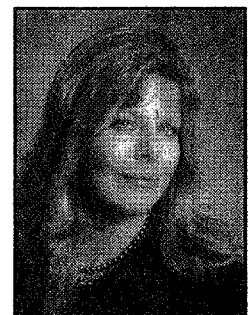
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Teachers invited to apply for freshwater institute

TRAVERSE CITY — NMC's Great Lakes Water Studies Institute is now accepting applications for the 2007 DTE Freshwater Institute for Teachers. This is one of the most successful programs in the history of WSI and it is being offered again this year, thanks to support from the DTE Energy Foundation.

The DTE Freshwater Institute for Teachers features rich content, hands-on learning, collaboration and community-based projects about water resources.

Teachers will first participate in a 4-day summer institute at NMC's Great Lakes Campus and at a variety of field locations from July 9 to 12. The summer institute has three areas of focus: (1) water resources and watershed management; (2) place-based education, and; (3) inquiry-based teaching and learning.

During the 2007-2008 school year, teachers will develop and implement a place-based education project about water resources with their students. Place-based projects help teachers achieve their curricular goals while increasing student engagement and achievement through authentic field experiences, school-community partnerships and community service.

Participants receive ongoing support from WSI staff and local community partners to help develop and implement their place-

based projects, while students work side-by-side with natural resource professionals to address locally-relevant water issues. In addition, three Dinner & Dialogue sessions during the academic school year provide a forum for teachers and community partners to network and forge productive partnerships. This year, teachers from the Grand Traverse region will be joined by Ann Arbor area teachers for the DTE Freshwater Institute for Teachers. Follow-up during the school year will take place in each of these two communities.

Course information and application materials are available at: www.nmc.edu/glwsi/dte. Applications are due by March 30. Participants receive a \$400 stipend, a \$200 mini-grant and the option to enroll for three graduate credits.

WSI will also offer a DTE Freshwater Institute in Muskegon in association with the Muskegon Area Math and Science Center, and an advanced DTE Freshwater Institute for veteran teachers of the 2004-6 DTE Freshwater Institutes at the University of Michigan Biological Station in Pellston.

The DTE Freshwater Institutes complement WSI's mission to inspire citizens' lifelong stewardship of freshwater.

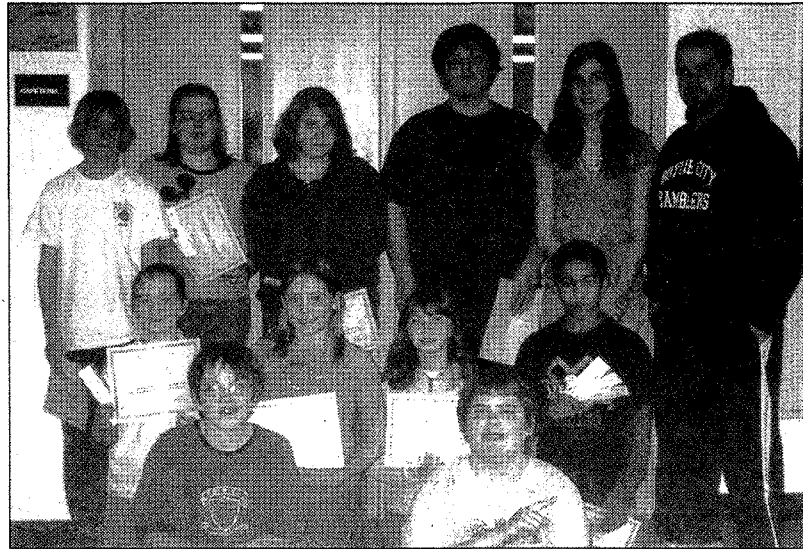
Winners announced in anti drunk-driving poster contest





A visitation will be held 6 to 8 p.m., Thursday, March 1, at Stackus Funeral Home.

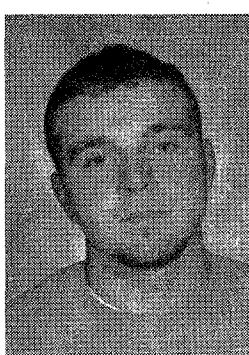

Three Ramblers hit double-figures, using a balanced scoring attack to on their end of the

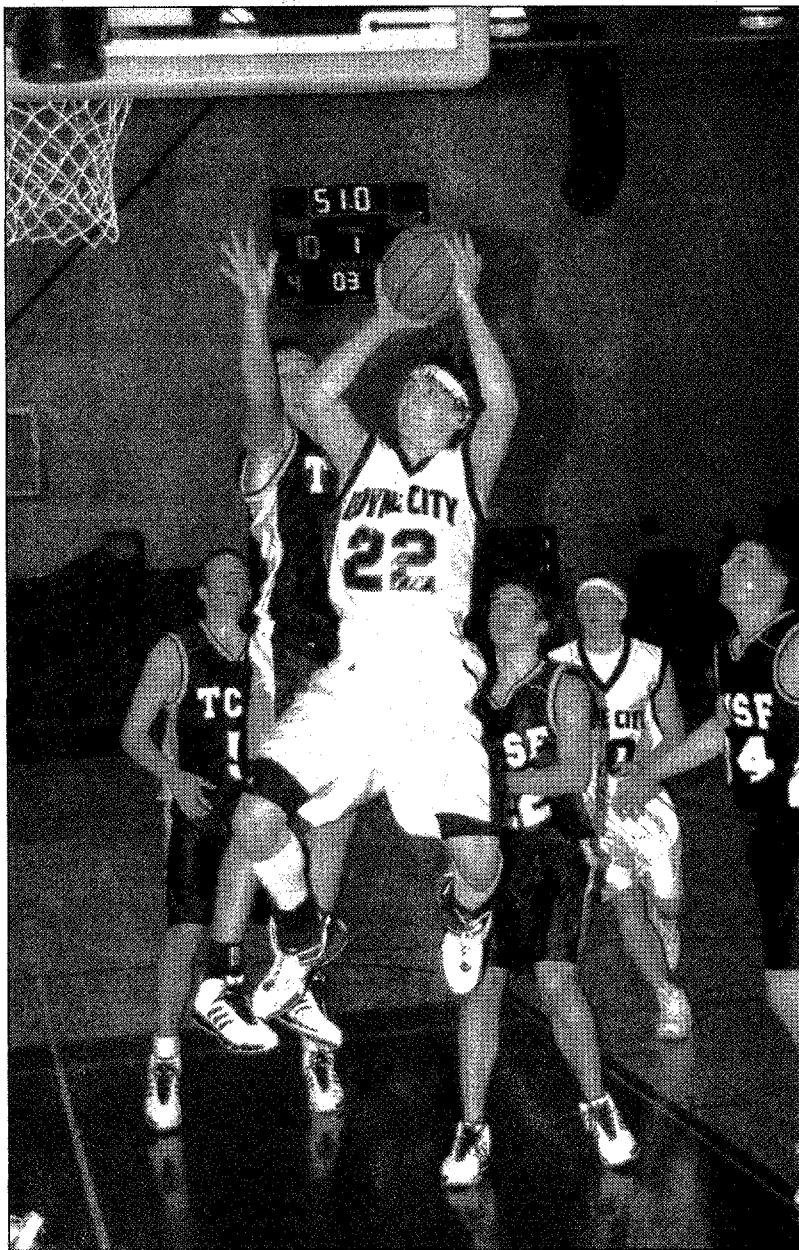

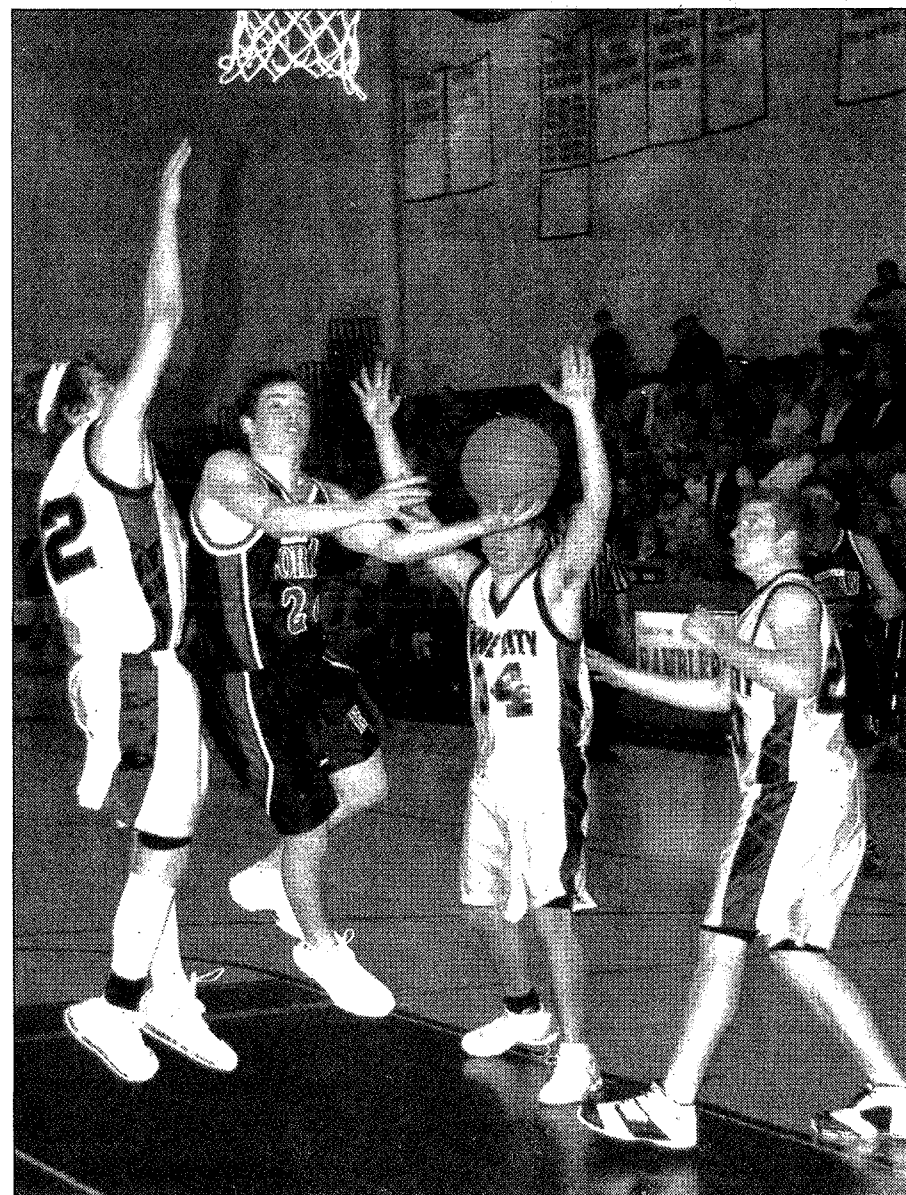
