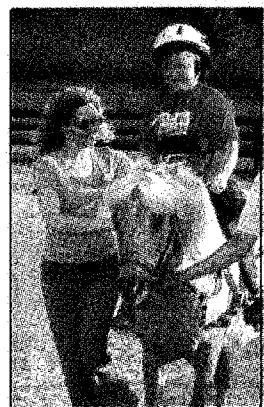

Residents unite, commissioners listen

BOYNE CITY - Residents in the Timber Ridge area convinced city commissioners that their neighborhood was not the place to rezone for a funeral home.

At a March 27 meeting at city hall, commissioners voted 4-1 to deny a rezone. If granted, the rezoning would have allowed the Stackus Funeral Home, owned by Stone Funeral Home, to relocate from Elm Street to a parcel just inside the city limits on the Boyne City-Charlevoix Road.

Mayor Eleanor Stackus cast the lone vote to allow

rezoning.

Residents of the Timber Ridge neighborhood gave several reasons to deny rezoning. Some concerns

Juvenile vandals apprehended, confess to cemetery damage

BOYNE CITY - Three Boyne City juveniles were apprehended March 27, by the Boyne City Police Department for extensive damage to the city's Maple Lawn cemetery. The youths have confessed to the crime, according to the police department. Two of the juveniles are Boyne City High School students.

The names of the 16-year-olds are not being released and as of Monday, no charges had yet been brought by Charlevoix County Prosecutor John Jarema. He said his office had not received the necessary paperwork from the police department.

Police Chief Randy Howard said Monday the paperwork would likely go to the prosecutor that day. The charges requested will be malicious destruction of property and larceny, Howard said.

Some time late on March 24, about 75 headstones were knocked over and damaged, along with numerous pots and plant holders, according to police. A small statue was found in the home of one of the juveniles.

The community has been saddened by the destruction. Some families have taken it upon themselves to repair what they can. But, many of the headstones await arrival See VANDALS, page 2

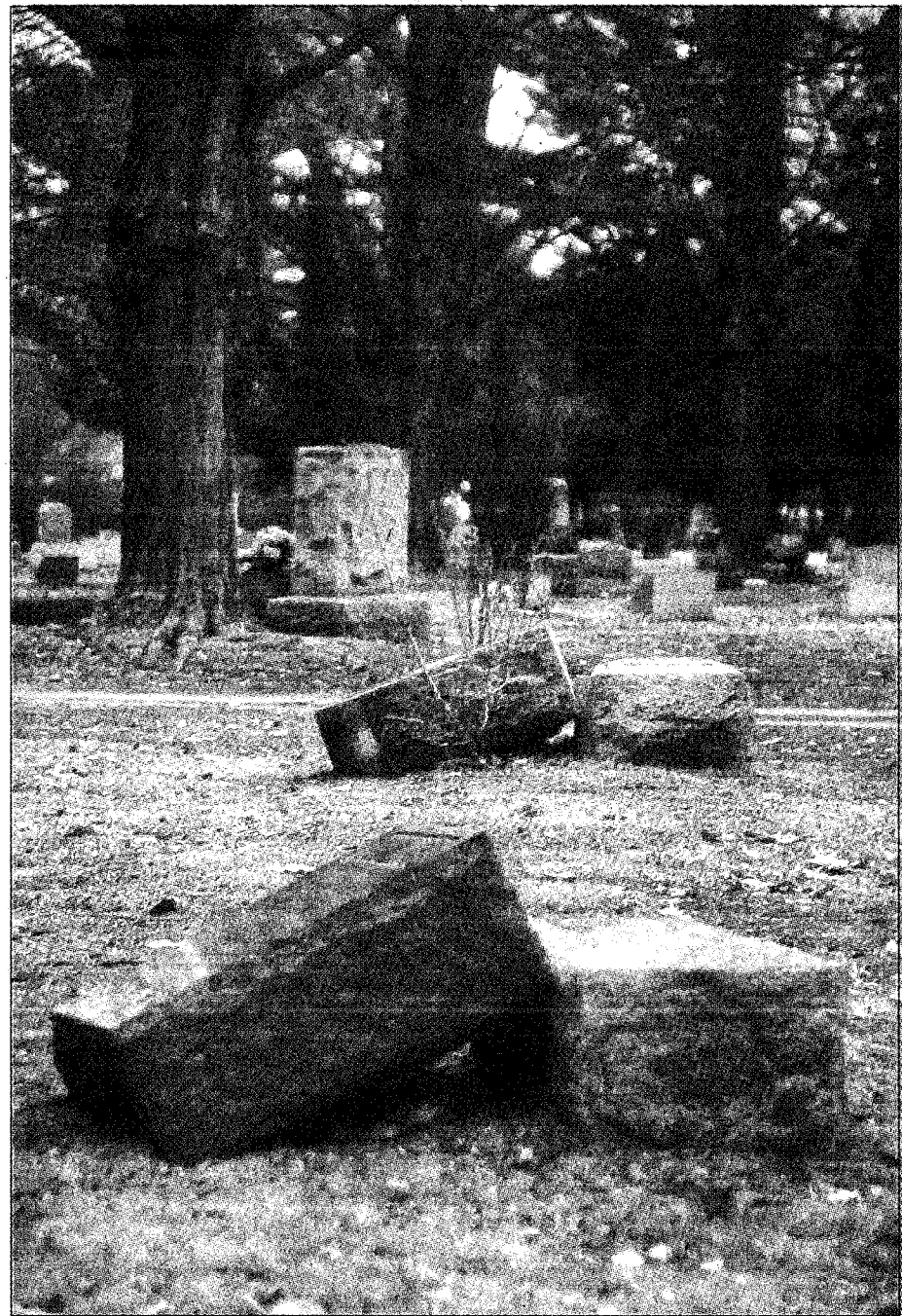

Public forum sought on bond needs

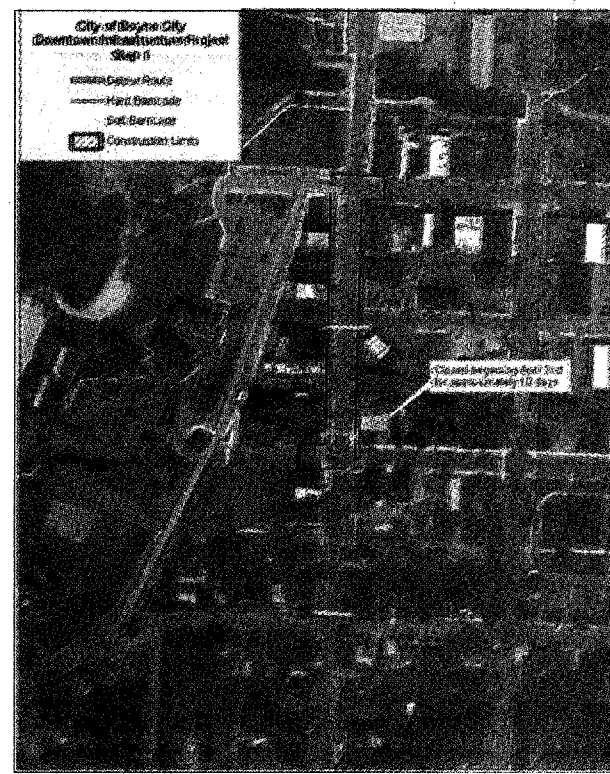

New construction phase in downtown Boyne City

BOYNE CITY - Construction began on Monday, April 2, for Phase Two of the city's downtown improvements. Phase Two encompasses the reconstruction of Lake Street from Main Street to Water Street. Phase Two consists of four steps.

Construction will not take place during the busy summer months, according to the city manager's office. Completion is expected by the end of May. Phase One was completed in the fall of 2006.

The downtown infrastructure project includes sewer, water and storm line replacements and upgrades, street reconstruction, and new streetscape elements. The project is funded in part by a \$1 million grant awarded in 2006 by the Economic Development Corporation.

Street construction will also take place on State Street from the intersection of East Street to Lake Street. This is a Michigan Department of Transportation project. See CONSTRUCTION, page 2

Yearlong program to benefit BC team

EAST LANSING — A seven-person team of Boyne City leaders has been selected to participate in a new program led by Michigan State University (MSU) Extension aimed at building community capacity around entrepreneurship.

Hugh Conklin, of the city of Boyne City; Rob Swartz, of Black Diamond Wealth Advisors; Rachel Swiss, of Northwood Mortgage, L.L.C.; retiree Bob Carlile; Boyne City manager Michael Cain; Pat O'Brien, of P. O'Brien & Associates; and Kirk Jabara, of Fulcrum Partners, L.L.C., began the yearlong Creating Entrepreneurial Communities (CEC) program recently during an intensive weeklong work-

shop at the MSU Brook Lodge Conference Center near Augusta, Mich.

The group was one of nine teams selected on the basis of their proposed economic goals, vision, composition and organization as well as the community's readiness, resources and unique ability to become a model for other Michigan communities.

"What makes Creating Entrepreneurial Communities unique is that most programs like this focus on attracting new businesses," says Barb Falls, assistant director of the MSU Product Center and one of the program's organizers. "This program encourages com-

area." Murdoch said people move into residential-zoned areas and should be able to know the zoning will remain that way. The audience showed agreement with approval.

The relocation of a commercial entity into an area zoned residential was sought under a controversial state law known as "contract rezoning."

Contract rezoning (Public Act 579) allows a city or village to enter into an agreement with a landowner to rezone land for a specified, particular use. If the land ceases to be used in the manner specified, it returns to the original zoning.

Critics say it is spot zoning, or allowing different zoning in the same area.

"I thought the Boyne City master plan created residential and commercial areas, so I don't know why you're spot zoning," resident John Hunt said.

Commissioners gave individual reasons for voting down the rezoning.

Safety was the top concern of commissioner Ron Grunch.

"My personal feelings, my reason for not

granting it, is the safety issue. Those cars are on top of you before you can cross the road," Grunch said.

He also said the rezoning goes against the master plan and zoning ordinance.

Commissioner Jerry Douglas thought for some time about the issue.

"I've been back and forth several times," Douglas said.

"I concluded that this is bigger

than residents and business - it's about contract rezoning. You can create many problems if it isn't used properly.

"I believe a high standard has to be set to use contract rezoning," he said. "I am one-quarter of a vote to come in and change your neighborhood. How scary is that? It's using a sledgehammer to hang a picture."

of a monument company with the equipment to hoist the markers back into place. A similar incident occurred in the fall of 2006, but on a much smaller scale. Howard's deceased father-in-law's headstone was displaced then.

"Somebody that goes in there and does this type of thing, they have absolutely no respect for the rights of others or their property," Howard said. "A cemetery itself is sacred ground."

The fall incident and the current incident are unrelated, Howard said.

The city offers a reward of \$200 for information that leads to the identification of those responsible for damage to city property.

Some residents added to that amount and the reward was up to \$1,155 on March 30, city treasurer Cindy Grice said.

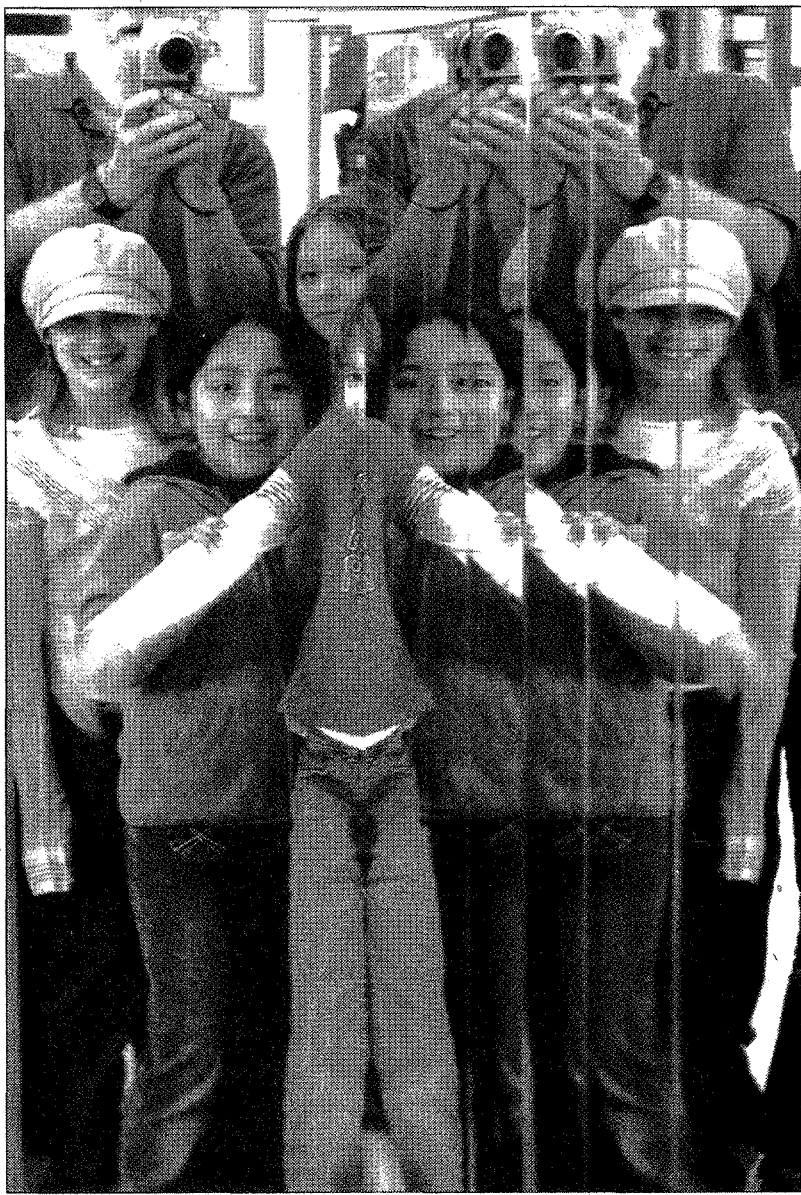

Traveling abroad?

EJ and BC post offices to host passport fairs

EAST JORDAN — For those planning a trip out of the country soon and needing a passport, the U. S. Postal Service will help by hosting a Passport Fair on Saturday, April 14, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the East Jordan and Boyne City post offices. The fair will take place within the customer lobby, with trained postal employees to handle the application, fee payment, passport photo, and verification processes.

With new passport requirements in place, the Postal Service has made it more convenient for customers to travel internationally by promoting our passport application services available at over 150 postal locations in Michigan.

The Post Office always recommends coming in as early as possible to apply for a passport — at least three months or earlier before your departure — to avoid any extra costs to expedite an application. The State Department is currently stating a 10 week processing time for passports, which does not include mailing time.

Normal passport application service costs \$97 total for adults, 16 years and older. This includes a separate payment of \$30 to the U.S. Postal Service for its processing fee, and \$67 paid to the State Department for the passport application fee. For persons under 16, the total cost is \$82, with separate payments of \$30 to the U.S. Postal Service for its processing fee, and \$52 to the State Department.

For expedited passport service, \$60 should be added for each application, payable to the State Department. Two-way overnight delivery is strongly encouraged. In such cases, the applicant incurs overnight (Express Mail) delivery costs, payable to USPS.

To help the application process go smoothly and efficiently, the Postal Service recommends the following:

- Bring in proper proof of American citizenship. This must be either a cer-

tified birth certificate issued by the city, county or state; a previous U.S. passport; a certificate of citizenship; or a naturalization certificate. (Please note: a hospital-issued birth certificate alone is not acceptable.)

- Bring in proof of identity. This must be either a previous U.S. passport; a naturalization certificate; a certificate of citizenship; or a current valid driver's license, government ID or military photo I D.

- The passport application requires two recent identical photographs of you, which the fair sites will take for a fee of \$15 each.

- To save time, you can download a passport application at www.usps.com/passport to complete your application beforehand.

Customers can also call 800-ASK-USPS to get the location of other area passport post offices and their passport customer service hours, or they can visit the State Department's Web site at www.travel.state.gov.

The ticket packages will give donors the opportunity to see the Tigers match-up against four teams that were playoff participants in 2006, including a rematch of the 2006 World Series against the St. Louis Cardinals. Other match-ups include Sunday games against the Minnesota Twins, New York Mets, Boston Red Sox, Chicago White Sox and New York Yankees.

During the monthly screening, healthcare professionals measure height, weight, body composition (body fat content), good and bad cholesterol levels, blood sugar and blood

pressure. Based on same-day screening results, participants receive follow-up recommendations. The April screening will offer information about sleep disorders.

Brian Bess, Northern Michigan Hospital Sleep Center polysomnographer, will be available to answer questions concerning sleep hygiene and treatment for sleep disorders recognizing common sleep disorders.

Sleep disorders in-

volve any difficulties related to sleeping, including difficulty falling or staying asleep, falling asleep at inappropriate times, excessive total sleep time or abnormal behaviors associated with sleep.

Research on sleep has shown that sleeping too little cannot only inhibit productivity and ability to remember and consolidate information, but it can also lead to serious health consequences and jeopardize one's safety.

According to the National Sleep Foundation, approximately 70 million Americans have trouble with sleep. About 40 million suffer from a chronic sleep disorder and an additional 20-30 million are affected by intermittent sleep-related problems. The majority of sleep disorders remain undiagnosed and untreated.

The health screening is \$20 per person or \$15 for Senior Advantage members.

Fasting is not re-

quired for the health screening and no registration is necessary.

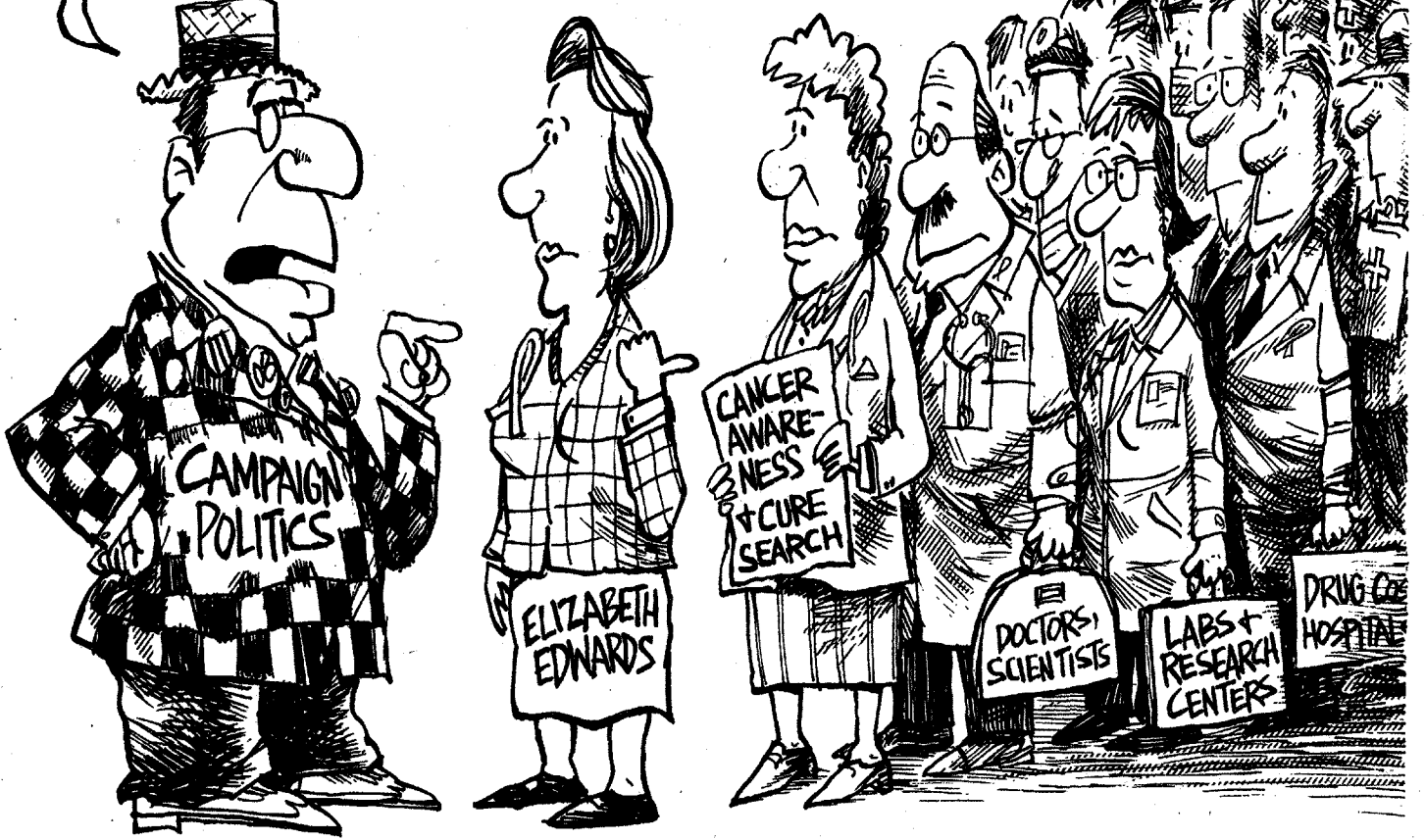

Please register our objection to One Water Street Investment's application for a permit to expand the current seasonal dock to a floating breakwater and marina extending 720 feet into the lake. There is no other structure anywhere on the lake that juts out that far.

Perhaps the DEQ should encourage One Water Street sim-

ply float three Boeing 747 jet airplanes nose to tail, as that would only intrude 693 feet into the lake and provide fish habitat. The wings could help keep the planes afloat and, since they only extend 98 feet from the fuselage center line, that would be about the same as the maneuvering room needed to safely get around a 45' boat tied up alongside the dock.

Of course, removal of the engines, fuel and hydraulic fluids as well as any other toxic hazards would be recommended so as not to wash up on the neighboring public and private beaches. That, of course, would be unlike any bilge, spillage and debris from a similarly sized marina. Surely marina sewage would stay within the boundaries of the marina itself, not influenced by the pre-

vailing westerly winds and high wave action.

Four earn Tae Kwan Do yellow stripes

Four local students of the Korean martial art form known as Tae Kwon Do took their first step ever, and were successful in their first test sponsored by the American Tae Kwon Do Academy and held in Boyne City on Saturday, March 10.

Olivia Bartelli (10), Elliot Bartelli (8), Gabe Mihelich (7) and Denise Behling (adult), all from Boyne City;

were rewarded for their efforts with yellow stripes to reach the first tier in Tae Kwon Do rankings.

Three other Boyne City students moved up in rank as Cody Mihelich (9) and Taylor Behling (7) earned yellow belts in their second testing and Cody Bullock (12) earned a green stripe.

Tae Kwon Do rankings come in the form of stripes (lower) and belts (higher) and in colors ranging from yellow (lowest) to

black (highest).

Rank testing is held four times a year at the Concord Academy near Boyne City, where instructors Anne Baic (fourth degree black belt) and Jeff Wellman (first degree black belt) teach the skills of Tae Kwon Do, which translates in English as "foot first art".

Saturday, March 17. McGeorge, who started Tae Kwon Do at the age of 13, earned his stripe and he hopes to test for his first degree black belt in March or June of 2008.
