BOYNE CITY - Morel mushrooms elusive for some, plentiful for others, brought fun to everyone Thursday-Sunday at the morel mushroom festival held at Veterans' Memorial Park.

Thousands of people celebrated the 47th Annual National Morel Mushroom Festival and participated in morel tasting, carnival rides, crafts, music, dancing, guided mushroom hunts, and more.

The fun was contagious. Chuck Pop from Charlevoix smiled as he watched his young boy, Charlie, take a turn on the carnival's merry-go-round. Little sister, Elizabeth, was perfectly content in her stroller.

"I enjoy watching my kids have fun on the rides," Chuck said when asked what he enjoyed the most about the festival. "It makes me happy to see them happy."

Tom and Marge Turcott walked across the park, smiling and holding hands. They said they were smiling because it was their 60th wedding anniversary. That is definitely something to smile about, but maybe, just maybe the morels had a little bit to do with those smiles.

A highlight of the festival each year is the mushroom hunt challenge. This year 214 people competed. The grand champion is Scott Neering of Tawas who picked 154 morel mushrooms.

Boyne Area Chamber of Commerce director, Scott MacKenzie, said the festival drew a record number of people, some from as far away as Washington, Florida and Maine.

"Because of the efforts of so many dedicated volunteers on the festival committee and the participation of the sponsors, the 47th Annual National Morel Mushroom Festival was phenomenal," MacKenzie said.

BOYNE CITY - The North Country Bicycle Club sponsored a "Ride of Silence" as did hundreds of bike clubs across the country and 23 locations in Michigan to commemorate their fellow riders who have been injured or killed in an accident on the road. All of these rides began simultaneously at 7 p.m. on May 16. In Boyne City, a sizable group of cycling supporters gathered in spite of the inclement weather at 6:30 p.m. for a brief memorial and reminder of the rules of the road as expressed by the ride leader, Donna Moll. While each remembered their own fallen friends, she introduced the community's latest victims, Bill Aten and Brandon Inglehart, who were assisted by their families to meet with the group. Bill and Brandon were the recent victims of a tragic accident that left them seriously injured. All were happy to see that they are recovering.

The hardy cyclists began the long, slow, cool "Ride of Silence" which followed the shore of Lake Charlevoix, in spite of the temps in the low 40s, a stiff breeze blowing off the lake and a constant cold rain. The riders were joined by the bicycle mounted police patrol from Boyne City and the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Pa-

trol. This was a good reminder that all have rights and responsibilities while enjoying the privilege of using the road system, both cyclists and motorist. Each participant was given a booklet, "What Every Michigan Bicyclist Must Know," published by the MDOT and The League of Michigan Bicyclists. Local builders chosen by Governor for award

EAST JORDAN - Gov. Jennifer Granholm chose the city of East Jordan as one of the recipients of the state's 2007 Historic Preservation Award. Main Street Properties, Floyd and Todd Wright Builders, and Presley Architecture are recipients along with the city.

The award recognized the rehabilitation of the Votruba Grocery and Porter Lumber Company buildings downtown. Mayor Mark Postma and others will accept the award Thursday at the Capitol rotunda in Lansing.

"This is a wonderful recognition of a public and private project," Postma said. "My congratulations to everyone who worked on the project. The Wrights worked above and beyond to make it work."

The recipients were the only ones chosen from Northern Michigan, Postma said. Six recipients statewide were chosen.

Mayor Postma made the announcement at the May

15 city commission meeting. Also at the meeting:

The city has offered an early retirement incentive plan to three of its 22 employees. City commissioners made the decision to offer early retirement at the meeting at City Hall.

City Administrator, David White, reported to commissioners that the city is waiting for word from the Corps of Engineers and the state of Michigan on a permit and grant funding. The permit is for harbor dredging work.

A resolution was passed to establish a fire and emergency medical services building construction fund. The city may now accept donations for the construction of a new building.

The commissioners discussed the requests from the Arts Council and the Senior Center for leases on the buildings that would be for 10 or more years. The Council and Center want to make capital improvements. The commissioners made no decision and referred the requests to staff for more consideration.

Boyne City and Sommerset agree on water, sewer extension

BOYNE CITY - The city commission approved an agreement between the city and Sommerset Pointe Development, LLC, that the city will extend water and sanitary sewer utilities to Sommerset in Advance in Eveline Township.

The agreement is not binding until Eveline Township gives permission for extension of the utilities, and executes an intergovernmental agreement that allows the city to service customers in the township. The township would also need to adopt utility ordinances that match the city's ordinances.

The city commissioners voted unanimously at their May 8 meeting for the city to enter into the development agreement with Sommerset Pointe.

The developer of Sommerset Pointe, Fred Taylor, plans to build an 84-unit condominium and 136-slip marina at the site of the former Wolverine Power Plant on Lake Charlevoix. The cost of extending the utilities the approximate two miles would be borne by Taylor, according to the agreement, city manager Michael Cain said. The cost is estimated at between

\$1.5-\$2 million. Taylor spoke to commissioners at the May 8 meeting.

"It's been a journey to try and understand Boyne City and the community," Taylor said. "I feel Sommerset will help Boyne City businesses."

The water and sanitary sewer utilities will run along Lakeshore Drive and would service only single-family residences located directly along the route. Those residences within the city would pay regular connection charges of approximately \$1,130 for a typical residential meter. They would also pay the normal utility charges.

At the Sommerset Pointe development the utilities would service the 84 residential units, plus another 16 units on another parcel that Taylor owns. The utilities would also service the project's marina docks and harbor master building. Customers on Sommerset property would pay regular connection charges, but one and one-half times the utility charges.

Other customers along the route, but outside city limits, would pay one and one-half times connection and utility charges, plus an additional \$3,000 each for water and for sewer, according to Cain. The \$3,000

would be given to Taylor.

An annual \$100,000 charge for availability would be paid by Sommerset Pointe customers to the city. A portion of the \$100,000 each year would help with the city's cost of billing and service.

City superintendent of water and wastewater, Dan Meads, stated in an Aug. 16, 2006

memorandum to the city manager that the city systems have the capacity to serve the Sommerset Pointe project, without impacting the capacity needed for planned growth within the city.

"We recently upgraded the water system," Meads said in the memorandum. "These improvements provide capacity in the water system far beyond the

needs of this project."

The wastewater treatment plant was recently improved, which also allows adequate capacity, Meads said.

The city has previously extended water and sanitary sewer to Boyne Mountain, Young State Park, along M-75 in Wilson Township and to the Glenwood Beach area of Evangeline Township.

Tips to prevent stroke

May is Stroke Prevention Awareness Month, a time to remind people that stroke is a major health threat.

Facts on stroke: (according to the American Heart Association.)

• Every 45 seconds, someone in America has a stroke - 700,000 people every year.

• Heart disease and stroke are the number 1 and 3 causes of death in the United States

• Fortunately, stroke is often preventable

• Heart disease and stroke don't just affect adults. The healthier you are now, the healthier

you'll be when you're older.

What are the risk factors that you can control?

Smoking - If you smoke, resolve to quit. Smoking cigarettes puts you at much greater risk for having a stroke and is the single greatest cause of preventable death in the United States.

Secondhand smoke - Constant exposure to other people's tobacco smoke also increases your risk, even if you don't smoke.

Birth control pills - If you're a woman who uses birth control pills and you smoke, your risk

is even higher.

The bottom line is, if you smoke, quit. When you stop smoking, no matter how long or how much you've smoked, your risk of stroke drops.

High cholesterol - Know your numbers to know your risk. A simple blood test can show if your blood cholesterol level is desirable, borderline-high or high 200 mg/dL, which is the level at which the risk for heart disease and stroke starts to rise.

High blood pressure - Have your blood pressure checked each time you visit your doctor. High

blood pressure is often called the "silent killer" because it has no symptoms.

Diabetes - Have your glucose levels checked regularly, especially if diabetes runs in your family.

Physical inactivity - Get up and get moving. The U.S. Surgeon General recommends at least 30 minutes of physical activity on most, and preferably all, days of the week. Regular physical activity helps reduce your risk of heart attack, heart disease and stroke.

Obesity - Obesity isn't an appearance issue, it's

a health issue. Obesity is a major health problem for all Americans. If you're obese or overweight, you have a much higher risk of developing heart disease because excess weight puts a strain on your heart. You can often decrease your heart disease risk factors by losing as little as 10 to 20 pounds.

CPR and first aid classes available at CAH

CHARLEVOIX - The following Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Courses and First Aid courses are being offered at Charlevoix Area Hospital

Saturday, June 2 - Heartsaver Pediatric First Aid from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. This is a new course being offered at Charlevoix Area Hospital. The target audience for this course includes those involved in child care such as child care workers, teachers, foster care workers, camp counselors, youth organizations, and coaches for children's sports organizations. The Heartsaver Pediatric First Aid Course teaches how

to manage illness and injuries in a child in the first few minutes until professional help arrives. Topics include first aid basics, medical emergencies, injury emergencies, environmental emergencies.

Modules included are pediatric first aid, asthma care training for childcare

providers, adult/child and infant CPR and adult/child AED. Cost is \$55.

Wednesday, June 6 - Adult/Child Heartsaver CPR from 6 to 9 p.m. This Heartsaver CPR course teaches CPR and relief of choking in adults and children and the use of barrier devices. This class is in-

tended for those who have a duty to respond to a cardiac emergency because of job responsibilities or regulatory requirements. Cost is \$30.

Pre-registration is required for all classes. Course materials will be mailed out once registration is received. All classes

are taught by certified instructors and are through Charlevoix Area Hospital which is an American Heart Association Community-Training Center. Classes are offered to private organizations upon special request. For more information call 231-547-8570 or 231-547-4024.

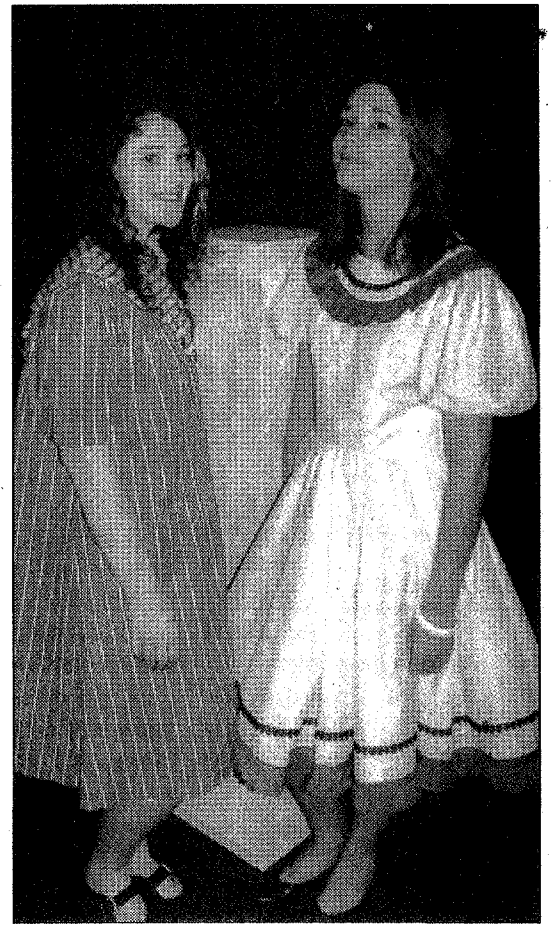

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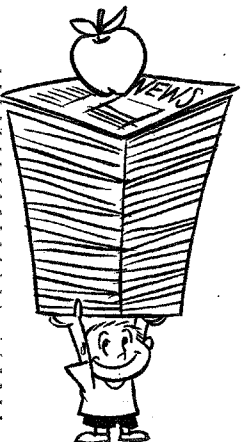

Green Transportation: Biodiesel

Did you know that the inventor of the diesel engine, Rudolph Diesel, intended it to run on pure peanut oil? His original vision for the diesel engine was as a replacement for the steam engine that could be run off of fuels that farmers would have readily available. Peanut oil was one of those fuels. It was later discovered that his engine could run just as well off of what later became diesel fuel, a by-product of the gasoline distillation process. Since diesel fuel was less expensive than peanut oil, Diesel's original vision for his engine was cast aside.

Diesel vehicle owners worldwide are rediscovering Diesel's original intent as they search for sustainable fuel alternatives. A sustainable alternative to petroleum-based diesel, known as 'biodiesel,' is gaining popularity as more people learn about it. Even celebrities are getting in on it! Woody Harrelson of television's *Cheers* is a vocal supporter of biodiesel (www.voiceyourself.com) and guitarist and songwriter Willie Nelson even has his own brand of

biodiesel, called 'Biowillie' (www.biowillie.com).

Biodiesel can be used in almost any car or truck with a diesel engine. It is non-toxic and biodegradable. Certain types of biodiesel may damage gaskets in older vehicles, so before trying to run it in your diesel vehicle you might want to check to see if yours is biodiesel compatible. You can find a list of biodiesel-compatible makes at the National Biodiesel Board's site at www.biodiesel.org.

One drawback of biodiesel is that it tends to gel in the engine fuel lines in cold weather. A way around this is to use a heater on your engine in cold weather. This heater assures that the engine remains at a high enough temperature to keep the fuel from gelling in the lines. Another method of dealing with this problem is to mix biodiesel with regular diesel fuel. The problem here is that mixing it with a fossil-fuel based product reduces its sustainability factor, but since you'd only have to do this in the winter months it shouldn't be much of a problem.

If you're a 'hands-on' sort of

person, you can even learn to make your own biodiesel at home from recycled fryer-vat grease! The complete instructions are available at many places online. A good place to start is http://journeytoforever.org/biodiesel_make.html. I personally know several people who have worked out deals with local restaurants to cart off their used fryer grease so they can make their own fuel at home. A word of caution if you go this route: you might want to let the local sheriff's department know what you're up to so they won't think you're making moonshine!

Another drawback is that if you're not the do-it-yourself type, it may be hard to find biodiesel in your area. The National Biodiesel Board maintains a list of filling stations that carry biodiesel, so you can check with them first if you're considering making the switch. The advantage to burning biodiesel is that if your vehicle will run on biodiesel, it will also run on regular diesel. This means that if you can't find biodiesel, you can always use regular diesel in a pinch.

If you don't have a diesel vehicle right now, but are considering purchasing one so that you may use biodiesel, I'd suggest buying an older model first, after checking the National Biodiesel Board's list of compatible autos. The reason for this is that using biodiesel will void most manufacturers' warranties. An older vehicle won't be under warranty, so that won't be an issue. Manufacturers are slowly coming around, though. B20 (a blend of 20% biodiesel and 80% regular diesel) was just approved under warranty for some makes and models; however, progress is slow and it may be some time before B100 (pure biodiesel) won't void your warranty. If you don't mind taking a chance on an older vehicle, biodiesel might just be your key to sustainable driving.

More news from Iraq

Greetings, Time again for a report from the front lines. 90+ days into the deployment now. Just got the word the other day we have been extended to 15 months. So, what they really mean is I have 9 months left. My unit hit the 6 month mark today. I came over in January when they came over in October.

The company I support for maintenance (ACO 1/8) has a patrol base out in their sector about 3-4 miles from Sadr City. I spend 3-5 days out there every 12 days. There are a lot of explosions and gun fire in the distance. The patrol base has been attacked twice. Both times I was out there. Don't worry. The enemy didn't

get more than 250 meters away. They were repelled quickly. Been out of the patrol base a couple of times to recover vehicles and pull some out of the mud.

ACO 1/8 has many projects they are working on in their sector. They are working with 14 schools, 1 college, and are placing 6 soccer fields.

They are also working for water, electricity, and a sewage treatment plant. All total they are working over \$11.5 million dollars worth of structures and upgrades. It's not all violent and gore-filled that the news channels make it out to be.

The base camp I'm at is called Rustamiyah. Its on the east side of the river. A lot smaller than

Camp Victory where I was last time. We share this camp with two other divisions, elements of 2nd Infantry Div, and 3rd Infantry Div.

With all the people here, its hard to get all the supplies needed. If anyone wants to, here is a list of things that are needed for my soldiers and crew: baby wipes, bug repellent, pens, paper, envelopes, soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes, body powder, lotion, footspray, floss, batteries "AA," "AAA," and dry snacks.

Just like last time, I am without proper head gear over here on off days. Everyone is sporting their team's hats. They don't sell Detroit Redwings or Lions hats

here. Plus, I don't see any U of M, either.

Also, if you send a throw away camera, I will get pictures from over here and send you the film back with a letter about what's on the camera. This might take a little while to get it back to you.

Just like last time I will respond to all letters and packages. I thank you all for your continued support for our Armed Forces, and I hope you all would say a little prayer for all the fallen warriors.

The Veteran of the Month for May 2007, is Sgt. Todd James Robbins. Born Feb. 16, 1970, in Flint, Sgt. Robbins was raised in Hart, graduated from Hart High School in the spring of 1988, and enlisted in the Navy. He was assigned to the USS Wasp (LHD 1), stationed in Norfolk, Virginia, serving as an Operational Specialist and, completing his term of enlistment in 1992, was discharged from the Navy, having served in Operation Desert Storm. He then enrolled at West Shore Community College, in Scottville, graduating in 1994, with an associates degree in criminal justice. Sgt. Robbins was an avid football

player and spectator and in 1992, began coaching in Scottville and later, in 1999, volunteer coached in Montague, Mich. On July 27, 1999, Sgt. Robbins enlisted in the Army, completing basic training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. On Nov. 20, 1999, while home on leave, he married Laura Frank in Scottville. Returning to Fort Sill, Sgt. Robbins was assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 13th Field Artillery, Charlie Battery (The Red Dragons), receiving his advanced individual training and was the Reconnaissance Sergeant for the Multiple Launch Rocket System battery



that was deployed in Jan. 2003 to prepare for combat operations in Iraq. Charlie 3-13 was then attached to 1st Battalion, 39th Field Artillery (part of the 3rd Infantry Division Artillery) and designated Delta Battery, 1-39 FA. They moved into Iraq with the 3rd Infantry Division providing

Multiple Launcher Rocket Fires in support of the 3rd Infantry Divisions fight to Baghdad. On April 3, 2003, during deployment in Operation Iraqi Freedom just southwest of Baghdad, while providing supporting fires to the 3rd Infantry Division, Sgt. Robbins made the ultimate sacrifice by answering the final call and was awarded The Bronze Star Medal and The Purple Heart Medal (posthumous), The Army Commendation Medal, The Army Achievement Medal, The Good Conduct Medal, The National Defense Service Medal, The Southwest Asia Service Medal, The Global

War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, The Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, The Army Service Ribbon, The Overseas Service Ribbon and The Basic Rifle Marksmanship Expert Medal. Sgt. 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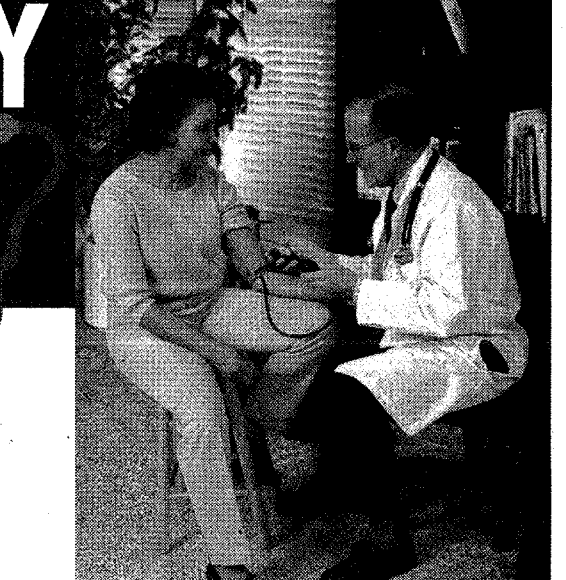
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Scholarships awarded at Jordan River Arts Center

"This was a sloppy game," Kitson said. "Our pitchers struggled with their control."

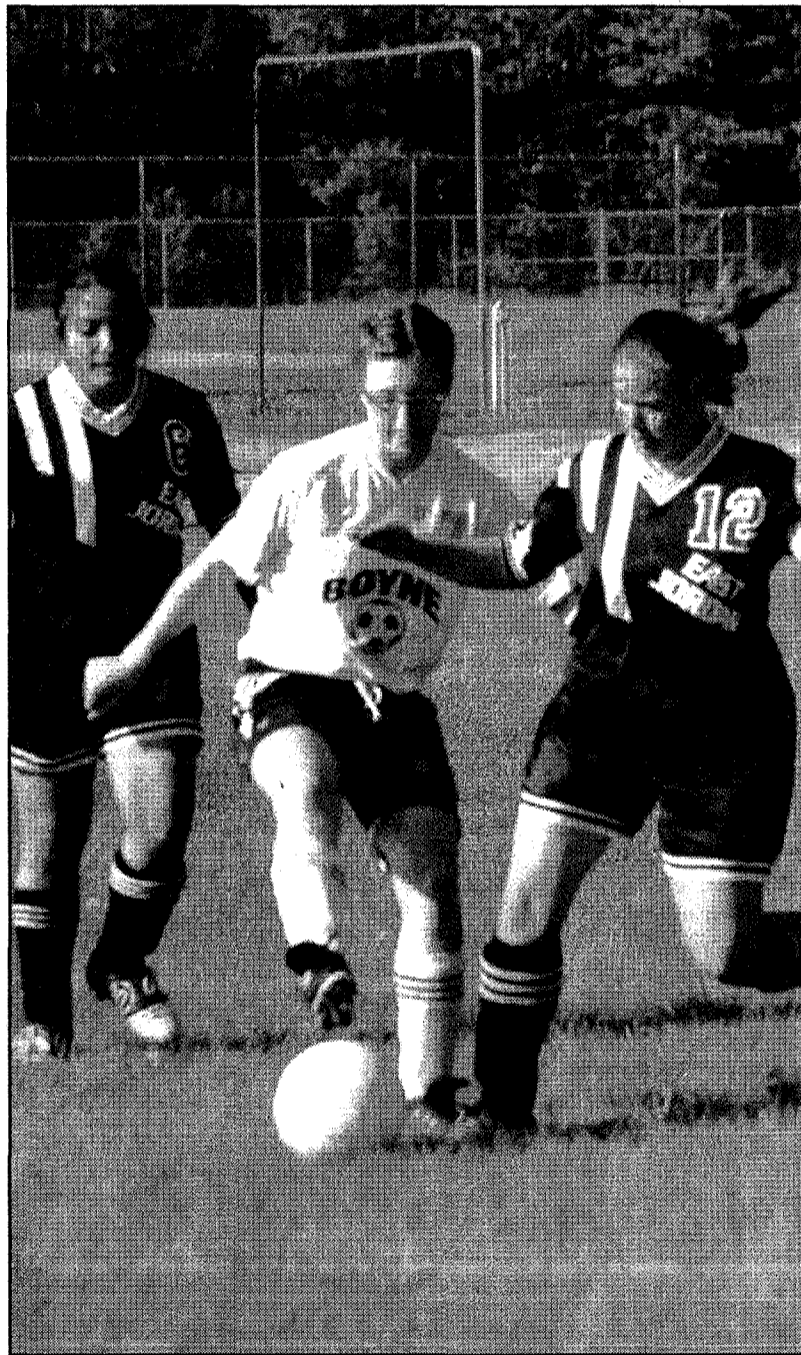

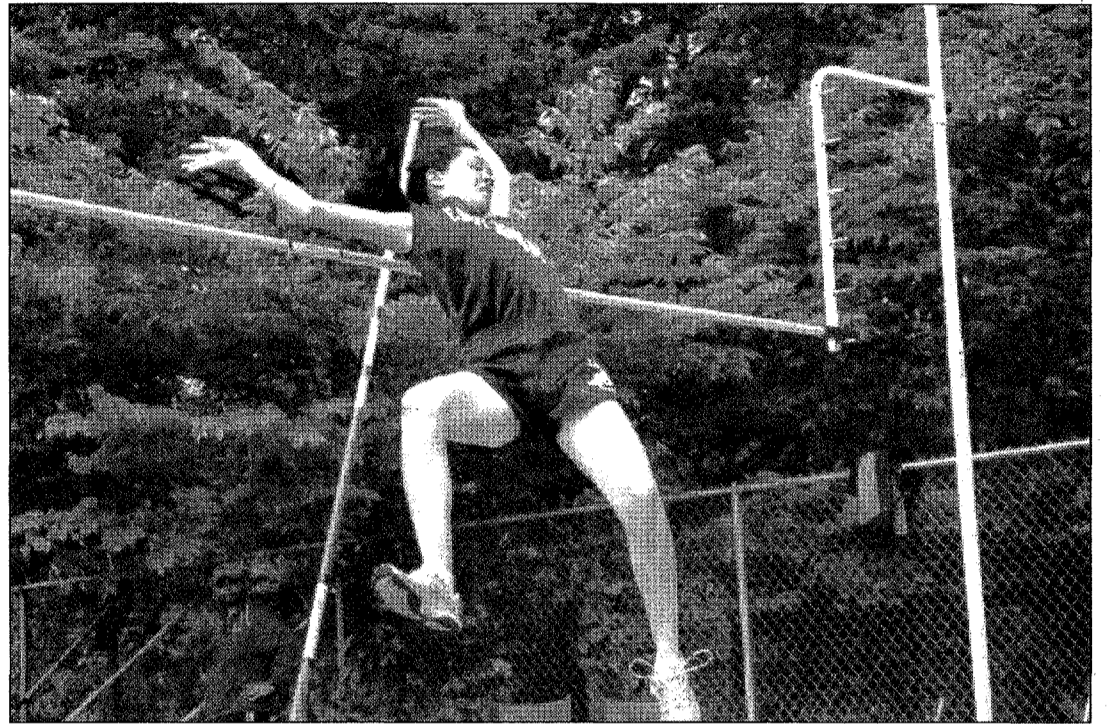
The Red Devils didn't come away empty handed, though.
