## Boyne City voting improvements underway

BOYNE CITY — City voters who have waited in long lines in one of the city's two precincts will find relief now that the city commission is creating one precinct with more access.

The Boyne River is the north and south boundary line for voting precincts. Five voting booths per precinct were installed at City Hall, but one precinct had 1,062 registered voters while the other had 1,653, or 591 more voters.

By combining the boundaries of the two precincts, voters would not be separated and would have the use of all booths. City clerk Cindy Grice suggested the change to commissioners at a meeting some time ago.

The change requires a city ordinance that has been drafted and the noticing process to the public is underway.

"It (ordinance) won't go into effect this November, but after that it will be," Grice said.

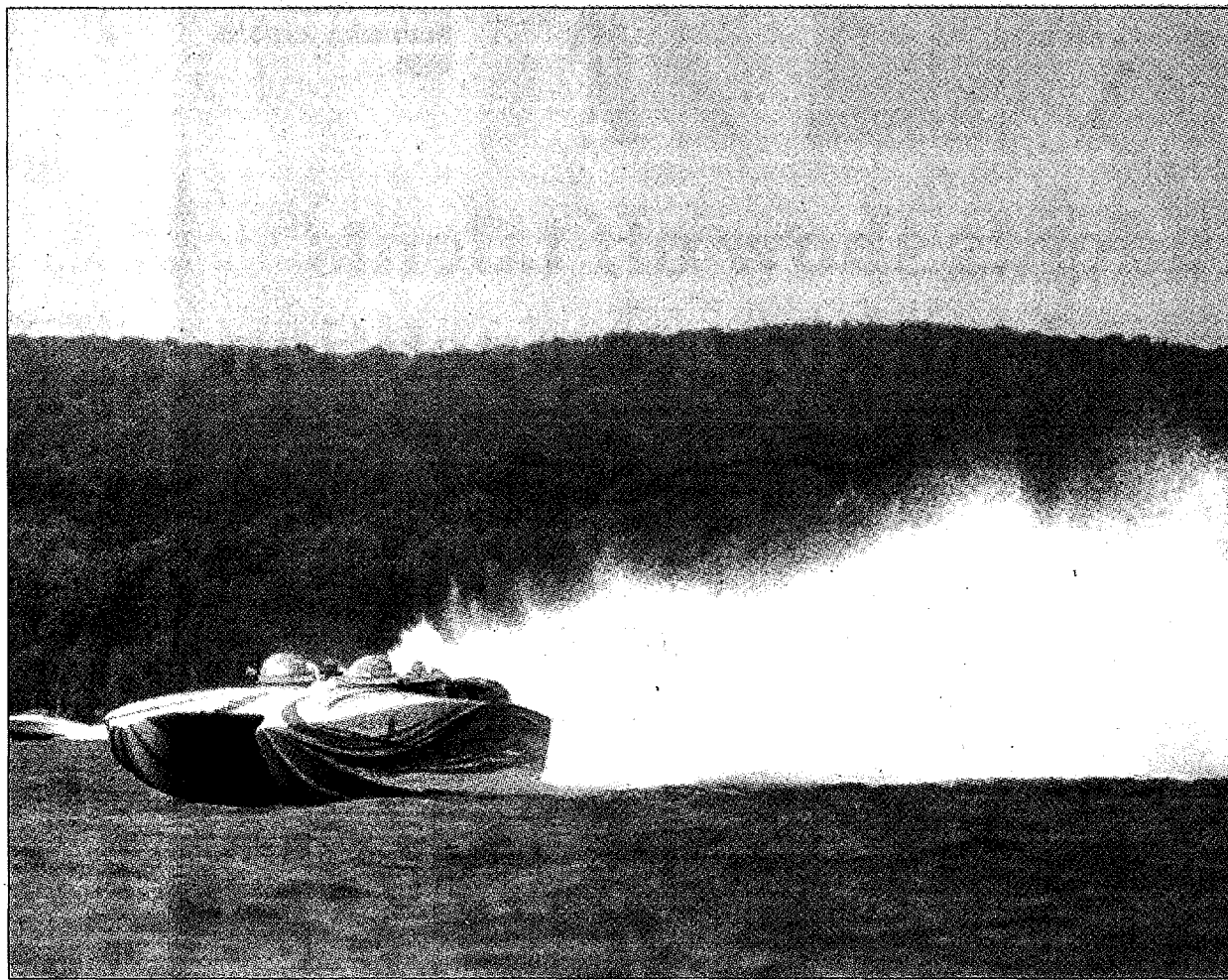

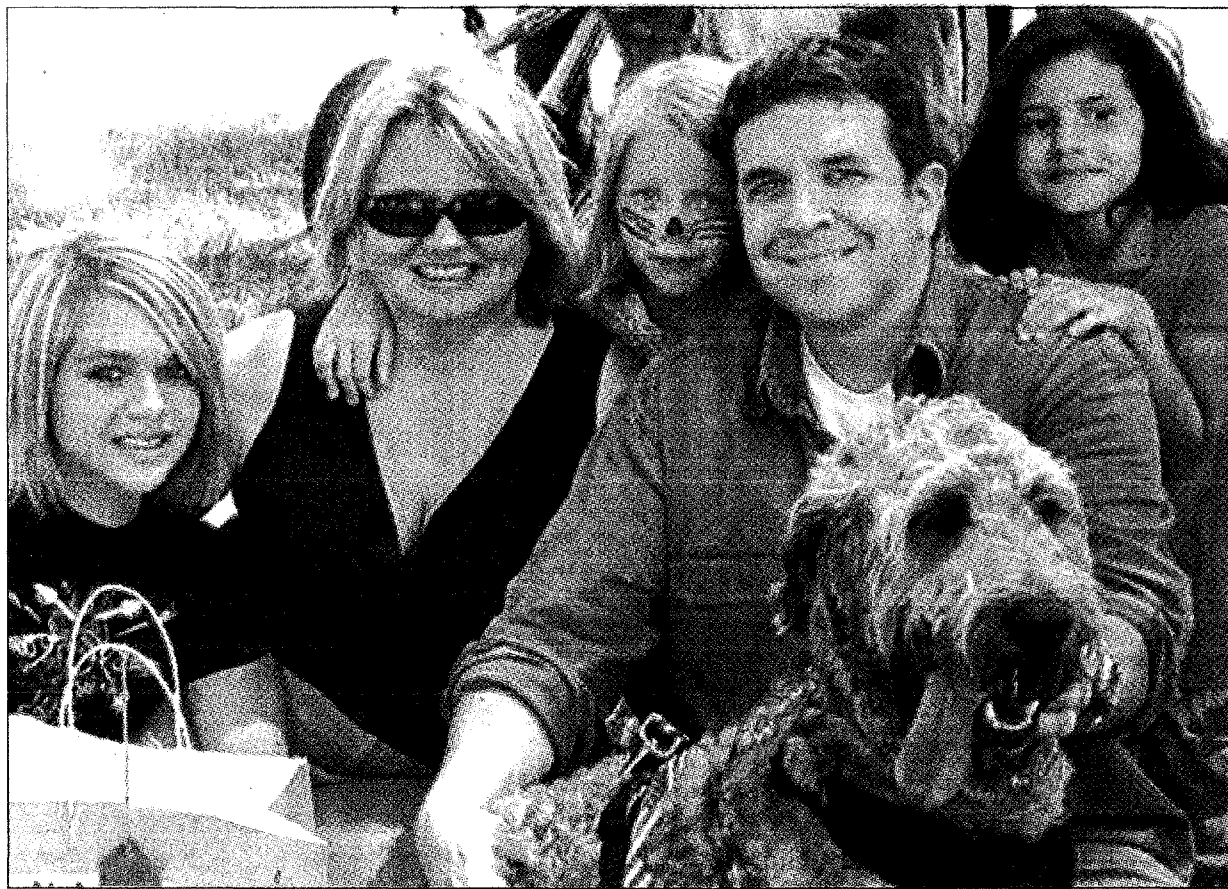

BOYNE CITY — The Board of Education for Boyne City Public Schools elected officers for the 2007-2008 school year on July 9.

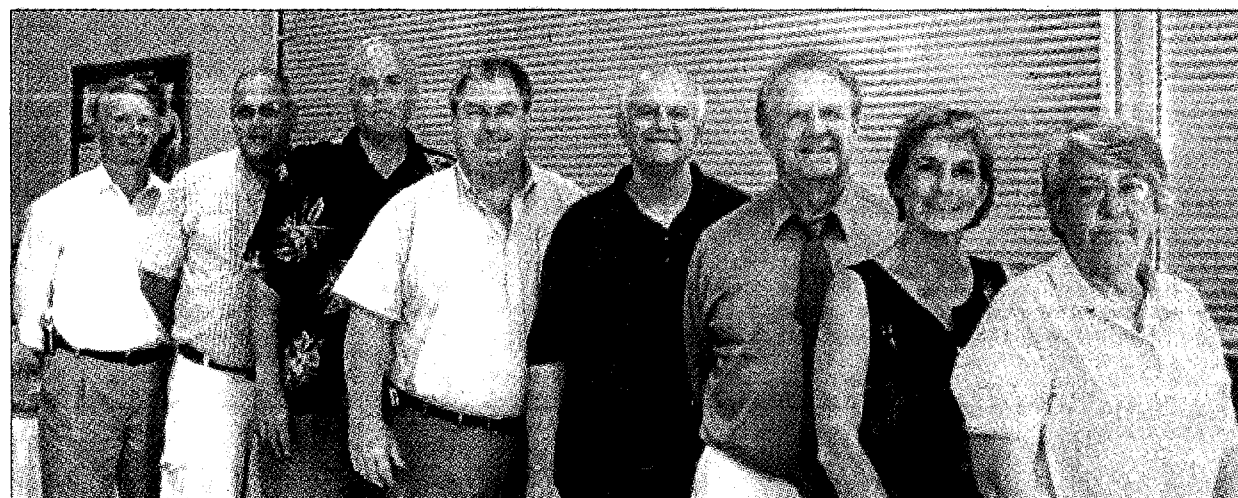

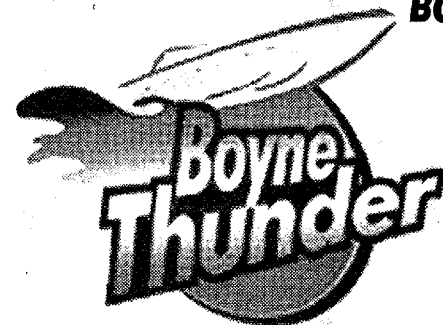

Serving seven days a week from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., Rennie's offers an extensive selection of appetizers and entrees, including steaks, seafood, game hens, salads and vegetarian dishes. A full bar provides mixed drinks, beer and wine. The luncheon menu features an array of sandwiches, burgers, salads and quesadillas. And anyone looking for a great place for breakfast should stop by and sample the fare. The biscuits, granola and cinnamon rolls are all house-made.

"I'm buying as much

from local producers as I can," Sommerfeldt said. "I buy what they've got and work the menu around whatever is in season and available."

The pies are made by Sommerfeldt's wife, Catherine, and they are visions of culinary perfection. Perfectly fluted, flaky crusts are topped either by towering lightly browned meringue or stained with the fruit juice that bubbles out during baking.

# Savings program has openings

Northwest Michigan Human Services Agency is accepting applications for its matched savings program in Emmet and Charlevoix Counties.

The program, called Michigan Saves, offers people the opportunity to save towards the purchase of their first home, for starting or expanding a small business, or to pay for college or vocational school. Enrollees make a minimum monthly deposit of \$20.00 per month for at least six months into a savings account set up jointly between the participant and the local program office. Each dollar the participant saves is matched at a 3:1 ratio for home ownership or at a 2:1 ratio for small business or higher education. The maximum that can be matched is \$1,000.00.

Michigan Saves is an Individual Development Account program. The program has been very successful according to Keith Greenwald, who is a Budget/Housing Counselor for NMHSA. "Currently, we have 11 families in the program. Each enrollee has made a commitment to attend financial management classes, participate in individual budget/credit counseling, as well as make monthly deposits into their savings account to reach their desired goal."

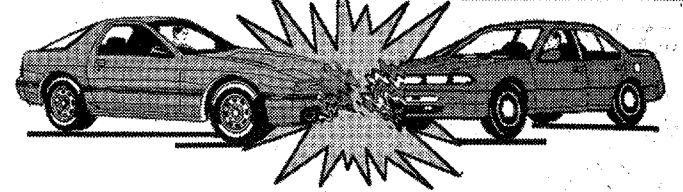
NMHSA has received funding for this program through a grant from the Assets for Independence Act Demonstration Program. The Charlevoix Community Foundation and the Petoskey-Harbor Springs Community Foundation have also provided funds in support of this effort.

The funding source determines the eligibility requirements for the program. To be eligible, an applicant must have income within 200% of poverty or below. For example, the income limit for a family of four is \$40,000 per year. Participants must have a source of earned income.

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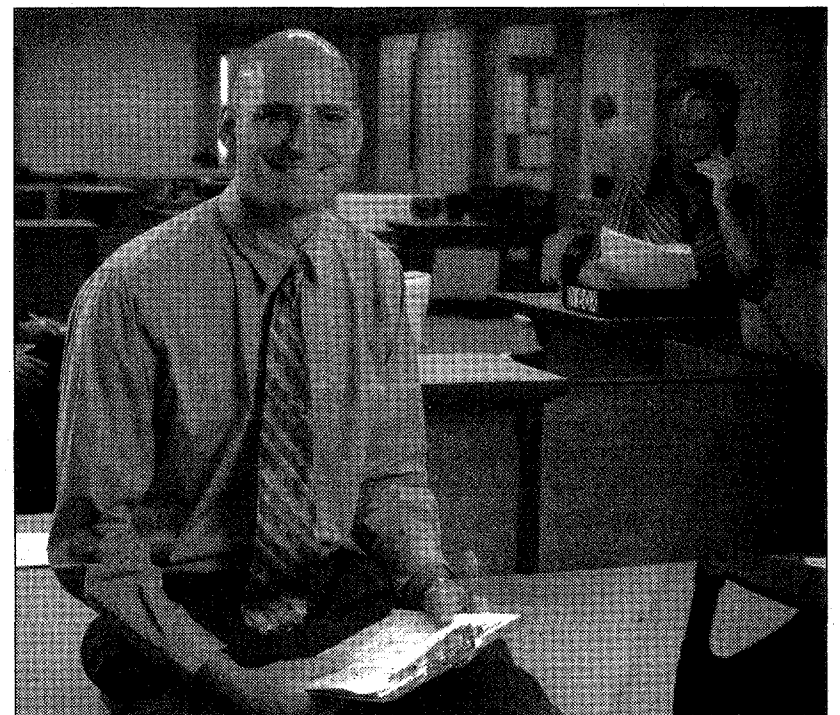
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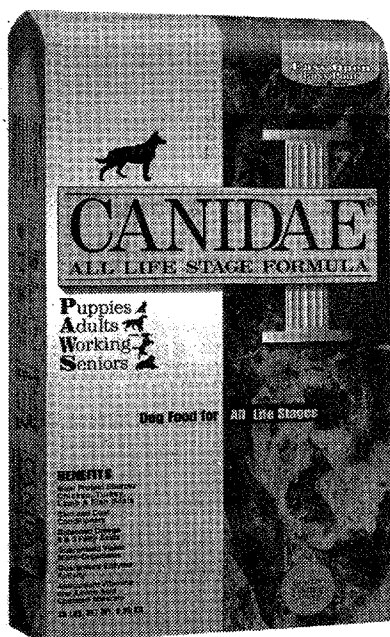

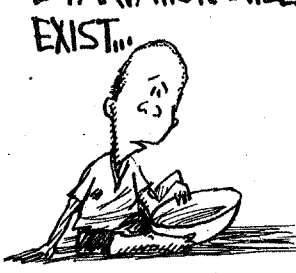

**Environmental group opposes Alba well**

To the Editor:  
The Friends of the Jordan want to let your readers know why the group opposes CMS Energy putting an injection well in Alba.

The Friends of the Jordan urge the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to deny CMS Energy's proposal for a Class I "Non-Hazardous" waste disposal well in Star Township, Antrim County near the community of Alba. We represent a broad coalition of concerned citizens and organizations who strongly oppose this disposal well and the rationale behind it.

There is the risk to our irreplaceable water resources. The region surrounding Alba lies atop an enormous, pristine, freshwater aquifer. This aquifer supplies drinking water for the region's

citizens and is the source of several major magnificent river systems, including the Jordan and Manistee. This aquifer is a priceless, irreplaceable natural treasure. Any mistake, accident or miscalculation could have devastating impacts for many individuals and the natural resources far into the future.

We acknowledge that Class I disposal wells require extensive safeguards and the best engineering technology can offer. However, they are not foolproof.

Operators of the leachate collection system in Bay Harbor shut the system down for seven months without telling anyone or installing an alternative solution to halt the continued contamination of Little Traverse Bay. In spite of their "covenant" not to

pollute, the operations have proven to be untrustworthy and not reliable with regard to pollution prevention.

The level of risk associated with well safeguards and previous operator failures is unacceptable to such a pristine resource.

While perhaps unintended, the reality is that CMS Energy chose a remote location with limited financial resources to oppose the disposition of toxic wastes generated far away in a privileged resort community. The small rural community of Alba has spoken out very clearly on this issue — they do not want this well. At EPA's public hearing on June 13, 2007 in Alba, citizens unanimously voiced their outrage over this proposal.

Not only do we oppose the

"dumping" of this toxic waste in our neighborhood, but the transport of an estimated 11 toxic waste-laden tanker truck loads per day, 365 days a year for approximately 20 years places increased wear and tear on the county's infrastructure, its first responders and undue worry among its residents. Elected officials of Star Township and of Antrim and Charlevoix Counties have also disapproved of this proposal. And, who speaks for the rivers, forests and wildlife? Do they have "standing"?

The only proper, moral and ethical solution is for CMS Energy and Bay Harbor to act responsibly, clean up their mess and not try to dump their toxic waste on someone else's doorstep.

Whenever we hear or read about our fellow citizens being victims of a scam, it usually concerns the weak, the sick or the old in our society. But now the crooks are targeting all of us, and especially the patriotic, the civic-minded and the law-abiding citizens among us. Most of us take a summons for jury duty seriously, but often people skip out on their civic duty, and now a new kind of scam has surfaced and this is how it works. The caller claims

to be a jury coordinator and tells you that you failed to appear for jury duty and an arrest warrant was going to be served on you. When you protest that you never received a summons for jury duty, the scammer asks you for your Social Security number and date of birth so that he or she can verify the information and cancel the arrest warrant. If you give out any of this information, your identity was just stolen. This scam has been reported in 11 states so far and this scam is

particularly insidious because they use intimidation over their're with the court system. A good rule of thumb is to never give out personal information of any kind over the phone or internet and to ask that the caller mail you the a written request for the information so that you can check it out before responding. As always, believe nothing you read or are told until you check it out for yourself and find it to be true. The FBI and federal court system have issued nation-

# MSU Extension receives Citizen Planner grant

Charlevoix County MSU Extension recently received a \$2,700 grant from the Charlevoix County Community Foundation to support the Citizen Planner Online Program.

Citizen Planner Online provides a convenient way, via the

Internet, for volunteer community leaders to obtain the latest information to perform their planning and zoning duties effectively.

During this special version of the program, Charlevoix County planning and zoning officials and interested

citizens can enroll in the program at a greatly reduced cost. The program is divided into seven modules that include online readings, down-loadable publications, online activities and quizzes. Two additional group meetings will be held, giving par-

ticipants a chance to focus on Charlevoix County issues. The program will begin on Sept. 25.

"While many local planning officials recognize how important training is," says Dean Solomon, Charlevoix County MSU Extension

CMS Energy needs to be fully accountable for their irresponsible choices.

In the late 1980's and long before Bay Harbor Resort was developed, scientists reported toxic leachate seeping from CKD piles at the then abandoned Penn Dixie Cement Plant. We know that when CKD is infiltrated with water a toxic soup emerges. As required at other sites with CKD piles, the proper disposal method was and is to encapsulate the CKD piles with an impervious barrier of high-density polyethylene or two feet of protective material. Back then, it would have been far easier (and less costly) to encapsulate the CKD piles before development occurred. Instead, Bay Harbor chose to cover it with six to twelve inches of top soil, build over it and hoped the problem would go

away. It did not.

We can now futilely argue and litigate and seek to assess blame. Or, CMS Energy and Bay Harbor can simply do what they should have done from the beginning. Their gamble did not pan out. These CKD piles need to be capped and encapsulate and made impermeable to moisture. The concept is very simple but the task will be substantial and costly. However, maintaining a collection system prone to failure, neutralizing, transporting and disposing of millions of gallons of toxic wastes into the foreseeable future is also expensive and risky, not to mention unethical.

The EPA is taking comments from the public until July 27.

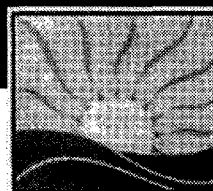

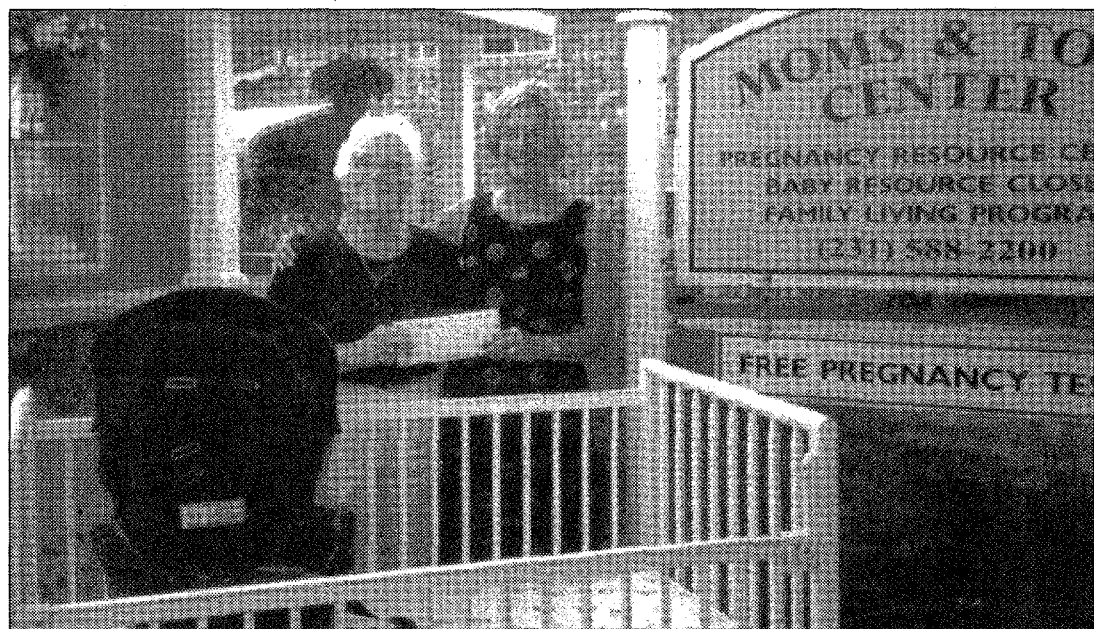

## \$3,000 grant awarded to Moms & Tots Center

Charlevoix County Community Foundation awarded a grant of \$3,000 to the Moms & Tots Center in Ellsworth for the purchase of car seats and cribs for Charlevoix County clients who are unable to afford them. The grant was awarded to help address the foundation's concern for the safety of children.

The Moms & Tots Center is a Christian non-denominational social service agency assisting with the needs of pregnant young women and young mothers from southern Charlevoix and northern Antrim Counties. The center is a ministry of Good Samaritan Family Services located in Ellsworth.

For many years young single women with children had been seeking Good Samari-

tan Pantry's assistance for such things as food, clothing, heating fuel, and rent. The board of directors decided that a separate organizational entity should be created to specifically address their needs. After much research and planning, the Moms & Tots Center opened its doors in August of 2001.

The center provides three distinct services. The first is to meet the immediate needs of the young woman (mostly teens) who thinks she is pregnant or who is pregnant. We provide her with a free pregnancy test, peer counseling, referrals, information, and encouragement.

Second, for the woman who wants to parent her baby (virtually everyone) the center provides a baby

closet. The closet includes maternity clothes, diapers, baby food, formula, baby clothes, and all types of equipment. This service includes continued peer counseling, information, and encouragement.


A third service that is available for the women who want it, is the mentoring program. It consists of pairing a young mother with a mature woman to be her friend, a listening ear, a source of information and positive feedback. Long-term relationships are encouraged to help clients become good mothers and solid citizens.

Some clients have been coming to the center for five years. Our active clients now number more than 300.











The cost is \$300 per person, or \$290 for ISEA members, and includes meals and materials. Students must be ages 14 to 18, and the class is limited to 10 participants.

### East Jordan student named to BGSU dean's list

Bavers, son of Jay and Shellie Bavers, was a junior in the College of Arts and Sciences during spring semester.

To be chosen for the dean's list, undergraduate students must carry no fewer than 12 letter-graded credit hours per semester and achieve a grade point averages of 3.5 or better on a 4.0 scale.

### NCMC enrollment up

PETOSKEY – North Central Michigan College reports strong enrollment numbers for the summer 2007 semester. Naomi DeWinter, North Central's dean of student services, told the college's board of trustees this week that 860 students were registered for the summer semester that began on June 4, an increase of 122 students, or 16.5 percent, over the 2006 summer semester. Total credit-hours were up 25.6 percent over a year ago.

The increase was attributed, in part, to local plant closings that have prompted laid off workers to register for college classes. Forty-five students enrolled for the summer semester are receiving state and federal benefits coordinated by Michigan Works!, a public-private partnership that fosters employment and training programs for employers and workers. Spikes in enrollment have occurred in several previous years following local plant closings.

Of the 860 students enrolled this summer, 523 are from Emmet County, 120 are from Charlevoix County, 78 are from Cheboygan County and 69 are from Otsego County. Fifteen are from out of state. The remainder are from Antrim,

Mackinaw, Montmorency, Presque Isle and other Michigan counties. Summer semester ends on July 27.

North Central experienced an all-time record for enrollment during the winter semester just ended when 2,876 students registered for classes.

## Michigan has potential to contend for No. 1

Pete Carroll is expected to fashion another national champion at the University of Southern California this fall, if you believe *The Sporting News* pre-season prediction.

But, the Trojans would be well served to cast a glance over their shoulders occasionally.

It's just possible Michigan's Wolverines might be snarling at their heels from start to finish.

And, if all the pieces to the puzzle fit into place, it's entirely possible the Wolverines

could be playing the Trojans (or, perhaps, someone else) in the Bowling Championship Series title game.

Despite the notion West Coast teams love to throw

the football around, USC tends to gravitate toward establishing a running game first, and then going to play-action passes.

The Trojans have done quite well with it, too.

With quarterback John David Booty at the controls of USC's high octane offense, it's no wonder most pre-season magazines have picked the Trojans to win it all — again.

Michigan has its own capable field general in senior quarterback Chad Henne, entering his fourth season as the starter for coach Lloyd Carr's equally dangerous offense.

Although the running game is the focal point of Michigan's offensive attack, Henne is quite capable of flinging the ball deep down the field.

His experience pulling the trigger on Michigan's offense is a major asset as the Wolverines look to remain a viable force on the football landscape.

Running back Mike Hart has a lot of heart, which makes up for the fact that he's not the biggest or fastest runner in the country. He will break off the infrequent big gainer, but is more of a grinder than a sprinter.

Plus, he seldom fumbles the ball. That endears him to a coaching staff bent on using ball control to eat up the clock, and keep the ball away from the other team's offense.

Giving the team an inside-outside combination are Kevin Grady and Brandon Minor.

### Receiving core big question mark

All-American candidate Mario Manningham is back to lead the Michigan receiving corps.

But Adrian Arrington was suspended from the team in the spring and his status is uncertain.

If he doesn't come back for fall practice, Henne will have to find another target to complement Manningham among a cast of inexperienced hopefuls.

Henne should receive excellent pass protection when he drops back in the pocket from an offensive line that returns three starters, and slimmed down to be a lot quicker off the ball last year.

Finding a replacement at center is the biggest challenge facing the coaching staff.

New defensive coordinator Ron English has installed a more aggressive, attacking style that makes the Wolverines far less predictable than they were two years ago.

LaMarr Woodley's departure for the NFL leaves the Wolverines searching for a pass rusher who can put pressure on the opposing quarterback, if not take him down.

Health issues make Tim Jamison a concern taking that step up, and might lead to the staff moving Shawn Crable from linebacker to rush end, despite Michigan's obvious weakness in the linebacking corps.

Despite last year's 11-2 record, Carr is still very much on the hot seat.

Slipping back to another 7-win season could signal the end of his long, and successful career at Michigan.

Another national title, even a share of the big prize, would save his job ... or, at least, permit him step aside gracefully.

Only one opponent stands out for the Red Devils, though, and that's Boyne City.

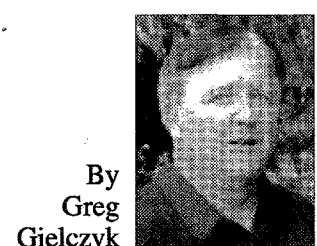
After taking a 20-0 lead at the half last year, the Ramblers scored 21 points in the second half and rolled up a 41-12

Game, it was recently announced by the club. The game will be played July 15-16, and feature a home run derby and skills competition. The game itself is scheduled for July 16.

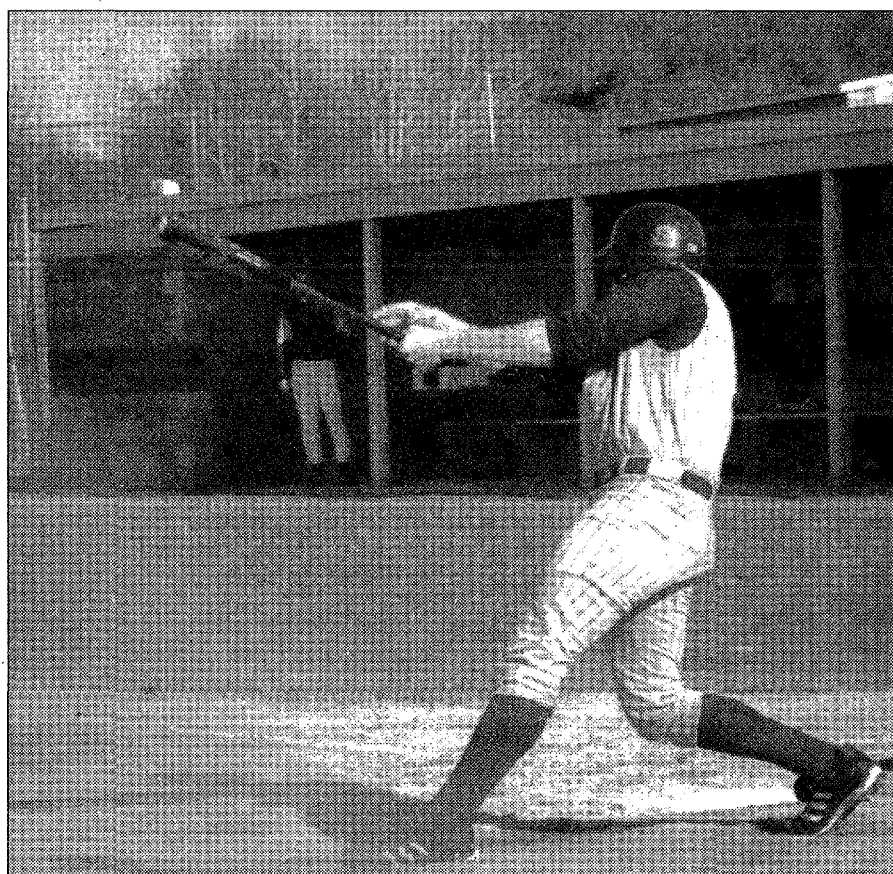
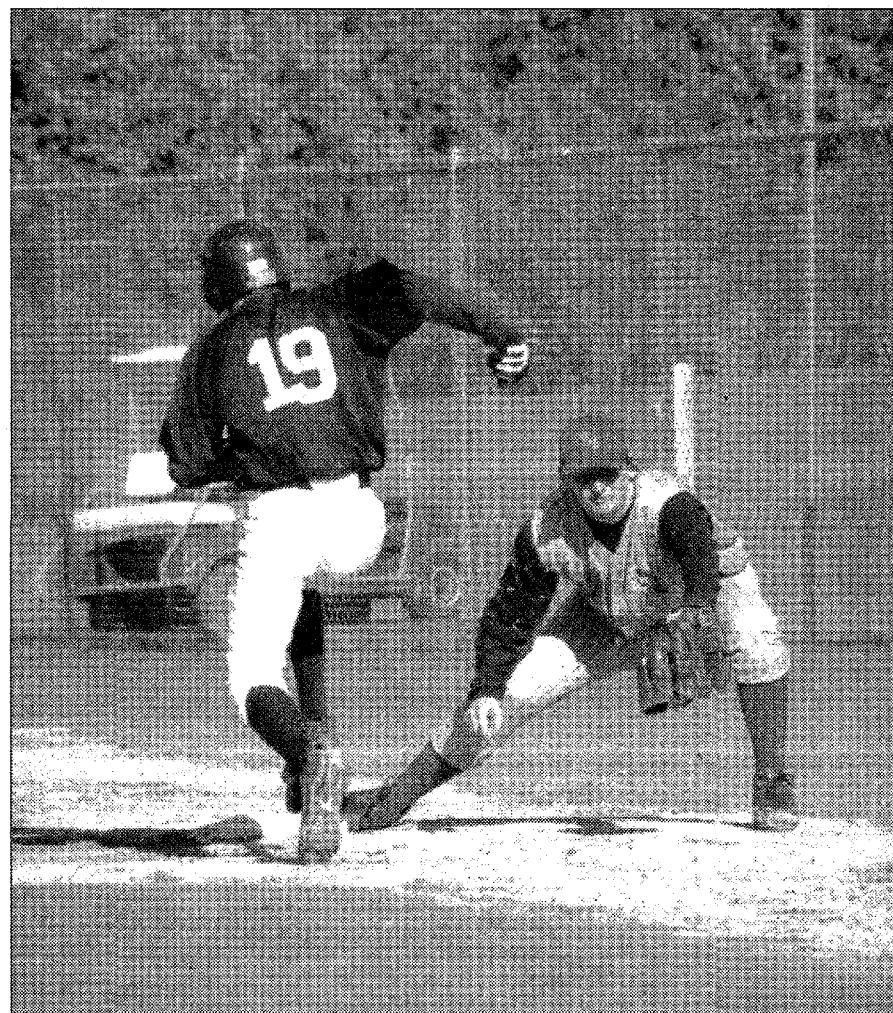
Hosting the game assures the Bums of four spots on the All-Star Team.

# High school coaches have tougher summer rules

EAST LANSING - For the first time this summer, all schools in the Michigan High School Athletic Association's membership must enforce a "dead period," when school coaches have no contact with students in an athletic setting on or off school premises. The dead period is a

minimum of seven consecutive days, with each school deciding when those days will occur. In surveys conducted this spring more than 90 percent of MHSAA member schools indicated that their dead period included the Fourth of July.

"Some of our con-

stituents think a dead period is long overdue, and some don't think seven days is enough," said John E. "Jack" Roberts, Executive Director of the MHSAA. "It is what it is, a de-escalation of pressures on kids and coaches out-of-season, one of several coming to school sports in Michi-

gan." The creation of the dead period is one of three actions taken by the Association's Representative Council a year ago which have been widely publicized and went into effect on June 1. The others are the creation of a pre-season down time before each sports season

and a ban on curriculum offerings focusing on a single MHSAA post-season tournament sport.

The pre-season down time prohibits schools from conducting open gyms and other activities for a period of 6 to 14 days prior to the start of each season which could be con-

strued as out-of-season practice or even tryouts for a team. The down times are from Aug. 1 to the first practice date in fall sports, 14 calendar days before the first practice date for each winter sport, and from March 1 until the first practice date in spring sports.

In the school curricu-

lum, effective with the 2007-08 school year, if a class offers instruction specific to an MHSAA tournament sport, the class must offer instruction on at least of three topics in equal proportion taught to all students enrolled, and the class must be open to all students.

"The down time will

allow schools to more clearly distinguish the start of each practice and its tryout period," said Roberts. "There have also been a number of schools conducting classroom offerings which have appeared to their opponents as school-sponsored out-of-season practice, especially in football."

### Pudge appealing suspension

SEATTLE — It would be easy for catcher Ivan Rodriguez to just accept his one-game suspension given to him on Saturday by Major League Baseball and take Sunday's game off. It's a day game after a night game, and he could use the rest, especially with Monday's off-day approaching.

But that's not the plan. Manager Jim Leyland said that wouldn't be right when he believes the suspension is wrong.

Rodriguez, also fined an undisclosed amount, was suspended for bumping plate umpire Mike Winters in the fourth inning of Thursday's game. He was upset after he tried to throw out Seattle's Adrian Beltre stealing second but believed that batter Yuniesky Betancourt interfered with the throw.

Winters ruled that there was no interference. Rodriguez argued strongly, but as he was moving around Winters, he appeared to bump his shoulder. He was immediately ejected.

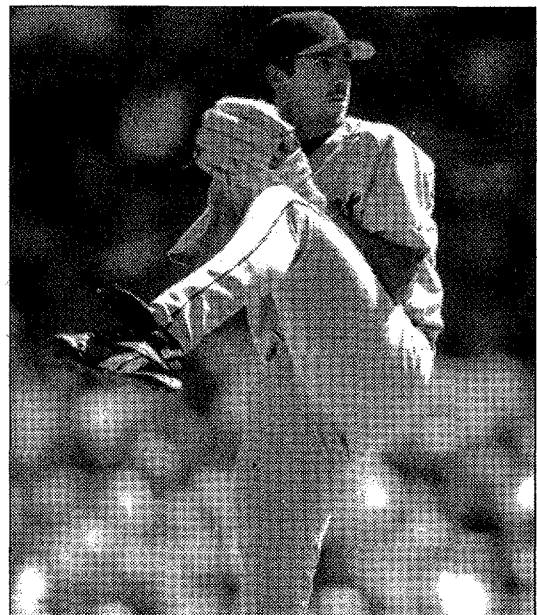
Rodriguez said he hopes that he has the opportunity to talk to Bob Watson, who is in charge of disciplinary actions for MLB.

Even in Winters' report to the league office, he described the bump as unintentional. He told Leyland the same thing when he came out to argue the play.

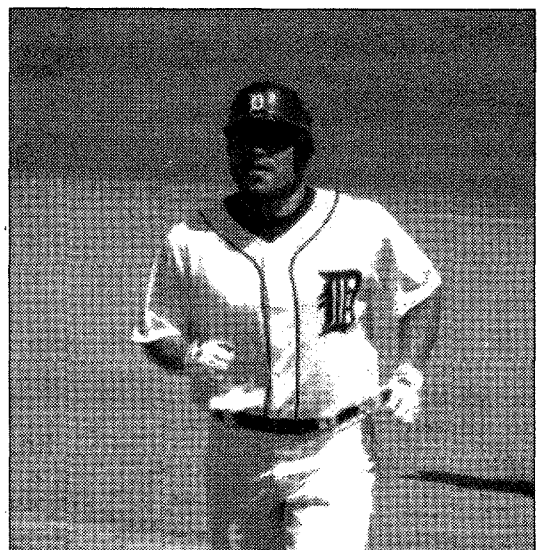
That other guy was Gary Sheffield, who was suspended for three games for apparently tossing the end of his broken bat at umpire Greg Gibson in a late May game. He appealed and grudgingly accepted a reduced two-game suspension.

The Tigers had a season-high five stolen bases that included Gary Sheffield's rare steal of home as they beat the Seattle Mariners, 11-7 Sunday.

Marcus Thames' three-run, fourth-inning home run was the game's biggest blow, ample support for starter Justin Verlander (11-3). Verlander, who pitched one inning in Tuesday's All-Star Game, was not as sharp as usual — throwing 47 pitches in the first two innings — but skirted neatly around trouble.

Verlander, who has won six of his last seven starts, allowed four runs on eight hits in his seven innings, 108 pitches. He is now 3-0 with a 3.26 ERA in three career starts against the Mariners.

For the first time this season, Stewart won a NASCAR NEXTEL Cup Series race.

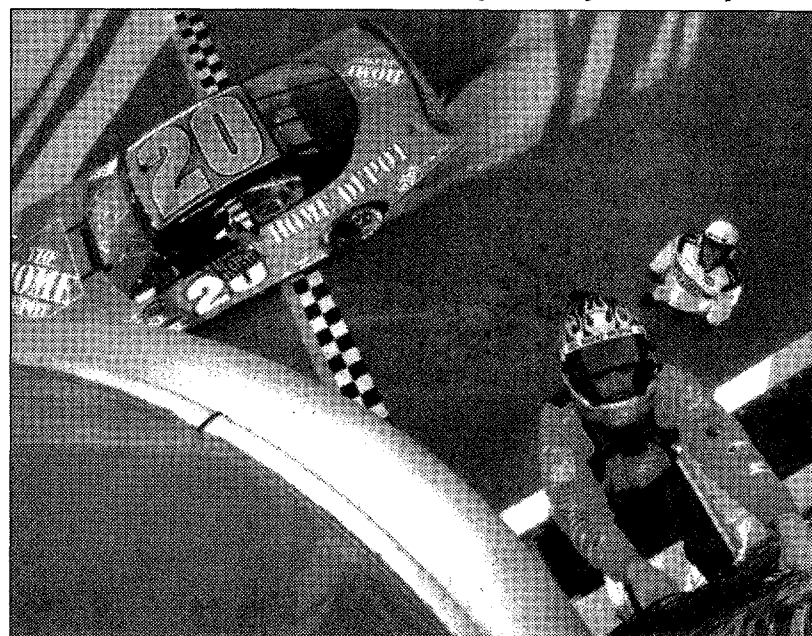
A capacity crowd of more than 100,000 spectators cheered Stewart home first after a flurry of late-race caution flags kept bunching the field for restarts.

The former NASCAR champion held off a furious run by another former champ, Matt Kenseth, with less than 15 laps remaining in the 267-lap, 400-mile event. Trailing Stewart and Kenseth were Carl Edwards, Kevin Harvick, Casey Mears, Kurt Busch, Jeff Burton, Ryan Newman, Jeff Gordon and Clint Bowyer.

Bowyer's 10th-place finish was particularly impressive after he overcame a pit road speeding penalty that sent him to the rear of the pack shortly after the halfway point.

Stewart has encountered various forms of bad racing luck this season although being in contention for a win almost every race. He was a contender all afternoon Sunday running with the leaders and leading throughout the day before his pit crew got him back on the track after one of the final caution periods. He never looked back.

When it was over, he did his signature "Spiderman" climb up



the fence to the starter's stand, much to the delight of the cheering crowd.

Dale Earnhardt Jr. finished 19th after being a contender most of the race. His power steering failed near the end, which dropped him out of the frontrunners.

Pole-sitter Mears charged into the lead when the green flag started the race but Truex took over on the eighth lap. Truex's DEI teammate Paul Menard, however, did not get off to a good start. His Chevrolet rolled down pit road on the 10th lap with smoke spewing from beneath the hood.

#### Volunteering - Good For You

According to a new report, older adults who volunteer live longer, have higher functional abilities and less depression and heart disease. Volunteering keeps you active and can give you a sense of purpose. About two hours per week is the minimum amount of volunteer activity necessary to see a health benefit. Researchers aren't sure why helping others improves health, but they think it may have something to do with the hormone oxytocin. Oxytocin seems to produce a "helper's high" and may have protective benefits. 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# New opportunities for healthcare training

People who are interested in pursuing a job in the growing healthcare industry will now have more opportunities to get the training they need. The Healthcare Regional Skills Alliance of Northwest Michigan has been in existence for three years, and is now poised to expand extensively due to a \$500,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Labor's High Growth Job Training Initiative. The Healthcare RSA offers training for the full spectrum of careers in the healthcare industry, which is

this region's fastest growing industry and largest job provider.

"With increasing high demand for qualified direct care workers, it is imperative that this region is able to meet the demand," said Jean Peters, coordinator for the Healthcare RSA. "This grant will create capacity to provide a career path through training opportunities that have previously been offered on a limited basis or not at all. We can now meet those training needs for both provider and worker

resulting in better care for those who need it."

With the grant, the Healthcare RSA will implement a comprehensive, coordinated direct care training plan that will help new workers get trained and current workers move up the career ladder. The plan includes a Basic Healthcare Training class, which introduces new workers to healthcare careers and teaches core skills that are used in every healthcare field. The plan also provides Certified Nurse Aide training, a certification program for

home health care workers, and offers training for current workers, enabling them to meet continuing education requirements.

Northwest Michigan Council of Governments (NWMCOG) operates the Healthcare RSA and will administer the grant on behalf of the Workforce Development Board and many partner organizations, including education and training agencies, hospitals, long-term care facilities both public and private, and others.

## Traveling with pets requires planning

Taking a pet on vacation can make the trip more enjoyable or create challenges, depending on the pet's health, temperament and how well owners plan ahead.

"The combined stresses of transportation and adjusting to a new environment can make vacations uncomfortable and sometimes dangerous for pets," says Karlene Belyea, executive director of the Michigan Veterinary Medical Association. "A visit to your veterinarian and a few simple phone calls can go a long way toward a safe vacation for your pet."

To ensure a worry-free and pet-friendly trip:

1. Visit a veterinarian: It is important to find out if a pet can handle the stress of a vacation. A veterinarian can advise whether older pets or those with health issues should travel, suggest the most reasonable method of transportation and offer specific feeding instructions.

2. Plan for transportation: Acclimate your pet to the travel environment before leaving. Once a pet is used to its surroundings, it will become much more comfortable. For example, take a cat that is not used to car travel on gradually longer trips to build up tolerance.

For air travel, certificates must be obtained no more than 10 days prior to departure verifying health and rabies vaccination. A clean bill of health means your pet is ready to enjoy a vacation. Also when flying, try to book a nonstop flight to reduce stress on the pet.

When staying at a hotel, check the facility's Web site or call the hotel directly to make sure pets are welcome. Regardless of the type of travel, always make sure the information on a pet's collar is up to date, including a cell phone number.

3. Bring items that remind your pet of home: A dog's favorite toy or treat will be a comfort in a foreign environment, as will the same food and even water they consume at home. A pet's carrier can also provide reassurance. When buying a new one, allow time for a pet to adjust.

## Reduce risk of swimmer's itch

While water quality is generally very good at northern Michigan lakes, the local health department wants to remind beach goers to protect themselves against contracting swimmer's itch.

Swimmer's itch is caused by a naturally occurring parasite that is carried from lake to lake by droppings from ducks, geese, or other waterfowl. The organisms then move into snails where they mature, eventually coming out to re-infect more

waterfowl.

When human swimmers leave the water, any parasites on their skin may burrow into the skin in an effort to survive. The parasites die quickly, but they can trigger an irritating rash, said Joshua Meyerson, MD, Medical Director of the Northwest Michigan Community Health Agency, the health department that serves Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties. "Your body reacts to the parasite by forming itchy, red

bumps. Swimmer's itch isn't contagious, but it can be very uncomfortable."

Meyerson offers the following tips to reduce the chances of developing swimmer's itch: briskly dry off with a towel as soon as you come out of the water, including the area under swimsuits, and shower immediately after swimming if facilities are available.

Not everyone who is exposed to the parasite will necessarily develop swimmers' itch.

"Repeated exposure increases sensitivity to the parasite and increases the likelihood of swimmer's itch," Meyerson said. He said children are often infected with swimmer's itch since they typically wade in and out of shallow water where the organism is predominately found and play on the beach as water evaporates on their skin.

Within minutes of swimming or wading in infested water, people may experience tin-

gling, burning, or itchy skin. Or, symptoms may take up to a week to appear. A small, reddened bump will develop at the entrance site of each parasite, causing periods of itching that can last for several days.

Using calamine lotion, an antihistamine such as Benadryl or corticosteroid cream, cool compresses, baths with baking soda or colloidal oatmeal, such as Aveeno, may control itching. "The most important thing to do if you

do contract swimmer's itch is to try not to scratch. Scratching may cause the rash to become infected. If itching is severe, your health care provider may prescribe lotion or cream to lessen your symptoms," Meyerson said.

Most cases of swimmer's itch do not require medical attention. Contact your health care provider when the diagnosis is unclear, complications such as infection are present, or the reaction is intolerable.

## Boaters urged to help protect Michigan's lakes

The Department of Environmental Quality's Office of the Great Lakes is reminding boaters that they play an important role in protecting Michigan's waters from invasive species this summer. Aquatic invasive plants and animals threaten Michigan's diverse ecosystems, and the confirmation of the existence of a new deadly fish virus, viral hemorrhagic septicemia virus, in the Great Lakes is further cause for concern.

Those enjoying

Michigan's lakes and streams should inspect watercrafts and recreational equipment before leaving a lake or other water body, remove any vegetation, drain all live wells, clean areas that may contain water, and dispose of unused bait in the trash. Allowing boating and recreational equipment to dry 4 to 6 hours in the sun also helps to prevent the spread of VHS as well as zebra mussels and other organisms from one lake to another.

"Over 183 invasive species and the diseases they carry now threaten the Great Lakes, natural ecosystem," said Office of the Great Lakes Director Ken DeBeaussiaert. "Michigan boasts some of the most pristine lakes and streams anywhere in the world, and they need our help to ensure they stay healthy."

VHS causes internal hemorrhaging and organ failure in fish, and while it does not pose any threat to human health even if infected

fish are eaten, the full biological impact might not be clear for years. VHS has been found in twenty species to date including muskellunge, smallmouth bass, northern pike, yellow perch, lake whitefish, walleyes, and Chinook salmon.

Infected fish have been found in lakes Huron, Michigan, Erie, and St. Clair and one inland lake in Clare County. Large fish die-offs in lakes Huron, Erie, St. Clair, and Ontario affecting more than a

dozen fish species have occurred over the past two years and are attributed to VHS.

Aquatic Invasive Species not only affect the use of Michigan waters but have negative effects on sport and commercial fishing, industry, municipalities and native fish and wildlife.
