### Traffic signal changes

Due to the start of construction on the block of Water Street between Lake and Park streets, the City of Boyne City has placed the traffic signal at the intersection of Lake and Water into the flashing mode. It will remain in this mode until further notice. North and southbound traffic on Lake Street will receive a flashing yellow light indicating proceed with caution. East and westbound traffic on Water Street will receive a flashing red signal meaning come to a full stop and proceed when clear. With the signal in the flashing mode the new pedestrian signals at the intersection are turned off. Drivers coming to the intersection should give pedestrians in the crosswalk, as in all crosswalks, the right of way. This new temporary arrangement will be monitored to verify that it is im-

## Petitions cause confusion

EAST JORDAN - The mayor and city commissioners are trying to find out why petitions were circulated among city residents asking that the issuance of capital improvement bonds be placed on the November ballot for voters to approve or disapprove.

The issue is that residents do not seem to know that the bonds would be issued for a refinancing of a land contract that would save tax-

payers money in interest, Mayor Mark Postma said recently.

"Not one person that I talked to had any idea it was a refinancing," Postma said. "Some people were told it was a purchase and would be put on their taxes."

The truth is, Postma said, the city would issue bonds for property already purchased and financed about a year ago, and the city is simply refinancing the loan at a lower interest rate.

"This is purely a cost-saving measure," Postma said.

Because of a better interest rate, the savings would have been at least \$42,000.

The land that was purchased and is the topic of the controversy is adjacent to the city's boat launch. It was purchased to use for expansion of the boat launch.

Commissioner Jean Timmons, who is not running for reelection, had signed the petition and surprised the other commissioners by so doing.

Questions were asked of her as to why she would sign when as a commissioner she

knew the bonds would be for a refinancing, yet that fact was not explained to people when they were asked to sign the petitions.

"You can understand why we're a little surprised to see your name on a petition when no communication on this took place at all within the commission," Postma said.

"They asked me if I would sign that to give the people the right to vote on it, for this being bonded out," Timmons said.

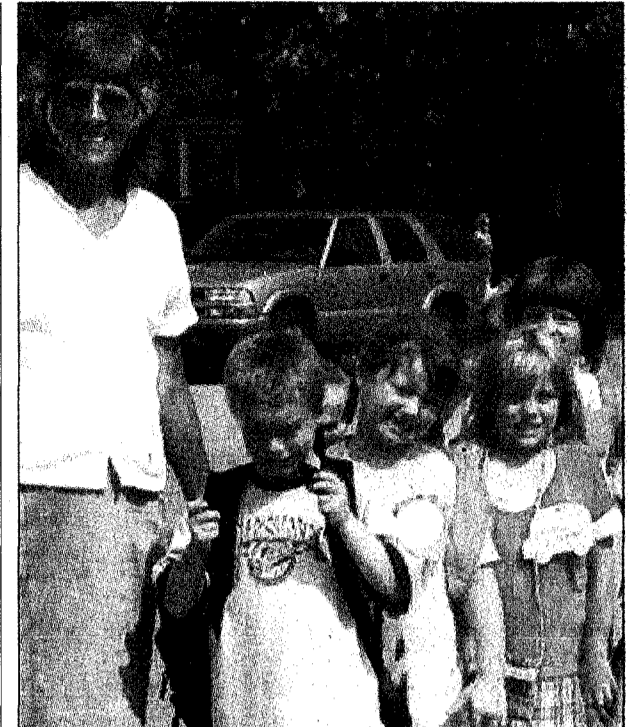

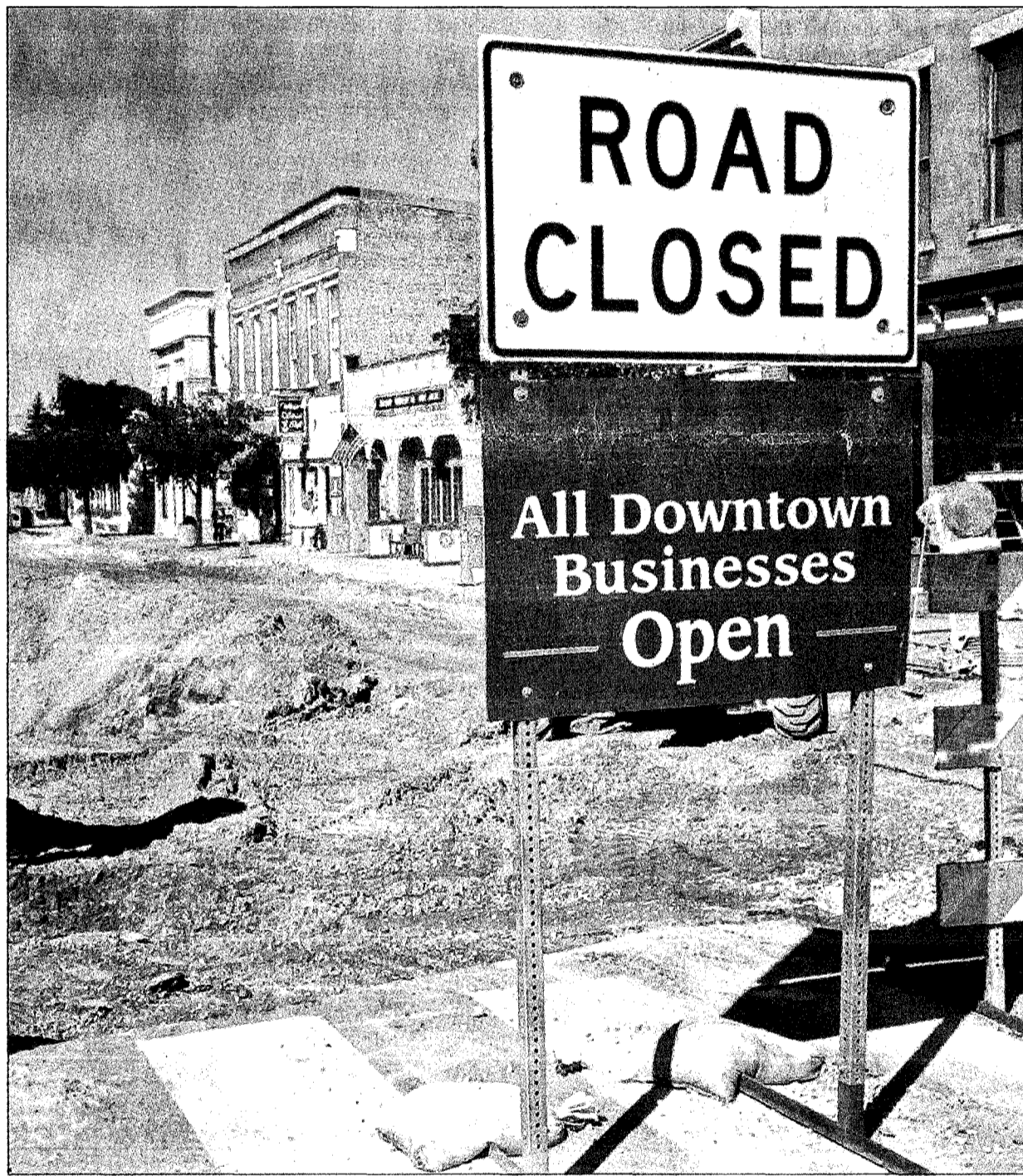

The consensus of those gathered sitting cross-legged on the grass waiting to board their bus was that lunch was the most fun part of the day and that it was too hot for a sweater.

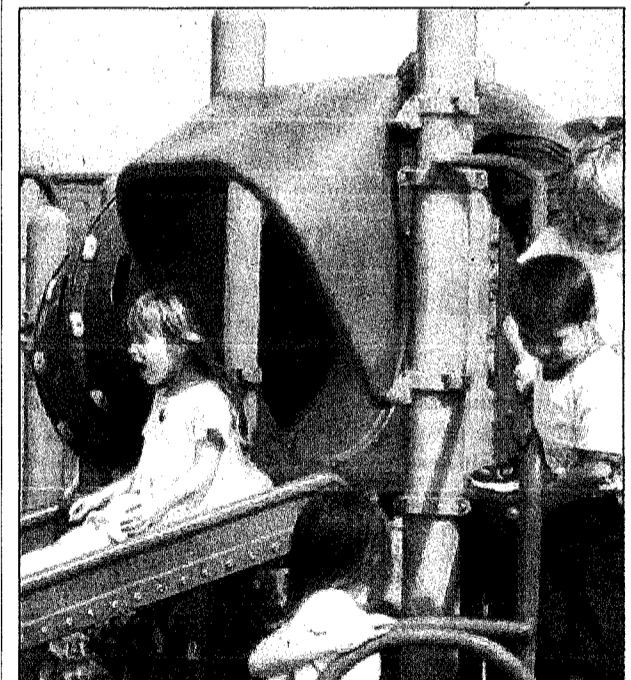

## Court hearing held in drug delivery case

PETOSKEY - An East Jordan man accused of delivering drugs to a Petoskey attorney who subsequently died, sat almost motionless at a lengthy court hearing as five individuals testified at his preliminary examination.

Ryan Matthew Fisher, 29, faces a possible life sentence if he is convicted under federal and state laws. Michigan statute, MCL 333.7401, provides for the charge of "delivery of controlled substance causing death."

Fisher was a client of attorney Greg Justis who died on June 26, 2006, from what has been ruled a drug over-

dose. Fisher appeared for the preliminary examination in the 90th District Court in Petoskey with his attorney, Mary Beth Kur, on Aug. 29.

Duane Beach from the Emmet County Prosecutor's Office represented the state of Michigan.

The first witness to testify did so from prison where

she was incarcerated on separate crimes. Rhonda Richards related through video conferencing that she made trips to Detroit with Fisher to purchase heroin and cocaine.

Richards also testified that after Justis died, Fisher called her and told her that he was scared and that Justis

## Devlon appeals circuit court decision

BOYNE CITY - Devlon Properties, Inc. has filed an appeal of its case against the City of Boyne City with the Michigan Court of Appeals. The appeal was filed on

July 9, and asks the higher court to review and overturn an order that granted summary disposition in the case.

The order was issued by Charlevoix County Circuit

Court Judge Richard M. Pajtas on June 21, and granted the city's request to rule that there was no cause of action.

Devlon Properties had

claimed money damages when the city revoked its permits that allowed construction of a residential hotel and restaurant. The

Postma said that as a commissioner, Timmons should have known the commission was refinancing and that it was not a new purchase.

He noted that her husband, Paul Timmons, is running for a commission seat.

Paul Timmons organized the petition

drive after he had several businessmen and citizens approach him about it, he said on Monday.

"They asked me how to go about voting on it (bond issue)," Paul said.

"Every person I spoke to was made aware that it was a refinancing," he said and added that he gave a

copy of the notice about the bonds that ran in the newspaper to each circulator of the petitions.

"I encourage everyone before the election in November to re-search the project and the city's financial status," Paul said.

Commissioners held a special meeting on Monday, Aug. 27, to

pass a resolution to approve submission of the bond proposal onto the November ballot. It was passed unanimously. The action was necessary because the petitioners had obtained the required number of signatures and had filed the petitions with the Charlevoix County Clerk.

city revoked the permits in May 2006, because they had expired, according to former planning director, Dan Reed. A city ordinance states that construction of a project must commence within one year from the date of the issued permits. The city claimed that no such construction had begun. According to city ordinance, Devlon was therefore required to reapply if it planned to pursue its lakefront project known as "Boyne Beach Club."

But, Devlon claimed that it lost construction time and consequently money because its permits were revoked and the reapplication process would delay its project. The city reissued the permits on Oct. 3, 2006.

Devlon also claimed that the city violated federal and state constitutional civil rights and due process. Judge Pajtas ruled that Devlon had no constitutional claims because it had not commenced construction on the site.

Devlon claimed that demolition of a building on the site and marketing efforts qualified for the beginning of construction, but the court did not agree.

Devlon Properties and its president, Jim Hevey, plan to build on the property at 475 N. Lake Street across from the shopping plaza. The land would be the site of a 111-slip marina and private beach, as well as a hotel and restaurant.

had overdosed in his (Fisher's) car.

Another witness, Roger Cicotte, testified that he too had made trips to Detroit to buy drugs with Fisher. Both Richards and Cicotte said there were occasions when they drove with Fisher to attorney Justis's office after the trips downstate.

Upon questioning by Kur, Cicotte said he was testifying on behalf of the Michigan State Police. Charges against Cicotte of malicious destruction of property were dropped

in light of the testimony, he said.

In response to Kur's questions, both Richards and Cicotte said they never saw an exchange of drugs from Fisher to Justis.

Attorney Ron Powers, who had been opposite Justis in court cases throughout the years, testified that he saw Justis in the courthouse on June 26, 2006, the day Justis died.

At the time he talked with him, Powers said he saw nothing unusual in Justis's demeanor or actions, al-

though he had noticed unusual behavior on a few occasions.

Powers said he could not positively identify the defendant as the person who was with Justis on that day.

But court records show that Fisher has admitted to police that Justis was in Fisher's car when he died.

That was corroborated by a court officer, Ed Mattson, who testified that he was in his office when he was informed that Fisher had notified a clerk that he couldn't wake up Justis, who was

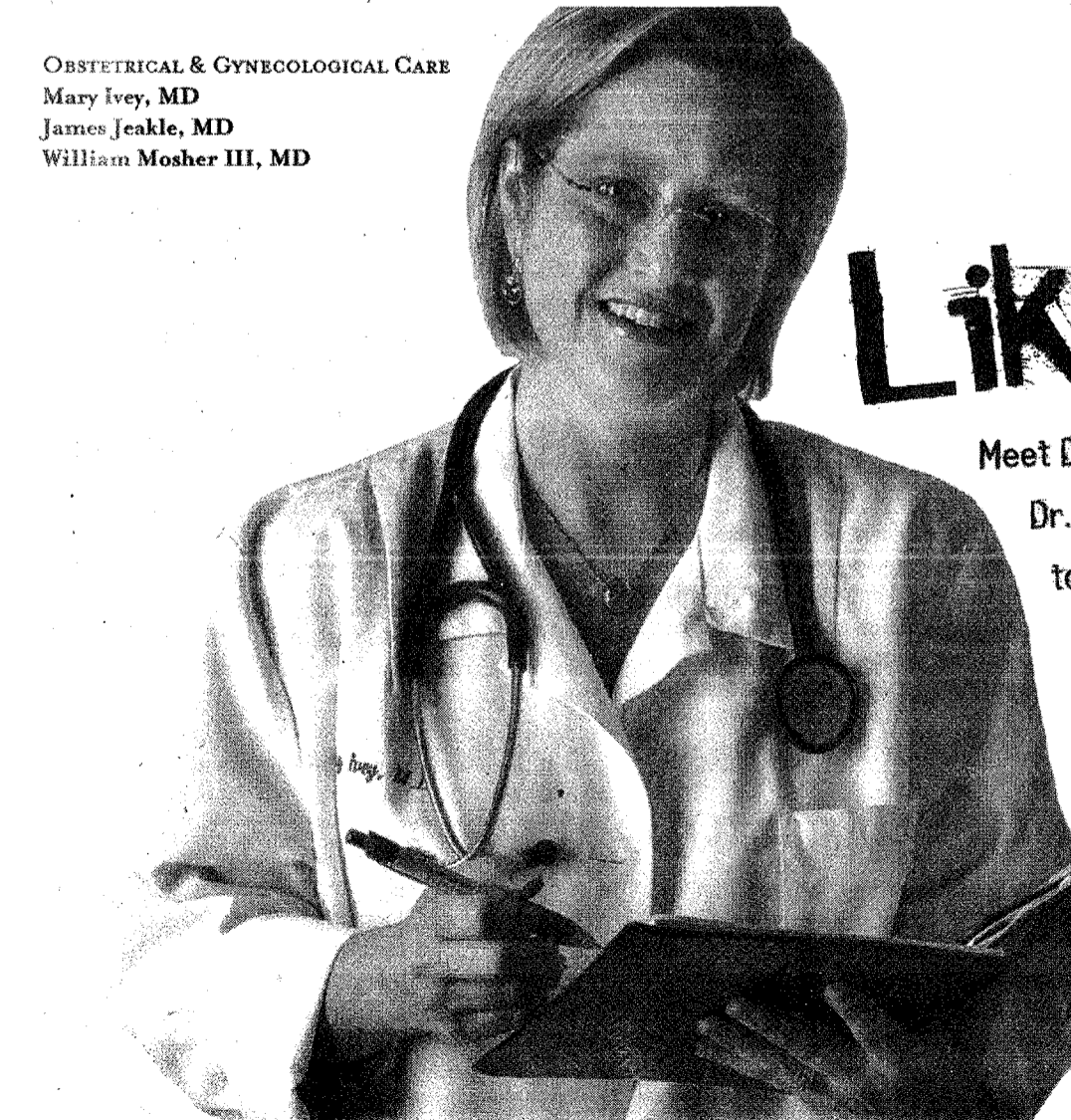

## Control your own emotions

You have complete control over your thoughts and emotions. However, many people do not fully exercise this control, inadvertently allowing others to affect the way they feel.

From examples set by family and friends, to conduct shown on TV and movies, society is replete with instances of individuals being manipulated by the actions of others. As a result, you learn to handle conflict by reacting with your emotions rather than your mind.

How many times have you heard any of the following? "He makes me so mad." "My husband would make me so happy if he would just listen." "My boss makes me upset when she treats me like that." "My kids make me so angry when they don't behave."

You can't control other people and there are many circumstances that you have no influence over. While you can't control your environment, you can control your reaction to it.

Imagine that you are walking down a trail in the woods and trip over a log. If you get angry at the log will it move out of your way? Does the log care how you feel? Your anger is a poison to you.

Anger will cause you to become tense and engage conflict. If you don't want to trip over the log again, you must watch out for it and step over or around it the next time it's encountered.

People and circumstances in your life can be logs across your path. Each person does things differently than you might. You won't change their behavior but you can manage your reaction.

As another example, how would you respond to someone cutting you off in traffic? Would you get emotional, lay on your horn, possibly try to cut them off in return to teach them a lesson? Instead, relax and recognize that the other driver has a problem. Don't let someone else's problems or behavior become yours. No

one can affect your emotions unless you let them.

How do you keep from being influenced by the actions of others? Start by not reacting with your emotions and not responding in kind. If someone yells at you, don't yell back, lower your voice. If someone threatens you, don't threaten back. Very often you can maintain control of a confrontation without responding at all.

Consider whether someone else's behavior requires any action from you. If not, then just remove yourself from the situation. When verbal input is required, present it in a calm and quiet voice.

As soon as you find yourself in a situation where no matter what you say, the other person doesn't "get it", stop trying to make them get it and remove yourself. Although this is not necessarily the easiest thing to do, the alternative is to suffer and stress. Don't permit other people's problems to control you.

When you react with your emotions, the other person will engage you and continue to battle. Be like water, the harder it's grabbed it, the more elusive it becomes.

Learning to control your emotions takes constant practice but results in living with less stress and anxiety.

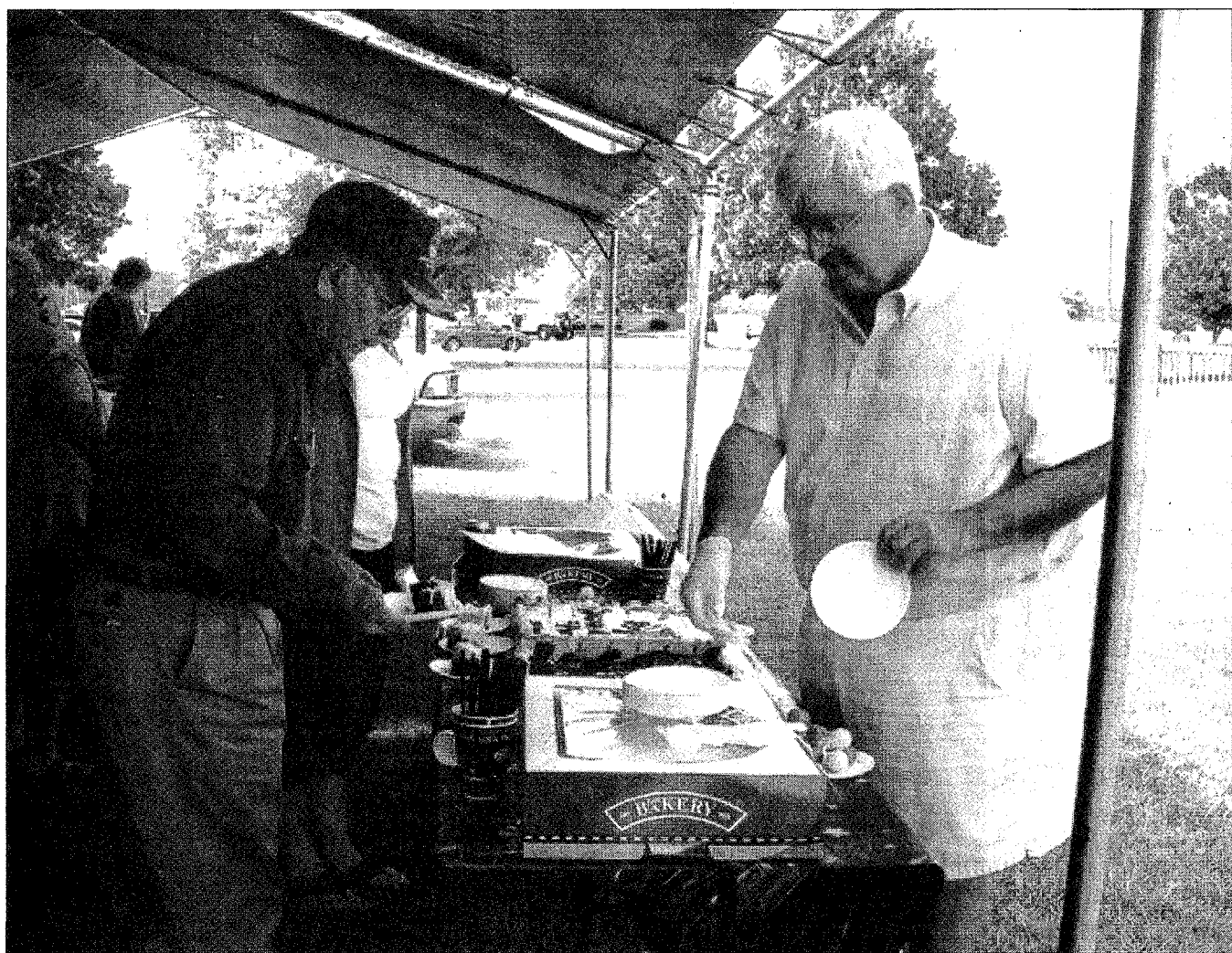

# Cancer screenings

New appointment slots for breast and cervical cancer screening are available at no charge to eligible women thanks to donations to the Health Department. Two community groups, Alden High Tea for Breast Cancer and Sue DeYoung/Judy Edger Memorial Breast Cancer Walk, donated proceeds from their events to support clinics in their local communities.

The donations cover expenses for 50 new screening appointments. "We received funding from the state health department to screen 645 eligible women across the

region this year. But there are so many more that need it. It's fabulous that so many people work so hard to provide additional cancer screenings for the women who need them in their local communities."

Sington said the screenings are important to identify cancers in the early stages, when they are easier and much less expensive to treat. "About a quarter of the women we see are referred to specialists for further diagnostic tests," she said. "We refer to a network of physicians who graciously accept reduced payment for

women screened through the Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program."

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code to promote wellness, prevent disease, provide quality healthcare, address health problems of vulnerable populations, and protect the environment for the residents and visitors of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties.
