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Petitions cause confusion

EAST JORDAN - The mayor and city commissioners are trying to find out why petitions were circulated among city residents asking that the issuance of capital improvement bonds be placed on the November ballot for voters to approve or disapprove.

The issue is that residents do not seem to know that the bonds would be issued for a refinancing of a land contract that would save taxMayor Mark Postma said recently.

"Not one person that I talked to had any idea it was a refinance," Postma said. "Some people were told it was a purchase and would be put on their taxes."

The truth is, Postma said, the city would issue bonds for property already purchased and financed about a year ago, and the city is simply refinancing the loan sioners by so doing. at a lower interest rate.

"This is purely a cost-saving measure," Postma said. rate, the savings would have been at least \$42,000.

The land that was purchased and is the topic of the controversy is adjacent to the city's boat launch. It was purchased to use for expansion of the boat launch.

Commissioner Jean Timmons, who is not running for reelection, had signed the petition and surprised the other commis-



The consensus of those gathered sitting cross-legged on the grass waiting to board their bus was that lunch was the most fun part of the day and that it was too hot for a sweater.



Kindergarten students give recess high marks



Court hearing held in drug delivery case

PETOSKEY - An East Jordan man accused of delivering drugs to a Petoskey attorney who subsequently died, sat almost motionless at a lengthy court hearing as five individuals testified at his preliminary examination.

Ryan Matthew Fisher, 29, faces a possible life sentence if he is convicted under federal and state laws. Michigan statute, MCL 333.7401, provides for the charge of "delivery of controlled sub-

stance causing death." Fisher was a client of attorney Greg Justis who died on June 26, 2006, from what has been ruled a drug over-

Fisher appeared for the preliminary examination in the 90th District Court in Petoskey with his attorney, Mary Beth Kur, on Aug. 29.

Duane Beach from the **Emmet County Prosecutor's** Office represented the state of Michigan.

The first witness to testify did so from prison where

she was incarcerated on separate crimes. Rhonda Richards related through video conferencing that she made trips to Detroit with Fisher to purchase heroin and cocaine.

Richards also testified that after Justis died, Fisher called her and told her that he was scared and that Justis



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



Meeting life's challenges

BOYNE CITY - Unpredictable, yet predictable. Practical, yet outrageous. A quick humor, then sudden seriousness. These contradictions are just a few that describe Phil Johnson.

A county commissioner for 14 years and chairman for four of those years, now retired, Phil says he isn't interested in serving in local government again. "It's time for new voices," he said. Yet asked if he'll run for local office again he replies: "Never say never. If I was really upset with what is going on I might."

Phil is practical in that he's always turning lights off around the house if they aren't being used, but on the flipside he's going to buy his fourth vehicle and his third Corvette because, "I have a fourstall garage.'

Asked whom he would like to meet more than anyone, Phil said Paris Hilton. Asked again whom he would like to meet, he again said Paris Hilton. Asked again, well, one can guess.

Finally, Phil said Lyndon Johnson.

"I'd like to ask him how he screwed up the Viet Nam War so bad. He tried to run a war from the White House. It was stupidity. He didn't let the generals run the war.'

A native of Boyne City, Phil was raised on a farm by his grandmother, Rosina Kurtz, whom he adored. His father died 12 days before Phil was born.

"This was before social security so my mother had to work," Phil said. Two other

boys stayed with his mother.

Phil worked in the fields, milked cows and performed other farm jobs. One day, he stabbed his foot with a pitchfork and hobbled back to the house.

"My grandmother put this salve on it and said to go back to work, and I did."

The work was hard, but Phil says it created his work ethic. That was instrumental for Phil when he became a businessman later in life.

"We were dirt poor, we didn't have anything," Phil said. He related how he would turn his socks around so his toes went through the holes, instead of the holes being at his heels.

At one point it was decided that Phil would attend school in Petoskey and stay in the city during the week. He missed his grandmother

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and hitchhiked home every weekend. He was

the best interests of Petoskey schools for Phil to return to Boyne City.

unhappy and proceeded to convince Petoskey

school officials that he should return to Boyne City schools. Young Phil's methods are unclear, but it wasn't long before Petoskey school officials called

"She said 'no' and then she smiled," Phil related. B. J. died almost two

years ago. They were married 42 years. They had five children from

her previous marriage.

Other than the printing business, Phil says he gets a great deal of satisfaction from the accomplishment of the institution of the 9-1-1 system in Charlevoix county when he was a commissioner. Also, he notes the accomplishment of the county building addition and the new jail, which were funded from delinquent taxes, and without a millage, he said.

Both Phil and B. J. were active in the Charlevoix County Humane Society as contributors and as a driving force in the construction of a new shelter and adoption center located in Boyne City.

These days abundant satisfaction for Phil comes from grandson. Philip Robert "Phil-Bob," the son of Robert and Cindy Banner. He is with him every chance he has.

"He's my all. He's my purpose in life," Phil

A key factor in living a contented and stable life is religion, he said. For the youth of today, Phil said there are still opportunities for success.

"If they apply themselves and work hard at it. And the economy? "It will come back," he

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

DARE TO LIVE WITH OUT LIMITS

Control your own emotions

You have complete control over your thoughts and emotions. However, many people do not fully exercise this control, inadvertently allowing others to affect the way they feel.

From examples set by family and friends, to conduct shown on TV and movies, society is replete with instances of individuals being manipulated by the actions of others. As a result, you learn to handle conflict by reacting with your emotions rather than your mind.

How many times have you heard any of the following? "He makes me so mad." "My husband would make me so happy if he would just listen." "My boss makes me upset when she treats me like that." "My kids make me so angry when they don't behave."

You can't control other people and there are many circumstances that you have no influence over. While you can't control your environment, you can control your reaction to it.

Imagine that you are walking down a trail in the woods and trip over a log. If you get angry at the log will it move out of your way? Does the log care how you feel? Your anger is a poison to you.

Anger will cause you to become tense and engage conflict. If you don't want to trip over the log again, you must watch out for it and step over or around it the next time it's encountered.

People and circumstances in your life can be logs across your path. Each person does things differently than you might. You won't change their behavior but you can manage your reaction.

As another example, how would you respond to someone cutting you off in traffic? Would you get emotional, lay on your horn, possibly try to cut them off in return to teach them a lesson? Instead, relax and recognize that the other driver has a problem. Don't let someone else's problems or behavior become yours. No

one can affect your emotions unless you let them.

How do you keep from being influenced by the actions of others? Start by not reacting with your emotions and not responding in kind. If someone yells at you, don't yell back, lower your voice. If someone threatens you, don't threaten back. Very often

you can maintain control of a confrontation without responding at all.

Consider whether someone else's behavior requires any action from you. If not, then just remove yourself from the situation. When verbal input is required, present it in a calm and quiet voice.

As soon as you find yourself in a situation where no matter what you say, the other person doesn't "get it", stop trying to make them get it and remove yourself. Although this is not necessarily the easiest thing to do, the alternative is to suffer and stress. Don't permit other people's problems to control you.

When you react with your emotions, the other person will engage you and continue to battle. Be like water, the harder it's grabbed it, the more elusive it becomes.

Learning to control your emotions takes constant practice but results in living with less stress and anxiety.

Two community groups, Alden High Tea for Breast Cancer and Sue DeYoung/ Judy Edger Memorial Breast Cancer Walk, donated proceeds from their events to support clinics in their local communities.

The donations cover expenses for 50 new screening appointments. "We received funding from the state health department to screen 645 eligible women across the

region this year. But there are so many more that need it. It's fabulous that so many people work so hard to provide additional cancer screenings for the women who need them in their local communities."

Sington said the

screenings are important to identify cancers in the early stages, when they are easier and much less expensive to treat. "About a quarter of the women we see are referred to specialists for further diagnostic tests," she said. "We refer to a network of physicians who graciously accept reduced payment for women screened through the Breast and Cervical Cancer Screening Program."

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code to promote wellness, prevent disease, provide quality healthcare, address health problems of vulnerable populations, and protect the environment for the residents and visitors of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties. 

St. Francis promises to be a much stiffer challenge for the Ramblers (3-0, 10).


