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Petitions circulated for parking vote

BOYNE CITY — Petitions are circulating in the city to bring the downtown parking issue to the voters at November's election.

"We are petitioning for a referendum on the parking exempt zone boundaries," resident Sue Hobbs told the city commission on Tuesday, Sept. 25, at its meeting. She asked that the commissioners support the right of the citizens to vote on the issue and show that support by signing a petition.

City commissioners approved the parking exempt zone boundaries on Sept. 11 in a 41 vote. Commissioner Chuck Vondra did not vote for the boundaries as drawn, saying he believed it would hurt downtown businesses because of a lack of parking spaces.

The zone boundaries include the proposed One Water Street development. The city's zoning ordinance calls for

the creation of 147 parking spaces by the developers of One Water Street, but the city exempted them from having to create about 58 of those spaces.

The zoning ordinance requires developments and businesses to construct a specified number of parking spaces to accommodate a project. The zoning ordinance contains a formula for the number of required parking spaces that is based on the size of the development.

The parking exempt zone is an area where, upon the request of a developer or owner located within the boundaries of the area, the city may approve an exemption to the number of parking spaces required by the ordinance.

If the city allows exemption of spaces for the project, the owners or developers pay a one-time fee to a fund for each parking space they are not required to construct. That fee has not yet been determined by the commissioners. The fees collected would be earmarked for future parking lots the city would create.

Citizens that are opposed to the issue say that not requiring businesses to provide the requisite number of parking spaces will result in too few spaces for shoppers downtown.

FOJR seek alternatives and solutions to Alba well

EAST JORDAN - In a search for solutions to the Alba well issue and the toxins leaching into Little Traverse Bay, the Friends of the Jordan River called a meeting with CMS Energy and the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality.

The Friday, Sept. 28 afternoon discussion with the energy company responsible financially and environmentally, and with the state regulating department was helpful, FOJR president Dr. John Richter said following the meeting.

"It was an informational, frank, open discussion and I think we all learned a lot."

The overall problem begins at the Emmet County site of a former cement plant on U.S. 31, just outside of the city of Petoskey. The nationally and internationally-known multi-million dollar Bay Harbor resort was developed by Dave Johnson. The resort stretches for five miles along Lake Michigan's Little Traverse Bay.

The kiln dust piles from cement production are still located on the land of the resort. The problem occurs when ground water mixes with kiln dust and forms toxic leachate. The leachate is discharging into the water of the bay. Leachate has a pH of 12 or more and that is equivalent to bleach.

Richter warns of the seriousness of the problem.

"This is a tragedy perpetuated upon the people and the water resources in Northern Michigan on an epic scale," Richter said, noting that mercury levels are dangerously high as well.

Friends of the Jordan River are concerned about contamination of the Jordan River, among other environmental and health problems.

The problem came home to the residents of Alba and Star Township in Antrim County when CMS Energy decided it wanted to bury the contamination in an underground well, an area that is basically in the residents' back yards. CMS has applied for a permit from the

New memorial ready for construction

BOYNE CITY — The city will have a new veteran's memorial in Veteran's Park to pay tribute with monuments to veterans from World War I, World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, Desert Storm, Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom.

"The project has been developing for about a year and a half," Mary Legg said. She is chair of the committee formed to coordinate the memorial and is a veteran who served in the U.S. Navy. Legg is also Vice Commander of American

Legion Post 228.

Legg appeared before city commissioners at the commission meeting on Sept. 25, to display the design and obtain final approval to begin the construction. Commissioners unanimously approved of the memorial plans.

"This was a great accomplishment for us today," Legg said of the approval.

Volunteers helped with the project plans, such as Mark Robinson, a landscape architect who worked on design. The first of the seven monuments that make up the memorial that is slated for completion is the World War II monument. Bruce Janssen

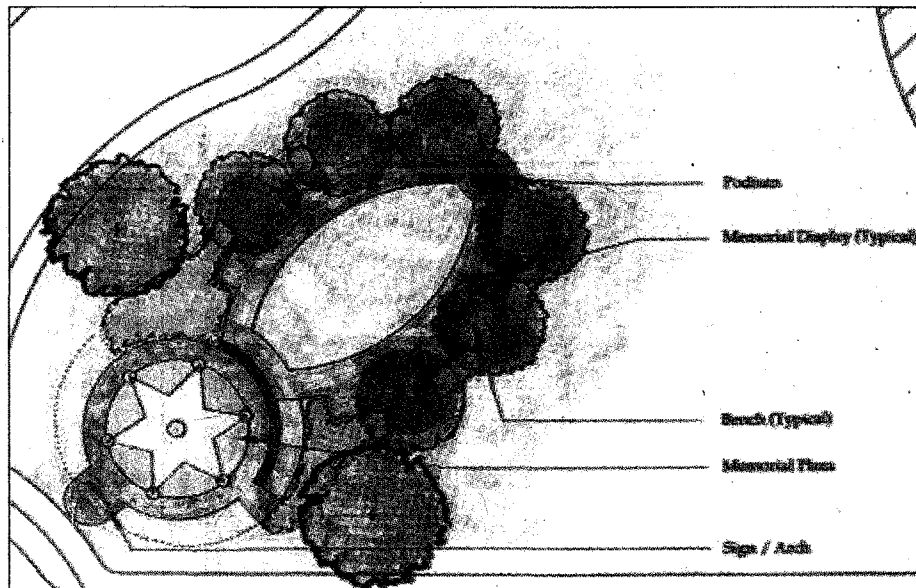
worked with the committee on the design.

The memorial design shows an elongated shape with a space for the monuments, a podium and a plaza. A walkway is lined with bushes and benches.

Charlevoix County Sheriff George T. Lasater opened an account at Citizen's Bank with \$5,000 from the proceeds from his book, "Charlevoix County's Contribution to World War II."

More donations are needed to construct the project, Leggs said. Contributions may be sent to Citizen's Bank to the attention of "Boyne City Area Veterans' Memorial Fund."

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality. To date, a decision has not been made.

Star Township supervisor, Richard Steel, participated in the meeting on Friday. The area residents are very involved in opposing the well, he said, and others are supporting their stance.

"We have been and are receiving donations to the township to fight this," Steel said. "We don't intend to let it go by." The township has retained legal counsel and national and state lawmakers have been contacted.

Besides Antrim county, Charlevoix, Emmet, Crawford, Kalkaska and Otsego counties are opposed to the request for a well.

While the MDEQ engaged in a dialogue at the meeting with the FOJR representatives, CMS Energy offered little, Richter said. The discussion was based on finding practical and effective solutions to the prob-

lem.

Speaking on behalf of FOJR, Richter said that it is a FOJR goal that CMS truly protects public health and the environment.

"Everyone at this table knows how we got here and we are not interested in finding fault or rehashing history," Richter said. "We are here to help you do it right, and if that's not possible, stop you from doing harm."

The FOJR presented a solution that would not threaten the residents or the environment of Alba and Star Township.

"The CKD (contaminated kiln dust) need to be entombed and contained so there is no leachate," Richter said.

Because cleanup costs are "enormous," Richter suggested that the financial burden be shared by all development parties, not just CMS.

No decisions were made at the meeting. The U.S. EPA and the MDEQ permit decisions are pending.

Whooping cough case confirmed in Emmet County

PETOSKEY — A case of whooping cough, also called pertussis, has been confirmed in Emmet County, public health officials announced. Both children and adults whose immunizations are up-to-date are protected from contracting whooping cough, a highly infectious bacterial infection of the respiratory systems that causes fits of severe coughing.

"This case highlights the need to review your family's immunization records and make sure everyone's immunizations are up-to-date,"

said Joshua Meyerson, MD, Medical Director for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. Children should receive the DTaP immunization against pertussis at two, four, six and fifteen months and again between ages four and six years. "The protection received from pertussis vaccinations administered in childhood begins to wear off after five to ten years, leaving preteens, teenagers, and adults at risk," Meyerson said. "The best way to help prevent preteens and teenagers from catching whooping

cough is to make sure they receive a booster shot called Tdap."

All preteens and teenagers should receive a single Tdap booster between age 11 and 18. Adults up to age 65 can also get the Tdap booster to reduce their risk of getting whooping cough.

Whooping cough starts with a runny nose, mild fever, and mild cough, similar to a common cold. Then symptoms progress to severe spasms of coughing that can interfere with eating, drinking, and breathing. Infants and younger children often

have more severe symptoms than older children, adolescents, and adults.

Anyone with whooping cough should stay home and away from public activities, including school, daycare, and work, to avoid exposing others. "They should be treated with certain antibiotic medications," Meyerson said. "If given early enough, antibiotics can limit the spread of whooping cough to others. A course of preventive antibiotic therapy may also be recommended for other members of the

household and other close contacts of a person being treated for whooping cough."

In addition to making sure immunizations are up-to-date, everyone can help prevent the spread of whooping cough by taking the following precautions:

- Washing hands frequently
- Covering mouth and nose when coughing
- Staying home from school and work when sick
- Contacting your health care provider if they have a prolonged or severe cough.

Newspapers: newsprint ink, Sunday mornings, websites and blogs

Some of the brightest minds in the newspaper business with the money to do the costliest of surveys have concluded that newspapers will go the way of the dinosaurs.

The future is here and it's on-line: websites and blogs and all that.

More telling than surveys is declining circulation for many newspaper companies. Throw in rising costs of news print and change is in the air.

It's true that many people exclusively look to the Internet for news. It's quick and efficient because many news sources are available within a key stroke.

But, just because computers and the Internet are common place now, doesn't mean it's an either/or situation.

Each medium has a valid role to play in people's lives.

A 2005 Forbes' article asserts that newspaper companies have real assets to bring to the table. Without newspaper content, television and Internet blogs would have no news to jump-start their stories.

Blogs draw lifeblood for raw material from conventional news organizations, a story from the American Journalism Review reported.

Blogs can be informative and fun given the interaction of blog authors and the public, and given the right topic. Many newspaper websites have blogs generated by reporters with topics they have covered.

Localism is a major reason the newspaper will remain - schools, local government, community events and local sports are all excellent reasons for the newspaper to hang around.

There is something about holding a newspaper in your hands (other than newsprint ink) that a computer will never replicate.

Many younger people may never form the habit of reading a newspaper. But the burgeoning numbers of "baby-boomers" are likely to continue to pick up the newspaper.

Then there is the traditional comfortable role newspapers play: Sunday mornings with the comics and other sections of the papers spread out on the living room floor, a bagel and coffee nearby.

Or settling into a favorite chair with the paper for a respite filled with news.

Newspapers will be missed if they do cease to exist. Not only for the nostalgic reasons mentioned, but the practical reasons: puppy training, packing moving boxes, and makeshift umbrellas come to mind.

Long live the traditional newspaper.

position, swear to uphold the Constitution of the United States of America. An oath is a formal declaration or promise to fulfill a pledge, often calling upon God as a witness.

The above being said, we expect our elected or employed public servants to do their jobs, be truthful, be accountable and have probity or integrity.

Many public servants fall short of that mark as evidenced by the "Official Budget of the United States" that is published and reported to "We the People" as true and factual, but the fact is that it is a deception and misstates our national economic condition.

The Federal government has a separate, unpublished Audited Federal Budget that unlike the Official Budget, follows the rules of accounting that govern all businesses, nonprofit institutions and state and local governments with over \$1 million in annual revenue. According to the Audited Federal Budget, the true 2005 deficit (the amount by which a sum of money is less than what is expected) was not the \$318 billion cited by Congress and the President, but rather \$760 billion. Recently, the Audited Budgets since 1979 showed deficits totaling \$2.9 trillion, not the \$729 billion that has been offi-

cially reported. The \$559 billion in surpluses during the Clinton Administration in truth were a deficit of \$484 billion and if corporate executives used the accounting practices that are followed in preparing the Official Budget, they would go to jail.

"We the People" have a right to know the damage being done by Washington's overspending and must call for the immediate adoption of the Audited Federal Budget by contacting your elected representatives.

Boyne City defeats East Jordan 41-6

EAST JORDAN — Every action is supposed to be met with an equal and opposite reaction. Tell that to the Boyne City football team. After surrendering a touchdown on East Jordan's first possession of the game, the Ramblers reacted by scoring six, winning 41-6. The win keeps the Ramblers (5-1, 3-1 Lake Michigan Conference) in the hunt for the conference title, while leaving the Red Devils still searching for their first win of the season.

However, East Jordan head coach Chris Nelson is proud of the way his team came out and fought hard, scoring on a big 30-yard touchdown strike from senior quarterback Scott Hansen to junior running back Anthony Castle. "Obviously, we are bummed about the loss, but this is the first time we've been able to come out and score. I give a lot of credit to my team for that, because Boyne City is an unbelievable club," he said.

The score stood at 28-6 with under a minute to go in the first half. Boyne City had the ball at East Jordan's 42 when senior quarterback Kelsey Nohel found senior wideout Stephen Redmer for a 38-yard gain down to the four. The next play was a touchdown punch right up the gut, sending the Ramblers into halftime up 34-6.

"That drive really put a cap on it, and they got a lot of motivation going into the half," Nelson said.

One bright spot for the Red Devils was the play of senior outside linebacker Josh Dougherty, who amassed eight big tackles.

"Josh came out this week in practice and showed he wanted to play," Nelson said. "He had a terrific game and made us thankful we started him."

East Jordan travels to Harbor Springs next week to take on the winless Rams.

"Harbor Springs was one of the teams that we really battled against last year," Nelson said. "It's going to be another battle this year. We just need to come out and play like we can play and execute our game plan."

The Ramblers' victory sets up a showdown next week against undefeated Elk Rapids, who pummeled Charlevoix 48-15 on Friday. Boyne City head coach David Hills says he's just going to treat it like any other week. "We'll re-evaluate what things are working and what we need to work on and move forward from there," he said.

Sharmai Wheaton (34th, 25:15), Rianne Coale (47th, 26:29) and Katie Fraser (65th,

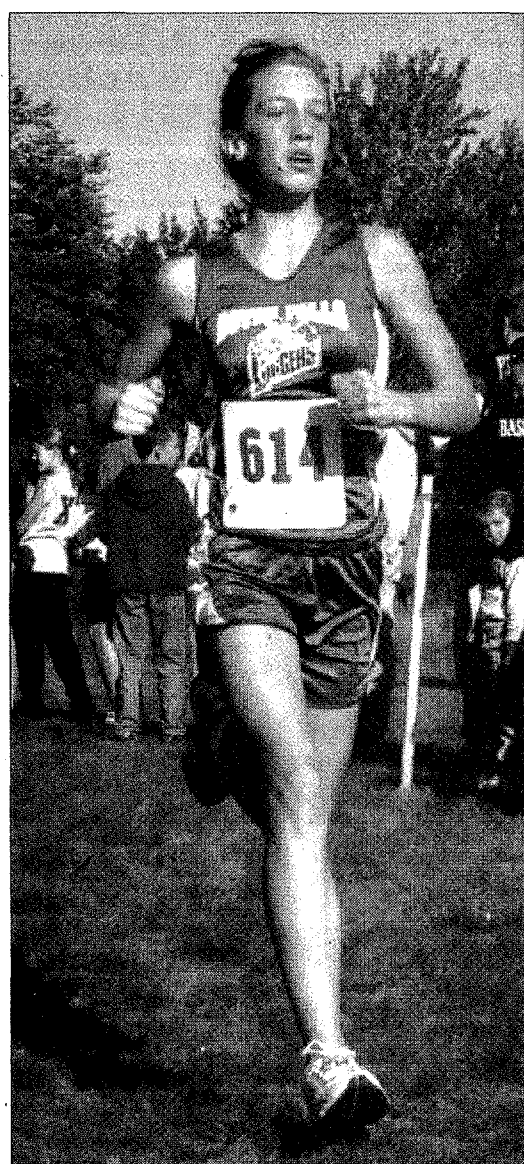

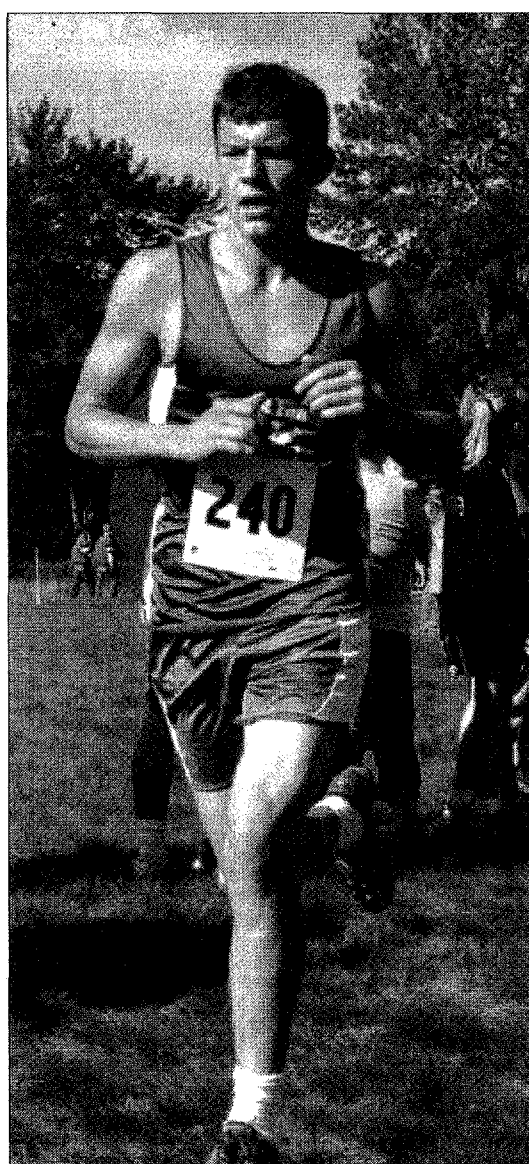

Jessica Kynsz pounded down 13 kills and had seven solo blocks. Caitlyn Wonski had nine kills and Hanna Haulser had six.

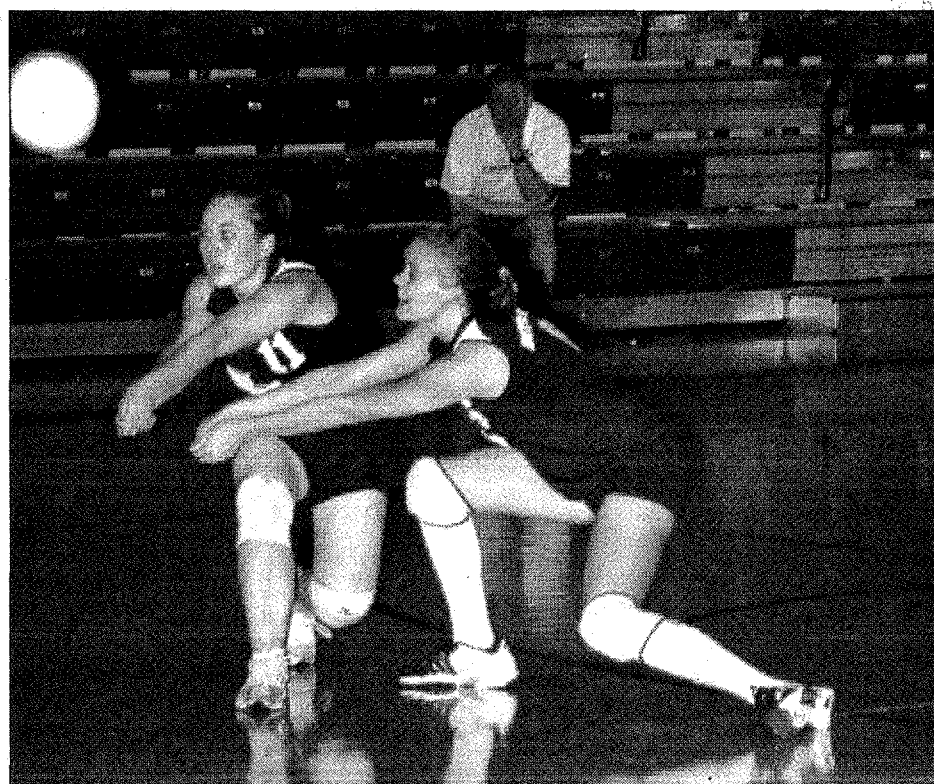
