Rambler girls beat Grayling, Harbor Springs Improve record to 8-6

BOYNE CITY — A pair of victories last week lifted the Boyne City girls basketball team's record to 8-6 overall leading into a big week in the Lake Michigan Conference.

The Ramblers got off to quick starts in both games and never looked back in dusting off Grayling, 62-25, and Harbor Springs, 60-25.

Shelby Mittig had a big game against the Vikings, firing in 23 points, including 5-of-7 from 3-point range. Trisha Tomkins contributed 9 and Natasha Bell added 8.

Laura Boylan led the Vikings with 12 points. Mittig found her shooting touch early, and the Ramblers rode her hot hand to a 24-12 first-quarter lead.

Boyne kept the pres-

sure on the Vikings the rest of the way, stretching its lead to 31 points, 47-16, at the half.

It was 60-20 after three quarters. With everyone getting into the game, Boyne had some trouble keeping its offense together and settled for just 2 points in the third period while the Vikings tallied 5.

All but one of the Ramblers scored. Jessica Knysz had 7 points, Allison Aown scored 4, T. Sessions and Maddie Moeke added 3 each and Caitlyn Wonski and Katie Sweet contributed 2 apiece.

The Ramblers shot 23-of-52 from 2-point range for 44.2 percent and were 6-of-15 beyond the 3-point arc for 40 percent. They made 10-of-17 free throws (58.8 percent).

Hilary Urman led the Ramblers with 10 rebounds while Knysz

hauled down 8 boards. Bell distributed 3 assists and had 2 steals. Knysz also had 3 assists.

Tomkins and Urman had 5 steals apiece to lead the defense, while Mittig had 4.

Boyne opened a 17-8 lead at the end of the first quarter against Harbor Springs, and extended that to 38-20 at the half. It was 55-22 at the end of three.

Knysz led the way with 14 points, Tomkins added 12 and Aown contributed 8. Mittig and Moeke each had 7, Sweet scored 6 and Wonski, Urman and Butler had 2 apiece.

Sweet ripped down 15 rebounds, Wonski grabbed 12 and Urman had 10. Aown led the team with 5 steals, Mittig had 4 and Tomkins and Urman picked off 3 each.

Caitlyn Reeves was the Rams' leading scorer with 11 points.

Boyne girls win Lake Michigan Conference ski race

Competing in a Lake Michigan Conference meet at Nubs Knob, the Ramblers used that depth to come away with a first place finish.

The Ramblers swept past Traverse City St.

Francis and Harbor Springs, scoring 62 points while the Gladiators had 88 and the Rams finished with 94.

Allison Wright paced the Ramblers in the giant slalom, taking second place overall behind Alli Moordian of Harbor Springs.

Kaitlyn Bohnet was fourth in the giant slalom, followed by Kelsey Kruzell in 13th, Morgan Harding in 17th, Megan Cytacki in 25th and Cristina

Roland in 36th.

Wright finished third in the slalom event, behind first place winner Katherine Rowley of Charlevoix/East Jordan and runner-up Lillian Wiley of St. Francis.

Boyne City also picked up a fourth place finish from Bohnet, while Kruzell was 13th and Harding took 17th. Cytacki finished 25th and Roland was 34th.

Wright also led the Ramblers in the giant

slalom with a second place, followed by Harding in fifth, Roland sixth, Kruzell 12th, Bohnet 21st and Brenna Cheadle 23rd.

Boyne City finished second in the boys' race behind Harbor Springs, scoring 61 points to 42 for the Rams.

The Rams dominated the race, capturing three of the top five spots in both the giant slalom and slalom events.

Caleb McNamara had the best finish for

the Ramblers in the giant slalom, coming in third. Sterling Adgate had a fifth in the slalom to lead the Ramblers.

Following behind Adgate in the slalom for the Ramblers were Cartwright in sixth, McNamara in seventh, Tom Hague in 10th, Joe Shear in 34th and Nick Simeri placed 37th.

Simeri finished ninth in the giant slalom, followed by Cartwright in 10th, Hague in 13th and Shear in 14th.

"They totally dominated us right from the beginning. They were quicker and stronger - that was the big difference," said Hamilla.

Boyne City wasted little time forging leads of 25-9 after one quarter and upping the margin to 51-20 at the end of the

first half. The Ramblers led 70-26 at the end of the third quarter.

Spencer Caverly led the Boyne City scoring with 12 points, while Grubaug led Boyne Falls with 10 points.

Boyne Falls will be home for its next two games against Atlanta on Wednesday, Jan. 30 and Alba on Friday, Feb. 1.

EAST JORDAN — It's a winter's day and the only sounds are a gentle whoosh from cross-country skis gliding along the snow, the chirp of a bird or the snort of a surprised deer.

Aspen Grove XC Center, a new enterprise near East Jordan and located on the Wagbo Peace Center's 212 acres of land, is a paradise for cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. Owner and operator Lou Awodey will throw in lessons, educational nature tours and children's programs, and with his background that's a monumental benefit.

Awodey opened Aspen Grove after managing and teaching skiing at Boyne Mountain's cross-country center for 22 years.

"I was looking for a place with a

variety of terrain to open a center," he said. "This area has the beauty of the north woods environment. There are conifer plantations, hardwoods, fields and meadows. It's pristine and quiet."

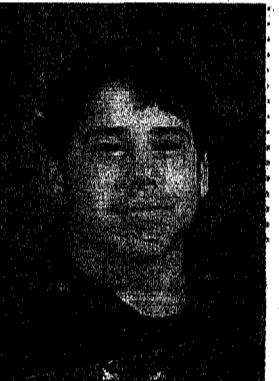

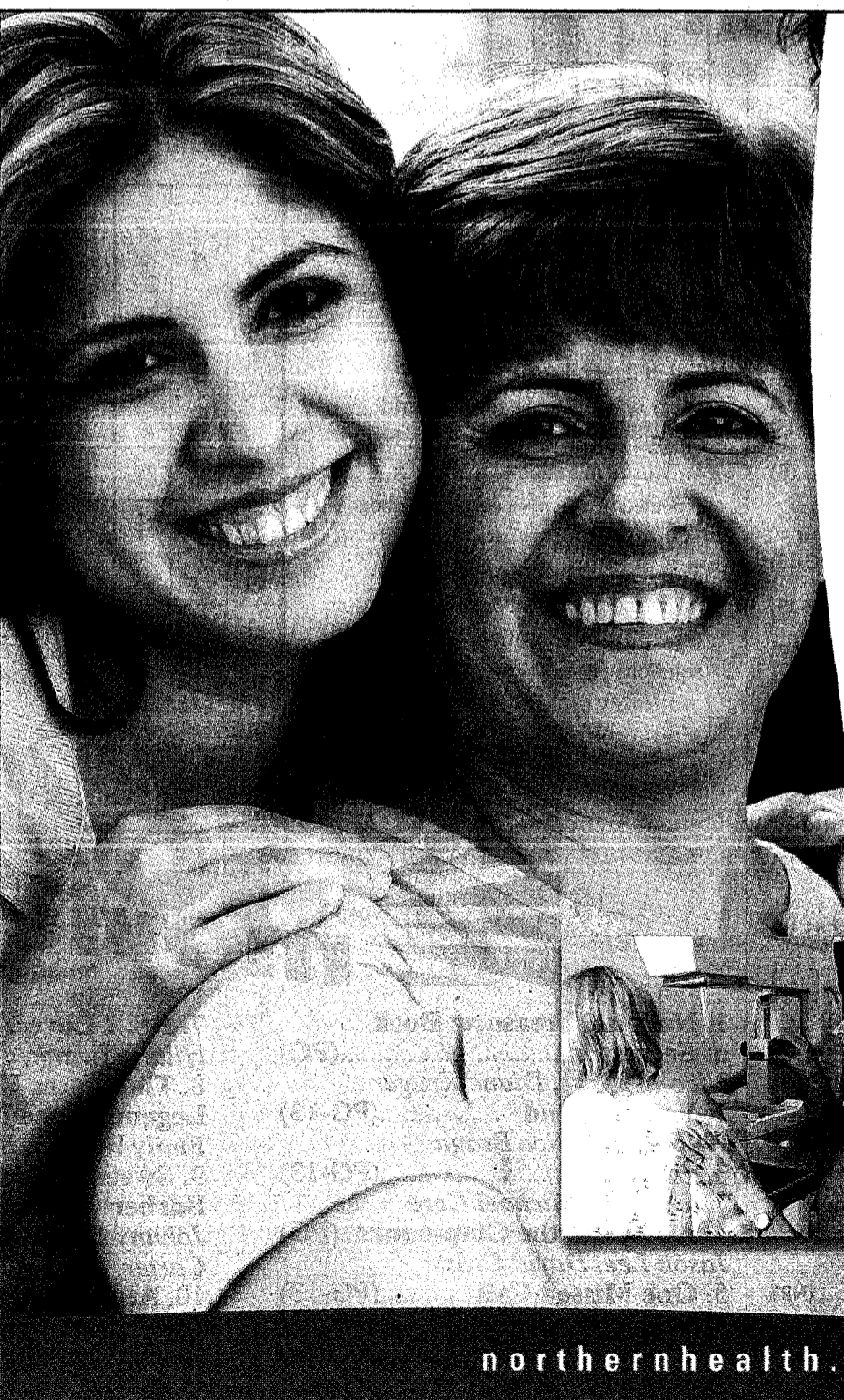

Chocolate & Blood Pressure

A small study of older adults with hypertension (high blood pressure) or prehypertension reported that a daily bite of antioxidant-rich dark chocolate may slightly lower blood pressure. Participants were told to eat a small square of dark or white chocolate (about 30 calories worth) each day for 18 weeks. Dark chocolate contains flavanols that are believed to improve blood vessel function. The dark chocolate eaters lowered both systolic and diastolic numbers by a few points. White chocolate eaters saw no change. The key was eating only a small amount per day to avoid weight gain because extra pounds would cancel out the benefit.
