# Bicycle Club addresses concerns for area cyclists

BOYNE CITY — The North Country Bicycle Club of Boyne City first met in October of 2007 to determine what concerns exist in the community with regards to cycling. The results were many that fell into three main categories that include safety, education and establishing a bike friendly community.

"The most interesting finding was that there were such diverse opinions about cyclists. Each individual had a totally different perspective and they learned from each other," Michael Sheean, president of NCBC, said. "They wanted to support safe cycling on our roads.

Since October, the committee has met twice, in early November and again in March to brainstorm suggestions and implement proposals. Many initiatives are under way with new ideas still being formed.

Donna Moll, the steering committee coordinator, has been heavily involved in the group and joined the club because of her interest in cycling. She is also a citizen in Boyne and saw a need for a coordinated effort on various parts of the city for bikers and motorists to all get on the same page as far as what they are doing and what their

"I first approached the city road commissioner and then the city itself, Mike Cain and the head of the Main Street department and the Chamber of Commerce," Moll said. "I also spoke with law enforcement and biker and motor representatives and we found a secretary to take notes. Every-

body cooperated in getting the meeting going and we just took it from there.'

The main purpose of the committee is to establish attainable goals to make the biking roads in Boyne City safer and more people friendly while educating the general public. The NCBC already has over 130 members from the local community and within that group they organize bike rides for all levels.

"We don't have many kids, we do it during the week when kids are in school and we haven't adopted our kids program yet, that is one of our future programs," Moll explained. "We will have bike rides for kids in early May that is one of the community efforts of the police. They will be working with these other groups that will be directly focused for children and parents from elementary age to junior high levels."

The NCBC has many upcoming events that include a Bike Safety Rally, a Pink Ribbon Ride for breast cancer, Make a Wish for people with terminal cancer, Ride the Charx, which is a ride around Charlevoix and this year will be hosting the DALMAC, which is for Dick Allen and the ride goes from Lansing to Mackinaw.

Another program called Ride of Silence is planned later this year and the purpose is to remember any biker killed in an auto related accident and is also a national event.

According to Moll, there has been a sizeable increase in bicycling interest and activity in the Boyne City area and the NCBC wants to address any concerns through education, safety and creating a bike friendly community.

# East Jordan man charged with child abuse

CHARLEVOIX — Phillip Ray Chipman, of East Jordan, was arraigned on Friday, March 28, in the Charlevoix County District Court on several charges including child abuse. The Sheriff's Office may have future charges of

child pornography.
Chipman, 43, faces five counts of criminal sexual misconduct in the first degree that carry a maximum penalty of life imprisonment, two counts of child abuse in the third degree and two counts of furnishing alcohol to minors. An additional charge includes one count of contractor fraud-fraudulent use of building contractor fund that carries six months to three years in jail.

The charges are based on a sexual and abusive relationship with a minor that goes back almost 10 years. Chipman is being held with no bond in the Charleyoix County Jail and entered a not-guilty plea. Prosecuting Attorney John Jarema's Office authorized the felony charges.

On Monday, March 31, additional charges had been authorized by Jarema's office that includes three counts of "Child Sexually Abusive Material" each count a 20 year felony.

The Sheriff's Officers traveled to Little Rock, Arkansas, to apprehend the suspect earlier this month after he tried to flee from the law seven weeks ago. It took about 45 days to put the case together.

"We had concerned citizens bring it to our attention and I assigned three deputies to work on it until

we got it solved because it was involving a minor child," Sheriff George T. Lasater said. "The three deputies worked very hard, the subject realized we were after him and he took off, we tracked him down. You can run but you can't hide."

Lasater credited Lt. Patrick Avery for his participation after Avery took a six week computer forensic certification class. The case had a lot to do with computers and the Sheriff had his own expert on hand that limited the time frame to get Chipman charged and arrested.

The allegations were reported on Jan. 22 by a younger sibling of the victim who said Chipman had been taping the abuse. The Sheriff's office seized Chipman's computer and hard drive after getting a search warrant based on the allegations. Chipman then fled with the 17-year-old victim and an 18-year-old to avoid arrest.

Charlevoix County Sheriff Sgt. Chuck Vondra apprehended Chipman in Arkansas on March 14 working with law offices from Texas, Missouri and Arkansas along with other sources. On Feb. 25, the victim and the 18-year-old girl were picked up in Missouri after a nationwide pick-up order had been issued in

Charlevoix's probate court.

In a court document,
Chipman allegedly beat and molested the then 9-year-old victim since 1999. Chipman was convicted for delivery of a controlled substance in

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## Dive Team lacks adequate equipment


area of water is 70 percent, which extends all the way to the Beaver Island chain. With so much territory to cover, Sheriff George T. Lasater and his divers have the daunting responsibility to recover victims who have drowned in Charle-

voix County. "Under Michigan statute County Sheriffs in the state of Michigan have a statutory responsibility to recover and retrieve anybody who has drowned," Lasater explained. "With all the lakes in and around Charlevoix County, unfortunately that occasion does occur.'

If the waterways are in the city limits of an incorporated city the local police will secure the victim. If it's in the township, which most of the lakes are, it becomes Lasater's responsi-

In Lasater's case there is never hope of bringing someone out alive as the Sheriff is only called in to

# **Boyne City proposes** truck route

BOYNE CITY — City officials have proposed a new route for trucks to use when traveling through downtown. Plans were presented to city commissioners at a March 25 meeting at City Hall.

The proposed route travels on West Division Street from Sidney Street and on East Division Street from

M-75 at Crest Court and Reh Lane. The route intersects with South Lake Street and continues through downtown westerly to the Boyne City Charlevoix Road. In addition, another portion of the truck route travels East on State Street, or M-75, between River Street and North Street.

Police Chief Randy Howard and other officials are working with the Michigan Department of Transportation on permanent routing for truck traffic. The city is also working on signs to designate the truck route and on signs for crosswalks. The city hopes to have crosswalk signs in place by Memorial Day.

Commissioners are reviewing the city budget for 2009 and will hold a public hearing at 7 p.m., Tuesday, April 22. City manager Michael Cain said that the

# **Snow plentiful** for ski season

BOYNE FALLS — The past winter season with its snowfall and cold temperatures gave a rest to the snow-making machines at

Boyne Mountain ski resort and brought more skiers to the area. In comparing this winter with the several seasons

prior, Boyne Mountain General Manager, Ed Grice, noted the benefits of this season's weather. "The biggest thing is we

haven't had to make snow," Grice said. "There were significant warm spells in the last few years."

Once past the Christmas holidays the weather was

consistently cooperative for outdoor activities and winter enthusiasts.

"We've had 135 inches of natural snow so far this year, and have a base of 85 inches," Grice said. Some of the past several seasons had less than 100 inches of natural snow.

With the ideal conditions, the resort saw an increase in business, Grice

"We're up about 10 percent for the year and we're pleased, considering the economy in the state.'

Boyne Mountain is open daily until April 13. After that date it will be open on weekends for as long as weather permits,

# Recreation trail construction funds sought from state

**CHARLEVOIX** COUNTY — Construction of a recreational trail may be a long way off, but the first step to obtain state funding was taken when county commissioners approved the submission of an application to the state on March 26.

The application will seek \$400,000 from the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund. The first phase of the trail is estimated to cost \$1.1 million.

There are two phases and the entire project is estimated to cost \$3.1 million. The county will also seek federal transportation funds. donations from foundations, private contributions and from townships along the trail route. The townships are Bay, Charlevoix, Evangeline and Hayes.

The trail will run parallel to C-56, the City-Charle-Boyne voix Road. Phase one will start at the Boyne City city limits and extend to Horton Bay, which is about five miles. Phase Two of

the trail will run from Horton Bay to U.S. 31 where it will hook up to the existing Little Traverse Wheelway. The Wheelway begins in Charlevoix Township and extends to Petoskey.

Questions were raised at the March 26 county commission meeting about funding the construction of the non-motorized trail while money cannot be found to repair the Boyne City-Charlevoix Road or other county roads.

"I'm concerned that we can't find \$5 million to fix the Boyne City-Charlevoix Road," said county

commission chairman Chris Christensen, who represents Boyne City and Evangeline Township. "And it's not just the Boyne City-Charlevoix Road, there are other county

roads that need repair.' Christensen said he understands that the Department of Natural Resources' funds are set aside as recreational funds only, but noted that no one had the foresight to set aside road repair funds.

Christensen said he appreciates the DNR taking care of the natural resources and that he thinks the trail will benefit the area. "But we have to take

ture too," he said. "Our infrastructure is a vital component to this area's economy." The county has

care of our infrastruc-

agreed to maintain the trail, but has not committed any money to its construction. Commis-County

sioner Joel Evans who represents the city of East Jordan and South Arm Township asked about people who use the trail paying a fee to help fund the trail.

County planning director Larry Sullivan said that it has been discussed, but it may cost more to enforce user fees than is collected.

Sullivan said the benefits from tourism are significant. A survey was conducted when the Little Trav-Wheelway erse opened and it found that many of the people using the trail were from outside the Northern Michigan area. The chambers of commerce received more than 500 requests for lodging and other information, he said.

look for the body if the person is deceased. Currently the Sheriff's office employs two divers, after one member recently left, and each is certified from an outside organization. From 1998 to 2007.

Dive Team operations at the Sheriff's office have had 118 dives that include searching for drowning victims, evidence, victims in other counties and training. In 1998 the number of dives was limited to two but that number has increased to 21 in

"It's our responsi-bility to find the body so the family, friends and neighbors can help put this to rest and deal with the tragedy and bury their loved ones," Lasater "Unfortunately said. for us, due to me being unsuccessful securing funds, most of our dive equipment is personal that belong to the divers themselves. I ney have to go nome, get it out and load it into the patrol car."

The Sheriff feels his team lacks the adequate equipment needed when going on dives.

Lasater said other counties have top-ofthe-line equipment and his office has very limited gear to meet the responsibilities of the Sheriff's office.

'When we show up for a dive, whether it's training or to recover somebody, normally two counties come to our assistance, usually Emmet and Antrim who are our closest neighbors," Lasater said. "They have top of the line equipment, they have either a van or some trailer type apparatus that they put all their equipment in and they just hook up and

The Sheriff is concerned about his divers' safety when it comes to the equipment and also for the families of the victims. Lasater understands loved ones want the body recovered as quickly as possible but he feels they are hindered with a slower response time due to the

logistics.
"We send out divers to do something very dangerous, diving in the water, staying down looking for a deceased person, that is a dangerous operation especially through the ice," Lasater added "We

want the top of the line equipment so we can keep our deputies and divers safe.'

Lasater credited the county commissioners for trying to help secure funds for his divers and also the Department of Natural Resources. The DNR has recently had their funds cut and for the marine patrol, diving and anything to do with the water in the state of Michigan, the Sheriff gets reimbursement funding from the DNR and most of their budget is from them. Unfortunately they have not been able to







### Heel Pain -**Plantar Fasciitis**

Heel pain may be due to

an inflammation of the thick band of tissue on the bottom of the foot. This can be the result of wearing high heels or thin-soled flats, strenuous exercise, excess weight, flat feet or high arches. 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

# Injection well raises many questions

Permits were issued on Feb. 7 to drill for an underground well and transport contamination from Bay Harbor to Alba in Star Township. Friends of the Jordan River and Star Township have appealed the

If the DEQ allows CMS to transport and dispose of cement kiln dust, a liquid waste that contains heavy metals with lead, arsenic and mercury with a pH of bleach, into a deep injection well in Alba there

are still many questions to answer. Recent scientific studies have shown fractures in the underground "containment" layer of rock and yet the DEQ and the U.S. Army Core of Engineers still have given the okay to CMS to move forward. This disturbing revelation should concern all citizens with Alba and Mancelona as the headwaters of the rivers of Michigan that include

the Jordan, the Boyne, the Manistee, the Cedar and the Au Sable. Even with the information learned about the toxicity of leachate, the DEQ and Army Core of Engineers are still allowing this to happen. Even the smallest risk of contamination is too much for the rivers and this line of action has to be scrutinized on every angle.

Citizens should stand up and demand the EPA designate cement kiln dust leachate as hazardous waste and hopefully order CMS to contain the waste rather than dump it into the injection well

One solution by the Friends of the Jordan River, based in East Jordan, and Star Township for the waste was initially disregarded by government agencies and CMS. Is the solution to encapsulate the kiln dust piles really the right idea? Contamination occurs when water mixes with the kiln dust that forms the leachate.

Why is the waste being moved from one backyard to another? Many residents are upset about the decision by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality and the federal Environmental Protection Agency to issue the permits.

The Friends of the Jordan River has worked diligently with Star Township to try and sway the government that this is the wrong method. There is so much at risk with dumping the cement kiln dust into the underground well and every angle should be exhausted before moving forward with this decision.


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### Get your **WorldSeries** tickets now

Jeff Passan at Yahoo Sports, who wouldn't pick the Tigers even if they signed Babe Ruth and Sandy Koufax, writes, "Sorry, but the Tigers need relief pitching badly, and they gutted their farm system ... so, no, they're not the favorite." Passan doesn't even like the Tigers in the AL Central, let alone the World Series. The "gutted their farm system" argument might apply five years down the road, but I don't see how it matters in 2008.

But, the Tigers' perceived defi-ciencies in relief pitching is convenient for those who create the conventional wisdom, because then they can rationalize their hero worship of Boston, New York, and even L.Ā, which will see a spike in media attention this year because of ex-Yankee manager Joe Torre's new job as the Dodgers' manager. The media loves a spectacle, and what better than the scorned-lover appeal of a Yankees-Dodgers matchup?

Meanwhile, the Red Sox and Yankees cheerleading squad, otherwise known as ESPN, will continue to fill up their nationally televised games with teams from those markets. Ever notice how the only time Detroit makes it on ESPN is when they're playing New York, Boston or the L.A. Angels? That's fine, I like Mario and Rod on FSN better anyway. Rod, especially, never met a superlative he didn't like.

Before you write me off as a total homer who eats sour grapes for breakfast, let me admit that the Tigers do have some problems with their bullpen. Todd "The Bus Boy" Jones is a good example. I call him The Bus Boy because the first thing he does when he gets in the game is set the table, usually with a single, a walk (after being up 0-2), and then a dribbler to the mound that he promptly throws into right field. I don't feel comfortable when he comes into the game unless the Tigers are up by at least six runs and my anesthesiologist is on call.





Stephen Curry is a wonder. There might be better players in the country. There is, however, none more compelling. The kid looks like he just came out of an eighth-grade CYO game, yet plays like Kobe Bryant. But he kept missing during the second half. He was 4-of-13 from the field after the intermission.

With the game on the line and double-teamed, he passed to teammate Jason Richards, whose game-winning attempt at

the buzzer was far off the mark.

Curry, who had more than 30 points in the first three postseason games, has been the best story of this tournament, but Kansas made his life miserable Sunday. He got 25 shots, but didn't get 25 open shots, that's for sure.

Davidson proved to be more

than a one-man team, though. Seldom-used Bryant Barr came off the bench to hit all four of his field goal tries during the second half — three from beyond the 3point stripe — to keep Davidson in the game.

Usually when those type of stories develop, it means a win. The Wildcats still lost.

Davidson coach Bob McKillop said the last game trumps the previous four months.

"My father was a New York City cop," he said. "And he'd say how he always made sure to polish the back of his heels because it was the last thing people would see as he walked away."

McKillop's message is a genuine one. His team wasn't just happy to be here. They were here to win. Not doing so was bitterly disappointing.

The bigger picture and time will be far less harsh to Davidson, though.

Enchanting isn't usually a term that is apropos when it comes to hard-fought athletic contests, but it does fit David-
