Murder trial to begin The Boyne City Police

CHARLEVOIX - Jury selection begins on April 15 in the case of an East Jordan area man who is accused of murdering his brother. The trial is set for April 16-24.

Charles Merriman's trial follows days of motions recently heard and ruled upon by Charlevoix County Circuit Court Judge Richard

M. Paitas. The motions were brought mostly by Merriman's attorneys, Dan Hartman and Michael At-chison, but some were brought by Charlevoix County Prosecutor John Jarema.

Most of the motions were to exclude information from the trial and varied from a motion by defendant Merriman to exclude statements he made while in jail, to a motion to exclude

his religious beliefs. Both of those motions were granted.

Charles's brother, William Merriman, has not been seen or heard from since June 2006, according to court records. However, even though no body has been found, the case was brought against Charles based on blood DNA found at the Merriman home. Blood was found on an ax, carpeting and a door,

among other places in the house. Charles told investigators that William had cut his hand while tearing up carpeting

Charles had been living in the parents' home on Phelps Road and the parents were in an area care facility. William, who had been living near Grand Rapids, was making plans to bring their father home to care for him, court records show.

The case was under investigation for more than a year and has taken detectives to a landfill down state where evidence was found, to a search for a missing freezer from the Merriman house on Phelps Road.

More than 60 witnesses are expected to be called to testify at the trial.

BOYNE CITY - The Michigan Northern Cancer Crusaders will be hosting a 50s party called 'Rock Around the Clock for Cancer" on Saturday, April 19, to help local families and friends cope with the impact of cancer. The event will start at 6 p.m. and be held at the Eagles Hall in Boyne.

The non-profit organization also promotes research and education and all proceeds from local fundraising are donated back to the community. NMCC started in 2005 and has brought assistance and support to local cancer patients with items such as gas cards, wigs, prostheses, airfare, transportation, hotel accommodations and social support.

We helped eight families last year, we have helped people that are three-years-old to 80," Gail Farley, a board and trustee member of NMCC "We are mostly said. based in Petoskey but I do the fundraising for the Boyne City area to raise money to help the Cancer Crusaders."

The party will feature a silent auction, prizes, a twist contest and live music with the "Ferdburys." There will be a cash bar and food available with all proceeds going to the NMĈC.

Last year the event brought in \$5,000 and this year Farley is hoping to raise that total to \$6,000. 'Right now we are helping a young lady who is 17that has cancer to get a wig. It's hard for a young person to get a wig and we also help with gas cards to get people to and from their treatments," Farley commented. "Wherever there is a need as long as it's connected to cancer we help, if there is another need we try to send them where they need to go." Farley said the NMCC branched off from the American Cancer Society a few years ago because of the need to help people in the area. The American Cancer Society helps with research but the NMCC wanted to do even more. "My husband had cancer and we were lucky, we were financially okay, but there are people that aren't okay. Even the gas cards are a tremendous help," Farley added. "The people we have helped have called us to thank us; it's just a wonderful feeling." The NMCC works closely with Northern Michigan Regional Hospital Foundation providing financial support and ideas. With all the fundraising this past year the NMCC also has been able to contribute to Camp Quality, Hospice of Little Traverse Bay, Circle of Strength and Otsego Memorial Hospital. 

Angel Food program offers significant savings on groceries

EAST JORDAN With soaring gasoline prices and other economic impacts affecting household budgets, monthly deliveries at Harvest Barn Word of Life Church in East Jordan are helping families stretch their dollars with significant savings on groceries.

The monthly deliveries at Harvest Barn from Angel Food enable residents anywhere in the area to purchase around \$60 of restaurant-grade food for \$30. No application is required and there is no limit on how many boxes may be purchased.

Angel Food, a national

non-profit program brings this benefit of buying groceries in bulk to Northern Michigan homes each month with standard food items offered in a main box for \$30. Specialty boxes, such as steak, chicken or pork, are offered for \$18 to \$20 each and one box of food is estimated to feed a family of four for one week or a single senior citizen for one month.

"Angel Food Ministries is out of Georgia, it's a nationwide organization and is growing rapidly," Richard Hardy, Administrator for Angel Food and program manager for Harvest Barn Church said. "I heard about this organization in the area and so I contacted them and registered so I

could help out. This is not affiliated with any one particular church. Throughout the area all denominations have been involved as far as the churches, not just one particular organization.'

Hardy, a Boyne City resident, said the service has no limitation based on your income; anyone can partake in the program.

'We service East Jordan and Boyne City, and surrounding areas. A lot of Petoskey people also, we would like to see someone there get involved to help people but right now there are no churches doing it," "We Hardy commented. have people who order





Their first commercial release on Skaggs Family Records was the self-titled album "Cherryholmes" and the band followed up with "Cherryholmes II: Black and White" in June 2007.

"The whole concept is that we have highpowered instrumentals that are at warp speed," Jere said. "We've got bluegrass; we've got traditional stuff from the Stanleys and Monroe. dancing onstage. "A lot of the energy when we play comes from the hard work and the long hours on the road when you're tired," Sandy said. "But then you get onstage and for all six of us, it almost blows up in a positive way. I think that has a lot to do with why we're so driven and why we can do so much.'

every month and tell us that Angel Food is how they make ends meet. Other people buy Angel Food just to cut back on their weekly grocery bills."

The payment op-tions include cash and cards distributed by the U.S. Food Stamp program. According to the service, there are no second-hand foods, no damaged or out-dated goods, no dented cans without labels and no produce that is overly ripe.

The orders and dis-tribution of the Angel Food monthly program are administered by the volunteers at Harvest Barn. To place an order you can stop by the church between 9 a.m. and noon the first and second Saturdays of each month or call for mailing information. Payment is required when placing the order. Groceries can be picked up from 10 to 11 a.m. on the last Saturday of each month at the church.

"I helped one woman carry a package out to her car. She was elderly and told me if it wasn't for this program she wouldn't have meat," Hardy said. "It was either groceries or utilities because of the cost. This put meat on her table.'

Governor proclaims Severe Weather Awareness Week

Severe weather, in the form of thunderstorms, wind storms, floods and tornadoes, is a threat to the saftey and welfare of all Michigan citizens. Governor Jennifer Granholm, in conjunction with the Michigan Committee for Severe Weather Awareness, has proclaimed April 6-12 as Severe Weather Awareness Week to educate the public about the dangers of tornadoes and other severe weather events.

With recent tornadoes striking the south, it is never too early to think about severe weather preparedness. Each year, more than 1,000 tornadoes strike the United States, including an average of 16 tornadoes in Michigan. Twentytwo tornadoes, including the first EF-3 or greater tornado in 10 years, struck Michigan last year, which is well above the average. Severe weather across the state was responsible for four deaths (three tornado fatalities and one lightning fatality), 11 injuries, and over \$150 million in damages.

Hail generated a large amount of damage across Michigan. A monster hailstorm hit downtown Marquette and surrounding areas during the afternoon of June 20. Another group of prolific hail producing storms formed in northern lower Michigan on July 5 near Long Rapids, Lachine, and Alpena, with hail as large as half-dollars covering the ground in spots. These storms then moved across the Saginaw, Flint and Detroit metro regions. Two hailstorms formed during the evening of July 26, one over Shiawassee County and the other near Adrian. Together these storms caused nearly \$7 million in damages.

Flood safety

Preparing for a flood:

 Make an itemized list of personal property well in advance of a flood occurring. Photograph the interior and exterior of your home. Store the list, photos and documents in a safe place.

•Memorize the safest and fastest route to high ground. Assemble a disaster supplies kit containing: first aid kit, canned food and can opener, bottled water, extra clothing, rubber boots and gloves, NOAA Weather Radio, battery-operated radio, emergency cooking equipment, flashlight and extra batteries.

•If you live in a frequently flooded area, keep sandbags, plastic sheets and lumber on hand to protect property. Install check valves in building sewer traps to prevent flood water from backing up into the drains of your home.

•Know the elevation of your property in relation to nearby streams and other waterways, and plan what you will do and where you will go in a flood emergency.

When a flood threatens:

•If forced to leave your

property and time permits, move essential items to safe ground, fill tanks to keep them from floating away and grease immovable machinery.

 Store a supply of drinking water in clean bathtubs and in large containers.

•Get out of areas subject to flooding. This includes dips, low spots, floodplains, etc.

During a flood: •Avoid areas subject to sudden flooding.

•Even six inches of fast moving floodwater can knock you off your feet,

Flood Facts

1. What is a flood and when do most occur?

A flood is the inundation of a normally dry area caused by an increased water level in an established watercourse, such as a river, stream, or drainage ditch, or ponding of water at or near the point where the rain fell. Floods can occur anytime during the year. However, many occur seasonally after winter snow melts or heavy spring rains.

2. What are flash floods?

Flash floods occur suddenly, usually within six hours of the rain event, and result from heavy localized rainfall or levee failures. Flash floods can begin before the rain stops. The water level on small streams may rise quickly in heavy rainstorms, especially near the headwaters of river basins. Heavy rains can also cause flash flooding in areas where the floodplain has been urbanized.

3. What are other causes of flooding in Michigan?

Ice jams and dam failures can also cause both flooding and flash flooding. 4. Are people killed as a result of floods?

Many people are killed by flash floods when driving or walking on roads and bridges that are covered by water. In fact, flash floods are the number one weatherrelated killer in the United States. Even six inches of fast-moving flood water can knock you off your feet, and a depth of only two feet of water will float many of today's automobiles. If you are in a car and water starts rising, get out and move to higher around.

5. What is a flood watch?

A flood watch indicates that flash flooding or flooding is possible within the designated WATCH area - be alert. It is issued to inform the public and cooperating agencies that current and developing weather conditions are such that there is a threat of flooding, but the occurrence is neither certain nor imminent.

6. What is a flash flood or flood warning? A flash flood or flood warning indicates that flash flooding or flooding is already occurring or imminent within the designated warning area - take necessary precautions at once. When a flash flood or flood warning is issued for your area, act quickly. Get out of areas subject to flooding and avoid areas where flooding has already occurred.

7. What is a flash flood or flood statement?

A flash flood or flood statement is used for follow-up information regarding a flash

Storm based warnings ushering in a new era

On Oct. 1, 2007, NOAA's National Weather Service began issuing Storm Based Warnings for tornadoes, severe thunderstorms, flash floods and marine hazards. Storm Based Warnings are geographically more specific for these shortduration weather events.

Why Storm Based Warnings?

Storm Based Warnings show the specific meteorological or hydrological threat area and are not restricted to geopolitical boundaries. By focusing on the true threat area, warning polygons will improve NWS warning

Lightning safety

Lightning can provide a spectacular display of light on a dark night. This awesome show of nature also causes death and destruction. Lightning is the visible discharge of electrical energy. It is often accompanied by thunder – which is a sonic boom created by the same dis-charge. If you hear thunder, lightning is a threat, even if the storm seems miles away and the sky is blue. Lightning's electrical energy seeks a path to ground your home, the trees in your yard or even you can be that chosen path.

Safety tips

1. Plan your evacuation and safety measures. At the first sign of lightning or thunder, activate your emergency plan. Lightning often precedes rain, so do not wait for the rain to begin before suspending activities.

No place is absolutely safe from lightning; however, some places are much safer than others. The safest location during lightning activity is a large enclosed building, not a picnic shelter or shed. The second safest location is an enclosed metal vehicle, car, truck, van, etc., but not a convertible, bike or other topless or soft top vehicle.

2. If outdoors, get inside a suitable shelter immediately. When a safe location is not nearby, the lightning safety community reminds you that there is no safe place to be outside in a thunderstorm. Don't kid yourself

- you are not safe outside. Being stranded outdoors when lightning is striking nearby is a harrowing experience. Your first and only truly safe choice is to get to a safe building or vehicle. If you like to camp, climb, bike (motorcycle or bicycle), boat, scuba dive, or enjoy other outdoor activities and find yourself in a place where you cannot get to a safe vehicle or shelter, outdoor safety tips are available at www.lightningsafety.noaa.gov/outdoors.htm . Over the past couple of weeks, two disturbing and alarming allegations of sexual assaults in Boyne City and East Jordan came to light. Even more appalling was the revelation that the crimes were committed against children and the reaction in town has been severe.

Sexual assault in any capacity is horrific and when a child is involved it is even more alarming. Unfortunately, this is not a one-time occurrence, these types of crimes are prevalent in our society and the main priority for the family and community for that matter should be to console the victim.

A huge amount of support is needed from family and friends as the victim is often consumed with guilt and embarrassment about the incident with mixed feelings about what happened.

It is paramount that these children know they are not at fault, and should be afforded any amount of counseling from an expert or their family. With these revelations coming out it is not uncommon for families to be torn apart and suffer a traumatic feeling of despair about the incident.

When Phillip Ray Chipman and Kevin Jerome Lounsbury were arrested and Lounsbury later sentenced to serve five to 15 years in prison after pleading guilty to a charge of third degree criminal sexual conduct, they permanently took a piece of innocence away from a child.

No sentence could possibly be enough for these predators and Lounsbury estimated his abuse of a child between the age of 13 and 16 was in the "hundreds." Fairness on sentencing is a story for another day but in the end these are some of the worst type of criminals.

What we as a community need to do is give privacy where it is needed. The victims need time to heal from something they will never forget. In time we can only hope they understand it was not their fault and go on to live a normal productive life.

We are outraged as a society that something so horrible can happen in our small towns, so let's remember to help victims when we can and also afford them privacy and time.

Let's pray for the victims that had to go through such a harrowing experience.

Booster seat legislation becomes law

LANSING --- Legislation requiring all children under the age of eight and shorter than 4 feet 9 inches tall to be securely fastened in a child safety seat has been signed by the governor. Senate Bill 82, now Public Act 43, will go into effect July 1.

'As a parent and a legislator that has been working on this issue for the past five years, I was proud for Michigan today to watch this measure become law," said bill sponsor Sen. Michelle A. McManus, R-Lake Leelanau. "Too many of our young children are not secured in a booster seat, risking serious injury in a crash. This legislation will

instantly increase child safety and inform parents of the potential dangers of not using a booster seat.

A University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute study shows parents are more likely to use booster seats if there is a law requiring it.

More than 90 percent of children between ages four and eight, who are seriously injured in auto accidents, are not restrained in a booster seat.

Michigan becomes the 39th state to adopt an expanded safety seat.

Senate approves retail incubator legislation

LANSING — The Senate today approved a measure that allows the creation of retail incubators, a key concept in a comprehensive, bipartisan downtown development package sponsored by Sen. Jason Allen and other members of the Senate Commerce and Tourism Committee

Allen's Senate Bill 970 establishes several parameters for retail incubators if a Downtown Development Authority decides to create one. An incubator is a facility that houses several businesses that share common costs and equipment.

The goal is to help nurture early stage businesses," said Allen, R-Traverse City. "By sharing resources new companies can better manage start-up costs to successfully open their business."

The legislation gives preference to tenants who provide goods or services not currently available in the downtown area. Under the legislation, incubator businesses can only stay in the incubator for 18 months.

Allen, who chairs the Senate Commerce and Tourism Committee, said retail incubators also increase access to capital, provide access to entrepreneurship education and help improve a local community's image.

Normally, retail incubators provide shared equipment and services that would otherwise be unavailable or unaffordable to help businesses cut costs. Receptionist services, photocopying and conference rooms are the most popular items.

The downtown development package was introduced after several months of hearings throughout the state. Allen and other committee members heard from municipal leaders in Ann Arbor, Port Huron, Grand Rapids, Midland, Detroit, Traverse City and Kalamazoo that vibrant downtowns are critical for the economic health of a community. They told lawmakers that vibrant downtowns foster and attract innovative businesses and are a key element to recruitment of personnel for local businesses

"Downtowns of all shapes and sizes play a key role in fostering new businesses and the entrepreneurs looking at investment in our cities want to see development that allows for quality work life, family life and social life experiences," Allen said. "Both large and small downtowns must reinvent themselves to attract business that will be the backbone of the 21st century economy. The state's economy will be greatly enhanced by vibrant downtowns where our citizens can work, raise families, shop and find an enjoyable quality of life.'

SB 970 now goes to the House for further consideration.

The Veteran of the Month for April 2008 is Benjamin Joseph Kondrat. Born April 14, 1923, in Boyne Valley Township, Kondrat left school in 1938, having completed the ninth grade, to work on the family farm and in 1940 became a bartender at the Rainbow Gardens Tavern, located between Boyne Falls and Boyne City. Kondrat accepted a job offer moving to Roval Oak, and went to work at the Silver Moon Tavern in Troy.

On March 24, 1943, he was inducted into the Army and was assigned to inactive status in the Enlisted Reserve Corps. On March 31, 1943, Kondrat entered into active service at Kalamazoo and was transferred to Camp Gordon, Ga. Following basic training, where he received a military qualification of expert with the 30 caliber sub machine gun, Kondrat received additional training required for combat reconnaissance.

On July 2, 1944, he departed the United States, arriving in the European and Middle Eastern Theater of Operations on July 15, 1944. He was assigned to the 3rd Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, serving as a gunner, and participating in the following battles and campaigns: Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes, and Central Europe. On July 1, 1945 Kondrat departed the European and Middle Eastern Theater of Operations arriving in the United States on July 10, 1945. On Oct. 29, 1945, at the Separation Center, Fort Bragg, N.C., he received an honorable discharge having attained the rank of Corporal/Technician

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

Give Your Driveway A Good Cleaning

Take a look at your driveway. Is it stained with oil, grease and moss? Is the appearance of it starting to drive you crazy? Don't replace it. Give it a good cleaning and see if that won't do the trick. You could have many more years left in your driveway

and save yourself the hassle and expense of replacing it.

No matter how hard you try to keep your driveway stain-free, sometimes it just doesn't work. Animal and pest residue, along with oil and transmission fluid leaks, and other accidents can leave any driveway a mess. If you have stains on your driveway, take these steps to clean it:

1. Purchase a bag of cat litter and scatter some of it on each stain on the driveway.


2. Cover the litter with newspaper and let it stand overnight.

3. Remove the litter and dab some non-bleaching powdered laundry detergent onto each stain. Moisten the detergent enough to make a paste and let it stand overnight.

4. Remove much of the detergent paste, add some water to the remaining paste and scrub the area with a heavy wire brush.

5. Rinse off the detergent paste and allow the sun to fade away any remaining stains.

6. Once all of the stains are removed, power-wash the driveway and cover it with an exterior sealer



to your driveway at least once a year, but hopefully, it will repel stains for many months to come. Depending upon the area where you live, you may also have

some moss on your driveway. You know, that combination of bacteria, mildew and mold that grows in damp areas with little sunlight and makes the driveway slippery on wet days. To get rid of the moss on your driveway, you need to use a strong bleach solution and follow these steps: 1. Sweep off the driveway.


2. Hose down any vegetation next to the driveway that you could overspray with the bleach solution. This will protect it from burns.

3. Don a pair of safety glasses and gloves, and make a mixture of one part bleach to two parts water.

4. Pour the bleach solution into a pump sprayer and saturate the mossy areas of the driveway. 5. Let the bleach solution stand for 15 minutes and then scrub and rinse.

6. Repeat the procedure as often as needed.

With any luck, you will remove most of the stains and moss from your driveway and it will stay clean for quite some time. You won't have to spend a fortune on replacement and can put the money toward something else.



Their last game they had gotten destroyed by the Mavs, so to loosen up the players Pat Riley played the Doobie Brothers, "Listen to the Music," and danced around the locker room. It worked! They won the game and later that same year, the Championship. Uncle Bill lives in Florida with his wife, Karen and their two children, Eric and Kaylee. BOYNE CITY — It's been difficult to properly evaluate the team's progress with workouts confined to the gym, but Boyne City varsity baseball coach Chris Weston is confident the Ramblers will be good this spring. Whether they'll be good

Whether they'll be good enough to contend for the Lake Michigan Conference championship and a district title remains open to question.

After all, they haven't stepped on the field yet, or swung a bat in actual competition.

Still, based on what the Ramblers have coming back from last spring, it's clear they'll be an improved ball club.

The Ramblers have the pitching and defense to compete with any team on their schedule, anchored by veteran Robby Jensen who'll start the first game of most doubleheaders and play shortstop when he's not on the hill.

Jensen's presence gives the Ramblers a productive leader who is also a calming influence in times of stress.

Weston took over the program last year, and spent his time concentrating on finding out where the players fit the best.

As a result, he didn't pay much attention to the opposing teams and isn't concerned so much with which ones look to be strong in the conference again.

He's focused on getting his team ready to play each time out, and with the veterans he has in the lineup that shouldn't be difficult.

"It's a good mix between young talent and experience," Weston said. "First of all, I have all my pitchers back.

"Last year was my first year with Boyne City. I've been in baseball a long time. I just implemented a few things, and worked with my pitching staff."

So, naturally Weston expects the pitching to be the strength of the team.

Weston limited Jensen's innings because he wanted to look at some of the other players in pitching roles.

But this year, he's turning him loose.

Also coming back is Jarred Forbes, a junior who really developed into a solid pitcher toward the end of last season.

Kolbi Schumaker is a freshman Weston brought up from the junior varsity whom he feels can pitch effectively at the varsity level. Trever Kruzel, an All-Con-

Trever Kruzel, an All-Conference basketball player, didn't play baseball last year but will be the Ramblers' fourth pitcher.

"He makes us real solid, because he's such a great athlete he can play anywhere," Weston said.

"I think those four are as good as any you've got in

northern Michigan."

Nick Young, an All-Conference centerfielder as a freshman last year, also returns. Sophomore Dalton Looze will be the starting catcher for the Ramblers, allowing Weston to put Kruzel wherever he's needed.

The only question mark for the Ramblers is in the outfield, where there are no returning starters.

But, there are four seniors currently battling for the three starting positions and whoever hits the ball will probably be out there for the opener. "On the infield, I'm solid as a rock," Weston said. "No matter who is on the mound, I can interchange things.

"The other senior who has a lot of experience was Kelly Austin, and he was my catcher last year.

"But, because of being able to put Dalton Looze back there, I can put (Austin) anywhere. He'll probably play first base for us." Although last year was one of transition as Weston became familiar with the team, Boyne City did put everything together for one game in the district and knocked off Charlevoix.

So, they know they're capable of playing well enough to win in the tournament.

"I know what they're capable of," Weston said. "Last year, we weren't a very good hitting team. But, that wasn't our focus.

"Our focus was looking at the pitching staff, and defensively to see what we had and what we could do. This year, we focused a little more on hitting.

"I think hitting, at the high school level, is more attitude than anything. I think we'll have a decent hitting team.

Nearly \$139 million in salaries this year. More than \$152 million for eight years to Miguel Cabrera alone. The numbers, quite frankly, are mind-numbing. Beyond the comprehension of mere mortals.

"Do you ever get the feeling," I asked John Westhoff, the Tigers' bespectacled lead lawyer and chief negotiator who deals out those eight-digit contracts, "that you are playing with Monopoly money?"

Westhoff smiled. None of it is his money, of course, but that doesn't mean Westhoff hasn't had his share of nervous nights.

Nobody Cabrera. wants to take a ride on the Reading anymore. When you pass "Go," collect \$200 not that 200 bucks buys much in baseball

these days. Three box seats at Comerica Park, that's about it. Or that would be it, if somebody else didn't already own them all. And there is no end

to the frenzied spending in sight — not if the Tigers want to keep winning. (I realize winning is a touchy subject right now, but we are looking at the big picture here.)

The Tigers' payroll this season is just south of \$140 million, either at \$138.7 or \$137.7 million, depending upon which school of bean-counting you graduated from.

Either way, with Cabrera and Magglio Ordonez, to name just two Tigers, both due raises next year, that payroll is sure to soar

even more. We can only shake our heads and wonder how long the otherwise-distressed Detroit market can sustain that.

Attendance at Comerica Park is as close to capacity as it can reasonably get. Ticket prices are set. Raising them dramatically at this juncture probably would not be wise ---although the Lions would, no doubt, disagree. TV revenues, while substantial under the Tigers' fat new contract with Fox, are fixed. And how many T-shirts, caps and replica jerseys can a team can

Where is all that additional cash going to come from?

Say what you will about the fervor of Tiger fans. Detroit, on its best day, is still not New York or Boston. Or even Los Angeles or Chicago.

There definitely is a limit here. There has to be.

Now that Cabrera is locked into the Tigers' lineup for longer than Jim Leyland is likely to manage the team, the front office can turn its attention to the next huge contract on the horizon: That of Justin Verlander.

Verlander, the undisputed team's ace, won't actually be eligible for free agency until after the 2011 season. However, the sooner the Tigers can head off that possibility, the better — and the cheaper - it will be. As was the case

with Cabrera, who could have fled after Verlander's 2009, price is only going to keep going up.

Verlander is no dummy. He saw what Johan Santana got this winter from the New York Mets (\$137.5 million for six years). You know

he will be watching closely next fall when Cleveland's C.C. Sabathia seeks to strike it rich. Verlander is in that

same class. He is sitting in the proverbial. catbird seat. Verlander now

makes a relativelymeager \$1.15 million under the terms of the five-year, \$4.5 million contract he finally signed in 2004 draft pick. He is due \$1.23 million next

vear. But that's a moot point. Verlander will be eligible for arbitration next winter.

They can either pay him now — or pay him more later. Or, worse yet, run the risk of losing him.

The Tigers cannot afford to wait until Verlander becomes a free agent. If they do, they probably will not be able to afford him.

If he has another season this year, like his last two, the 25year-old right-hander will likely looking for \$4 million — or more – next season.

And that's just the beginning.



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

Elsenheimer's open seat draws numerous candidates

LANSING — The word from state Rep. Kevin Elsenheimer in late March that he is running for the Michigan Court of Appeals sparked the intentions of at least four citizens (thus far) to seek his seat in the Legislature.

Elsenheimer (R-Bellaire) appeared to be upward bound in his state party and perhaps national party as well Sen. John (U.S. McCain appeared with him at Boyne Mountain Resort in June 2006). So, the announcement to forego a run for a third term may have surprised some, but Elsenheimer said family responsibilities were a deciding factor.

"I love the Legislature and it's been an honor to serve Northern said Elsenheimer. know that in the next term I probably would have been the Republican House leader.'

But, when he heard that Court of Appeals Judge Bill Schuette was retiring, Elsenheimer knew the jurist position would allow more time with his family. It would also expand on his 15 years of practicing law, part of that time as an assistant gan.


prosecutor for Antrim County.

Elsenheimer still has his Bellaire law firm, Young, Graham & Elsenheimer, P.C., and said he will practice there again if he isn't elected to the Court of Appeals. In the meantime, he is collecting petition signatures to file his candidacy with the Michigan Secretary of State. The deadline for him to file is April 29. The deadline for legislator candidates to

file nominating petitions is May 13. Hayes Township resident Connie Saltonstall, 62, a Democrat, filed her campaign paperwork with the Michigan Secretary of State prior to Elsenheimer's announcement. She said she is undaunted by the number of candidates.

"I know my reasons for running and I'm confident that my positions will be positive solutions for the people of the 105th District," Saltonstall said.

Saltonstall is a retired teacher and is the founder and a co-owner of a national media research company. She was a radio advertising executive and sales manager. She earned a bachelor's degree at the University of Michi-

Other political experience includes county commission board member, Charlevoix Public Schools Board of Education member, service on the Michigan Association of School Boards Taxation Committee, and volunteer work on various campaigns.

Saltonstall's volunteer activities include Hospice board Northern member. **Community Mediation** mediator and board member and Charlevoix Library Building Committee.

Young Republicans chairman for Cheboygan County and previously served as chair-Citizens man of Against New Taxes. I have also represented Republicans the




abroad, building important relationships with international allies and conservatives across the world," said Lennox.
